QUESTION IV.

What Ministers have died since last Conference ?

ANSWER.

WILLIAM TEMPLE, who was born in London, March 29th, 1790. He was the child of pious parents, and from his earliest days was trained in the way that he should go.

To this fact, under God's blessing, he attributed his preservation from gross offences, and his inclination, while yet a youth, to serve the Lord. His mother's death, which occurred during his fourteenth year, deepened his impressions of eternal things, and stimulated his purpose to lead a godly life; but it was not till four years later that he obtained a knowledge of salvation by the remission of sins. This joyous event took place while he was reading Mr. Charles Wesley's Sermon on "Awake thou that sleepest." The words "Son be of good cheer; thy sins are forgiven thee," were applied with such energy to his soul that he was constrained to praise God for his pardoning mercy. He immediately united with the Methodist church, and under a strong persuasion that the Lord had a special work for him to do, he applied himself diligently to the acquisition of useful knowledge.

After a period of arduous labour as a Local preacher both in his circuit and in connection with a society called, "The Workhouse Community," and of honorable service in the Mission House in London, he was, on the 4th July, 1820, ordained to the Christian Ministry, and appointed to the New Brunswick District. His first Circuit was Fredericton, and for a period of thirty-nine years he successively occupied the chief posts of ministerial toil, in the lower provinces of British North America.

His appointment to the general Superintendency of his District by the Missionary Committee and British Conference, and his election to various important connexional offices by his brethren here, testified to the high esteem in which he is held.

While distinguished for the catholicity of his spirit, he was thoroughly loyal to Wesleyan Methodism. Its doctrines he held with a firm and intelligent faith; its discipline he observed and maintained with characteristic fidelity; and in every way he laboured to promote its peace and prosperity.

As a preacher he was lucid, direct and eminently practical—seeking that he might save souls. He was also a diligent pastor, and the kindness of his heart, manifested by loving deeds caused him to be honored within and beyond the circle of his own communion. Studious in his habits and well read in theology and general literature, he occasionally contributed to periodicals of our church, and might have won distinction in this path, had he regarded it as his providential vocation. At the Conference of 1859 he retired from our active work, but for several years after he cordially co-operated with his brethren in the Ministry; nor did he seem to be capable of higher gratification than what the preaching of the gospel afforded.

In the year 1861, when the beloved partner of his life was removed by death, he experienced a shock from

the effect of which he never recovered. Thenceforth the shadows of life's evening gathered thick and fast upon him.

Yet amidst these shadows, there came to him pleasing recollections of the scenes, the labours and the fellowships of earlier days, and also assuring glimpses of a glorious immortality. Not seldom was the stillness of the midnight hour broken by the tremulous tones of his voice as he essayed to praise the God of his life. And even when other subjects had passed away from his memory, and the most familiar faces had become strange, the name of the Lord Jesus possessed its former charm, and drew forth fervent ejaculations of thanksgiving, and joyous recommendations of redeeming love.

He often fancied that he was again leading the services of the sanctuary, or uniting with his brethren in christian counsel; and he sought, as of old, to impress the minds of his hearers with the sublime importance of the ministry of reconciliation. At length the time of his departure came; and as a wearied child sinks to rest, apparently without a pang or struggle, he spirit glided away to the rest of the sanctified. He died on the 19th of May, in the eighty-third year of his age, and the fifty-third of his ministry.

2. HENRY L. CRANFORD, was born in Wales, Decr. 13th, 1842, and died at Dartmouth, England, May 13th, 1873. In youth he consecrated himself to Christ. Obedient to the Divine call he offered himself as a Missionary candidate, and was accepted by the British Conference and sent to Newfoundland in the autumn of 1864, where he continued to labour most successfully till laid aside by sickness, probably brought on by excessive toil and exposure while travelling in open boats. At last Conference he was appointed to the St. John's Circuit, and entered upon his new sphere with bright hope and unreserved devotion, and during the few months in which he was permitted to labour, his ability in the pul-

pit, his diligence as a pastor, his suavity and deep concern for the welfare of the Church, secured for him the esteem and love of all. Early in December, he left for England, on account of failing health, having been ordered to do so by his physicians, leaving, as he said, the result with "Him who has hitherto cared for me and mine;" but the benefits anticipated by rest, change of air and further medical skill were not realized.

It pleased Him whom he faithfully served to take him to his reward in heaven. The sublime truths of the Gospel which he had delighted to preach to others was a source of solace and support in his extraordinary and protracted sufferings, and he sweetly acquiesced in the will of God.

The day before he died he said he had had a sharp conflict with the enemy, but he had come off more than conqueror, adding, "I am very tired but I shall soon be at rest; I shall not go home to-day, but I shall to-morrow," and so he did, for he sweetly fell asleep on the following morning. His last words were, "The struggle is sharp, but it will not be long. Father, dear Father, I am coming."

Of Brother Cranford it can be truly said his mind was richly stored with knowledge, and his constant aim was to add to his acquirements that he might "show himself approved unto God a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." "For him to live was Christ, and to die was gain."

3. WILLIAM H. IBBITSON, A. B., who was born at Shinimicas, Cumberland County, N. S.

He was converted to God while still young and soon after felt persuaded of his call to the christian ministry. In view of the great importance of this work he devoted himself for several years to a course of Collegiate study at Sackville. He won there by his talents and perseverance the esteem of the Principal and Professors. Three years ago he offered himself as a candi-

date for the ministry and was accepted, after which he still continued his studies for two years.

At the last Conference he received an appointment to labour on the Truro Circuit. His health having been impaired by close application to study, was far from robust, and he only remained at his work for a few weeks when he returned home to die. His hope at first was that a few months rest would so far restore him that he might be able to continue his ministry. During his retirement he wished as far as his strength would permit to be usefully employed. The approach of winter compelled him to desist from all work.

The hope of recovery soon passed away, and he became sensible that his end was near, he frequently expressed his confidence in Christ, the preciousness of whose blood he felt and his hope of that inheritance which is incorruptible, undefiled and that fadeth not away. After lingering a few days in weakness and suffering, the shadow of death passed over him and he entered into rest, April 21st, 1873, in the 30th year of his age and the second of his Ministry.

QUESTION XIII.

What are the Resolutions respecting the Circuit Aid and Contingent Fund ?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference, in view of the many pressing cases of affliction and consequent calls upon this Fund, makes another appeal to the Societies and congregations in its behalf.

2. The Rules for the support of this Fund are hereby reaffirmed and their observance urged upon the superintendents and preachers on trial.

3. The Conference presents its thanks to the Rev. James Taylor, the retiring Secretary, for the faithful and indefatigable manner in which he has discharged the duties of his office, and appoints the Rev. J. G. Angwin in his stead.

HOME MISSION FUND.

QUESTION XIV.

What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting the Home Mission Fund?

ANSWER.

