THIRTY-SIXTH SESSION.

KINGSTON, Monday, June 26th, 1899.

The Standing Committees appointed to report in reference to deceased members of the Synod, beg to report as follows:—

During the year the following clergymen have died, viz.: Revs. Messrs. Richard Lewis, M.A., Thomas Stanton, B.A., John Halliwell, and William Moore, M.A.

Richard Lewis was made Deacon on Trinity Sunday, 18th June, 1848, in St. George's Church, Lennoxville, by the Right Reverend George Jehoshaphat Mountain, Lord Bishop of Quebec; ordered Priest by the same Bishop, on Sunday, 3rd June, 1849, in the Cathedral, Quebec; licensed to the Mission of Port Neuf, Louis, and St. Catharines, Diocese of Quebec, 19th June, 1848; appointed Bector of Franktown, about 20th June, 1852; Rector of Kemptville, about 15th June, 1856; and Rector of Prescott, 7th April, 1858. Subsequently for many years and until incapacitated by illness, he was Rector of Augusta, and for some time was Rural Dean of Grenville. He died at Maitland on 10th March, 1899.

Thomas Stanton was made Deacon on 19th November, 1854, by the Lord Bishop of Norwich, England, and ordered Priest in May, 1856. He was licensed to the Curacy of North and South Topham, Norfolk, England. Having come to Canada, he was licensed to Enniskillen, in 1857; Marysburgh in 1859; Franktown in 1863; Camden in 1866; Tyendinaga in 1870; Trenton and Frankford in 1876; Marysburgh in 1880; Barriefield in 1882; and Deseronto in March, 1884. He was for some time Rural Dean of Hastings, and died at Deseronto on 3rd September, 1898.

John Halliwell was made Deacon 10th July, 1870, and ordered Priest on the 22nd September, 1872, by the Lord Bishop of Ontario. He was licensed to Finch, 8th July, 1870; Stirling, 1st January, 1873; Hillier, 24th June, 1876; and Vankleek Hill, 20th June, 1889. He resigned his parish in January, 1894, and was superannuated. He died on the 20th February, 1899.

William Moore was made Deacon in December, 1889, by the Lord Bishop of Ontario, and was appointed to the Parish of Leeds Rear in February, 1890. He was ordained Priest in June, 1890, and died at Lyndhurst in July, 1898.

George Burchill, a delegate to Synod from the Parish of Merrickville for one three years' term, died 25th July, 1898. Of him the Rev. Wm. Roberts writes that he was ever most kind and hospitable to the clergy, loyal to the Church, and a liberal contributor to its funds.

E. H. Whitmarsh was from the early years of the Diocese and down to 1886, almost continuously a delegate to the Synod from Merrickville. He was friendly, courteous, liberal, given to hospitality, and a staunch Churchman. He died on 11th April, 1899, age 90.

II.—PROPOSED CANONS.

1. By Judge Reynolds-

ield,

A Canon for the settlement of Differences between Clergymen and their Parishioners.

I. Whenever the Bishop of the Diocese believes that differences have arisen between a Rector or other Clergyman in charge of any rectory, parish, or mission in the Diocese, and communicants resident in the said rectory, parish, or mission, or that the condition of the rectory, parish, or mission is in any respect such as to require investigation, the Bishop may, and upon a request in writing signed by five persons qualified to vote at the election of lay representatives of such rectory, parish, or mission, or by the said Clergyman, shall, unless he shall be of opinion, after considering the whole circumstances of the case, that proceedings should not be taken (in which case he shall state his reasons in writing to one of the petitioners), appoint a Committee consisting of one Clerical and one Lay Member of the Synod of the Diocese, whose duty it shall be to proceed to the Rectory, parish, or mission, and endeavour, if possible, to bring about a settlement of the differences existing therein, or the removal of any grievance or cause of scandal or other hindrance to the peace or prosperity of the rectory, parish, or mission.

2. Within one month after their appointment the said Committee shall report in writing to the Bishop, and if the said Committee by their said report declare that they have failed to bring about a settlement of the said differences, and that for causes named in the report (not being subjects for investigation under the Canon on Church discipline) the said Committee consider it to be detrimental to the interests of the Church that such Rector or other Clergyman should longer remain in charge of such rectory, parish, or mission, and recommend that a commission of enquiry be issued to enquire into such complaints made by communicants of the Church resident in the rectory, parish, or mission as may be recited in the said report, the Bishop shall issue a commission to two Clergymen and one Layman (who shall be either the Chancellor of the Diocese or some other member

of the Synod being a Barrister of 10 years' standing and who shall be the chairman of the said commission) empowering the Commissioners therein named to hold such investigation.

- 3. As soon as conveniently may be after the issue of the commission the Commissioners shall give notice to the Clergyman in charge of such rectory, parish, or mission, and to the Church Wardens and Lay Representatives thereof, and to the petitioners for the commission of enquiry, of the time and place at which the Commissioners will hold their sittings.
- 4. The proceedings by and before the said commission shall be as nearly as possible similar to those provided in respect of the court for the trial of complaints under the Canon on Church discipline.
- 5. The Commissioners, or a majority of them, shall report with all convenient speed to the Lord Bishop of the Diocese the result of their enquiry, and may recommend that such action be taken in the premises as they may deem advisable.
- 6. The Lord Bishop shall take such action upon the report of the Commissioners as may seem to him desirable in case that needed power in that behalf be granted by the Legislature, and he may suspend or remove the Incumbent of such rectory, parish, or mission from his benefice.
- 7. Any Clergyman neglecting or refusing to obey any order so made by the Bishop under this Canon shall be punishable as for contumacy under the Canon on Church discipline.

2. By Rev. Rural Dean Forneri-

Proposed amendment to the proposed "Canon for the settlement of differences between Clergymen and their Parishioners."

Section 1. Whenever through unfortunate differences or dissensions arising between the incumbent of any parish or mission and his parishioners, or from any other cause (not involving any act or offence which might form the subject of criminal investigation under the Canon on Church Discipline) the peace of the said parish is seriously disturbed, and the Church therein is suffering injury and loss, the Bishop of the Diocese to which the said parish belongs, upon receiving a memorial representing the condition of affairs in the parish from the incumbent thereof, or from the church-wardens, being communicants, or from five communicants, being males of full age and for the previous six months resident in the parish, or of his own mere motion, shall, if he think fit, appoint a committee, consisting of one Clerical and one Lay member of the Synod of the Diocese whose duty it shall be, after notifying the Churchwardens and Incumbent of their commission, to proceed to the parish within fourteen days from their appointment, and enquire into the matter and use their good offices to bring about a settlement of the differences, or other causes of complaint existing therein, and a restoration of harmony and contentment to the parish.

Section 2. The said Committee, having performed the duty entrusted to them with all fidelity and discretion, shall forthwith draw up and transmit to the Bishop a full report of their enquiries and proceedings in the parish, and shall also state therein their opinion with regard to the probable results of their mediation.

Section 3. Should the Committee declare in their report that they have failed to reconcile the differences or remove the dissatisfaction of the parish, the Bishop may, if he think fit after considering all the circumstances of the case, suspend further action under this Canon until he shall have endeavored, by godly counsel and advice, to persuade and help the incumbent and his parishioners to arrange their difficulties and heal their divisions and dwell together in christian unity and concord.

Section 4. Should the Bishop decide not to suspend procedure under this Canon, or should his good offices fail to restore harmony, he shall forthwith require the incumbent of the parish and three representatives thereof, being parishioners (who shall be qualified and elected in the same manner as Lay delegates to the Synod are qualified and chosen), to state in writing (within fourteen days) whether they are willing to submit to the decisions and directions of their Father in God; and if both parties shall declare their readiness to do so, then the Bishop shall require them to appear before him at a certain specified time and place, with their witnesses, if any, to give an account to him of their parochial difficulties and complaints; and the Bishop shall proceed to hear the matter, with the assistance of two assessors, one Clerical and the other Lay, who shall be approved of by him, but nominated by the incumbent and representatives of the parish respectively; and the Bishop, upon hearing the said cause, shall determine the same without appeal, and shall give such judgment and issue such monition as he may think proper and expedient for the quieting and appeasing of the discontent in the parish.

