ANOTHER TRAGEDY FROM WOOD ALCOHOL

Farmer and His Son are Dead
—Another Very Ill

Typhoid Prevalent in Toronto—Young
Woman Nearly Perished—Onario
Man Takes Carbolic.

TORONTO, Feb. 17.—Fifty-eight cases of typhoid fever have been reported to the city medical health officer so far this month, as against ten for the whole of February last year. The number of cases last month was fifty-one. The condition of the city water is given as the cause of the increase of typhoid.

STEWART, Feb. 17.—Wood alcohol was the cause of a tragedy near Capton, in which two lives have been lost and another is in grave danger. A man and his two sons named Sien, homesteading near Capton, went to the village Saturday and purchased a quantity of wood alcohol from a chemist. Going back to the cabin they drank it, and the elder son went to sleep, never to awaken. The father afterwards died, but not before he managed to wash the younger son and dispatched him to the doctor. The doctor kept the boy at the village, where he may recover.

STRAITFORD, Ont., Feb. 17.—Miss Violet Lenz, aged 22 years, having a cripple, having lost a leg in an accident some years ago, was unable to extricate herself until the arrival of a young man, who took her home.

KINGSFORD, Ont., Feb. 17.—Geo. Green of Stratford, aged 22 years, swallowed a quantity of carbolic acid and it is feared he will not recover. The young man's family, who objected to his keeping company with a young woman living in the village.

MAD DOGS MAKING HEAPS OF TROUBLE

Men and Animals Bitten All
Over Ontario

Big Collie Attacked a Crowd and Found
One Victim—Cattle and Dogs
Under Quarantine.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., Feb. 17.—While assisting the police yesterday in despatching a big collie dog, Mr. A. Snowden had one finger severely bitten before the animal was finally disposed of. The dog was shot since, but was not mortally injured and made for a dog while he was returning home from school yesterday and will be taken to New York at once for treatment.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., Feb. 17.—A dog frothing at the mouth and supposed to be suffering from rabies was discovered on Washall Park, four miles from here. It was killed with an axe and several dogs it had bitten were also destroyed.

LONDON, Ont., Feb. 17.—A mad dog which came into the village of Dashedwood, six miles from London, yesterday bit about twenty dogs and many horses and cows before it was killed. Government inspectors have ordered that Dashedwood will quarantine all the animals bitten.

TELEPHONES WERE
DISCUSSED TODAY

Union Declares for Government
Control of Rates

Endorses A. L. Macdonald's Resolution—
The Chair S' do of the Case
Able Presented.

CAMPBELLTON, N.B., Feb. 17.—The morning session of the Municipal Convention was taken up discussing the telephone monopoly. Ald. Macdonald, of St. John, in strong speech condemned the increase in rates and moved the following resolution:—"That the local government be memorialized to amend the Act of Edward the last 37, an act respecting telephone companies, so as to provide that telephone rates and tolls may not be increased above the present rates and tolls without the approval of the Lieut.-Governor in Council, and upon hearing all parties who may desire to oppose such increase." This motion carried unanimously. He read a lengthy extract from the Board of Trade report and asked the meeting to pass his resolution. It was a fair resolution, and nothing was done and the following month the telephone company could continue to increase its rates. Telephones were a necessity to the business people and they would be obliged to pay the increase.

Mayor Montgomery of Dalhousie strongly opposed the resolution. The statement that the company's stock was watered and that their property was overvalued was not correct. When the New Brunswick Telephone Co. took over the Campbellton telephone plant here they paid \$10,000 for it. This plant was then torn out and entirely rebuilt, and of course this \$10,000 would have to figure in the dividends as well as the new work. What was done in Campbellton was done in many other towns. The company had to earn a fair dividend and provide for renewal as the plant had to be renewed about every ten years. He was sure the much talked of monopoly would give a better service than the government. While it was perhaps true that the city paid a large share of the expenses, yet that was only fair as the rural districts could not be expected to pay in the same ratio. He moved the following amendment:—"That a special committee of five be appointed for the purpose of obtaining information on the question of government ownership of telephones and telephone rates and that such committee have a representative from the rural districts and report at the next regular convention." NEW HAVEN, Conn., Feb. 16.—The Chesapeake pool table championship was formally opened tonight with a swimming meet between Harvard and Yale. All the events were won by Yale, giving her a score of 44 points to 3 in the water polo, Yale won by seven goals to one. The inter-collegiate record for plunge for distance was broken by R. Lorne of Yale, with a distance of 72 feet 9 inches, and W. Howe of Yale, in winning the 50 yard race, tied the inter-collegiate record of 25-2 seconds.