The Conference records with great satisfaction that our Home Mission cause manifests unmistakable signs of advancement, and that it is regarded with increasing favor by our people generally. We rejoice in the largely augmented income of this Fund, from Circuits during the year, and in the measure of success with which our operations in this department of Christian toil have been already crowned. It regards the establishment of a Home Mission Society, and the prosperity which has thus far attended this movement, with encouragement: and hopes and believes that with the continued co-operation and support of our people, and the blessing of the Great Head of the Church, this youthful organization will be abundantly instrumental in evangelizing the destitute portions of our country, and in promoting the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom.

The following Regulations have been agreed upon for the management of the Home Mission organization:

1. This Society shall be called the Home Missionary Society of the Conference of Eastern British America.
2. Each person subscribing not less than one dollar, annually, shall be a member of the Society, and shall be entitled to receive a copy of the Minutes of Conference, containing a Report of the proceedings of the Society, with the names of the subscribers for the year.

3. Each subscriber to the amount of Twenty dollars shall be a life-member of the Society.

4. The sources of income of the Society shall be (1) The subscriptions and collections taken up at the Home Mission Meetings, which shall be held at all the principal preaching places throughout the Conference, and (2) All donations made to the Society, and the interest on monies invested.

5. The funds of this Society shall be under the management of a committee, consisting of the President and Secretary of the Conference, with twenty-eight others, who shall be appointed annually by the Conference, and one half of whom shall be laymen.

6. The public anniversary of the Society shall be held during the Conference Session of each year; and shall be designated the Conference Home Missionary Meeting.

7. Each preacher occupying a Home Mission Station shall furnish, through the Chairman of his District, to the President of the Conference, a Quarterly Report of his labors, and the state of the work of God upon his mission.

For Report, &c., see Appendix A.

SUPERNUMERARY FUND.

QUESTION XV.

What does the Conference resolve respecting the Supernumerary Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Fund?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference most gratefully observes that this important Fund continues to receive increasing attention from our people by a uniform improvement in the receipts

from the Circuits year by year, though it regrets to find a falling off in amounts contributed this year on a few of the more prominent Districts in the Conference.

2. Our Supernumerary Ministers and their families are committed to the Church as a sacred trust; and we feel assured that according as they are sustained, who have been worn out in the service of the Master, and are confidently reposing upon the benevolence of a people whose interests are to them an increasing and exhausting responsibility, God will bless and prosper our cause.

3. The Conference once more appeals to the Church for such an augmentation of pecuniary gifts and annual contributions to this Fund as shall render its resources ample to meet all the demands which the Providence of God may permit in the future to fall upon it.

CHILDREN'S FUND.

QUESTION XVI.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Children's Fund?

ANSWER.

1. That John Starr, Esq., and Rev. James Taylor be requested to act as General Treasurers; and the Rev. D. D. Currie as General Secretary.

2. In accordance with the standing rule which makes provision towards the support of the children of our Ministers, from a certain rate of contributions in proportion to the membership of the Church, it is agreed that for the ensuing year forty-eight (48) members shall provide the allowance for one child. The following statement has accordingly been prepared, determining the number of children to be allotted, at the Financial District Meetings, to the Circuits.

2. That application to this Fund for assistance, in support of local efforts, may be made by circuits in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island.
3. That the grant to any Circuit shall in no case exceed two hundred dollars.
4. In order to accomplish the intention of Conference in the formation of this Fund, and to insure greater uni-

formity in the applications thereto, and in the distribution of its grants, the following regulations are adopted, viz :

(1) In every case where it is proposed to seek for a grant in aid of a new Parsonage, the parties about to build shall communicate with the Secretary of the Committee of this Fund, and procure from him a copy of the Model Plans ; and shall also lay before the Committee full particulars in regard to size, location, tenure and value of land upon which it is proposed to build; the plans of the building, details of size, height, materials, and estimated cost, amount of reliable subscriptions in aid of purchase of land and erection of building, and also the amount of the anticipated grant.

(2.) In regard to applications for grants in aid of purchase of land and buildings,

In every case where it is proposed to purchase land and buildings for a Parsonage, it shall be necessary, in order to obtain a grant in aid of such purchase, for the Superintendent of the Circuit to communicate with the Secretary of the Committee, and furnish full particulars respecting the situation, size, value and tenure of the land and also a plan of the house, shewing size, height, and arrangement of the rooms, a statement of the materials of which the house is built, and of the estimated present cash value of the property, and also of the extent to which the buildings are completed, together with the amount of local subscriptions.

(3.) In every case when a grant is sought to be obtained from this Fund, it must appear that, with the assistance of the grant, it shall be entirely free from the burden of any debt.

5. In regard to applications for grants to liquidate debts on Parsonages :

(1.) Applications for grants can only be received from Circuits where there has been a distinct charge upon the Circuit accounts, and a claim upon the Contingent Fund for rent, or interest.

(2.) Satisfactory evidence must be furnished to the Committee that, with the assistance of the grant sought, and the local effort, the debt shall be liquidated, and all charges for rent or interest shall cease.

6. No grants can be made from this fund to assist in defraying the expenses incurred in repairs and alterations of Parsonages, or for the purpose of assisting in the erection of outbuildings in connection with Parsonages for which no grant is obtained.

7. No grant shall be paid from this fund until the Committee shall receive satisfactory evidence that a sum amounting to at least three times that of the grant sought, has been secured by local effort towards the accomplishment of the object proposed.

8. Every application for aid from this Fund must receive the sanction of the District Meeting, either Financial or Annual, before it can be considered by the Committee.

9. The Treasurer of this Fund shall not pay the amounts which may be granted in aid of local efforts until he shall have received from the Secretary of the Fund satisfactory evidence upon the following points, viz:

(1.) That the title of the property is valid, and that the deed is executed upon the Connexional plan.

(2.) That the whole of the sums subscribed on the Circuit are available and secured, so as to relieve the Circuit account from any charge for rent or interest.

(3.) A Certificate from the Registrar of Deeds must be forwarded, stating that the Connexional Deed is recorded, and that the property is free from all encumbrance, whether by way of mortgage, judgment, widow's thirds or otherwise.

The following is the Report of the operations in connection with this Fund for the past year:

1. Seven parsonages have been secured to the connexion, two by purchase and five by erection, at an aggregate cost of \$18,700. Of this amount \$17,700

have been given by the circuits, the remainder, \$1,000 having been paid by the Committee.

2. Three new parsonages are in a forward condition and will be completed in a very short time.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

QUESTION XVIII.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference with reference to our Sabbath Schools?

ANSWER.

Regarding the Sabbath School as an important auxiliary to the Church in spreading Scriptural holiness throughout the land, the Conference records its high appreciation of the laborious and self-sacrificing efforts of the annually increasing numbers of the intelligent and godly persons who are engaged in the laudable work of leading our youth to Him whose gracious words are, "Suffer the little children to come unto me," and rejoices to learn from the District Returns that a gratifying increase in the number of Schools, Teachers, and Scholars has again been reported. But believing that far greater triumph may yet be won for Christ in this interesting department of our work, the Conference commends this increasingly valuable institution to the prayerful and practical support and sympathy of our people that those who, from week to week go forth with weeping bearing precious seed, may come again with rejoicing, bringing their sheaves with them.

EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY.

QUESTION XIX.

What are the Resolutions of Conference with regard to the Conference Educational Society.

ANSWER.

1. The Conference would call the special attention of the friends of our Church to the increasing importance of the cause of Christian Education.

2. The rapidity with which stirring events transpire among the nations of the world, and the persistent and insidious efforts of the enemies of the cross to subvert the principles of Christianity, render the subject of Education one that must commend itself to every enlightened mind and philanthropic heart.

3. Moreover, the connection that this subject has with the Ministry of our Church, as well as with our College and Academies at Mount Allison, necessarily invest the operations of the Educational Society with an interest which calls for practical sympathy and regard.

4. The Conference regrets that in the first year of the existence of this Society, as a distinct organization, it has not generally secured that recognition, at the hands of the friends of our Church, that its promoters anticipated, and whilst it is expected that the Ministers should faithfully observe the requirements of the Constitution of the Society, it is likewise hoped that our people will more largely and generally co-operate with them.

For Reports, &c., see Appendix B.

CONSTITUTION.

Art. I. The Society shall be known as the Education Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Eastern British America.

II. The payment of an Annual Subscription of not less than three dollars shall constitute a member; and the sum of such annual subscriptions, together with the amount of the annual collections to be made throughout the Connexion, and the interest of the permanent Fund, or Capital Stock, shall constitute the Current Income of the Society.

III. The payment of fifty dollars at any one time shall constitute a person a life member; and the sum of such payments, together with the amounts of all bequests, and special donations of fifty or more dollars, shall be carefully invested from time to time, to constitute a permanent fund, to be regarded as the capital stock of the Society.

IV. The current income of the Society shall be appropriated in a manner following, viz.:

One-third part to aid in the maintenance of the Mount Allison Wesleyan College, as an agency necessary for the suitable educational training of candidates for the Chris-

tian ministry; one-third part to secure Scholarships of the annual value of not more than seventy-five dollars each, for persons authorized by the Conference to attend the Institution, at Sackville, as Theological Students, who may need such assistance to enable them to meet the expense of such attendance; and the remaining third part to secure Scholarships for the children of the members of the Conference of the annual value of not more than fifty dollars each for those in attendance at either Branch of the Institution at Sackville, and not exceeding half this sum for those not so in attendance; no such Scholarship to be available for any child before it shall have entered its tenth year, nor for more than six years.

If in any year it is not found by the Committee necessary to appropriate the full amount of the current income to the above named objects, the surplus for that year shall be added to the Capital Stock.

V. An anniversary Public Meeting of the Society shall be held during the Conference week in the place where the Conference may meet from year to year, at which meeting a report of its operations and condition shall be presented, and its claims shall be urged.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of every Circuit in the Conference to arrange to have a sermon preached annually in every principal congregation upon the importance of education upon right or Christian principles, at the time appointed for making the annual collection for the Society, and also for holding public meetings in which to urge its claims wherever it may be deemed expedient, and to make all possible proper exertions to enlist the sympathies of our friends, and to promote the interest of the Society.

VII. The President of the Conference shall be ex-officio President of the Society, and its other officers shall be two Vice-Presidents, two Secretaries and two Treasurers, and a Committee of twelve. One half the number of such other officers and Committee to be laymen.

VIII. At the suggestion of the Committee any one of the rules or articles of the Constitution may be altered by vote of the Conference.

5. The "Educational Fund for Ministers' Children" as heretofore existing shall be closed, and the interest accruing from the present invested Capital shall be added, year by year, to the third part of the Current Income of the Education Society which is appropriated to Scholarships for Ministers' Children, and all who were required to pay annual subscriptions to the said Education Fund for Ministers' Children, shall hereafter be required to constitute themselves members of the new Education Society, by the payment of the required annual subscription; and the annual collection hitherto required for said Fund, shall be allowed to merge in that required by the new Society.

6. The interest which was ordered to be appropriated from the Jubilee Fund for the promoting of the objects for which the new Education Society is to be established shall be paid from year to year to the Treasurer of said Society, and be counted a part of the Current Income.

PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN & BOOK ROOM.

QUESTION XX.

What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting the Provincial Wesleyan and Book Room?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference would give expression to its sense of the high importance to all the interests of our Church that our Connexional Organ, the Provincial Wesleyan, be well sustained in its career of usefulness, and earnestly resolves to employ the utmost effort to render this indis-

pensable instrumentality increasingly efficient, by enlarging its sphere as widely as possible in every Circuit, thereby making it more extensively auxiliary in the diffusion of Christian intelligence, and the cultivation of the religious home-life of our people.

2. The Conference still regarding with great interest the success of our Book Room, very cordially commends it to our Connexion as a highly necessary department of our Church operations, in the diffusion of sound religious literature, and trusts that this important agency may receive a greatly extended patronage and be rendered much more widely useful.

3. The Conference desire to present its very best thanks to the Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., for the important and valuable service he has rendered the connexion in office of Book Steward and Editor during the last four years, and cannot allow him to retire from its incumbency without expressing its gratitude for the marked improvement he has been able to effect in its business, and offering to him its best wishes for his happiness and success in another department of our work to which he has been appointed.

4. The Conference has elected Rev. A. W. Nicolson as Book Steward and Editor, a brother whom it believes to be possessed of such qualifications as will carry forward the interests of the Book Room and Provincial Wesleyan, and confidently commends him to the fullest sympathy and co-operation of both its Ministers and people.

MOUNT ALLISON INSTITUTIONS.

QUESTION XXI.

What are the Resolutions of Conference with respect to the Mount Allison Educational Institution.

ANSWER.

1. The Reports of the Collegiate and Academic Institutions have been received with real gratification.

2. That the hand of Divine Providence is still as ever clearly recognized in the very general favor which these Institutions have received not only from our people, but from the general public, as well as in the peculiar adaptation of the entire Board of Instruction to their responsible positions and the happy preservation from severe illness and death of both our Academic and Collegiate families.

3. That recognizing our responsibility as the conservators of our educational interest, we would earnestly and unanimously pledge ourselves to sustain by personal effort as well as by our sympathy and prayers, the Institutions, feeling assured that their work is in the fullest sense the work of our Divine Master.

4. The Reports of the Professor of Theology and the Examining Committee respecting the Theological Institution for the past year have given us unmingled pleasure and we are gratified to record our appreciation of the very valuable services of the Rev. Charles Stewart, D.D., whose arduous and responsible work in training candidates recommended for our Ministry has been most efficiently performed.

5. That the opinion of the Board of Trustees and Governors that while an endowment Fund of from seventy-five to one hundred thousand dollars is exceedingly desirable, one of at least sixty thousand dollars is immediately indispensable for the maintenance and advancement of our educational work, has received our substantial endorsement in the pledges already given by the members of the Conference to the amount of twelve

thousand dollars; and, satisfied as we are that this matter needs only to be intelligently presented to our people to receive universal concurrence and support, and recognizing this at present to be an interest of paramount importance, we have pleasure in acceding to the request of the Board of Trustees and Governors, and do hereby designate Rev. Humphrey Pickard, D.D., to that special work, regarding him as peculiarly fitted for it because of his unvarying devotion to educational work, and would commend him and his mission to the appreciation and benevolent consideration of our Churches and the public generally.

