

The dominating idea of the report is the gradual establish-ment of a large industrial white popu-lation and the gradual elimination of black labor. The commissioners main-tain that the mines can adjust their organization to the employment of a

tain that the mines can adjust their organization to the employment of a greater proportion of whites and a less proportion of blacks without materially increasing the cost of production prevailing at the beginning of 1907. The Commissioners recommend:—

1. The gradual stoppage of the importation of Portuguest natives. It is of opinion that there is no essential difference between the importation of Chinese and of Portuguese natives, both being equally undesirable.

2. The abolition of the pass law, because that would make it impossible to enforce native contracts, and native recruiting would stop.

3. Legislation compelling the employment of one white miner for each machine-drill.

4. An eight-hour day.

5. Taxation of unworked claims, no claim being "worked" unless a definite number of whites are employed on it.
6. Stricter measures to stop the illicit gold buying, which prevails to a great to be satisfactory.