ADVISE THAT POLICE CARRY REVOLVERS

A Toronto Jury Finds That
Withers Killed Himself

Michigan Central Engineers Get Generous
Increase—Cashing as a Private
Member in Alberta.

EDMONTON, Alberta, Feb. 17.—Hon. W. H. Cushing, late minister of public works, took his seat yesterday as a private member. His resignation will be forwarded to the Lieutenant Governor to the cabinet today. Cushing will make no statement until the Alberta and Great Waterways question comes before the house for discussion.

TORONTO, Feb. 17.—That three bullets were put into the head of Matilda Withers by her husband William Withers, at Elliott street, House, which was the scene of a shooting affray last Monday, and also that Withers committed suicide instead of having been shot by the police, was definitely made known at the post mortem examination and inquest last night.

Prof. Robertson, who recently resigned as principal of the Macdonald college at St. Ann's, P. Q., passed through the city today on his way to Halifax, where he will address the Board of Trade and the Canadian Club. After a brief visit to his home he will arrive in St. John next week with his wife and daughter, to sail on the Grandian for a six months' visit to the old country.

Regarding his mission to Europe, Dr. Robertson is planning a pleasure trip, but that while away he would devote some time to investigations along the lines in which he was interested. He plans to spend two or three months in Switzerland to study their methods of saving in agriculture. Canada, he said, is a great country for waste, but in Europe have learned to economize and get the full value out of their land and its products.

In Denmark the elaborate system of co-operation among the farmers will be studied, and in Sweden he will study the methods of cereal growing, which are far in advance of those in general use here.

His plans also include a long stay in England and Scotland, and while absent he is billed to make a number of addresses on the agricultural progress of Canada during the past 25 years.

Prof. Robertson is chairman of the lands committee of the recently organized Conservative Commission, the work on which is purely voluntary, and while away he will also devote some time to seeking information on this subject.

An important announcement regarding the plans of the commission was predicted by Prof. Robertson who said that they are planning a series of about thirty large meetings to be held next fall after harvest time for the purpose of awakening public interest and disseminating information.

On his return from Europe Prof. Robertson is planning another trip, that to Australia and other parts of the British Empire in the west.

Regarding his plans in general Dr. Robertson said that he had given twenty-five years hard service to the country and while he intended to continue his work along the same lines as previously, he did not think money would bind himself down by accepting any official position.

LONDON, Feb. 17.—The shareholders of the three principal London tube railway companies met today and agreed upon a plan of amalgamation. A bill providing for the amalgamation will be laid before parliament.

BOWERY HOTEL THE SCENE OF A MURDER

Guest, Unable to Pay for
Drinks, Shot by Thugs

Jay Rider Meets Death—Bomb Exploded in
New York House Stunned Policeman
Who Was Passing.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 17.—While returning from a "joy" ride in West Philadelphia early today James Graham, 19 years old, was killed when the automobile he was operating crashed into a telegraph pole. Three other occupants of the car, two of whom were young women, were thrown out and slightly injured.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—The explosion of a dynamite bomb in the doorway of the house in Jamaica owned by Oscar Catanzaro, a wealthy merchant, threw the neighborhood into a panic today and knocked down and stunned a policeman who was passing. The officer was picked up unconscious, but soon recovered.