6. The Conference, in compliance with the request of the Board of Trustees and Governors, authorizes the President and Secretary of the Conference to act in conjunction with the Alumni Society of the Institutions, or representatives thereof, in securing such an amendment of the act of incorporation as will provide for the addition of two members to the said Board as at present constituted, said members to be elected annually by the Alumni Society in such manner as itself may determine.

7. That the Educational Society, comprehending as it does three most important objects, is still earnestly recommended to the benevolent consideration of our people, and especially, as it is becoming increasingly desirable to afford to Candidates offering for our Ministry, and in need of preliminary aid, the advantages of a thorough and systematic course of study.

8. The following shall be the course of study appointed for probationers for our Ministry, and they are required to be examined upon it by written papers in answer to questions to be furnished by the Secretary of the Committee for the examination of candidates at the Annual District Meetings;

QUESTION XXIV.

What Miscellaneous Resolutions are adopted by the Conference?

ANSWER:

I.—THANKS TO OFFICERS OF CONFERENCE OF LAST YEAR.

1. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. J. G. Hennigar, Ex-President, for the very judicious and faithful discharge of his presidential duties during the year.

2. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. C. Stewart, D. D., Co-Delegate, for the faithful discharge of his duties during the term of his office.

3. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. D. D. Currie, Secretary of the Conference; also to the Rev. R. A. Temple, Journal Secretary, for the valuable services rendered by them during the year.

II.—CANADA CONFERENCE.

4. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. S. D. Rice, D. D., President of the Canada Conference, for his visit to our Conference, the interest he has taken in matters pertaining to the union of the Conferences of Canada and E. B. America, the important aid he has rendered in connection with our public meeting in behalf of our Educational Society, and his excellent address to the Candidates for Ordination.

5. That we rejoice to have the prospect of meeting Dr. Rice in an ecclesiastical connection, which we trust he may long live to adorn by his wisdom and talents.

III.—THANKS, ETC.

6. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. C. Jost, A. M., Rev. J. A. Rogers, Rev. A. D. Merton, A. M., Sub-Secretaries; to Rev. J. M. Pike, Assistant Journal Secretary; to Rev. J. G. Angwin, Assistant Financial Secretary; to Rev. G. S. Milligan, A. M., and Rev. H. Sprague, A. M., Conference Letter Writers; and to Rev. Robt. Duncan, Reporter for *Provincial Wesleyan*, for the valuable services rendered by them at this Conference.

7. That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., for his faithful and very valuable services, as our Financial Agent, and that he be requested to continue in that office for the ensuing year.

8. That the thanks of the Conference are due to the Superintendent on the Fredericton Circuit, for the satisfactory arrangements made by him for the comfortable accommodation of the ministers attending this Conference.

9. That the minister of the Fredericton Circuit be requested to express from the pulpit next Lord's Day, the thanks of the Conference to the members of our church, and other friends, for their kindness and Christian hospitality in entertaining the ministers who have attended the present Conference.

10. The Conference presents its thanks to the proprietors of the railroads, steamboats, and coaches, for the special advantages afforded in journeying to and from this Conference.

11. That a Committee be now appointed to prepare the Pastoral Address for 1874, and report the same to the next Conference.

Ordered, That Revs. John Lathern, and John Read, do compose said Committee.

12. That a Committee be now appointed to prepare the Address to the English Conference for 1874, and report the same at the next Conference.

Ordered, That Revs. J. A. Rogers, and J. L. Sponagle do compose said Committee.

IV.—TEMPERANCE.

13. The Conference, deeply impressed with the conviction that intemperance is a sin against God, and most destructive to the best interests of our race, and that the use of alcoholic liquors, even in moderation, tends to the increase and perpetuation of drunkenness,—

Resolves—(1.) That in view of this great evil, we would reiterate and earnestly enjoin upon all our people the most careful and conscientious observance of that rule given by the Rev. John Wesley to the societies under his care, respecting the use of intoxicating drinks, viz. :—

"Neither buying or selling spirituous liquors, nor drinking them, unless in cases of extreme necessity."

(2.) That we hail with delight all well directed efforts of individuals and organizations to promote the cause of Temperance, and, so far as practicable, will heartily cooperate in those laudable efforts.

(3.) That as the Church of Christ should be the most effectual promoter of moral reform, we pledge ourselves to renewed efforts to purify and preserve her from reproach by discountenancing all complicity of her members with the great evil of intemperance, whether by drinking, manufacturing, selling, signing petitions for license, or furnishing or renting places for the sale of intoxicating liquors.

V.—MARYSVILLE CHURCH.

14. That the thanks of the Conference are due and are hereby tendered to Alex. Gibson, Esq., of Marysville, for the munificent gift of the Church and Parsonage, erected by him and presented to the Conference, free from debt, and would fervently pray that He whose words are, "Them that honor me, I will honor," will graciously vouchsafe to him and his family every needed good, both temporal and spiritual.

VI.—HOME MISSION.

15. That a managing Committee be constituted for the present year, to be named the Executive Home Mission Committee, which shall consist of the President of the Conference, the Secretary of the Home Mission Fund, and the Superintendent of the Sackville Circuit, whose duty it shall be in the interval between this and the ensuing Conference to employ suitable men for such periods and places as shall best serve the interests of our cause in Home Mission work.

That whenever any circuits are left unsupplied, at the close of Conference, and cannot be supplied by the Home Missionary Committee. The financial District meeting shall make provision for visiting such circuits, not less than four times during the remainder of the year, from the circuit of that District—the expenses to be borne by the Home Mission Fund.

VII.—EDUCATIONAL.

16. That this Conference hereby expresses its earnest conviction that the now denominational Common School system is best adapted to the circumstances of this country and deprecates any attempt to substitute for it, for the gratification of any one Body of Christians or class of citizens a Sectarian system of education.

17. That a Committee of privileges, consisting of twenty members, and embracing an equal number of ministers and laymen, shall be appointed, who shall be subject to the call of the President, when he may deem it desirable in the interest of our connectional rights and privileges, as respects the subject of education or any other question.

VIII.—UNION.

18. That the proposed plan of Union between the Conference of Eastern British America and the Conference of Canada shall be submitted to the ensuing March quarterly Meetings of the respective Circuits within the Conference bounds, to afford them an opportunity of giving an expression of their judgment upon the scheme in the event of its receiving the approval of the British Conference.

QUESTION XXV.

When and where shall our next Conference be held ?

FINANCIAL ECONOMY.

The Report (No. 2.) of the Special Committee on our Financial Economy was adopted, and is as follows :—

The Conference recommends to the Quarterly Meetings of the several Circuits the following plan, by which it is hoped they may the more effectually raise the amount necessary to meet the allowances of the ministers and preachers, and which will make the collection of class and ticket money hereafter unnecessary.