Section 5. Should the Bishop and his assessors, after due deliberation, decide that the peace and well-being of the parish necessitates the removal of the incumbent therefrom, he shall be removed with all convenient expedition; nevertheless he shall not be compelled to resign his parish, nor to relinquish any portion of the income therefrom, until a suitable vacancy occurs elsewhere to which the Bishop is able and willing to appoint him.

Section 6. The expenses of conducting proceedings under the provisions of this Canon shall be borne by the parish or congregation concerned, except the personal and legal expenses, if any, of the incumbent for which he himself shall be answerable.

I.—ARCHBISHOP OF ONTARIO'S JUBILEE MEMORIAL FUND.

(1.) REPORT OF FIRST DELEGATION TO ENGLAND FROM DIOCESE OF ONTARIO.

(Presented to the Executive Committee, 26th May, 1898.)

I. At a special meeting of the Executive Committee held in Kingston on December 29th, 1897, a memorial was adopted which set forth the pressing needs of the Diocese, and the appropriateness of commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Archbishop's ordination to the Church's ministry occurring in July, 1898. Inter alia the following resolution was passed:

"That the Venerable the Archdeacon of Ontario and His Honour Judge McDonald be requested to act as a deputation to the Mother Churches of England and Ireland, and to press upon the attention of the Archbishops and Bishops, the great Societies, and other representatives of the pious munificence of the Church at home, the present condition and needs of the Diocese of Ontario, as set forth in the memorial prepared by this Committee, and the urgent necessity of immediate action being taken to meet those needs."

2. The undersigned, having consented to act as requested, left Brockville on Monday, January 10th. Arrangements were made for an interview with the Right Reverend Horatio Potter, D.D., Bishop of New York, through the kindness of the Rev. Dr. Body, sometime Provost of Trinity College, Toronto, and now Professor in the General Theological Seminary, New York. By special invitation the Delegation, with Mrs. Lewis and Dr. Body, breakfasted with the Bishop on the morning of the 12th of January, and subsequently the subject of the Diocesan needs was fully set before the Bishop and discussed The result was His Lordship's kind consent to the formation of a committee in his Diocese, with the suggestion that it should be formed of Canadians residing in New York, and with the Rev. Dr. Body to act as Hon. Secretary. The Delegation have not yet heard what success attended this action.

3. The Delegation sailed on the 12th and arrived in Liverpool on the 20th of January. Letters had been written by the Archdeacon to the Lord Bishops of Liverpool and Manchester and the Earl of Derby, and mailed at Queenstown, requesting interviews at an early date, so that the Delegation might explain the nature and object of their mission, and have their Lordships' patronage in its furtherance in the very beginning of their work. It was hoped that the influence of the Earl of Derby, who, as Lord Stanley of Preston, had been recently Governor General of Canada and a contributor to the Episcopal Endowment of the See of Ottawa, would have been readily accorded, but in this the Delegation was disappointed.

4. On the day of arrival the Delegation called on the Lord Bishop of Liverpool, but found him engaged elsewhere with his Clergy; but by appointment the Delegation had a very agreeable and satisfactory interview with him on the 22nd. His Lordship then not only sanctioned the appeal being made in his diocese, but made valuable suggestions and consented to speak on its behalf at a public meeting.

5. Efforts were at once made to interest influential Churchmen of Liverpool and to secure a strong committee. In passing it may be mentioned that while awaiting the interview with the Lord Bishop of Liverpool, the Delegation were hospitably entertained by Mrs. Butler (sister of Mrs. Lewis) at High Lawn, Bolton-le-Moors, Diocese of Manchester, and there received the first subscriptions to the fund: five pounds from Mrs. Butler and a lady visitor, who subsequently added the handsome contribution of fifty pounds to her first guinea.

6. And here it must be stated that all the success attending the efforts made in Liverpool was largely due to the active and unwearied co-operation of Thomas

A. Leigh, Esq. Not only by his hospitable entertainment at his house at New Brighton, and in Liverpool, did he save a great amount of expense, but his devotion of time and consideration were of the utmost assistance from the beginning to the end of our sojourn in England. It was mainly owing to Mr. Leigh's good offices that the following committee was formed —Sir George Baden-Powell, M.P., John S. Harmwood Banner, Thomas H. Barker, F. C. Danson, Alfred L. Jones, Charles McArthur, M.P., Thomas B. Neale, Sir E. R. Russell, M.P., H. Grendon Tippet, A. F. Warr, M.P.; G. A. Shipley, Hon. Treasurer (Bank of Liverpool, Heywood's branch); T. A. Leigh, Hon. Sec'y, 19 James St.

- 7. Finding that further action in Liverpool would be of no avail until the meeting had been held, the Delegation proceeded to Manchester to solicit the imprimatur of the Lord Bishop, and they were courteously received by His Lordship on January 24th. Dr. Moorhouse readily gave his consent to the appeal being made in his diocese, but frankly stated his inability to give any practical assistance, as he had just appealed to the diocese for eighty thousand pounds, for very pressing objects. In Manchester the Delegation drew up a condensed form of appeal, and had this widely circulated in Liverpool and Manchester.
- 8. Liverpool was again visited, and there was considerable canvassing among the leading merchants up to January 26th, preparatory to the meeting there, which could not be held, however, before February 28th. It was impossible to arrange for any meeting in Manchester, it being felt that the most important business was the securing the sanction of the Archbishop of Canterbury and the work to be done in London. Still, many Manchester gentlemen were interviewed, among them the Dean, who offered his pulpit at a later period of the year, but these interviews did not result in any pecuniary benefit.
- 9. On January 27th the Archdeacon left for London and virtually began work there next day, January 28th, when he became a member of the Church House Corporation by paying the subscription of one guinea, which secured to the Delegation the free use of the writing room as an office, with all the stationery required during their stay, and gave them other material advantages. Learning that the Archbishop of Canterbury was at Lambeth the Archdeacon on the same day called on His Grace, and was most kindly received. The subject of appeal was discussed in a friendly manner, and the Archbishop promised to read the papers and communicate with the Archdeacon as to the time of receiving the Delegation formally. This was arranged afterwards on February 2nd for February 11th, the first day at His Grace's disposal.
- rio. The delegation now met regularly each morning at the Church House, writing letters to all important personages, drafting the press notices, and consulting as to the work to be done every day. On January 31st, the Archdeacon had a prolonged interview with the officials of the S.P.G., but the Secretary, Prebendary Tucker, who had seen the notices published in the Church papers, took a most unfavorable view of the appeal, and would give no encouragement whatever to any application to the Society.

11. On February 3rd the Archdeacon had an interview of a very different nature with the Secretary of the S.P.C.K., Rev. W. Osborn B. Allen. Mr. Allen spoke hopefully of the result of an application, but requiring certain definite information as to the investments and disposition of funds, for which the same day a letter was written to Canon Spencer.

12. The intervening days were occupied busily in preparing for a meeting at the Mansion House, and in communicating with prominent clergymen and laymen. But it was felt that the pledged sanction of the Archbishop was essential to success, and for this they had to wait patiently. However, on February 11th the interview was held, and after hearing the statements of the Delegation (who were accompanied by Mrs. Lewis), His Grace promised his warm support, and that he would speak on behalf of the fund at the proposed Mansion House meeting. The delegation had agreeable interviews with the Lord Bishop of London and the Lord Mayor, the latter granting the use of the Mansion House for a meeting at which he would preside. There was no little difficulty in making arrangements to suit the convenience of the Archbishop, the Bishop, the Lord Mayor and others, but finally the 9th of March was found to be the very earliest day practicable for holding the meeting.

13 Meanwhile the meeting at Liverpool and the canvass there had to be looked after, and the Archdeacon, at the request of the Liverpool committee, returned there and prosecuted an active canvass from February 15th to February 19th, greatly assisted by Mr. T. A. Leigh.

The work in Liverpool and London now so fully engaged the attention of the Delegates that it was impossible to arrange for and organize meetings at other places, although there was much correspondence with, and contributions or subscriptions now and then received from, friends elsewhere in England.

14. On February 14th the Delegation returned to Liverpool and were busily engaged there until the 28th, when their first meeting was held in the Town Hall, the Lord Mayor presiding and speaking strongly in favour of the appeal from Ontario. After the Delegates had stated their case, showing maps of the diocese and fully explaining its present needs, the Lord Bishop of Liverpool made a vigorous speech in support of our cause. This had been presented to the public otherwise in the press, by several communications from the pen of the Archdeacon. Notwithstanding, the meeting was very poorly attended and, apart from one or two promised subscriptions, the receipts were only one pound, fifteen shillings. On the three days following the Delegation continued a personal canvass of Liverpool merchants, but the financial results were so unsatisfactory that they returned to London, to prepare for the meeting there and the formation of a committee if possible.

