Canada Has Nice Trade Balance
Nearly \$200,000,000. is the Figure for Twelve Months Ended May 31.
Ottawa, June 27.—Canada has a favorable trade balance of nearly \$200,000,000 for the twelve months ended May 31. During that period Canadian products exported were worth \$1,069,715,880. Imports totalled \$873,867,732. Duty totalled \$129,956,468. Exports increased by \$10,000,000 over 1923 and imports increased by \$32,000,000. The chief increase in exports was in agricultural products and wood and paper.

STEWART WILL NOT MAKE ANY TERMS
Postal Strikers Must Come Back as New Employees if At All.
Ottawa, June 27.—Hon. Chas. Stewart, acting postmaster general, reiterated last night that the Government has not made any new offer to the striking postal workers since June 19, when proposals were made to the men's executive, on the eve of the strike. These proposals will stand Mr. Stewart said in the House of Commons yesterday, so far as the employees of the Government are concerned. The strikers, however, are regarded as having undertaken to make no further service. There is no barrier to their being taken back to work if the various postmasters can find room for them, but they will come back as new employees, and the Government does not see its way to treat with them as strikers or while they are not members of the post office department.

Take On More Men
Toronto, June 27.—Rejection by local striking postal workers yesterday of the Government's offer on June 19 of a sub-committee to investigate the strike, was also announced by postmaster general, when he said that the Dominion authorities were following up this morning by the employment of an additional number of substitute workers, whose names had been placed on the "accepted list" at the last oral examinations conducted by representatives of the Civil Service Commission.

Three Quarters of Greek Navy Officers Are In Mutiny; Would Oust Minister
Athens, June 27.—One hundred and fifty-five of the 200 officers in the Greek navy have mutinied and are demanding the resignation of Minister of Marine Hadjikyriacos.
The disgruntled officers charge that the minister promoted several superior officers unjustly. It is predicted in some quarters that the affair will develop into a serious one. All naval aviators have joined the mutiny. Premier Papastasiou refuses to comply with the demand to oust Hadjikyriacos and the Government declares that all party parties will be punished sternly. There is talk of executing the ring-leader.

WHITCOMBE LEADS SAYS PROHIBITION IS "A FALSE SCENT"
English Bishop So Assures a Rotary Club—Clergy Favors Model Inns.
London, June 27.—(British United Press.)—Prohibition pushes positive law beyond the proper limitations of personal rights. The moderate use of alcohol is a tradition of Christendom."
Dr. Hensley Henson, the Bishop of Durham, surprised the members of the Sunderland Rotary Club with this statement, declaring that prohibition was a false scent. He urged that the slums should be cleared and that the public houses should be improved. The number of clergy present at the opening of the Model Inn at Catford, which is a step in the direction of providing good public-houses for the people was surprisingly large and their presence is freely commented upon in the morning newspapers.

GERMANY WARNED
Paris, June 27.—(British United Press.)—Premier MacDonald and I have agreed that if Germany is loyal she will not be disturbed, but that if she is not loyal she will not be spared."
That was Premier Herriot's declaration in the Chamber of Deputies here today, when he outlined the results of his recent conversation in London and Brussels. He also gave the result of his talks in a speech before the Senate.
Premier MacDonald has informed me that in case Germany defaults England solemnly promises to remain beside the Allies," he told the Senate.

HALIFAX COUNCIL WANTS JUDGMENT
Revives Case of City Collector, Recently Released From Dorchester.
Halifax, June 27.—The finance committee of the city council, last night, unanimously passed a resolution to the effect that the city solicitor be instructed to take immediate action to secure judgment for \$104,000 against former City Collector Robert Theakston, who has recently been released from Dorchester Penitentiary after serving five months of a two years' sentence. The sum is the total amount known to date of the default in the collector's department. The resolution also asked that the former official be examined under the collection act.

IRISH FREE STATE HAS ITS MINISTER
Washington Heartily Agrees to Proposal of British Government in This Matter.
Washington, June 27.—Secretary Hughes was advised by the British Ambassador yesterday that the British Government deemed it desirable that the handling of matters at Washington exclusively relating to the Irish Free State should be confined to the Irish Minister Plenipotentiary accredited to the United States.

New York, June 27.—Imogene Wilson, whose bouts with Batting Frank Tinney raised her from lowly position of a girl in the chorus to a Follies star, went before the grand jury here today to tell of an alleged felonious assault upon her by the widely known blackface comedian.
Backed by Flo Ziegfeld himself, the actress said she would tell the same story she had already repeated in court and to the newspapers many times how Tinney pummelled her into unconsciousness.
Tinney is held under bail for the alleged attack in an apartment off Upper Broadway, which Tinney says is under lease by him, and in which Miss Wilson lived.

CANNIBAL STORY COMES TO 'FRISCO
Natives of Sokotia Island Alleged to Have Eaten Six Light-Keepers.
San Francisco, Cal., June 27.—Because cannibals had eaten the light-keeper on the island of Sokotia and consequently no light was showing, the President Garfield, due here July 3, was forced to anchor outside the island port all night, and so was delayed on its schedule, officials of the company in San Francisco reported.
Natives of this island, which lies between Colombo and Suez, in the Indian Ocean, have done away with five other light-keepers in this manner.
The advices stated that the authorities at Suez had thus informed the captain of the President Garfield.

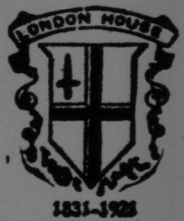

Consumption of coal will be cut down from 80,000 to 60,000 tons, thus curtailing the outputs in the Cape Breton and Pictou fields.

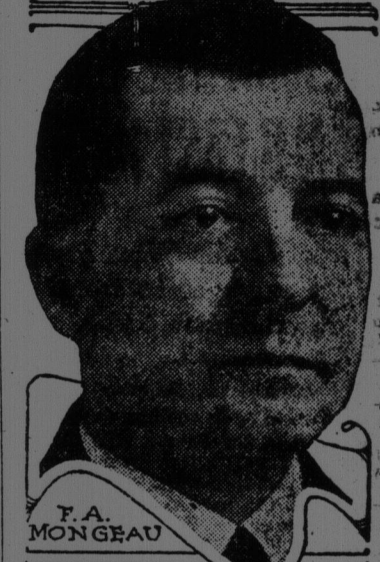

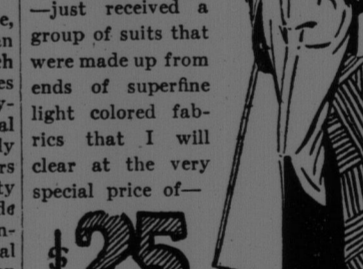

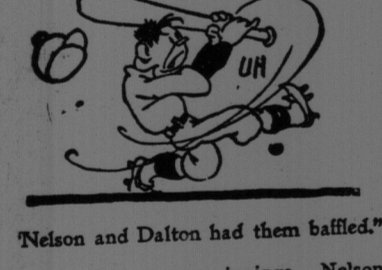

SOUTH AMERICANS ARE KEEN SPORTS

Washington, June 27.—In some respects the United States and Latin America has each its own peculiar sports, in which the other never can be expected to develop a great deal of interest except occasionally as a mere matter of curiosity.