1. Let the Quarterly Boards at the beginning of each financial year estimate the amount needed for the year.
2. Then ascertain from each member of the church, and, as far as practicable, from each attendant of the congregation, what each proposes to give as his or her weekly or monthly contribution.
3. Let these sums be entered by a steward appointed for that purpose in a book which he shall keep as Treasurer of the Quarterly Board.

4. If the total amount of these sums does not equal the amount needed, then let the stewards apportion the deficiency among all such as are willing, for Christ's sake, to assume such deficiency, setting down to each person, with his or her consent, the additional amount which they think he or she ought weekly or monthly to pay.

5. Let the stewards then adopt and carry out a plan by which every one shall have the opportunity of regularly contributing each week or month by envelope or otherwise, not grudgingly or of necessity, the sum which has been pledged by him or her. Let these contributions be paid over regularly to the steward appointed to receive them and be brought up by him to the quarterly Meeting. The said steward shall keep an individual account of all these pledges and contributions, and shall pay over the same, under the direction of the quarterly Meeting, to the preacher or preachers authorized to receive them.

STANDING ORDERS.

I.—DISTRICT MEETINGS,

1. The Chairmen of Districts are peremptorily required to procure three complete copies of the Minutes of the several annual and other meetings of the District Committees, financial and ordinary, duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary; one of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records, the second shall be reserved for the use of the Conference, and the third shall be delivered to the Secretary for preservation in the archives of the Committee. Furthermore, it is required that the last mentioned copies be handed in on the forenoon of the day preceding that on which our first preparatory Committee meeting may be appointed

to be held, that the Secretaries may prepare classified lists of all matters which are to come before the Conference, and thereby expedite business.

2. That as much trouble has been caused at different sessions of Conference in consequence of alterations made in the District Minutes, it is determined, that when the Minutes of the several Districts shall have been signed by their respective Chairmen and Secretaries, they shall not be altered, except by the special permission of the Conference.

II.—PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN.

3. That in consequence of the annually increasing arrearages of subscriptions for the *Provincial Wesleyan*, enquiry be instituted in the District Committees respectively, as to the fidelity of each brother responsible for the collection of such monies—the accounts being previously sent to the Chairmen, and distributed at the Financial District Meetings.

III.—CANDIDATES RECOMMENDED.

4. Each District Chairman is required to instruct young men recommended by the District Meeting as probationers for our work, to attend the meeting of the Committees for the examination of Candidates,

IV.—MISSIONARY LISTS.

5. Each Superintendent is required to present, at the Annual District Meeting, prepared on foolscap paper, and made up in Canada currency, a perfect list of all Foreign and Home Missionary monies collected on his Circuit; and each Chairman is required to present such lists, to the Missionary Secretaries, in a state ready for publication, on the day previous to the meeting of either of the Missionary Committees.

V.—CHILDREN'S FUND.

6. The Financial Secretaries of the several Districts are required to send to the Secretary of the Children's Fund, immediately after the Financial District Meeting, the names of all the Ministers, in their respective Districts, who are claimants upon the Children's Fund for the current year; and to state the number of children for whom allowance is claimed; and, as far as possible, the name and date of birth of each of the said children.

VI.—CONFERENCE STATISTICS.

7. The Chairmen of Districts are requested to bring before the notice of their respective Financial District meetings the subjoined schedule (Appendix C,) and to see that it be carefully filled up at the next Annual District Meeting.

VII.—SPIRITUAL REPORTS.

8. *Resolved*, That at the Annual District Meetings, a summary of the Spiritual Reports, and of the Sabbath School Reports, for the respective Circuits, be prepared and entered in the District Minutes, to be laid before the ensuing Conference. The Chairmen of Districts are made responsible for the execution of this order.

VIII.—BOOK ROOM ACCOUNTS.

9. *Resolved*, That every Minister and Preacher is peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward each year, at or before the meeting of Conference.

APPENDIX A.—HOME MISSION FUND.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY

FOR 1873.

Another year of toil in our Home Mission field has passed away. It has not been wanting in pleasing incident and cheering success, such as are calculated to awaken profound gratitude to Almighty God, and to inspire lively and abundant hopes in reference to the future of this important enterprise. The Committee are more than ever confirmed in their conviction that our work in this department is but in its infancy, and that the Church has only to be faithful to the solemn trust so clearly imposed upon her by the Great Master, in order to have her efforts crowned with the most satisfactory and glorious results. The seed sown has already yielded a compensating return, and nothing but unceasing care and diligent culture is needed to secure a rich and ample harvest. We sow in hope, though often in tears, and if faithful to our appointed task we shall assuredly one day reap in joy.

The usual Home Missionary Meetings were held throughout our Conference during the past Autumn and Winter. The interest evoked by these services, not only in our older and more important Circuits but even in those where Methodism is a comparatively new and feeble cause, is a most significant and

cheering circumstance. The congregations convened on these occasions have listened with evident interest to the impressive facts presented and the stirring appeals made by the advocates of Home Missions, and by their practical and generous responses thereto have furnished abundant proof that this beneficent scheme is taking fast hold upon the hearts of our people.

Bro. H. J. Clarke writes thus respecting a gracious revival of religion at Gabarus, C. B. "The Harbor Church has been literally packed each night, with souls praising God, or panting for freedom from sin. Over one hundred have been converted, many of whom are heads of families."

Bro R. B. Mack writing from River John, says : "A revival of religion, calm and gentle, but real and glorious, is in progress among us. Whole families are rejoicing in and together. Great things are witnessed in the Sabbath schools. As the result of the revival upwards of forty souls have been gathered into the church.

At New Germany special services were held by Bro. James Scott during the month of March. "Notwithstanding the stormy weather, they were well attended and our labor was blessed by the Divine Spirit. Some were led to seek the Saviour, and a considerable number who had backslidden were re-awakened to penitence."

Other Circuits though not favored with these special visitations of revival influence, have nevertheless realized a good degree of religious prosperity. Bro. Weldon reports relative to the work at Port Hawkesbury :—"I am thankful to be able to write that there are some encouraging evidences that God's blessing accompanies the humble efforts made for the advancement of his work. A Class meeting has just been re-opened at the Head of Hawkesbury Harbor, in which several have been received as members on trial with the prospect of further increase."

Bro. C. W. Hamilton writes from Knowlesville: "Our prosperity spiritually has not been great, but it has nevertheless been encouraging. Some souls have been converted, and several added to the Society."

Bro. A. Lucas of Souris, P. E. I. says,—“Looking over the year now closing we see much for which to be grateful.

“Georgetown has been formed into a separate Circuit, Mt. Stewart has a comfortable House of Worship, and at Souris proper a church is now in course of erection. The work of the year has consisted of journies amounting to 1524 miles, pastoral visits 460, preaching services 107, in addition to holding Bible classes, prayer and class meetings, and on most Sabbaths attending Sabbath school.”