15. Every pains was taken to secure a good attendance at the Mansion House meeting on March 9th. The Lord Mayor and the Lady Mayoress kindly allowed the invitations sent out to about two thousand persons to be issued in their names. The Archdeacon's personal acquaintance with the Marquis of Lorne secured at once his interest in the cause and his presence at the meeting. It was duly held, and after it was opened by the Lord Mayor addresses were de-

live ed by the Delegates, followed by excellent speeches by the Archbishop of Camerbury, the Marquis of Lorne, Archbishop Machray, Primate of all Canada, Sir George Baden-Powell, Bart., M.P., Rev. Canon Benham, and F. A. Bevan, Esq., Treasurer, and resolutions were passed commending the appeal and naming a London Committee. But here again the results were disappointing. The collection amounted to only four pounds, six shillings and six pence, of which one pound, ten shillings, was, according to custom, paid as a gratuity to the servants at the Mansion House.

- 16. The Delegation had several interviews with the S.P.C.K., and were informed that the appeal had been brought before the Standing Committee, and remained for consideration in the usual way. The replies from the Clerical Secretary arrived and were duly sent to the S.P.C.K. Committee, and since the return of the Archdeacon to Canada he has had the satisfaction of receiving an official letter from the Rev. W. O. B. Allen, stating that the Society has voted five hundred pounds upon the usual conditions, viz.: that forty-five hundred pounds is raised otherwise, and that proportionate sums will be paid as the money is raised in the diocese. This is a matter of congratulation. Mr. Allen's letter is herewith appended.
- 17. The remaining time was spent in London, endeavoring to get the committee together and add to its number. Few, if any, members of the General Committee who gave their names as such subscribed to our fund, while many of those who were confidently expected to give assistance declined even to have their names appear as honorary members. Among them were the Lord Bishop of Salisbury, the Provost of Trinity College, Dublin, the Dean of St. Patrick's, the arquis of Dufferin, the Earl of Selborne, the Dean of St. Paul's, the Dean of Norwich (who never replied to the Archdeacon's earnest letter), the Hon. and Rev. Montague Villiers, Mr. Athelstan Riley (after a long personal interview), and others. Since the Archdeacon's return he has received Mr. Riley's note enclosing a subscription.
- 18. Most of the members of the committee were busy Members of Parliament, and it was the Lenten season, when all the clergy were exceedingly occupied and it was not possible to secure their attendance. One or two committee meetings were held, and one informally in the House of Commons itself. Day after day, up to Holy Week, the Delegates met at the Church House and worked at correspondence and advertisements, while visits were paid to those presumed to have influence.
- 19. But as the result of all this work the Delegation soon found that several causes militated against the appeal, of which the chief were the following three:
 —1st. The recent Diamond Jubilee had almost drained the springs of English benevolence; so much so that all the ordinary charities were suffering from lack of funds. People were tired of the very word "Jubilee," and even the personality of an Archbishop did not evoke a response. The most prominent Liverpool layman, a Churchman and a personal friend of the Lord Bishop (who had requested the delegates to see him), curtly declared he never wished to hear the word "Jubilee" again, and refused to listen to any advocacy of the appeal,

which had been previously sent him in print and which he assured the Delegation he had carefully read but considered not worthy of the smallest contribution. 2nd. From this gentleman and from many others the Delegates heard a generally expressed feeling that Canada, and especially the Province of Ontario, was so commercially prosperous that any appeal to England ought to be unnecessary, and that after the long episcopate of our Archbishop it was from the Church members of the diocese itself, and not from those outside, that the funds for the commemoration should come. 3rd. The crying necessities of the clergy in England, for which appeals were being made on every side, anticipated and precluded our own; while from every pulpit during the Lenten season sermons were being preached on behalf of all manner of most urgent local claims. We found that the time of our visit was most inopportune, and our cause more or less unpopular. While we cannot be too grateful for the personal kindness of so many of the clergy and laity, we could not but see that our cause evoked but little sympathy from the Church public generally. In fact, any money received was contributed for the most part out of personal consideration to members of the Delegation and not from any desire to help the diocese. Still, the Delegation has sown seed and while we are not at all sanguine this may possibly bear better fruit than our experience leads us to expect.

20. All moneys received by the Delegation were deposited with the Treasurers in Liverpool and London, with the exception of a few sums handed to Mrs. Lewis at her request, to be credited to her account in Manchester. As far as known to the Delegation the total amounts to the credit of the Appeal Fund up to the date of their leaving England were, two hundred and eighty-nine pounds, one shilling and tenpence, of which two hundred and thirty pounds, one shilling and sevenpence were the result of the personal application of the Delegation. To this amount should be added the prospective grant of the S.P.C.K. What may be done by the S.P.G. remains to be seen. A formal and strongly written appeal was made by the Archdeacon, and the Secretary promised that it should be laid before the Standing Committee.*

21. The Archdeacon having kept a careful account of all receipts and expenditures as delegate begs to present herewith a complete statement of these, together with the statement received from the Liverpool Treasurer, with the vouchers of payments made by the Hon. Secretary in Liverpool, and vouchers for his own disbursements. This statement will show that after deducting the railway and steamboat fares and expenses connected with travelling, the Archdeacon's personal expenditure for three months was but thirteen pounds sixteen shillings and sixpence, or \$69.12. This is due to the generous hospitality afforded him by his brother, Dr. H. Macnaughton Jones, of Harley street, during the whole period of his stay in London.

- deposited with the Liverpool Treasurer was transferred to the Bank of Barclay & Bevan, Lombard street, London, one of the heads of which, Mr. F. A. Bevan, had become our London Treasurer.
- 23. To economize as much as possible the Archdeacon applied for and obtained an emigrant chaplaincy on board the steamship "Scotsman," which sailed from Liverpool on April 14th, his passage thereby costing but five pounds, and he resumed his parochial duties the day of his arrival, April 26th. During his absence these duties were efficiently discharged by the Rev. Harold H. Bedford-Jones, M.A., Fellow of Trinity University, whose expenses in travelling backwards and forwards between Brockville and Toronto and the payment of a substitute at Trinity were barely covered by the stipulated \$120,

Judge McDonald returned by the steamship "Labrador," arriving in Brockville on Sunday, May 8th.

The undersigned regret that they have not a far more gratifying report to present as regards the financial results. They are themselves greatly disappointed. But they consider it best to state the facts as they found them, leaving it to the Committee and the Diocese to say whether there should be a further prosecution of the appeal outside the Diocese.

A detailed statement of the disbursements of each member of the Delegation and of the sums received to meet the same has been handed to the Clerical Secretary.

To the Executive Committee of the Diocese of Ontario:

GENTLEMEN:

In accordance with your request I herewith beg leave to present my report re the canvass in England on behalf of the Archbishop of Ontario's Commemoration Fund.

Having been summoned to Kingston on April 12th, I had an interview with His Grace the Archbishop and with your sub committee, and on the following Saturday, 16th, I sailed for England, arriving in London on the 26th. I went directly to 45 Eastbourne Terrace, where I met Mrs. Lewis, and finding the house not habitable I went that evening to Staines and there awaited instructions from Mrs. Lewis. On the 28th I returned to London and commenced my work.

I found it a most difficult task at first, owing to the fact there were no minutes of what had occurred on record, nor could I discover the names even of the London Committee to whom I could refer.* The Manifestoes were not to be found, and when I did succeed in tracing them out I could not find on them one half the names of those who were represented to me as being members of that committee. The first thing I set to work to do was to get them completed. After some little delay and work I succeeded in adding to the list the following: The Primus of Scotland, the Lord Bishops of Edinburgh, Glasgow, and Rochester, the Lord Mayor of London, the Earl of Erne, the Marquis of Dufferin and Ava, Mr. F. A. Bevan, the Archdeacon of London, the Rev. H. C. Evans (the Archbishop's Commissary), Canon F. H. Murray, the Earl of Derby, the Archbishop of York, and the Dean of York. These names, together with those already secured, formed a committee that one would think sufficient to have enabled any one to make the appeal, which I was sent to make, a perfect success.