Catanzaro had received several threatening letters recently in which his handsomeness demanded \$1000. The explosion did little damage to the building.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Two desperadoes with drawn revolvers raided the lobby of the Waverly Hotel on the Bowery today, shot and killed Fred Devlin, a guest, who when they demanded money for drinks was only able to produce a dime, and then held up and robbed the clerk of the night's receipts. Less than \$10 in gold was the result of the hold-up and murder. The men ran out of the hotel after the shooting and a large force of detectives at once started out on their trail.

MONTANA MINES ARE CLOSED BY A STRIKE

Long Period of Idleness is in Prospect—
Anacosta Smelter Also Likely
to be Shut Down.

BUTTE, Mont., Feb. 17.—All of the big mines with the exception of six are shut down this morning with prospect of a prolonged suspension, on account of the strike of the engineers. The international engineers are standing firm and thus far have the whip hand. The Clark reduction works will close down today, according to official statement last night. All the Clark mines have shut down. No encouragement for amelioration of conditions was held forth by mine managers last night.

Large forces were laid off at the Washoe smelter at Anacosta yesterday apparently in preparation for a shut-down of that plant. It is not believed that the operation of six amalgamated properties can keep the smelters in operation and unless the other mines resume the plant will be compelled to close.

The suspension of the Clark smelter will compel a number of small mines to close down.

WARSHIPS GIVE UP THE SEARCH FOR THE NINA

All Hope of Finding the Naval Tug and
Her Crew of Thirty-two Has
Been Abandoned.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—All hope that the missing U. S. navy tug Nina, which left Norfolk Feb. 6, bound to Boston with 32 souls aboard, is still afloat has been abandoned by the navy department and today the warships which for five days have been searching for the Nina were ordered to discontinue their hunt.

CANNIBALISM IN THE PORCUPINE COUNTRY

MONTREAL, Feb. 17.—A case of cannibalism has been discovered in the New Forcupine hold. The body of a man was found just off one of the trails and several pieces had been cut out and the bones, with the meat chewed off them, were found near. The names of the party who found the remains and all particulars are being kept quiet while the police are looking into it. The party which found the remains took photos of the body as it lay.

THE PILOTAGE SUIT

Judge Barry's Decision Sustained
by Full Court

Bob Crawford Successful in His Appeals
From Verdicts Against Him for
False Arrests.

FREDERICKTON, N.B., Feb. 17.—The supreme court this morning decided a large number of judgments. The full bench was present and ex-Chief Justice Tuck occupied a seat on the bench.

Crockett vs. the Town of Campbellton, Judges McLeod, White and Barry quashing the conviction. Crockett had recovered a verdict against the defendant for what he claimed was wrong shutting off of the town water. The full court agreed that there had been no breach of contract, no negligence and no malfeasance, and ordered a new trial.

The King vs. Judge Wilson in re Braithwaite. The court unanimously expressed the opinion that the judge's decision quashing the conviction against Braithwaite must stand, as the supreme court will not interfere with a conviction unless the judge's jurisdiction exceeded his jurisdiction, and in this case Judge Wilson had acted within his jurisdiction.

The King vs. Farris, ex-parte Lebel. A rule had been taken out to quash a conviction for selling liquor. The court held Commissioner Farris acted within his jurisdiction, and so discharged the rule.

In re ex-parte Duncan. The same facts being involved as in the Braithwaite case a like decision as in the Braithwaite case was made.

The King vs. Surveyor General, ex-parte Shaw. The court held that the surveyor general had no jurisdiction to cancel the lease and ruled that the order made by him be set aside and a new trial ordered.

Mitchell vs. Davis. Application dismissed and goods ordered to be returned.

McDonough vs. Telegraph Publishing Company. Judgment ordered to be entered for defendant on the ground of no malfeasance.

Estate of S. W. Foster. Appeal allowed.

Massey Harris Company vs. Methew. Appeal allowed with costs.

Moore vs. Cormier. Kent County appeal. The appeal dismissed with costs. Foiter vs. Crawford and McEae vs. Crawford. New trials granted.

