LIVELY CLASH OF LAWYERS IN DIVORCE COURT

Mr. Justice Crocket Ordered Both to Sit Down and be Calm.

COURT ADJOURNED UNTIL FEBRUARY 22

Kealty Case Evidence Will be Considered in Private by the Court.

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 27.—The divorce court adjourned this afternoon after completing evidence in the case of James Francis Kealty vs. Lydia Kealty until February 22nd, when judgment will be delivered in a number of cases.

The defendant, Mrs. Lydia Kealty was on the stand, finishing her evidence. She was given a searching cross-examination by C. D. Richards who was associated with J. A. Leblanc in the case. She adhered to her statement of drunkenness and bad habits, as the reason why she left her husband. The evidence of Duff Furlotte, taken under commission in Massachusetts, where he now resides, was presented to the court. With the consent of counsel the reading in court was dispensed with and Mr. Justice Crocket will peruse it in private, time being saved in that manner.

Wrangle in Court

The proceedings were enlivened in their later stages by a lively clash between Messrs. Richards and R. B. Hanson, K. C. The former said that Mr. Hanson was not ready to live up to his agreement with regard to the hearing of the cost of taking the evidence by commission.

Firm Believer in Port Development

Hon. Mr. Wignmore at Halifax Pledges His Aid to Halifax Port Work.

Sydney, N. S., Jan. 27.—"I am a firm and strong believer in the development of our national ports and port facilities," said Hon. R. W. Wignmore, minister of customs, to a representation of Sydney's interests who conferred with him informally this evening, prior to his leaving by private car for St. John. "I am also a non-believer in the cry of no money. If we have not got it we must go outside and get it, for if we do not, then other countries are going to reap the betterment at our expense."

Our national ports must be developed if the country is to take its place with other shipping countries of the continent. As to Sydney as a sea port I am most favorably impressed and I stand ready to assist Hon. F. B. Mcurdy in every way to develop your facilities and lend my efforts to your drydock proposal.

Veteran Succumbs To Illness War Caused

John A. Robinson, Formerly of Fredericton, Dies in Vancouver of Heart Trouble.

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 27.—A telegram received by Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Robinson told of the death of their son, John Alexander, at the Shaughnessy Hospital, Vancouver, where he had been undergoing treatment since September last for heart trouble, the result of being gassed in the trenches, aged 34 years. He enlisted in August, 1914, with the 12th Battalion when 17 years of age. He was transferred to the 14th Battalion, went to France, was wounded at Sanctuary Woods and badly gassed soon after. The deceased returned home in March, 1918, and was discharged in March, 1919. Previous to his being taken ill he was engaged in survey work near the Alaska line. He was one of three brothers who donned the khaki at the call of their King and country, two brothers, Ronald, going overseas with the 236 Battalion from this city, and being killed in action at Cambrai on Sept. 29th, 1918, and Roy, who went over with the 8th Battery as an engineer at Moncton. One brother, Moreland, at home, and four sisters, Mrs. G. P. Rigby, of this city; Mrs. (Dr.) Coffin, of Finster Rock; Florence, of Moncton, and Dorothy, at home, also survive.

Suddenly, at the City Hospital, Boston, at an early hour this morning, F. Ambrose McCain, of this city, died. He was employed for many years as a hewman with the Western Union Telegraph Company, and about ten months ago met with an accident in Chatham, a pole falling and striking him on the head and face.

CONTRACT BOOKS VANISH DURING HIGHWAY PROBE

Bedford Construction Co. Figures Relating to Amounts Paid Are Not Available.

VANISH SINCE DEMAND WAS MADE

Auditor Busy on Them Last Friday But They Have Disappeared Since That Time.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 27.—That all the books relating to the amounts paid the sub-contractors and the hours of work done on the St. Margaret's Bay contract had disappeared from the offices of the Bedford Construction Company, the contractors, was the statement made this afternoon before the Royal Commission investigating highway expenditures in Nova Scotia by William C. McDonald, the engineer employed by the company to superintend the carrying out of the work on the St. Margaret's Bay road.