It was not until the 24th of May that I succeeded in getting together a quorum of the London Committee, and even then only some four or five members attended. Awaiting this meeting I was engaged in making myself known, and in enlisting the sympathy of some personal friends. What occurred at this and all subsequent meetings is fully set forth in the Minute Book.

I secured a license to officiate from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, as well as the Archbishops of Armagh and Dublin, and put myself in communication with nearly all the Bishops in England, Ireland, Scotland, and Wales, receiving encouraging letters from a few, but not so from the majority, who referred to the matter in detail. I experienced great delay and inconvenience at the hands of the printers, and it was not till the latter part of May or the beginning of June that I received the printed appeals from them. In the meantime preparation was being made for sending them out as soon as received

by getting the envelopes addressed and stamped. Some six or seven thousand appeals were sent out, the names having been prepared by Mrs. Lewis from other similar lists, who had engaged a Miss Wells to assist her. I regret to have to state it, but I firmly believe that by far the majority of these printed appeals were never even so much as opened, or if opened immediately consigned to the waste paper basket. To the 2,300 circulars sent to the clergy I feel safe in saying that you could count the replies on the fingers of your hands. Where I did succeed in getting sermons it was the outcome of personal letters or interviews.

The causes of the failure of the effort are many and varied. In the first place, from the very beginning some of those who affixed their names as commending and approving the scheme had no faith in it whatever. Mr. F. A. Bevan, in a letter dated June 27th, says:

"As I saw from the beginning, the whole scheme was bound to be a fiasco, and I never encouraged Mrs. Lewis to think otherwise. I am very sorry that you should have had such a thankless task imposed upon you."

This, coming as it does from a leading London banker and thorough business man, did not augur well for the chances of success. I received some letters the tone of which was by no means complimentary. The fact that at St. Peter's church, Eaton Square, a church situate in the very centre of one of the most fashionable parts of the city of London, a church in the habit of giving its three and four thousand pounds on Hospital Sunday, and that it was in the height of the London season, and the Archbishop of Canterbury announced to preach—that in the face of all these favourable circumstances the offertory amounted to only twenty-three pounds, only added additional testimony to Mr. Bevan's surmise.

The success which attended the Mansion House meeting was not such as to give that encouragement which generally follows such an august event.

Another cause for the failure of the effort is, I think, due to the trouble that the controversy in connection with the Ritual question was causing.

The name of the Diocese of Ontario misled a good many, as they confounded it with the province of the same name. More than once I was told that Canada ought to be able to support its own Church without coming to England for help.

That the Appeal was not popular can be seen from the following sample of letters which I received. One person writes: "I doubt whether a meeting with the prosaic object of raising an endowment sum for a colonial diocese would appeal to the imagination or rouse the sympathy of a handful of small farmers and labourers." Another writes thus: "I really must be allowed to remonstrate with you on sending to me, I suppose amongst the rest of the clergy of England, a preposterous request that we should send money to the thriving Dominion," and he concludes his letter by saying: "It really is a trifle too bad to pass the Coloniai hat round for money to enable the discharge of Canadian first duty, its duty to its God, and that to us poor English Clergy, with half of our incomes lost through legislation. The "Rev." before your name ought to have kept you from such a pitiful application from your brethren."

The proposal for the appointment of a Co-adjutor for the diocese also had a dampening effect upon my work. More than once it was said to me that I was soliciting aid for the superannuation of our Archbishop, and thereby seeking to form a fund which they do not possess themselves. "Charity begins at home," they would say to me.

The absence of the names of the committee on the subscription list also told against me, as some took care to tell me, and I must confess that at first they were very slow in subscribing. In fact only a few did so at all.

I prepared a list of the donors for publication, and presented it to the Committee at our last meeting, on November 2nd, and they strongly advised me not to publish it. Instead of doing so I left a complete list and statement of accounts with the Rev. J. Storrs, of St. Peter's, Eaton Square.

I sincerely regret the failure of the undertaking, though I feel that it is not owing to any lack of attention or devotion on my part. I worked as hard as I could, but the fates seemed against the project.

Too much praise cannot be given to the Rev. J. Storrs, who gave me every assistance in his power, and I may couple with his name that of one since called away, the late Sir George Baden-Powell.

Before leaving England I wrote letters to those members of the committee who attended the meetings, thanking them for the kind interest they had taken in the cause, including in that number His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury.

A statement of the receipts and expenditures has been forwarded to the Clerical Secretary.

2.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONARY STIPENDS.

The Committee appointed at the last synod to consider in what way the status of the Missionary Clergy may be financially improved, whether in the manner suggested by the Mission Board Report or otherwise, begs to report as follows: After careful consideration of the subject at two meetings, the Committee came to the conclusion that under existing circumstances it would not be wise to recommend any radical changes in our existing system, however desirable. Moreover it was found that our brethren in the Diocese of Ottawa had decided on making a change which they are hopeful will prove of material benefit to their mission work hitherto conducted on the same lines as our own. It seemed to your Committee that it would be prudent for the present to await the result of this action of the Ottawa Diocese and benefit by their experience. The whole subject, however, with regard to the adequate stipends of Missionaries, their scale according to length of service, and the regularity of payment, is one deserving of our best attention, and your Committee would respectfully ask to be reappointed in the hope that by next Synod they may be in a position to recommend some definite scheme, which may either modify or change the existing condition of things, which is admitted to be anything but satisfactory.

5.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION IN SCHOOLS.

Nothing so far has been accomplished, and your Committee can at this stage make no definite statement as to the probable success or failure of any scheme proposed.

Your Committee asks to be re-appointed in order that the Diocese may be kept informed of the progress of the movement and aid in the settlement of the details of whatever scheme may be agreed upon.

Reports of the Standing Committees.

1.—REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee presents the following report of its proceedings since the Thirty-fifth Session of Synod:—

APPOINTMENT OF AUDITORS.

Messis. J. H. Birkett and R. J. Hooper were appointed Official Auditors immediately after the close of the Thirty-fifth Session, as provided by the Canon.

MORTGAGING OF CHURCH PROPERTY.

Consent was given to the mortgaging of the new rectory at Bath for \$500; and to the placing of a new mortgage for \$4000, bearing interest at 5%, upon Trinity Church, Brockville, in lieu of the former mortgage for \$5000, bearing 6%.

SALE OF CHURCH PROPERTY.

Conditional leave was given to sell a Church lot at Roblin and the old Church at Young's Corners, in the Mission of Selby, the proceeds to be applied to the completion of the Church at Selby; also, for the sale of a glebe lot in Trenton for \$100. The conditions attached to the sale of land forming the endowment of Amherst Island were changed by raising the upset price of one of the properties by \$1000; and pending the sale the rector and two other trustees were empowered to effect a loan of \$700 to be expended on the improvement of the property, \$500 to be repaid out of half of the rent as it accrues, and the balance at the end of seven years, or sooner if the land is sold.

INSPECTION AND VALUATION OF REAL ESTATE.

Direction was given for the inspection and valuation of all real estate arising from foreclosed mortgages held by the Synod.

TITLE AND PROTECTION OF CHURCH PROPERTY.

A Committee consisting of the Chancellor, Judge Reynolds, and Dr. Smythe, Q.C., was appointed to consider the title to properties held in trust for the Church in this Diocese, and to report on the steps necessary to be taken for the protection of such properties.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE, 1898-9.

Your Committee beg leave to report that the accompanying financial statement was presented. Accounts amounting to \$88.66 were presented and ordered to be paid.

A letter was read from Rev. Mr. Swayne, asking to have his arrears of assessment, due by Mission of Selby, remitted. Request was granted on condition of the payment of \$15, which included the assessment up to April 30th, 1899.

Your Committee further recommend that on and after the current Synodical year the Archbishop's travelling expenses of \$200 be discontinued.

Your Committee cannot see its way clear to recommend the payment, after the current year from the Assessment Fund, of the interest on the See House mortgage owing to the limitations contained in Canon XI, 8. At the same time, your Committee is strongly of opinion that under no circumstances should the income of the Episcopal Fund in any way be charged with the payment of the said interest, or any part thereof, and recommends that a special committee be appointed to devise ways and means to provide for the payment of said interest and for relieving the Episcopal Fund of the charge caused by the investment, said committee to be composed of the Very Rev. the Dean, Rev. Messrs. Patton, Rural Dean Wright, Woodcock, Dibb, McTear, the Chancellor, and Messrs. Pense, Smythe, Carson, Rogers, Briscoe, and O'Loughlin.

