### STILL TALKING SETTLEMENT IN G.T.R. STRIKE

Impression Prevails In Montreal That Settlement Is About At Hand-Men Abandon Some Demands.

Montreal, July 31.—The impression that the Grand Trunk strike is nearing its closing hours is stronger than ever tonight, but when the various rumors are sifted down the most that can be positively said is that negotiations are still going on and that a settlement, therefore, is not an improbability. Vice-President Fitzhingh of the Grand Trunk, President Garretson, of the Conductors and President Lee of the Trainmen, held a prolonged conference today with Hon. MacKenzie King, minister of labor, but all of these parties when asked what is being done confined themselves to the statement, that they cannot talk. Reports have it that the men have practically abandoned their demand that the company must agree to take back all the men who went out on July 18th, and restore them to their former runs and pension rights before anything else is done, the their former runs and pension rights before anything else is done, the company absolutely refusing to take settlement on any other basis.








A WELL MERITED RESUKE.

It is satisfactory to note that the Telegraph, after persistently endeavoring to misrepresent the position of the Public Utilities Commission with regard to complaints which may be brought before it, is at length showing some glimmerings of common sense. Robert J. Murdock of Kamloops, B. C., son of Wm. Murdock, city engineer, arrived in the city yesterday on a months' visit to the home of his parents. He is accompanied by his sister, Miss Jessle Murdock, who is returning from a visit to the West extending over a year.





PRICES ARE STILL

ON UPWARD TREND

New York, N. Y., July 31.—The important financial and railroad news which became known last week went far to explain the recent turmoil and unsettlement in the stock market, and serve at the same time to relieve it by the settlement of a threatening situation. The surrender to an international syndicate headed by Kuhn, Loeb and Company, of holdings accumulated by the so-called Pearson syndicate transformed the speculative position. The transaction in its first bearings, relieved the stock market of a necessarily forced liquidation such as the Tuesday gave an example of. The selling out of loans to the hard pressed holders of the stocks designed to form the combination, threw the market into demoralization on that day. An excited rise in the price of corn caused the apprehension that prospective partial failure of that crop and fears for the country's general credit position, were involved in the acute depression of the stock market. With the disclosure of the immediate cause of the action of the market, the part attributed to general causes in the depression was less considered.