Labrador was one of the first localities placed on our list of Home Missions. Bro. J. Hale who was appointed by Conference to visit that region during the Summer months, furnishes an interesting Report of his visit from which we make the following extracts:—“After a short voyage I arrived at Labrador in the early part of the summer, and proceeded as soon as possible to Indian Tickle, the extreme point of the Mission northwards. . . . I preached three times on the Sabbath; the congregations were good. During the Evening service the power of the Spirit rested upon those present While there I visited some of the natives at their homes, and found them in a state of deplorable ignorance. At Cape Charles I spent nearly three weeks. At some of the services the congregations were large and deeply attentive, and the

means of grace were seasons of rich enjoyment to many. At Chateaux and Henry Harbor I spent a fortnight. While there I met with several men from the Bay of Islands, on the coast of Newfoundland. They spoke very encouragingly concerning the prospects of Methodism in the Bay. The Wesleyans and members of the Scotch church have unanimously resolved to build a Wesleyan Methodist church, which they expect to have completed free of debt next year, when they hope a Wesleyan minister will be sent them. I was pleased to find at Red Bay such a large number of warm-hearted Methodists, and think it a great pity we are not in a position to answer their long and loud appeals for ministerial help."

Referring to the above Report, the Chairman of the Newfoundland District strongly urges the claims of the two last named places upon our church for the immediate appointment of missionaries to them. Of Red Bay he says, "It may be so arranged that the Labrador missionaries shall reside for the Winter months at this interesting place, and itinerate along the extensive coast during the Summer." Several of the Home Mission Circuits in this important District have been favored during the year with extensive and powerful revivals of religion, and as the result report large accessions to the church.

The committee would also call attention to two or three other promising fields which invite our pastoral aid and oversight, but which from lack of men and means we have been compelled thus far to leave unsupplied. One of these is Goldenville in Guys-

boro' County. A layman of that place writing in the Provincial Wesleyan, states that at present there is a most promising opening there for Missionary labor, and strongly urges the immediate appointment of a minister. Dalhousie Circuit at the northern extremity of New Brunswick has also been destitute of ministerial supply for several years. Bro. Paisley writing from the adjoining Circuit states: "There is not a Wesleyan minister in the whole County of Restigouche, and indeed there are only four Protestant ministers stationed in it. There are many persons firm in their attachment to us, and of such there are the youthful members of the community who are anxious to have a Wesleyan minister.

We sincerely trust that the loud and pressing appeals made by these destitute regions, to the sympathies and the liberality of our people, will meet with a fitting response. Blessed as they have been so richly both with temporal favors and spiritual mercies, the members of our churches and congregations should regard it as their most solemn duty, and high privilege to impart to others the benefits they have so freely received. So long as there is a single locality within our Conferential bounds, which desiring the services of a Wesleyan minister remains destitute thereof, we are stopping far short of the position God has designed us to fill, and are neglecting our obvious and most important duty. It is our earnest hope that our people will speedily discharge their solemn obligations in this matter, and that by the blessing of God upon the growing liberality of his Church, these neglected corners of the vineyard entrusted to us for cultivation may soon be over-

taken by our evangelistic agencies and made to rejoice in moral verdure and faithfulness. Nor should our holy ambition rest satisfied until every portion of our land has been overspread with gospel influence, and the entire population thoroughly permeated with saving grace.

APPENDIX D.

REPORT

Of the Joint Committee on the Federal Union of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in British America, held in the Dorchester Street Church, Montreal, during the month of October 1872, as amended and adopted by the Conference of Eastern British America, held in Fredericton, N. B., in June and July, 1873.

GENERAL PRINCIPLES.

1. The Wesleyan Methodist Conferences in British America shall be so altered in the form of their general government as to be composed of one General Conference, and several annual Conferences.

2. The Name of the Church hereby organized shall be THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA, or if it should hereafter be found expedient, the United Wesleyan Methodist Church of Canada.

THE GENERAL CONFERENCE.

3. Whereas, under existing circumstances, it is deemed expedient to make such arrangements as will admit of the incorporation of Lay Representation in the General Conference, if it be found that the requisite majority of the Quarterly Meetings of the two existing Conferences desire such incorporation.

The General Conference shall be composed of either one Minister for every four members of each Annual Conference, or of one Minister and one Layman for every eight members of each Annual Conference. Provided, nevertheless that a fraction of three-fourths shall entitle a Conference to an additional representation. Provided always that the President of each Conference shall be one of those so elected; and also provided always that the whole number of delegates elected to the First General Conference shall not exceed two hundred and twenty.

4. The Ministerial Members of the General Conference shall be elected by ballot, in their respective annual Conferences.

5. The appointment of Layman to the General Conference shall be made as follows:—

(1.) The Laymen in each Annual District meeting next preceding the meeting of the General Conference shall elect from among the members of our Church, within the bounds of the District a representative or representatives to the General Conference; the number so elected to be determined by the number of Church members in the District, as compared with the entire membership within the bounds of the Annual Conference; the whole number not to exceed the number of Ministers appointed by such Annual Conference.

(2.) The Lay members of the District Meeting making such appointments to the General Conference shall be elected by ballot by the Quarterly Official Meeting next preceding.

6. The Secretary of each annual Conference shall compute the number of Laymen to be appointed by each District, in accordance with the principles laid down in section 5, and publish the same in the minutes of the Annual Conference next preceding such District appointment. Each delegate must not be not less than twenty-five years of age, and must have been a member of the Church continuously during the five years next preceding the time of his election.

7. A majority of those chosen to constitute the General Conference shall form a quorum for the transaction of business.

8. The first General Conference shall meet on the first Wednesday after the fifteenth day of September, in the year 1874, provided that the Conferences concerned shall have approved of the plan of Union; and thenceforward, once in four years, on the first Wednesday after the fifteenth day of September, in such place as may be decided by the General Conference.

9. Each General Conference, from its Ministerial Members shall, on its assembling, elect by ballot, without debate, a President, who shall preside over its proceedings and all its Committees, during the four years of his Presidency.

10 Each General Conference shall, immediately after the election of the President of the General Conference, elect by ballot without debate, a Secretary or Secretaries, whose duty it shall be to keep a correct record of its proceedings, and publish the minutes under the direction of the General Conference.

11. The General Conference only shall have power to make rules and regulations for the Church under the following limitations and restrictions, viz.:

(1) It shall not revoke, alter or change any article of religion, nor establish any new standards or rules of doctrine, contrary to our existing and established standards.

(2) It shall not destroy the plan of our Itinerant system.

(3) It shall not make any change in the General Rules of our Society.

(4) It shall not do away with the privilege of our Ministers and Preachers of trial by a Committee of Ministers, and of an appeal; neither shall it do away with the privileges of our members, of trial by a Committee and of an appeal.

(5) It shall not appropriate the profits of the Book Room to any purpose other than for the benefit of the Preachers traveling and Superannuated of the Canada Conference, and the Travelling and Supernumeraries of the Conference of Eastern British America, their wives, widows, and children.

