

## GENERAL STATEMENT.

HISTORICAL.—In the year 1861 an Act was passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick authorizing the Trustees of the "Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy," under certain specified conditions, to establish and put in operation at Sackville a degree-conferring institution under the name and style of "The Mount Allison Wesleyan College." In July, 1862, the required conditions having been duly fulfilled, a collegiate organization was effected and the work of instruction regularly entered on. Several students having been admitted to advanced standing on the basis of studies and examinations in connection with the higher classes of the Academy, the first College Class was graduated in 1863. By an amendment of the original charter in 1886, the corporate name of the Institution was changed to "The University of Mount Allison College."

Organization and Government.—The Charter of 1861 conferred on the projected College full University powers as respects Courses of Study and Degrees in the various Arts and Faculties, and these powers are expressly continued to the Institution under its present designation of The University of Mount Allison College. Under this authority the University maintains complete and efficient Faculties in Arts and Theology, and confers all the Degrees appropriate thereto.

According to the provisions of the amended charter the ultimate ownership of the University is in the General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada. The direct government is, however, vested in a Board of Regents and a Senate, and the aforesaid General Conference exercises a controlling influence on the affairs of the University solely through the power conferred on it by the Charter of appointing a large majority of the Regents.

The University Senate is a composite body consisting of all the members of the Board of Regents and Faculty. It is charged by legislation with the duty of regulating the strictly educational con dist nati very sent

concerns of the University, such as framing Courses of Study and conferring Degrees. The general management of affairs is entrusted to the Board of Regents, which is the supreme governing body of the Ladies' College and the Academy as well. The Board consists of thirty-two members: twenty-four—twelve ministers and twelve laymen—appointed by the General Conference of the Methodist Church, with six representatives of the Alumni Society, and two representatives of the Alumna Association of the Ladies' College. These various modes of appointment practically ensure a thoroughly representative character for the Governing Board of the University.

In its internal administration the University has always been conducted on strictly non-sectarian principles. While the Methodist population of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland is naturally looked to as the chief source of supply of students, a very appreciable percentage of the attendance has uniformly represented other religious denominations.

Students.—Students may enter the College either as regular Undergraduates having passed the Matriculation Examination, or as special Students who do not look forward to a University Degree. Among the latter are included both those who have passed the required Matriculation Examination but do not expect to pursue the regular course, and those who, without full Matriculation, have given evidence of being able to pursue the selected subjects of study. Such students, upon leaving the College, will be entitled to receive Certificates bearing the College Seal, and specifying the particular branches of study in which they have received instruction and passed satisfactory examinations. In addition, persons not in any way connected with the University may be admitted to a particular course or courses of lectures on approval of the Professor or the Faculty.

Courses of Study.—The regular courses are: the Arts Course, leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts; and the Divinity Course, leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Divinity. Honor Courses are provided in Classics, Mathematics, Science, Philosophy, and in English Language and Literature.

Admission of Women.—Women are received on a perfect equality with men in all Lectures and competition for prizes and

honors. Mount Allison was the first chartered College in Canada to admit women to all the privileges of regular Collegiate Courses and Degrees. Young women wishing to pursue an undergraduate course will find at Mount Allison facilities for thorough collegiate training under the most favorable conditions as regards health, and domestic and social advantages. Board may be had at the Ladies' College on reasonable terms. In addition to the regular undergraduate work, the best instruction in Music and the Fine Arts available, and those not fully prepared for matriculation have opportunities of bringing up the studies in which they are deficient.

Affiliation with Dalhousie Law School.—Graduates in Arts of this University who during their Undergraduate course have attended classes in Constitutional History, International Law and Contracts, and have passed their examinations as required by the Law Faculty of Dalhousie College, can graduate in the Law School of said College in two years from time of entrance, provided they take during these two years all other required studies.

EXAMINATIONS.—Written examinations, three hours for each paper, are held at the close of each term. The Honor examinations are held for the most part at the end of the year, slightly in advance of the ordinary class examinations.

A student's standing depends both on the result of the written examination and on his work during the term, regular attendance at lectures, etc. The lists are arranged in three divisions: First Class, Second Class, and Pass.

Supplementary examinations will be held twice each year, at the beginning of the first term, while the Matriculation examinations are in progress, and during the second term at different dates for different subjects, (see p. 2). Students desiring such examinations must give notice in writing, and at least a fortnight in advance, to the respective Professors of the subjects in which they wish to present themselves. A fee of \$2.00 will be charged for each such examination.