Your Committee further recommend that \$100 be allowed for office expenses; audit, \$50; guarantee policy, \$50; postage and stationery, \$100; rent, taxes, and

Your Committee does not think it judicious to reduce the Clerical Secretary's salary.

3.—REPORT OF THE MISSION BOARD.

The Mission Board begs to present the following report for the year ending April 30th, 1899. The board meetings have been duly held, and the full attendance of both clerical and lay members denotes the deep interest taken in this most important department of Diocesan Church work. The presence and earnest co-operation of so many laymen deserves a passing and grateful recognition by the chairman.

It is with deep regret that notwithstanding all efforts made during the year the Board has to report a considerable falling off in the funds placed at its disposal. For the convenience of Synod members it may be well to give side by side the figures showing the two years' receipts:

These figures show a steady diminution in our sources of revenue especially as regards parochial collections, and in special offerings. It must, however, be remembered that in both the Trinity and special offerings of 1897–8 were included the gifts of the Queen's Jubilee year, and the Thank-offering of the Ontario W. A. amounting to \$217.28. The total decrease is \$937.67; and the result at the end of the financial year was an overdraft of \$2648.85, over double that with which the year began, viz: \$1256.33. The figures show also that in addition to the reduction of income, the expenditure was increased by additional grants, deputation expenses, and by the interest on the borrowed money.

Having these facts before them the Board resolved to proceed with caution and make this year one of retrenchment. However much it may be deplored it is a painful necessity. For the information of the Synod and Church

members generally the following circumstances may be stated. The Board is guided in its amual apportionment of grants by a classification committee, which consists of three experienced laymen, the treasurer and two judges, and three clergymen, all well acquainted for years with the Diocese. Last month this Committee made a careful survey of the whole field of our missionary operations. Having received reports from every mission, they weighed impartially the claims and merits of each and all. Then instead of basing the classification as heretofore on a fluctuating amount of probable revenue (such as that of a previous year or a year before), they stated the lowest actual sum now required in their judgment to maintain our Diocesan missions with efficiency. They represented where the progressive work of the Church might be judiciously developed by subdivision, and economy practised by amalgamation of stations; or where a small additional assistance would be of material benefit to missionary and congregation, and promote the interests of the Church. Accordingly their report recommended, as the missionary requirements of the Diocese, grants to the amount of \$6,225. This would make a small increase of \$200 on the expenditure of last year. Alas, in view of the sad fact that our overdraft had doubled, the Board, after earnest discussion of various expedients and suggestions, was compelled to request the Committee to reconsider their report in consultation with the Rural Deans, and make substantial reductions. This has been done in the classification herewith appended and now submitted to the Synod. The apportionment of grants has been reduced from \$6225.00 to \$5275.00, or by nearly \$1000.00. How this action will affect the Diocese remains to be seen.

The reduction of grants is inevitable. Our people generally will, we trust, now understand that the Mission Board has no right to spend more money than it has a reasonable prospect of receiving. And yet some good may result from the present distress. It may indeed necessitate an improvement in our whole system of Missionary relief and bring about the attainment of two most desirable objects: 1st, the arousing of Church members everywhere to a keener sense of their brotherhood obligations, the stronger to the weaker ones of the same household of faith; and 2nd, the creating or encouraging a spirit of independence and self-reliance—involving, it may be, no little self-sacrifice—on the part of our brethren too long trusting to the assistance received through the Mission Board. There are, and no doubt there always will be, some missions so poor that they must stand in need of financial help.

In consideration of the present condition of our finances the Board appointed a sub-committee to report a scheme for a regular and thorough visitation of all parishes and missions with a view to stirring up the congregations to more generous and more general contribution to the Mission Fund; and the report of this Committee, which has been unanimously approved by the Board, is herewith appended.

The time seems to have come when, after thirty-seven years of independent life and faithful teaching, our Diocese should be bearing fruit in much more liberal support of the Church's ministrations and in a higher appreciation of her spiritual

privileges. The Board earnestly hopes that this effort to place the Mission Fund on a new basis will be attended with success. All our brethren must surely know that in the past the Church has grown and prospered, under God's blessing, mainly through the ministration and operation of the Mission Fund; and they must now be urged to feel that growth and prosperity for the future will depend on its continued and increased support.

REPORT OF SUB-COMMITTEE.

To the Mission Board:

Gentlemen:—The Sub-committee appointed to consider the necessity of more general and more generous support of the Diocesan Mission Fund, in view of the increasing debt and the recent reduction of Missionaries' stipends, offer these recommendations:

Systematic and thorough canvassing of the whole diocese by one clergyman for each rural deanery to take place, and to supersede the old system of missionary deputations.

That the work be carried on earlier in the year, beginning in the autumn, with Sunday addresses where practicable, and with enough of a personal canvass to raise the standard of giving in each parish.

That the rural deans be earnestly requested to assist in supplying the places of the absent canvassers, and to facilitate their work in every way; to the end that the Mission Fund debt may be liquidated, and the income increased until adequate to the important work of sustentation and expansion.

That the necessary expenses of the canvassers be paid out of the Mission Board's funds.

That these clergymen be earnestly invited to undertake the canvass:

4.—REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee has the gratification of being able to report a decided increase in the contributions received during the past year. For the year ending April 30th, 1898, the amount was \$1,850.75; while for the year just closed the amount was \$2,384.08. Of this, however, \$1,117 was from the Woman's Auxiliary; and their contributions were considerably increased by their Triennial Thank-offering to the Hospital at Nagano, Japan.

Special services and collections in connection with the celebration of the centenary of the C. M. S. also served to bring up the amounts received during

the year. If a large number of parishes had taken an interest in the anniversary of this great society a contribution more worthy of this Archdiocese and its reputation would have been the result. However, another special opportunity will soon be given to us all of showing to what extent we appreciate the last command of our dear Master, because in June of next year the venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts hopes to celebrate its bicentenary and jubilee.

Your Committee would suggest that it be referred to them to take such steps as may enable the Diocese of Ontario to worthily join with all the other friends of the S. P. G. in commemorating the one hundred and ninety-ninth anniversary of the day on which the Royal Charter was granted by his Majesty, William III, to that venerable society to which the Canadian Church owes so much.

As usual several parishes have been altogether unmindful of the Church's great work outside our own Diocese and indifferent to the instructions of the House of Bishops on the subject. This neglect is to be regretted not only for the sake of the cause but also of the parishes themselves and of the Diocese. These defaulters lose the promised blessings, and the fair name of the Diocese is dimmed, as Ontario is placed almost at the foot when the contributions of the Canadian Dioceses are announced.

The faithful and energetic Woman's Auxiliary last year devoted their annual Thank-offering to the cause of the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy of the Diocese; this year they gave it to the Mission Fund; this coming season they are to bear in mind once again the widow and the orphan.

The Episcopal Fund Committee beg leave to report:

That the capital of the Fund remains unchanged, viz: \$59,208.48

This increase is due to the payment of an insurance premium, repairs, some minor expenses, and interest on the overdraft, aggregating \$275.73. 14.—REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church has pleasure in assuring the Synod that they have prepared their report with care and caution, and that in several particulars it will be found most encouraging. Returns have been received from every parish and mission, except Parham till lately unfortunately vacant. Distinct gains appear under the headings of families, total population, and communicants, as well as in the number baptized and confirmed; and these increases seem to warrant us in believing that we are at least holding our ground in the spiritual supervision of those entrusted to our care. As regards communicants, the most significant item in the list, the increase aggregates 557. The gains appear in those Rural Deaneries in which confirmations have been held, viz: Hastings, Leeds, Lennox and Addington, and Prince Edward; the losses in Frontenac and Grenville, where general confirmations are reported in but two parishes. In the former group the increases appear in 25 parishes out of 33, and are in most cases so reasonable and moderate as to represent stable and healthy growth. In a few instances, however, the additions have been very large. The incumbent of Trinity Church, Brockville, presented 102 candidates for confirmation in May, 1898, and now reports a gain of 133 communicants. Trenton follows with 64; then the great mission of Dungannon with 62; then Bath, Picton, Newboro, etc., with diminishing numbers. As comparisons seem to be in the air at present, your Committee may be permitted to state that St. George's, Kingston, which was at one time distanced by Trinity Church, Brockville, and Merrickville, now leads the Diocese in the number of its communicants. St. James', Kingston, once fifth, is now second, but may well fear lest it be overtaken by Trinity, Brockville, which bids fair to regain its former standing and is now a good third. Then comes Merrickville, then Tyendinaga, then Trenton and Picton, differing only by a unit, then St. Thomas', Belleville.