(6) All new Regulations, and alterations of any Rule or Regulation now in force respecting our temporal economy,—such as building of churches, the order to be observed therein; the allowance to the Ministers or Preachers, their widows and children; the raising annual supplies for the propagation of the Gospel, (Missions excepted) for the making up of the allowances of the Ministers, Preachers, &c., shall not be considered of any force or authority, until such rule, regulation, or alteration, shall have been laid before the Quarterly meetings throughout the several Annual Conferences, and shall have received the concurrence of a majority of the members who may be present at the time of laying said rule or regulation before them, of two-thirds of said Quarterly meetings.

(7) Nor shall any new rule, regulation or alteration, respecting the rights and privileges of our members; such as receiving persons on trial; the conditions on which they shall retain their membership; the manner of bringing to trial, finding guilty, reprobating, suspending or excluding disorderly persons from society and Church privileges, have any force or authority till laid before the Quarterly meetings and approved as aforesaid: *Provided, however,* that on the concurrent recommendation of three-fourths of all the members of the several Annual Conferences who shall be present and vote thereon; then a majority of two-thirds of the General Conference succeeding, shall suffice to alter any of the above restrictions, except the first and third, which they shall not alter; *Provided, further,* when such alteration or alterations, shall have been passed by two-thirds of the General Conference, so soon as three-fourths of the members of the several Annual Conferences shall have concurred as aforesaid, such alteration or

alterations shall have effect; *Provided, also*, that in case there shall be Lay delegation in the General Conference, the appeal to the Quarterly meetings, allowed in the above restrictions, shall not be continued in force, but shall be null and void.

12. Any act of the General Conference involving constitutional changes, shall become law, only when it secures a majority of three-fourths of the members of the General Conference, who may be present and vote thereon.

13. Any act of the General Conference affecting the rights and privileges of the Annual Conferences, shall become law only when it secures a majority of two-thirds of the members of the General Conference who may be present and vote thereon, also a majority vote of the members of the several next ensuing Annual Conferences, who may be present and vote thereon.

14. The General Conference by a vote of two-thirds of its members shall have power to increase or diminish the number or alter the boundaries of the several Annual Conferences.

15. The General Conference shall, at each session, appoint a special committee of not less than twelve persons, containing an equal number of Ministers and Laymen, whose duty it shall be, from one General Conference to another, to watch over and guard the rights and privileges of our Church throughout the Connexion; to promote, as far as possible, the recommendations of the General Conference, and to consider and decide upon all questions affecting the general interests of the Church, and to adopt such measures as it may judge best calculated to secure these ends:—*Provided, nevertheless* that this Committee shall not exercise any legislative power whatever, nor do anything that shall interfere with the duties of any Annual Conference or any Officers of the Church.

16. In the intervals of the Sessions of the General Conference, its President shall perform such duties as the General Conference may direct, and shall call and preside over all Standing Committees of the General Conference:—*Provided, nevertheless*, he shall not exercise a general superintendency, or any powers which are conferred upon other officers of the Church.

17. Toward meeting the expenses of the First General Conference, a collection shall be made throughout our whole work, and the Annual Conferences shall fix the time when such collection shall be made within their respective bounds.

THE ANNUAL CONFERENCES.

18. The work in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec shall be divided into three Annual Conferences, to be known as the Toronto, London and Montreal Conferences.

19. The Toronto Conference shall embrace the Toronto, Bradford, Barrie, Collingwood, Owen Sound, Whitby, Cobourg, Peterboro and Belleville Districts.

20. The London Conference shall embrace Hamilton, Niagara, Brantford, London, St. Thomas, Chatham, Sarnia, Guelph and Goderich Districts.

21. The Montreal Conference shall embrace the Kingston, Brockville, Perth, Pembroke, Ottawa, Montreal, Quebec and Stanstead Districts.

22. The work embraced in the Conference of Eastern British America shall be divided into three Annual Conferences.

23. The Provinces of Nova Scotia, and Bermuda, shall constitute one Annual Conference, and shall be known as the Nova Scotia Conference.

24. The Province of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island shall constitute one Annual Conference, and shall be known as the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference.

25. Newfoundland, Labrador, and the Islands contiguous, shall constitute one Annual Conference, and shall be known as the Newfoundland Conference.

26. Each Annual Conference shall be composed of all Ministers received into full connexion and ordained, who are stationed and appointed by it.

27. Each Annual Conference shall retain all rights, powers and privileges at present possessed, except such as are vested in the General Conference.

28. Each Annual Conference shall on its assembling, elect a President from among its own members by ballot, without debate.

29. Each Annual Conference, immediately after the election of a President, shall appoint a Secretary by ballot, without debate; and shall also elect the Chairmen of Districts, according to Discipline.

30. In the event of the death or disability of a President of an Annual Conference, the ex-President shall immediately enter upon the duties of the Presidency and discharge them to the end of the year.

31. Each Annual Conference shall examine the character and qualifications of all Ministers and Preachers on trial within its limits, and its decisions shall be final.

32. Each Annual Conference shall station all the Ministers and Preachers within its limits according to the rules of the Stationing Committee.

33. The Stationing Committee in each Conference shall consist of the President, the Chairmen of Districts, and another Minister from each District, for whose election the Lay Representatives shall also vote—the voting being always by ballot. One of the General Missionary Secretaries may be *ex officio* a member of the Stationing Committee of the Toronto, London and Montreal Conferences.

34. Each Annual Conference shall continue to act under its own Discipline until the meeting of the first General Conference.

35. The several Annual Conferences shall assemble during the month of June in each year, and shall appoint the place of meeting from year to year.

36. Each President of an Annual Conference shall be stationed on a Circuit, or otherwise, as the Conference shall direct.

TRANSFER OF MINISTERS.

37. The President of the General Conference, the President of each Annual Conference, and one Minister elected annually by each Annual Conference shall be a Committee for the transfer of Ministers and Preachers, from one annual Conference to another, and the decisions of such Committee shall be final. To the Chairman of such Committee shall all communications by all parties concerned be addressed, but not later than the first day of May in any one year:—Provided, nevertheless, any minister who deems himself aggrieved shall have the privilege of appearing before the Transfer Committee and stating his case; and provided, likewise, that such transfer shall not prejudice the ultimate financial claims of any Minister or Preacher so transferred:—Each Minister transferred shall be subject to the action of the Stationing Committee of the Conference to which he may be transferred.

FINANCIAL ECONOMY.

THE GENERAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

38. All the monies raised for Missionary purposes in all the Conferences shall form one General Missionary Fund. Such Circuits as are now assisted in the Conference of Eastern British America by the grant from the Parent Conference and by the Home Mission Fund, and such Circuits and Missions of the Canada Conference as are now assisted by its own Mission Fund shall hereafter be supported by the General Missionary

Society, according to the principles upon which the Missions of the Canada Conference have been hitherto sustained.