THE DEGREE OF M. A.—The Degree of Master of Arts may be taken in course by any Bachelor of Arts of at least one year's standing who shall have taken (during his Undergraduate course or subsequently) the full Honor Course in any department, or who

shall have taken, either at Mt. Allison or at some approved University, at least one year's post-graduate work in some special line of study and have passed satisfactory examinations on the same. Each applicant shall prepare and forward to the President on or before May 1st a satisfactory thesis on some subject connected with his courses of study. The fee should be remitted at the same time as the application for the degree.



## MATRICULATION.

The Matriculation Examinations are held on the second and third days of the First Term of the Collegiate Year. Students may pass either the Junior Matriculation or the Senior Matriculation.

Certificates of Matriculation from chartered Colleges are accepted in place of the examination. Students holding provincial licenses and non-professional certificates will be exempted from examination in any subject covered thereby.

## JUNIOR MATRICULATION.

## I. English.

Candidates in English will be expected to be acquainted with the main principles of English Grammar as taught in the Provincial High Schools. To test their power of writing their language accurately, an essay must be written on some special work which they have studied. For 1897, Longfellow's Evangeline; Tennyson's Enoch Arden. For 1898, Scott's Marmion. Other questions will be asked about the text. Special importance is attached to the general analysis of sentences. In addition there will be an examination on the Outlines of English and Canadian History, and General Geography, as in the books severally prescribed by the Educational Departments of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and P. E. Island.

#### II. Classics.

Latin — Cæsar, Gallic War, Book IV.; Virgil, Æneid, Book II.;
Latin Grammar, Harkness or Bennett. Easy sentences of English to be translated into Latin. Questions in History and Geography, arising out of the Books prescribed. For 1898, the required authors will be Cæsar, Gallic War, Book V.; Virgil, Æneid, Book III.

Greek — Xenophon, Anabasis, Book I.; Greek Grammar, Hadley or Goodwin. For 1898, the required Greek author will be Xenophon, Anabasis, Book II.

[Instead of the Classical selections prescribed, satisfactory equivalents from the same or other authors will be accepted.]

## NOTES.

Students taking the full Honors Course in any department may omit one of the optional subjects from either the Junior or the

All students on the college roll shall, during their second year, write seven essays and during their third year five. These essays will be carefully revised and returned.

Every Senior is required to write, and deliver during his Senior Year, three orations at dates fixed at the beginning of the session.

Students in Science of the Freshmen and Sophomore Years will be required to prepare permanent note-books of all lectures and experiments. Term standing will be determined in large measure by the accuracy and neatness of these books.

All books of Reference may be found in the Library, which is open to students during lecture hours, and certain groups of books bearing on particular courses of lectures are brought together and reserved for a certain time as special libraries. During this time these "kept books" are to be used in the Library and are not to be removed without special permission.

# THE BRECKEN STUDENTS' AID FUND.

The income from an investment of \$5,000, given by the Rev. Ralph Brecken, D. D., will be available hereafter for the assistance of students who may need such aid, under the following conditions and limitations:

- The Applicant must show himself worthy by maintaining a good standing in his classes and in regard to his conduct.
- Not more than Fifty Dollars from this Fund will be assigned to any student in one year, but the same student may be a beneficiary of the Fund each year of his course.
- The allocation of these bursaries will be decided by the Faculty, in part according to the relative need, and in part according to the ability of the applicants, as may be determined by examination.

# THE BLACKBURN FUND.

By bequest of the late J. J. Blackburn, Esq., of Shubenacadie, Nova Scotia, a sum of from One Hundred to Two Hundred Dollars annually is placed at the disposal of the President of the University for the educational aid of candidates for the ministry.

## THE ROBERTSON FUND.

The Library contains about 8,000 volumes. An advance payment of \$40 on account of board and room rent is required at the beginning of the first term, and of \$50 at the beginning of the second term.

Students will be charged for any damage done to rooms or furniture during their occupancy.

