At Saskatoon the three systems meet. For the next two and a half degrees of longitude the G. T. P. and C. P. R. have practically the same right of way, with the C. N. R. from ten to fifty miles north. Then the last mentioned road begins to converge and meets the Grand Trunk Pacific at Edmonton with the C. P. R. for the last one hundred miles ten to fifty miles south. For the whole distance of any 500 miles this road, which was to broaden out Canada, runs among other railways, usually close to one, often close to two, and never fifty miles from either railway. It is hardly a development or colonication railway at all,

The real pioneer line in that country after the Cana-dian Pacific, is the Canadian Northern, of Mackenzie and Mann, one portion of which runs north the whole length of Lake Winnipeg, and to the Pass of the Saskatchewan, fully 200 miles north of the Grand Trunk Pacific at that longitude, goes through Prince Albert, still 100 miles north of the G. T. P., and traverses a country which other-wise would be Improvible to settle.

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



Montreal, April 30.—There were no new developments in the local flour situation, business being still quiet but the undertone to the market is firm in sympathy with the further advance in prices for wheat.

Receipts of eggs this morning were 1652 cases as against 1654 for the corresponding date a year ago. There was no change on the market today and there was a steady trade doins at well sustained prices. There was a good demand for local consumption, but there was no thing doing in the export trade. Fresh receipts were selling at 19c. to 19½ cents per dozen. Potatoes were in good demand and there was a brisk trade doing. Green Mountains were quoted at \$1.05 to \$1.07½ per bag in car lots, other varieties at 95c. to \$1 and in a small way at \$1.15 to \$1.20 per bag.

Receipts of butter were 760 packages as against 210 for the corresponding date of last year. The market is steady under a good demand with fresh receipts quoted at 24 to 24½c. and fall creamery at 21½ to 22.

New York, April 30.—The few May notices issued this morning as anticipated had no more effect than to cause rather an uncertain opening. Cables were fully as good as due, there were reports of severe rain and wind storms in the central belt and the National Ginners' Association was said to have estimated a reduction of 6 per cent in acreage. At any rate after opening one point lower to 4 points higher the market developed 3 decided strength and during the early afternoon sold at a net advance of 8 to 12 points with May making a new high record for the session. There was heavy realizing on the advance and prices later reacted several points. There can be little doubt that severe storms have occurred in parts of Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas, but comparatively little cotton has been planted in these states and we should think no irreparable harm has been done. The trading here has given every indication that some of the older and stronger bulls were taking down profits.