The Spears case was tried before Justice Barry without a jury at the June sittings of the Circuit Court and was an action brought to try the right of the plaintiff to speak vessels from a gasoline launch used in connection with a pilot boat. The defendants withheld payment of pilotage fees contending that the speaking must be directed from the pilot boat. His Honor found in favor of the plaintiff and his decision was upheld. Mr. John B. M. Baxter, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff both at the trial and on the argument before the full bench and Dr. A. O. Earle, K. C., for the defendants. Other cases are of interest to Crawford's friends in this city. The defendant, Robert Crawford, was for some time a police officer on the local force and is at present chief of police of Campbellton. These actions were for false arrest and imprisonment and were tried before Mr. Justice Barry and a jury at the Restigouche Circuit in September last, resulting in

INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS IN CANADA IN JANUARY

OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—With the current issue of the Labor Gazette the department begins the publication of the results of the special investigation which has been in progress for some months into the increase during the past few years in the cost of living. In subsequent issues there will be given statistical reviews of the trend of wholesale and retail prices during the past twenty years in Canada with comparative data on the trend of prices in other countries.

INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS IN CANADA IN JANUARY

The total number of industrial accidents in the Canadian West during the calendar year 1929 was 57,981, a decrease of 1,498 as compared with 1928. During January 11 firms and 1,388 employees were affected by trade disputes in Canada. The loss in time in working days was approximately 44,894, as compared with only about 1,800 days in January, 1929.

POSTAL CARELESSNESS.

Now that the Post Office Department has developed into a regular producer of annual surpluses, and since the profits, according to the federal treasury, are apparently not lessened by the introduction of rural mail delivery, the Postmaster General might, without serious harm to himself or anyone else, institute a system whereby those engaged in the work of the department might receive instruction in handling mail. The United States is, if possible, a worse offender than Canada in this respect, but the damage done to matter sent by post in this country is had enough for anything. It is practically impossible for a man to send a stick of cord wood through the mail without having it reach its intended recipient in the shape of kindling. Indeed there is a proverbial, but not officially confirmed, instance of a creditor who mailed a dollar bill to a merchant, the latter receiving the money in ten cent pieces. But seriously, the destination of packages in transit in Canada affords ground for just complaint. Whether it is in the system of packing adopted by the post office department, or on account of carelessness on the part of employees, it is nevertheless a fact, that packages and parcels of all sort might just as well be kicked along the streets as sent through the mails. The suggestion has been made that baskets or crates, such as are used elsewhere, might be adopted with advantage in this country, in place of the bags now in use. This would perhaps overcome some of the difficulty, but unless greater care is taken in handling mail matter there can be little improvement. Unfortunately persons who send letters or parcels have no way of getting back at the post office for damage done, or at least, there is so much rapé about the business that the unfortunate individual is inclined to stand his loss rather than seek compensation. This is a state of affairs which should not longer exist. The disappearance of letters and parcels—particularly the latter—is another evil to which some attention should be given. It is scarcely fair that in an age such as this, all mail matter should be carried at the sender's risk, and that those who lose should be deprived of the privilege of obtaining compensation.

THE MUNICIPAL UNION.

The Union of New Brunswick Municipalities is meeting today in Campbellton. St. John enjoys membership in this body and is supposed to be interested in all matters relating to the welfare of the province. About one-seventh of the population of New Brunswick is to be found in St. John, and it might naturally be supposed that the matters to be discussed at the convention, which is being held in Campbellton, should be of sufficient importance to justify representation of this corporation at the meeting. Apparently this is not the case, for although a number of delegates were appointed to attend the convention, Mr. McCordick is the only one who has gone to Campbellton, and it will scarcely be argued, even by the general admirer's warmest admirers, that he alone is capable of representing St. John. Strangely enough there is not always such an indifference when the duties for which members of the Council are named, include trips to Montreal and Ottawa or Boston and New York. When those sightseeing tours are arranged, it is usually found that almost every member of the aldermanic board can arrange to shake off business worries for a few days and conscientiously perform his duties. And it must be believed that if the aldermen so desired a sufficient number could have been found able to go to Campbellton to properly represent St. John's interests in the questions to be discussed. The inference is either that a trip to the North Shore at this time of year does not promise any particular enjoyment, or else that St. John aldermen regard the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities as an institution unworthy of attention. If the latter is the case then the city should withdraw from membership. If the thing is worth following it must be worthy of proper attention. If it is useless in the opinion of our city fathers then drop it, but do not let us have a mere pretence as now seems to exist.