Disappear Since Friday

Last week the commission had decided that these books were pertinent to the inquiry as evidence of the amount of work actually done, and should be produced in court if required. The witness stated the last time he had seen them was on Friday night last, when they were in course of being audited by William Wilson, of Montreal. He had tried to locate them since, but no one, including V. J. Cavich, the head of the firm, seemed to know where they had gone.

STEAL OPIUM FROM COURT.

The opium was a part of the exhibition in a case held in the police magistrate's court yesterday—that of Alphonse Tessier, accused of being found in illegal possession of drugs.

Mine Union Levies \$24,000 On Maritime

Two Dollars Per Head Tax Imposed on Men by the U. M. W. of America.

Amherst, N. S., Jan. 27.—Cumberland County coal miners have received official notice that the levy of \$1 on the individual members of the United Mine Workers of America, district twenty-six, to support U. M. W. strikers in Alabama, will be made this month, and a subsequent levy will be made in February. There are nearly 2,000 miners in this county, so that their contribution will total approximately \$4,000. It is said here that the total contribution for district twenty-six, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, will be about \$24,000. The levy is compulsory.

St. John Architect To Consider School

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 27.—Construction of an annex to provide accommodations for four additional class rooms at the Smyth street school is the policy determined upon by the Board of School Trustees as a means of relieving the present congested conditions in the public schools.

F. Neil Brodie, of St. John, is the architect who will be consulted and he will be asked to come here within a few days and make a report, the Smyth street school sub-committee and Dr. Vanwart, the chairman of the board, and J. M. Lemont being named as the special committee to deal with the matter.

HONORED NEGRO PORTER.

Savannah, Jan. 27.—For the first time in the history of the Savannah cotton exchange, its flag was flown at half-mast the other day in honor of a negro man. He was Philip Smith, for forty years porter at the exchange,

Nova Scotia Farmers Fight Harvest Excursions

Province Wants Agricultural Laborers and Will Ask Government to Assist.

Bridgetown, N. S., Jan. 27.—Resolutions calling for further legislation beneficial to the farming industry and the election of officers, were the chief features of the closing session here today of the twenty-fifth annual convention of the Nova Scotia Farmers' Association. The association urged by resolution that more attention be paid by the Provincial Government and by the Federal Government to immigration, as it affects Nova Scotia, emphasizing the need for men with agricultural experiences and capital to purchase farms for agricultural laborers and for domestic help.

Oppose Harvest Excursions
A committee was appointed to interview the Minister of Railways and

the general manager of the C. N. R. to protest against high freight and passenger rates on Canadian railways. The association went on record as protesting against the "harvest excursion" system, claiming that it was benefiting Western Canada to the detriment of Nova Scotia. Re-establishment of the Provincial Exhibition, which has not been held since the Halifax explosion, at the earliest possible date, was asked. Compulsory grading of cream delivered at creameries of the province, and the establishment of a permanent Maritime School of Dairying was also urged.

EASILY SATISFIED.