In the See City we have of late years made little or no advance in this particular. In 1891, when St. George's had just turned 400 and St. James' 300, our total for the city was a little larger than it is to-day. The same state of things appears in Belleville and Brockville, the two smaller cities of the Diocese, and should lead to great searchings of heart as to whether the Church is the spiritual power she should be upon the considerable number of semi-lapsed households in our denser centres. Most clergymen, it is true, readily explain to themselves their small gains from year to year by looking over their list of confirmees and finding the numerical addition almost wholly effaced by removals and by deaths. Nevertheless, if only the whole Church exhaled a richer aroma of Christian love and aggressiveness, we might hope that the 557 over whom we rejoice to-day would be added to by many souls brought in by conquest for Christ.

In the four columns which tabulate our various religious services, there has been a decrease. But this may in great part be explained by the deplorable destruction of our Cathedral and the serious illness of the Rector of All Saints', Kingston. In these two churches and in St. Peter's, Brockville, and St. Thomas', Belleville, there is daily prayer. In All Saints' and St. Thomas' there is also a daily celebration of the Holy Communion. The exceptionally frequent services held in these churches by their faithful clergymen are nearly one-half of all that are held in the Diocese, and any considerable reduction necessitated in these quarters must noticeably affect the numerical resultant. The usual average will, of course, be restored with the restoration of these parishes to their normal condition.

No very satisfactory progress can be reported in the state of our Sunday schools. Our male teachers, already far too few, have decreased by fifteen. We have again to emphasize what seems to be the fact, that this is the weakest department of our Church's operations. In some cases, indeed, the faithful and overworked clergyman is himself the catechist, and where such an arrangement can be, this old-fashioned canonical method is one of the best. But in three or four missions with from 50 to 80 families, neither Sunday school nor catechizing is reported, and there are half a dozen other missions of the same size where the children reported as Sunday scholars are a mere handful. A certain number in these missions are almost sure to receive a form of religious teaching apart from the Church, and so may be ultimately lost to us. The subject of the establishment and effectiveness of the Sunday school, therefore, is worthy the constant attention of every clergyman; and the Committee on Sunday schools may go on considering how best to educate a few of our most intelligent members into efficient teachers.

Coming to the subject of finance, we note a considerable increase in every object contributed to, save in that particular in which your Committee desires least to see a falling off, the matter of clerical stipend. The decline is small, however, and represents little or no personal hardship. The total giving of the year, including about \$5,000 contributed towards the Diocesan Augmentation Endowment Fund, a mere fraction of which appears in the figures supplied to your Committee, amounts to \$83,417, being \$10,835 in excess of last year. Your Committee, without venturing to say which parishes are the most liberal (for proportionate giving depends upon such a variety of considerations that it is next to

St. James', Kingston, this year, and usually, stands second. The three Brockville churches, St. Peter's, St. Paul's, and Trinity, come next, keeping well abreast, but in the order named; then St. Thomas', Belleville.

The tearful ruin of the holy and beautiful house in which it has been our privilege to worship from time to time in this place, but which (D G.) under the calm courage and generosity of those most immediately concerned is already beginning to rise from its debris and ashes, has made a temporary reduction in the value of Church property. In the Deaneries of Hastings, Leeds, and Prince Edward, however, there have been notable increases amounting in the aggregate to over \$15,000.

In our substantial advances, then, in things spiritual and financial, we have multiplied evidences that there is no atrophy in our parish life and activity, but on the contrary that there is much to encourage us to persevere in the face of inevitable difficulties. Our blessed Master is even now giving us palpable assurance that no work done for His honour, no loving effort to draw the souls of men closer to him, no earnest struggle against the devil, the world, and the flesh, will ever be made in vain. Remembering the solemn words of our own Christian poet,

"And ah! to him what tenfold woe, Who hides so well his sin, Through earth he seems a saint to go, Yet dies impure within,"

let us make it our constant prayer that He will first purify us, and then use us; and we shall find that His Spirit, abiding in the Church, His temple, is a salient spring of life which shall give to our efforts such success as He shall see best for us, and which shall last till He come again.

At Ardoch a new church was opened last winter by the Lord Bishop of Ottawa. In January a beautiful brick Church was opened at Sharbot Lake. It cost some two thousand dollars, which was paid for with the exception of two hundred dollars before the Church was opened. This speaks well for the liberality of the people and for the faithful work of the incumbent, the Rev. T. Austin Smith. Parham has been filled by the appointment of the Rev. J. W. Chaplin-Wilkinson, under whose ministrations, it is hoped, the work will prosper amongst these faithful and long tried people. \$100 will be expended on repairs of parsonage. Sydenham, for some time vacant, is now filled by the Rev. W. P. Reeve, B.D., who is most popular and doing a good work for the Church. Pittsburg is prospering under the able and energetic management of the Rev. Jas. Robinson, who is galvanizing an old and rather dead mission into new life. At the lower Church on Wolfe Island they contemplate erecting a memorial porch and tower to the revered memory of the late Rev. Rural Dean Kirkpatrick. At Portsmouth the handsome stone parish hall and school house was opened last winter and is nearly all clear of debt. The aged and respected rector is very ably assisted in the parish work by the Rev. J. O. Crisp. In the city of Kingston there is not much change in the regular routine of Church work. The serious illness of the Rev. R. W. Rayson deprives All Saints' Church of his vigilant and efficient oversight, and the hope is sincerely expressed that God may restore him soon again to his former health.

The total offerings for the year throughout the Deanery exceeded those of any former year by \$5000.

The sad calamity of the year, the destruction of the Cathedral, was a fearful blow to the Church, not only in the city but in the Diocese. Its rector and people have our deepest sympathy; and it is felt by almost all that this sympathy should be shown to be of a Diocesan character, and be expressed in a practical manner, by a collection being ordered throughout the Diocese for the restoration fund. The memorials, tablets, and other monuments destroyed, were of the greatest historical interest, and were not local in their character; and it is to be hoped that the people of Canada will take the necessary steps to replace them when it is possible to do so.

2. - RURAL DEANERY OF GRENVILLE.

Maitland reports:—"The rectory has been made habitable by placing \$100 furnace. St. George's debt has been reduced by \$100, and interest paid. The interior of the Church at Lord's Mills has been re-tinted and varnished. Four hundred dollars the extent of the ability of the parish to support the ministrations. The Deanery chapter strongly recommends a Mission Board grant of at least \$200.00 per annum."

Oxford Mills reports:—"Number of householders 53, of whom several are poor widows or unmarried persons living alone. Total Church population 188 souls, of whom fifty per cent are communicants. The Oxford Mills Ladies' Parish Guild raised \$100.00. A Ladies' Guild has been started at St. Anne's,

Oxford Station. The Mission Board is urgently requested to keep its agreement made with the late Rev. J. Stannage with this mission."

North Augusta reports:—"New lamps have been placed in St. James', Jellyby, and St. Andrew's, Garretton, at a cost of \$60.00. Work of parish on the whole very satisfactory."

Merrickville reports:—"All dues met; two hundred and thirty dollars paid on debt; ninty-one dollars in treasury. Burritt's Rapids church to be improved."

Cardinal reports:—"Improvement in Church services as regards number and devotion. Church property in good order. Money on hand to shingle Church. Sunday school increased in number. A Bible class for young men. Increase of Church literature. Parochial financial claims all met."

Kemptville reports:—"New rectory with extension and summer kitchen of brick, with modern improvements. Quiet growth all round."

3. -RURAL DEANERY OF HASTINGS.

A conference was held in Belleville at which papers were read by Clerical and Lay representatives, and discussions took place on topics of interest. It seems hard to prevail upon the laity to take their part in these conferences, even to the extent of attending. A chapter meeting was held on May 16th last and matters pertaining to the welfare of the Deanery were discussed. From the reports then presented by the various incumbents, the following items have been gathered.