The residence, a cut of which appears on the opposite page, is designed in plan and equipment to promote in the highest possible degree the comfort and convenience of its occupants. The site is one of ideal appropriateness and beauty, elevated without being unduly exposed, and combines all conditions favorable to health and agreeable living. The building is heated and ventilated by the Smead-Dowd system of uniformly warmed and constantly changed air. Drainage (which natural conditions favor) and plumbing have received special attention according to the most improved modern methods. Pure spring water has been brought to every story, and numerous well-equipped bath-rooms are constantly available. The building throughout has been lighted by electricity. In general, a connected parlor and bed-room are allotted to each pair of students, though for such as prefer them, a small number of single and double rooms are at command. The dining-room is spacious, lofty, and particularly well lighted, with a handsome panelled ceiling. In entire keeping with the general character of the interior are fine roomy apartments designed for use as kitchens, pantries, servants' common rooms, laundry, drying room, etc., etc.

# The Harriet A. Stewart Hospital.

The handsome suite of rooms designed for use as an infirmary has been provided with a complete modern hospital outfit through the kindness of the children of the late Mrs. Harriet Augusta Stewart, of Sackville. Collectively these apartments as thus furnished are known as "The Harriet A. Stewart Hospital."

A supply of the necessary Text-books, Stationery, etc., is kept on hand in the University Office, and furnished to the Students as needed by them; and the articles so supplied are charged in the term's bill at the lowest rates.

# General Governmental Regulations, Etc.

Students, both regular and special, are expected to conduct themselves with propriety, and to observe all the regulations of the Faculty as announced from time to time. Students whose conduct or progress in study shall continue, after suitable admonition, to be unsatisfactory, will not be allowed to remain in the Institution.

Regular and punctual attendance at their classes shall be imperative on all students,

No student shall be absent from the College after ten o'clock at night without special permission of the President.

All students are expected to attend Divine Service on Sunday, and to be punctual in attendance at daily prayers in the College Chapel.

Without necessarily involving expulsion from College, students may be debarred from the privileges of the Residence for failure to conform to the recognized standards of gentlemanly conduct.

No student shall resort to any tavern or place where intoxicating liquors are sold without special permission of the President; and no student who is known to use intoxicating drinks will be allowed to retain his connection with the College.

The use of tobacco on the College premises is not permitted.
Undergraduates are expected to provide themselves with College caps and gowns, and to wear them at Classes and Lectures, at Church, and at all public Collegiate exercises and anniversaries.



Special facilities are offered to graduates in Arts who wish to reside in the College while pursuing this course.

#### Candidates for the Ministry.

Candidates for the Ministry of the Methodist Church of Canada, who have been appointed to attend College, will pursue the course of study prescribed on page 192 of the Discipline of the Church.

The Educational Society of the Methodist Church makes provision for free tuition, and aids in meeting the general expenses of young men appointed by the Conference to attend College.

## Preliminary Course of Study.

This Course of Study is designed to meet the wants of young men preparing to offer themselves to be received on trial for the ministry. It embraces all the subjects prescribed for the preliminary and first year's examinations of the Methodist Conference, and may extend over one, two, or three years, according to the previous attainments and circumstances of the student. The Theological parts of this course may be pursued in connection with Matriculation in Arts.

Students presenting themselves for admission to this Course should bring with them letters of introduction from the Superintendent Ministers of the Circuits in which they reside. If they expect to offer themselves for the ministry at the close of the year, they must be recommended from the quarterly meeting of their own circuits, and not from the Sackville quarterly meeting. Students bringing with them certificates of such recommendation will be exempted from fees for theological tuition. Licenses as exhorters or local preachers should also, in all cases, issue from the Superintendent and quarterly meeting of the Circuit in which the student resides, and where his church membership and standing should be continued.

After examination at the close of the College year, all students in the preliminary course will return home in time to be presented at their own district meetings, in case they wish to be received on trial by the Conference.

#### Societies.

Two Societies have been established having a relation to this department. The one is designed for the benefit of the Theological students in the College; and the other to serve as a connecting link between them and the ministers laboring in the three Conferences of the Maritime Provinces, as well as to promote among the latter a spirit of theological and ministerial culture.

Among the students it is proposed, by means of Essays, Exegetical Papers, and Oral discussions, to stimulate inquiry as to the best methods of ministerial efficiency, and so to assist in preparing each other for the great work of preaching the Gospel and feeding the flock of Christ.

The Ministers' Theological Union will meet at the close of each Collegiate year, and, in addition to the consideration of topics of interest belonging to their work, will have an annual Sermon preached and a Theological Lecture delivered. The Rev. WM. AINLEY will preach the annual Sermon, and the Rev. J. A. CLARK, M. A., will deliver the annual Lecture in 1898.