Canada's merchants carrying large stocks of German goods bought under the surtax, wish operation of the new agreement postponed for four or five months in order that they may unload. It is a reasonable request, though imports always profit when the rate of duty on any commodity is advanced.

Queens County, N. S., has dealt more kindly with the ministerial campaigners than Lunenburg did a few years ago when the efforts of the "noble sixteen" preachers were worse than useless.

During the next few weeks Mr. Hosen and his associates will have opportunity to provide for the fulfillment of some of the promises made by them

three years ago, which are still awaiting fulfilment. The speech from the throne, however, does not offer very much hope.

The Senators had a pleasant chat yesterday about the Intercolonial. They could find in the subject many points on which interesting comment might be made, but their moderation was surprising.

Dr. Chisholm would like seven—remember the number, seven—Dreadnoughts at an annual rental of \$1,500,000 as Canada's share of the British navy. But suppose rents advanced?

"I have gambled more or less all my life, but I never got the better of it but once," a newspaper man said to me the other day. "And that once was when I got in with a crowd of men who had a good deal more money than I. They were real estate men. My business threw me in with them for a few months, and during that time I spent more money on cards than I had a right to—but that was the only time."

No, don't be scared. This isn't to be a preachment against the danger of gambling—simply a few words set out what some men to the greater danger of "getting in with a crowd" that has more money than you do. It was simply the desire to live up to a financial standard that was too high for him. I do not believe that any five-dollar man, unless he has unusual strength of character, can be thrown constantly to the temptation to spend as they do. In some of his books Charles Dickens says that, if you earn fifty pounds a year and spend forty-nine pounds and nineteen shillings you can be happy, but if you make fifty pounds a year and spend fifty pounds and one shilling, you are pretty apt to be very unhappy. True enough, except that no matter how carefully you keep your expenditures within that fifty pounds I doubt if you will be happy if you associate too constantly with people who earn a hundred pounds. In the town where I was brought up there lives a sordid woman for whom even of the most tolerant folk have a good word. She was the daughter of the owner of a small shop, who made perhaps \$1,500 or \$2,000 a year. She was a pretty girl. Her mother was a clever woman and ambitious for her daughter. Together they managed to place themselves in the set of the five and ten and fifteen thousand-dollar-a-year people. When the daughters of these families finished high school they went to one of the most expensive colleges. This is not a wild surmise. SPEECH FROM THE THRONE.

(Continued from Page One.)

The speech from the throne was as follows:—

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

It affords me much pleasure to meet you again at the opening of another Session, and to once more express our thanks to the Creator and Giver of all good things for a beautiful harvest and the general prosperity with which the people of New Brunswick have been blessed.

It is gratifying to find that during the last year the crop yields averaged larger than in 1908, and were above the average of the figures of the last ten years, though unusual weather conditions occasioned local losses. High prices have prevailed for most farm products, and increased faith in the agricultural capabilities of the Province, is being manifested.

Since the opening of the Legislature last year, eighteen new agricultural societies have been incorporated, and they are actively tabulating their plans for live stock improvement, and the purchase of good seeds.

In response to the demand for larger and better draught horses, my Government arranged for reliable horse importers to bring Clydesdale, and stallions and Percheron stallions to be sold within the Province upon a commercial basis. These horses have been sold at reasonable prices and well distributed at small expense to the Province.

I am pleased to note the honors won by the fruit growers of this Province, at the exhibitions in Great Britain and at the Maritime Fair at Amherst, and to congratulate our horticulturists on the success which has crowned their efforts. The fruit from this Province carried off prizes in competition with the Empire.

To assist our fruit growers in further developing the production and export of apples and other fruit, an expert in fruit culture has been added to the staff of the Agricultural Department.

