While there is no immejate prospect of a settlement of the first two disputes, the third, that of the electricians, is at present the most threatening as there is increasing danger of all the building trades be ing drawn into the strike. 





Ceremonies and Now Must THE DAILY PROVINCE **REAPPEARS AFTER** DAY'S SUSPENSION Have you read J.Castell Hopkins Moniteal, June 13.—Peter Sawitch, a Russian, was sentenced to be hang-ed on September 12, this afternoon, by Judge Desy. Sawitch was an in-vited guest at a Russian wedding feast held in Prince Albert Hall, on April 9, and stabbed and killed George Yacobovitch, the master of the ore-monies of the occasion. A notable fea-ture of the trial was that neither counsel addressed the jury. Three families get their water supply from it. Well No. 6 is only three feet deep, is unsealed, has no coping and the sides are subject to surface drainage. A family with six small children ges their supply thereby. The seventh well, at the ice barn, is used mostly for horses, as the family find it more satisfactory to melt ice or drinking and other purposes. Well No. 8 is much lower than the house it supplies and is only two feet deep. It has the common fault of no coping, no seal and subject to surface drainage. It supplies a family of four. The other three wells have the same faults, and one particularly is situ-ated so that it is sure to get some of the drain from the adjacent bern All three supply fairly large families. This formation, with a letter show-ing up the serious lack in the city lim-its of a proper water supply, and a recommendation that a public house corner, was sent to the Commis-sioner of Water and Severage.
