**LITERARY DOINGS.**  
 Mr. Holman Hunt is occupied upon his new book, which will treat of the pre-historic movement in England. A copy of the sixty-page pamphlet edition of "The Dawn," printed by the author in 1893, is in circulation for three hundred and seventy dollars.  
 The interesting announcement is made that an authorized memoir of the late Dr. Francis Parkman will be prepared under the direction of his family.  
 With the seventy thousand dollars left to Yale by the late Judge Billings a chair of English literature is to be established. It will be known as the Emily Sanford professorship.  
 A rumor has gained some credence in Chatham that Prince Bismarck has sold the copyright of his memoirs to a firm of publishers for one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars.  
**FINANCE NOTES.**  
 The amount of money received and expended for the relief of the miners during the recent general strike in England was \$101,714.  
 French imports decreased 251,830,000 francs in 1893, and the exports decreased 231,118,000 francs.  
 East-bound trunk line shipments of bread-stuffs and provisions from Chicago for the year 1893 were 2,167,239 tons, against 1,728,022 tons in 1892.  
 The Edison Electric Illuminating Company of New York reports for year 1893 earnings of \$1,169,225, increase \$250,768; net \$981,678, increase \$100,541, and a surplus over interest and dividends of \$9,668.—Bradstreet's.

**FOREIGN STATISTICS.**  
 In the Hong Kong prison 115 cases of prisoners fighting with each other occurred during 1893.  
 St. Petersburg's population is 1,000,000. There are 2,163,390 males, who in 1890 made 76,002 arrests.  
 In Glasgow last year 577 persons were arrested and fined for falling to sweep their steps or pavements.  
 Paris has 2,644,000 population and 7,154 police. Total arrests in 1890, 96,848, of which 88,232 were for falling to sweep.  
 The City of Mexico has 451,000 people and 2,302 police. The arrests last year were 52,225, over one-half for intoxication.  
**BITS OF INFORMATION.**  
 Meaford has an Astronomical Society. Fine coffins are now made of wood pulp. A strong milk spring has broken out near Chatham.  
 Bottles have been successfully blown by machinery in Woodville.  
 It is estimated that 800 Kingtonians use opium, the majority being women.  
 A monster lock to be built on the Calvert Shoals canal at Birmingham, Ala., will, when completed, be the largest in the country.  
 A safety envelope, just patented, is so folded and pasted together that it cannot possibly be opened without being entirely destroyed.  
 A Paris inventor believes that he can clean the ocean waves under a vessel by spraying over them a thin coating of silk, which, when dried, will be as hard as iron and will be impervious to any oil or grease.  
 The first open air experiment for a statue in aluminum has just been made in London. It is the figure of an angel placed on the monument recently unveiled in memory of the Earl of Shaftesbury.  
 The government of India offers a reward of \$25,000 to the man who will invent a machine for extracting the fiber from the sisal leaf with only one motion. Now the leaf is pushed in between rollers, crushed, and pulled back to the fiber, and it is this backward motion which is to be dispensed with.  
**FARMING IN FOREIGN LANDS.**  
 The cotton crop of India for 1893 was 18 to 18 per cent. higher in the various provinces than that of the preceding year.  
 Cotton culture is rapidly increasing in Burma, as is indicated by the amount of exports, which increased seven fold in the last fiscal year over those of the preceding year.  
 The large, white Yorkshire pig has become the favorite breed with Danish bacon factories, and large numbers of them are imported yearly from England for breeding purposes.  
 A mace pork factory has been established at Canterbury, New Zealand. The company buys the green pork from the farmers and cures it by the dry salting process for shipment to London.  
 The Babcock tester for determining the proportions of butter fats in milk, is very popular in Victoria, Australia, and its use seems likely to become general in the butter factories of that colony.  
 The pastoral industry of Argentina shows very slow increase. In 1874 the number of cattle killed in the slaughter was 1,543,000. The number last year was 2,009,000, and the preceding year 1,969,000.

**PEOPLE AT HOME AND ABROAD.**  
 Servia is a promising country for young men with political ambition. Mr. Vranich, a member of the new ministry, is barely 30 years old.  
 Capt. and Mrs. Thomas Crapo, now of the schooner Oriole, from New Bedford, crossed the Atlantic together in 1871 in a little dory only 19 feet long.  
 It is said that at some day in the near future Edison proposes to visit New Orleans and begin active operations in developing methods for the production and reducing the sulphur gold ore of that region.  
 Prof. L. C. Russell, who made, in 1892, the nearly complete ascent of Mount St. Elias and the Malaspina glacier, perhaps the highest North American peak, is very near the Appalachian Mountain Club in Boston recently.  
 There are women who will read with breathless interest that M. Paderewski, the night before a recent recital in London, practiced all night, or at least until 8.30 a.m. The morning after the recital he went to Chatham, where he played the same afternoon, before a densely packed, audience. He exhibited no fatigue.  
**WAGES PAID.**  
 Sixteen men are paid \$388 per annum; the chief gets \$356 and a horse to live in. Cashiers in the stores of Smyrna, Turkey, receive an average salary of \$14 per week.  
 Female servants in the Acropolis "who have their own clothes" receive \$1.05 per month.  
 The average weekly wage paid to female laborers of all classes in Germany is \$2.17.  
 The regular salary of the superintendent of a Cuban sugar plantation is \$100 a month.  
 Native laborers in Palestine work for 15 cents a day and pay all their own expenses.  
 Women coal carriers at the Lisbon docks receive 30 cents a day; male coal carriers, 80 cents.  
 The highest wages paid to conductors on government railroads in Germany amount to \$250 per year, but at least \$1.30 a day, and the hours of labor from 10 to 30 a day.  
**WOMAN'S GOSSIP.**  
 Of the 100 medical missionaries in China, 56 are women.  
 Connecticut, the "land of steady habits," boasts of six cities with police matrons and has a school suffrage law.  
 The first woman's grammarian in Europe in the Solo-I of Minerva, in Prague, founded in 1860 by Eliza Krasnoborska, the editor of the Woman's Journal in that city. It has 70 students.  
 Chicago has 20 police matrons with a head matron over six. The W.C.T.U. has a committee of women who strive to keep out political influence in the appointment of women matrons, and to get women who are total abstainers.  
 The association of women for raising the moral tone of society in the Netherlands has over 4,000 members in the 197 places where it is represented. Half of the young women are maintained very generally.

**TESTED RECIPES.**  
 Sauce for the Fudding.—One-half pint water heated to a boiling point. Thicken with flour to a boiling point. Season with a good teaspoon of butter and flavoured preferred, such as lemon, vanilla, nutmeg, etc.  
 Sweet Fudding.—One cup of sweet, chopped fine one-half cup sugar, one-half cup of molasses, one cup of raisins, three cups of flour, one teaspoon of soda, one teaspoon of salt; mix enough for a stiff batter. Steam one hour and a half.  
 Baked Cake.—Two cups of sugar, two of chopped raisins, two of butter, one-half cup of shortening, four cups of flour, one teaspoon of soda, one teaspoon of salt, one teaspoon of molasses, with a little less of sugar. Give the cake a better color and flavor. If treated with cream and confectioner's sugar well beaten, with coconut added, it will have a cake "good enough for a king."  
**MISERIES OF MONARCHS.**  
 Nero had bulging eyes and was very near sighted.

 Excavations in Ouessant la Petit, department of the Sarthe, France have revealed a Gallo-Roman city, which appears to have been destroyed by an earthquake. The city probably contained some 30,000 inhabitants. The name is not known in French history. The ruins include a great temple, part of which is still standing, also the theatre and monuments.—Engineering and Mining Journal.