On account of the large crops of potatoes in Ontario, Quebec, and by Government, it was felt by the Government that it was desirable that some new outlet should be found for the New Brunswick potato crop, and assistance was therefore given to the potato shippers of the Province in introducing and extending our potato trade in the Cuban market. The result has been most gratifying, and the present time upwards of seventy-five thousand barrels have been shipped to Havana. Our product has obtained an excellent reputation there, and there is every prospect that the trade will be a permanent one.

During recess, renewed and additional efforts have been made to induce the immigration of agriculturalists, farm laborers and domestic servants, and I am pleased to be able to say that these efforts have been crowned with a reasonable degree of success, and it is expected that in the future greater results will follow.

It is a pleasure to inform you that the territorial revenue during the last fiscal year, was the largest in the history of the Province, and that the estimates of lumber cut during the present year, so far received by the Department of Crown Lands, indicate that the receipts will show a substantial increase over those of the previous one.

RELEASE CONVICT TO PERFECT INVENTION

TROUBLE MAKERS CHASED FROM NICARAGUA

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 17.—All American troops will have to leave the east coast of Nicaragua, according to a dispatch received here today. An order to this effect, it is stated, has been issued by the United States government. The American troops, under the command of U. S. Colonel Moffatt, at Bluefields, Nicaragua, have been ordered to leave the country, a disturbing factor in Nicaraguan affairs, being responsible for frequent trouble.

TELEPHONES WERE DISCUSSED TODAY

In seconding the amendment, Mr. A. E. McKensie, of Campbellton, presented the company's side of the controversy in a fair and convincing manner. You can telephone from Campbellton to St. John for three minutes for one dollar, while to telephone the same distance in Manitoba would cost one dollar and ten cents for two minutes.

Quickest Port of Transfer in the World

Says Wm. Still, General Passenger Agent of the C. P. R.—Talking Business From U. S. Ports.

That St. John is unsurpassed by any port in the world for the quick handling of ocean passengers was the statement made by Mr. Still, general passenger agent of the C. P. R., in conversation with The Star this morning.

His statement showed that the big railway is thoroughly satisfied with St. John as a landing port and that we need fear no serious competition, for the C. P. R. business from any other Maritime Province port. He predicted a record breaking season of immigration this spring and also a great development in the freight business of the empire.

Mr. Still is on his way to Halifax to make arrangements for the future handling of Chinese passengers through that city. This is made necessary by the action of the United States government in closing Malacca and Richmond as ports of entry for the Chinese.

ELECTION REFORM THE CHIEF ISSUE IN GERMAN POLITICS

Government's Announced Intention of Addressing to Class System Causes Much Bitterness.

BERLIN, Germany, Feb. 16.—The Prussian election reform question has become the chief issue in German politics, and threatens to assume unexpected importance in the internal affairs of the empire.

Not only from all parts of Prussia but from Wurtemberg, Bavaria, Saxony and Baden, come reports of stormy meetings in which the government's proposed partial measures of reform were the subject of excited discussion.

Chancellor Bethmann-Hollweg's speech the Prussian chamber announcing that the government was immovably opposed to the secret ballot, and that it intends to retain the class system of voting, with minor modifications has evoked a fresh outburst of the present franchise system in the chief bulwark of the reactionary and bureaucratic forces now controlling imperial affairs.

Herr Bethmann-Hollweg's open declaration that the government would not be swayed by public opinion has broken a flood of denunciation unprecedent in bitterness.

MANAGUA, Feb. 16.—General Chamorro, according to advices received here, suddenly abandoned his march southwards and unexpectedly appeared at Dionisio, 15 miles to the east of Teres Bonita. He then disappeared completely. A division under General Tera has been sent to cut off his general through Chontales, which appears to be his objective point. General Rivas is believed to be close on his heels. The movements are degenerating into guerrilla warfare. Chamorro's great handicap is the lack of ammunition. He also is without heavy artillery.

The Nicaraguan congress has voted to reconsider the approval of the bill recognizing the debts of the unsuccessful revolutionists in 1892. The measure has been taken out of the hands of the committee and placed on the calendar of congress for further discussion.
