The jub lee celebration has so absorbed attention in England, that it is hard to turn to other things. In the House of Commons, the leader of the government having threatened cloture, the Irish members at once withdrew. The report stage was thus reached on the Crimes Bill on Thursday instead of Monday. Gladatone was expected to rally his forces yesterday, for the final stand against the Bill. The Land Bill is being hurried through the Lords, modified to meet the wishes of Hartington and the Unionists. Sir George Trevelyan has finally broken with the Unionists and has taken his stand with the Gladatonians. This latter party have gained a seat. Where their candidativas defeated at the last election by a majority of 288, he has been elected by a majority of 747. This seems to show a change of sentiment in favor of Glad tone. The Porte, pressed by the Freuch and Russians to refuse to ratify the convention in respect to Egypt, and by the British government to assent to it, has had a few days graated to consider the matter further. Of course you do not mean to say that the British and Foreign Bible Society will not join in circulating a version which translates baptize by a word meaning to immerse; for this you have been doing in Germany, Sweden, Denmark, and other countries, from the first day until now. What you really mean is that you will not circulate such a version if it be made by a Baptist, for a people whose practice it would be likely to shape or determine. You will circulate it if made or used by apople who say, 'I jammerse thee," when they simply apply their wet fingers to the forehead of the candidate. The faithfulness of the translation is readily condoned in consideration of the "catholicity" of the practice. But when Baptists, who void cate their name by the strictaces of their observance of the scared rite, translate the word according to its meaning, and in harmony with their practice, it is counted an offence too rank for toleration. But the uncatholic thing on their part is not the rule not only denier us the help of the great Bible Societies, but it strikes at our right to be, and to obey God a cording to the best light we have, and the voice of conscience. If we would give up that for which we are set to witness, and comform our usage to what we regard as unscriptual cerementer, no further objection would be urged to eur missionary versions of the Scriptures.