- 1. Dungannon and Monteagle.—The missionary and his lay helper continue to hold regular Sunday services at twelve stations: weekly at two; fortnightly at the other ten. The log Church at Peever's settlement has been sheeted outside with "cove siding." St. John's Church, Bancroft, has been presented with a set of violet hangings by a friend in England; Coe Hill Church with an Altar cloth, by the W. A. of St. Thomas' Church, Belleville; and Ormsby Church with a retable, by the congregation of St. John's Church, Belleville. Plans are being prepared, and material and subscriptions gathered for the erection of a Church at Bird's Creek, an interesting and important point. The crying need of this large mission is sub-division. The southern portion, with centres at Ormsby, Coe Hill, and Faraday, is geographically and physically cut off from the northern, a large tract of rocky and unsettled country lying between them. If the mission and the present grant were both divided, better work could be done and more money raised among the people for the support of the Church among them.
- 2. Queensboro.—The missionary continues to serve five Churches and has held 137 Sunday services. This mission, like the one north of it, presents a geographical anomaly, Queensboro village being quite isolated from the rest of this large mission. It is hoped that the authorities will re-arrange both the above mentioned missions, and thus save time and labour to their missionaries, and money to the Mission Fund. The Church at Rocky settlement has been

- 3. Madoc.—The incumbent has been doing good work in his small field of labour. He reports an increase of 23 in his list of communicants during the year; 27 Baptisms, chiefly children of Dissenters, gained by persistent visiting and teaching; Sunday school also increasing. New hangings have been placed in the sanctuary of the Church, and a new furnace in the Church. The total debt on the Church property is \$75.00. To show the work done in these three missions during the past twelve years, it is to be noted that in the North Riding of Hastings, the population is 26,000, of which 3,365 are nominally members of the Church of England; Clergy 3, covering an area of eighteen townships, 11x14 miles in size, i e 2,772 square miles. In the year 1886, there were in this area three places of worship and 100 communicants. In 1899, there are fourteen places of worship and about 400 communicants. Rev. Hugh J. Spencer has begun holding services at Crookston. There will, it is confidently hoped, be more to report on this matter in June, 1900.
- 4. Tweed.—The chief centre of activity in this mission is, as usual, the newest, viz: Hungerford (late Sheffield Station on the C.P.R.). The new Church has been painted and a shed erected with a parish hall above it, and these improvements are paid for. A day school, which is really a parochial school, has been established in the hall, of which the teacher is a communicant and a helper in the Sunday school. Of the \$788 expended for all purposes in the mission, every dollar was raised through the offertory. The reign of pic-nics, concerts, and tea-fights for getting money for the Church is over in that parish. The Ladies' Guild of Tweed has paid for the converting of the woodshed at the parsonage into a permanent kitchen, thus providing a dining-room which was much needed, and which will also serve as an excellent guild room.
- 5. Roslin.—Work in this mission is, like its missionary, quiet, regular, and unflagging. A drive-shed seventy feet long, worth \$110, has been built and paid for at Moneymore. The promised stipend has been paid and every one is happy. The missionary has no serious reason to complain, his parishioners have none.
- 6. Shannonville.—Excellent work is being done by the missionary on a salary of \$300. The Church has been repaired, the stonework painted, and a new organ purchased. The improvements, costing \$250, are paid for. In July last, regular weekly services were begun at Point Anne, on a Sunday and a week-day alternately, with an average attendance of thirty-five. This place, whose inhabitants were originally Church people, is being reclaimed for her; but the mission needs help from some source.
- 7. Deseronto.—Everything is working harmoniously under the new incumbent. The weekly offerings, which averaged \$14 in 1897, increased to \$19 in 1898-9, and an effort is being made to raise the average to \$25. The parish has but a small debt and is flourishing in every way.
- 8. Tyendinaga.—Progress and improvement seem the watchwords in this mission. Sunday schools and congregations steadily increasing, especially at All Saints' Church, which greatly needs enlargement. A service is held in Mohawk

In conclusion the Rural Dean would call attention to the Deanery paper, the Buy of Quinte Churchman, which was issued in its new form in January last, and would ask the support of the clergy and laity for our venture. It is not in any sense intended as a money making scheme. Its monthly visit to the homes of our subscribers is much appreciated; and we trust it will, in its small way, be of service to the Deanery, and to the Church.

4.-RURAL DEANERY OF LEEDS.

I beg to report that Church work in the several parishes and missions of this Deanery is in a satisfactory state. Improvements in the Church buildings and other property in several of the parishes and missions have been made during the year; also payments for past improvements have been very satisfactory.

During the year the only change in the clergy of the Deanery was the appointment of Rev. J. W. Forster to the parish of Leeds Rear. I visited the parish and made arrangements for stipend.

It is with deep regret I have to report the death of the former rector of Leeds Rear, the Rev. W. Moore, M. A., who was a most zealous and successful clergyman.

Rev. C. J. H. Hutton made a canvass of two parishes in the Deanery, viz.: Newboro and Elizabethtown, for the Diocesan Augmentation Endowment Fund, and was very successful.

In consequence of my recent appointment to the office of Rural Dean for Leeds, my report this year is necessarily of the briefest and most imperfect character.

5 .- RURAL DEANERY OF LENNOX AND ADDINGTON.

Tamworth.—The Rev. J. W. Jones writes:—"The best thing I can say of this mission is—spiritualities encouraging, temporalities healthy, stipend paid."

Christ Church, Tamworth: A new fence has been erected round the Churchyard; a handsome marble font has been placed in the Church, costing \$75, of which the Ladies' Guild contributed a share.

St. John's Church, Enterprise: A fine set of Communion vessels has been purchased for this Church. At the three Vestry meetings held in this parish it was unanimously agreed that the thanks of this mission should be tendered to the Mission Board for its past assistance, together with an expression of willingness to surrender \$50 of the Mission grant.

Selby.—St. Jude's Church, Kingsford, has been undergoing repairs. It has been shingled; the inside plaster has been renewed and re-tinted; a set of altar

Napanee. – The work of the Church in this parish goes on with fresh spirit. Last Easter Day a surpliced choir of 16 men and boys was introduced with the approval of all the congregation, and with the happiest effect. A Boys' Brigade has been organized under the charge of Mr. D. L. Hill, whose able management has raised the corps to a high state of efficiency.

Adolphustown.—The Archbishop visited this parish Sunday, June 26th, and administered the rite of Confirmation to 3, candidates. The heating arrangements in St. Alban's Church have been improved at a cost of \$130. In St. Paul's Church, Sandhurst, the chancel has been beautified by a handsome, carved reredos and altar of antique oak, and by frontals to the prayer desk and pulpit; the former the gift of the daughters of the late Robert Neilson, in memory of their father; and the latter, the gift of Miss Harding, daughter of the late rector of the parish.

Camden East.—The rector reports that the parish has had another year of progress. Receipts from all sources, \$1702.00. The stipend of last year was the largest ever received, namely \$695.00. The collections for the Mission Fund exceeded those of last year by more than \$16. On the new Church, Camden East, \$286 has been paid together with the interest on debt. The Church grounds have been enclosed by a neat wire fence. The electric light has been introduced into two of the parish Churches. A new and tasteful reredos ornaments the chancel of the Newburgh Church. At Yarker a surpliced choir has been introduced, with all needful articles paid for. At Napanee Mills, funds are in hand to erect a stone wall in front of the Church lot. But in May the rector resigned this part of his mission, finding it impossible to do justice to it with all his other work, and believing that it would be advantageous to the Church's interests if it were attached to Selby parish. The Commissary has approved of the transfer.

Bath.—The past year has been a year of years in the history of St. John's Church. The Archbishop has visited the parish three times during the past year; twice for confirmation, when he administered the rite to seventy-three, mostly adults, of whom thirty-five were converts. He also visited the parish to lay the foundation stone of the new rectory (now completed), and to attend the centennial celebration of St. John's. The attendance at the services has been good throughout. Between sixty and seventy more made their Easter communion this year than last. Last Easter Day about sixty communicants were present at a 6 a.m. celebration. The ladies of the Church have been indefatigable in their labour of love, providing \$100 for the rectory furnace. Services have been held regularly in the out-stations. Odessa Church debt remains, but the interest on the mortgage has been paid up to July, and a small balance remains on hand. The stipend needs augmenting. Hawley is looking up and may become a great Church centre with hard work and patience. On the whole there is ample cause for thanking God and taking courage.