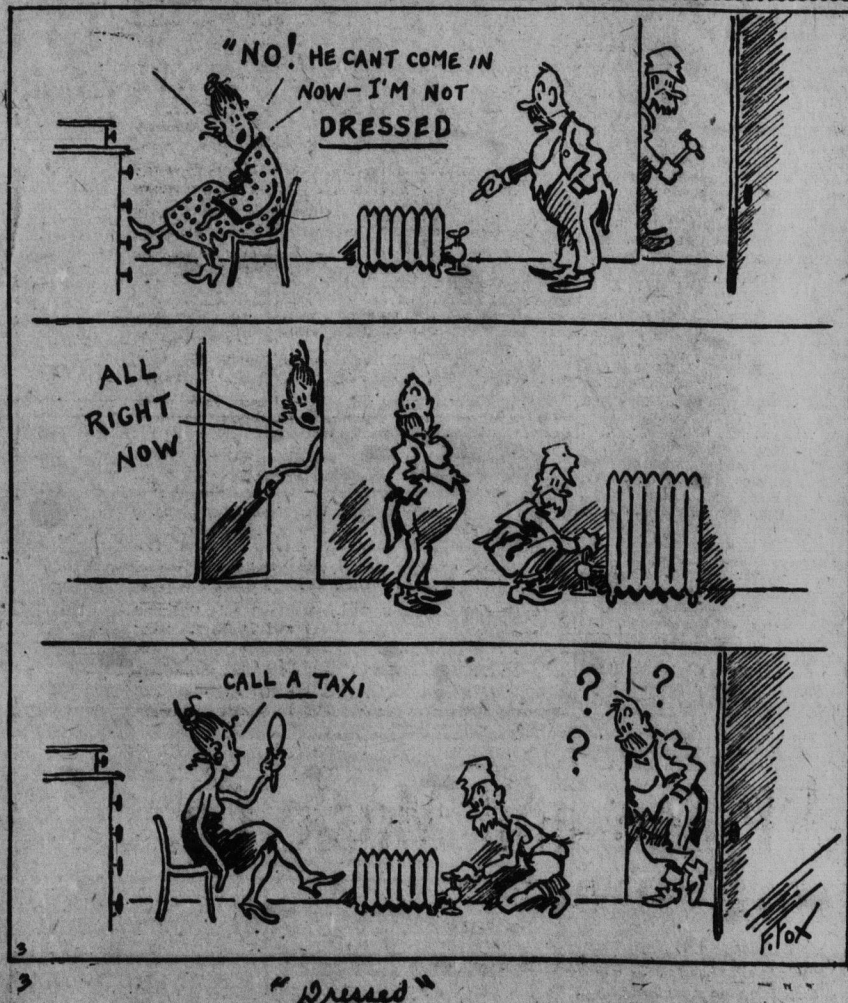



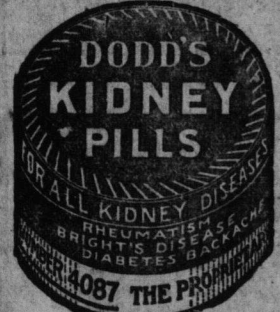
MEN'S FABRICS CUT BY AMERICAN WOOLEN

(Copyright, 1921, by Public Ledger.) New York, Jan. 27.—The American Woolen Co., in order to stimulate trading, has reduced their men's wear fabrics 25 to 33 1/3 per cent. The lower prices are expected to restore buying. Heavyweight fabrics will be shown next month or in March on a basis of the new selling prices for spot delivery.

The new price for No. 312, which is a staple fabric and known by this number by all cutters-up and jobbers, is obtainable at \$2.37 1/2 a yard, as against the former price of \$3.62 1/2.

V.O.N. and Travellers' Aid Ask Grants

Strong Appeals Made to Council Not to Retrench in Sums Given These Bodies.

Two delegations appeared before the council yesterday morning in regard to grants. One asked for the increase to the Victorian Order of Nurses last, as in his opinion the order was the ounce of prevention in regard to health matters that was always better than a pound of cure. They were all the time visiting the homes of the class which could not afford the services of the physician and any money granted to them he considered well spent. Senator Thorpe expressed his support of the appeal of the Victorian Order of Nurses.

Want Grant of \$1,000.

Mrs. R. A. Jamieson, Mrs. John McAtilly and Mrs. Alfred Morrissey appeared on behalf of the Travellers' Aid and asked for a grant of \$1,000 for that work.

Mrs. Jamieson gave a review of the work done during the past year, when 3,542 trains and 370 boats were met; 967 persons helped at the depot; 1,395 brought to the transient home; 247 taken to hotels; 41 to their friends; 89 to boats; employment found for 74; sent for visitors 57 letters and 325 telegrams. The expenditures included \$12 a week for one worker and \$10 for the other; \$65 per month for the matron and \$40 per month for rent beside coal and other incidentals. The revenue was about \$1,000 from persons using the transient home and the balance some \$2,000 had to be secured by private subscription. If the grant were given they would still have to solicit from the people \$1,000. They were assured the application would be given consideration.

Families in the districts about the depots wishing to have these benefits for their children may also buy tickets at the depots between twelve and one o'clock every day from the ladies in charge. Tickets may be had at the rate of twelve cents per quart, which price has been made possible through the generous assistance received and merely covers the cost. Kind assistance towards this undertaking has already been given by several of the butchers, and John Bond, with his usual interest in such affairs, offers a generous contribution.