North Addington.—This mission is in the counties of Frontenac, Addington, and Hastings. Its area is about sixty by thirty miles, and cannot be thoroughly

worked by one man. The country is now very poor. While lumbering operations were carried on, it was more prosperous, and it will not regain its prosperity till the mines that exist in some localities are worked. It is encouraging that more attention has been given, at the present time, to mining in this district than ever before. To regain the ground lost by the past neglect it is necessary to place three unmarried missionaries in it at once. Mr. Joseph James of Actinolite, writes:—"I cannot speak too highly of the way in which the Rev. Mr. Wright is working. This district has been the happy hunting ground for all kinds of religious cranks and quacks. Nothing else being offered, the people swallowed it all: but since the Church has occupied the field, and the people hear Church doctrine and Bible truth, they are becoming more and more anxious for instruction for themselves and their children. One thousand dollars per annum from the Mission Board would be well spent in supporting three men (including Mr. Wright) of the right stamp, to lengthen the Church's cords and strengthen her stakes in this long neglected country."

6.-RURAL DEANERY OF PRINCE EDWARD.

I beg to report, that good and substantial work is being carried on, generally, in the various parishes of the Deanery of Prince Edward.

Improvements have been made in churches, and parsonages. The attendance upon the services is satisfactory; a larger number of communicants than formerly are to be found; and, from what I can learn, the stipends of the clergy are somewhat improved. The confirmations, held in several of the parishes, by the Lord Bishop of Ottawa, have resulted in adding a respectable number of communicants to the Church.

The work carried on by the missionary at Milford and Marysburg deserves hearty commendation.

My own parish is, I think, flourishing. We pay our way, notwithstanding the burden of debt on our parish house.

Wellington and Gerow Gore, under the supervision of its energetic missionary, is becoming, gradually, a live Mission.

The parish of Hillier has now a well painted, beautifully ceiled Church. Parsonage and Church sheds repaired. The Rev. Mr. Armstrong, acting for me, visited the parish, on two occasions, and materially increased the stipend of the minister.

Since the appointment of the Rev. Mr. Byers to Ameliasburg renewed life has been infused into the parish, and it bids fair to become a strong, self-supporting one.

Trenton is flourishing, and becoming, steadily, one of the most progressive parishes in the Diocese, under its genial and hard working rector.

The missionary at Stirling, and the eighth line of Rawdon, is most energetic and successful in his work. Prosperity and contentment prevail. I am happy to say that the Rev. Mr. Spencer seems to be the right man in the right place.

The Rev. Mr. Harris's labours in Marmora and the twelfth line of Rawdon need no commendation from me. His work speaks for itself. With patience, prudence, and persevering under many difficulties, the parish of Marmora has become, under Mr. Harris's ministrations, one of the model parishes of the Diocese.

Frankford, in its present state, is not as satisfactory as one would wish. The removal of its late missionary, and the non-residence of the minister in charge, has caused a state of things which ought not to exist. One thing, however, should be said, that it has shown its appreciation of the Rev. Mr. Holah's labours, and they, the parishioners, have offered the sum of \$350 per annum if he would remain among them.

It has been suggested that a re-arrangement of some of the parishes in this Deanery is desirable; the re-uniting of Stirling and Frankford, the formation of a new parish in the Township of Rawdon. This, however, is a matter for others to decide.

Again, the re-uniting of the parishes of Hillier and Wellington and Gerow Gore is earnestly recommended, and is endorsed by me.

The grants to the various missions now receiving them should be continued. The missionaries are entitled to be considered as having more than a moral claim to what they are now allowed; and I, for one, do not think it just that the various Deaneries should receive, from a common mission fund, only the sum or amount sent in from the several parishes in each Deanery, less the expenses. I, therefore, beg to ask that the grants now being received by the missionaries in this Deanery be continued as heretotore.

Dean George O'Kill Stuart), His Excellency Lord Sydenham, Governor General of Canada, who was buried in the nave of the building, and many other valuable and interesting monuments were destroyed, never, I fear, to be replaced. The Very Rev. the Dean and congregation immediately set to work to restore the Cathedral, and

have made considerable progress, and it is hoped that by the Festival of Christmas they may be able to worship, in their new structure.

I.-Auditors' Report.

1.—REPORT OF THE AUDIT AND ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE, 1898-9.

To the Members of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario:

The Audit and Accounts Committee beg leave to report:

That Messrs. Birkett & Hooper, the official Auditors, have made the usual required examination of all accounts up to the 30th April, 1899, and their report is satisfactory.

Your Committee have examined all the securities and compared the same with the statements submitted to them by the accountants. The securities were in the hands of the proper custodians.

Your Committee further report that the Consolidated Fund capital amounts to \$364,825.57, of which \$37,000 is on deposit receipt. The arrears of interest are \$3,618 96. The rest account is \$1,100.

The Investment Committee have, in pursuance of the resolution passed at last meeting of the Executive, procured a valuation of the properties foreclosed by the Synod and now held by them. This valuation shows that the properties are less in value than the amounts at which they stand by the sum of \$1,346.86, which sum will in due course be written off the several securities and carried to the debit of the indemnity account. The Committee calls special attention to the following debit balances, viz:

2.—REPORT OF THE OFFICIAL AUDITORS, 1898-9.

To the Executive Committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario:

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

- r. The Laymen's Association for the Diocese of Ontario shall be composed of male members in good standing of the Church of England in Canada, resident in the diocese, with the object of uniting congregations in sustaining and aggressive action, of encouraging every branch of definite individual work, and of cordially seconding the efforts of the clergy in advancing the Church's interests.
- 2. A branch may be formed in each parish or mission of the Diocese, of which the clergyman in charge shall, ex officio, be honorary president. It shall be styled "The Laymen's Association for the parish of ——." There shall be elected annually a president, and a secretary who shall act as treasurer; and these two, with three other members to be chosen, shall form an executive committee. All proceedings shall be conducted in harmony with canonical laws and well established usage.
- 3. The parish branch shall at each such annual meeting decide when its regular meetings are to be held, and at any such meeting members may be admitted by vote after being duly proposed and seconded. The annual membership fee shall be 25 cents.
- 4. Each parish association shall hold a festival service annually at which the members shall have the opportunity of receiving the Holy Communion together.
- 5. The diocesan association shall be composed of the members of the parish associations and of such other persons as have been proposed for admission, have been accepted by the central council, and have paid the annual fee of 25c. It shall be under the patronage of the bishop of the diocese, and shall hold a general meeting at each annual session of the synod of Ontario, for election of officers, for receiving reports and suggestions from branches, and for the consideration of matters affecting the welfare of the Church. The officers shall consist of a president, a secretary (who shall also act as treasurer), and a committee composed of seven members to form a central council in conjunction with the president and secretary.
- 6. It shall be the duty of each secretary of a parish association to report to the general meetings of the diocesan association the state of the branch, number of meetings held during the year, the names of members, and the branches of Church work to which they had given their personal services. It shall be the duty of the diocesan secretary to tabulate these returns in a permanent register.
- 7. The central council may call conventions of lay workers for the hearing of papers and addresses on Church work, either for the Diocese at large or for any one of the rural deaneries.

It shall be the especial duty of every member to promote harmony in the congregations; to encourage regular attendance at diocesan synod and committees; to respond to every lawful call for general effort with personal aid and influence; and to further mission work with his best energies. He will also be expected:

To begin and end the day with private prayer, and to lead a life of kindness, temperance, and honesty, doing his daily work "as unto the Lord."

To regard the laws of purity as binding alike on men and women.

To be regular in attendance at Divine Service and in partaking of the Holy Communion.

To promote the spreading of pure literature and to counteract the growth of impure reading.

To seek means of spreading God's Kingdom by endeavouring to help others to lead a Christian life.

So far as strength and opportunity will allow, he will undertake active parish work under the incumbent's direction, by assisting at all Church services, by conducting a bible-class, or by taking part in the Sunday School or choir, promoting week-day services and opening of new missions, welcoming newcomers to the Church or parish, visiting the sick and afflicted, and by making himself generally useful in rendering the Church efficient and carrying its message to every door.