39. There shall be a Central Missionary Board for the management of the Missionary Fund, which shall meet annually.

40. This Board shall be composed, for the present, of the President of each Annual Conference, one Minister annually elected from each Annual Conference, the General Secretaries and Treasurers of the Missionary Society, and twelve Laymen, of whom, one shall be appointed by the Laymen of each Annual Conference Missionary Committee, and the others by the Laymen of the General Conference.

41. The duties of this Board shall be to review the Missionary work, and apportion the funds committed to them to the respective Conferences according to their necessities.

42. Vacancies occurring in the Central Missionary Board shall be filled by the said Board as follows:—In case a vacancy occurs by the death, resignation, or other disability of a member of an Annual Conference, the vacancy shall be filled only until the next meeting of the Annual Conference to which the member thus dying, resigning, or being disabled, may belong, but in case the vacancy occurs by the death, resignation, or other disability of a layman, the vacancy shall be filled by the Missionary Board until the next General Conference.

43. The General Conference shall appoint the General Secretaries and Treasurers of the Missionary Society, who shall be *ex-officio* members of the Central Missionary Board.

44. The Districts of Red River, Saskatchewan, British Columbia and Japan shall be regarded as Missionary Districts, and for the present shall belong to the Toronto Conference.

45. All Missionaries must be connected with some Annual Conference, and be amenable to such Conference for their conduct in all respects.

46. There shall be within the bounds of each Annual Conference a Local Missionary Committee constituted as the Annual Conference may determine.

OTHER CONNEXIONAL FUNDS.

47. It is deemed desirable as soon as legal and other difficulties can be removed, to amalgamate the different funds of the United Church and to place them under the management of a Central Board.

48. For the present the Superannuated Ministers' Fund of the Canada Conference, and the Supernumerary Ministers' Fund of the Conference of Eastern British America shall be kept distinct, each department being managed by its own laws.

49. The Toronto, London and Montreal Conferences shall, for the present, have one General Contingent Fund and one General Children's Fund.

50. The Contingent Fund (embracing the annual income from the Commutation Fund) shall be divided annually among the several Conferences, according to the number of Church members, including those on trial.

51. For the Children's Fund a uniform rate shall be levied on the membership, including those on trial, in the above named Conferences, and the amount so raised divided annually among said Conferences, according to the number of their respective claimants.

52. The Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland Conferences shall each have and manage its own separate Children's Fund, and Contingent Fund, for the present.

53. Whenever Connexional Funds are organized or amalgamated, their management shall be entrusted to a Board, or Boards constituted by the General Conference similarly to the Missionary Board.

EDUCATIONAL AND PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

54. The publishing interests of the United Church shall be under the direction of the General Conference.

55. The General Conference shall appoint the Editor or Editors, and the Book Steward or Book Stewards.

56. The General Conference shall determine the number and character of our Educational Institutions, and shall prescribe the manner of forming the Governing Boards of all Universities and Theological Schools. The General Conference shall also prescribe a Course of Study for all Candidates for the Ministry.

57. This Conference, having considered the reports of the joint Committee appointed by this Conference and the Canada Conference to prepare a basis of Union of these Conferences into one Connexion or Church, thereby initiating a movement which may somewhat alter the relations it has hitherto sustained to the British Conference, cannot allow the inauguration of the measure proposed, without expressing its deep and grateful sense of indebtedness for the liberal support and paternal care shown toward us by the Parent body during the many years of our past history. We devoutly pray that upon our fathers and brethren of the British Connexion, and upon ourselves, may continue to rest the peculiar favor of the Great Head of the Church, and that the strongest ties which

should exist between the different branches of the same great Christian family, may continue to unite us in uninterrupted harmony, until the whole design of the Mediatorial reign of Christ shall have been accomplished to the glory of His Holy Name.

APPENDIX E. ADDRESSES AND REPLIES.

THE PASTORAL ADDRESS

Of the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Churches in Eastern British America, to the Members of the Churches under its care.

DEARLY BELOVED BROTHERS,—

Grace be unto you, and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Assembled in our Annual Conference, and cherishing an undiminished interest in your welfare, we again address to you our pastoral counsels. Ye are ever in our hearts, and we do not cease to pray for you, and to desire that ye might be filled with the knowledge of God's will, in all wisdom and spiritual understanding, that ye might walk worthily of the Lord unto all pleasing, being fruitful in every good work, and increasing in the knowledge of God.

In the meantime mindful of our constant need of Divine guidance in order to the faithful administration of the interests with which we are put in charge of God, we reiterate the inspired request, "Brethren pray for us that the word of the Lord may have free course and be glorified."

During the past year, three of our number have entered into rest. Of these brethren whose names are very fragrant in our memories, Henry L. Cranford and

William H. Ibbotson had but recently entered upon their ministry. Our Divine Master, whose wisdom and whose right are alike unquestionable, called them to the higher service in heaven. They died triumphing over death. The third, Father Temple, was an aged Supernumerary, whose "praise was in all the Churches." During a long ministry, in which he occupied some of our most important circuits, he showed himself "a workman that needed not to be ashamed." Eminently diligent and faithful as a minister of Christ, with an intense love for his work, which neither age nor disease could destroy; having long and laboriously "served his generation by the will of God," he "fell on sleep."

Meanwhile God "carries on his work." Two young men who have passed creditably through the usual term of probation, were, after the necessary examinations received into full connexion and set apart to the work of the ministry by the imposition of hands and prayer, and seventeen others who have given evidence of a divine vocation, were received on trial. Yet, so has God in his mercy prospered our way, that our numbers are not sufficient to fill the places which earnestly ask to have their spiritual necessities met. Our appeal, often repeated, is yet eminently timely, "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that he would send forth laborers into his harvest."

With devout gratitude to the Great Head of the Church, who has accompanied the ministrations of His servants with the power of the Divine Spirit, we are enabled to report that after filling the places of some who have gone to other lands, and of those who have been removed to the Church in heaven, there is a clear increase in our membership of five hundred and sixty-seven, with more than two thousand on trial. Let us take courage. If we be faithful in labor and prayer, God will show unto us yet greater things than these.

We are glad to be able to record an increase in most of our Connexional funds. We trust that the advance this year made in the receipts of the Supernumerary and Ministers' Widows' Fund is indicative of a more enlightened recognition of the necessities and claims of those whose life and strength have been exclusively given to the work of the Church, and of an ever deepening determination to meet those obligations.

We rejoice in the generous response made to our appeal in behalf of Home Mission work. The receipts from the ordinary sources have been increased by more than sixteen hundred dollars. Earnest minded laymen enhanced the interest at the meeting of our Committee this year by their hearty zeal in this enterprize. And the Divine blessing rests upon it. The land is opening up to us on every side. And where we have been able to enter these openings, precious fruits have been gathered. Let us not however forget the claims of a heathen world, or the imperative duty of the Christian Church towards those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death.

The editorship of the PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN and the management of our Book Room have been committed to the care of the Rev. A. W. Nicholson. We hope that these institutions of our Church shall continue to grow in favor with you. Our Conference organ is well deserving of a place in every household connected with our congregations.

Again we make an appeal to you on the great importance of Christian education. Secure for children the highest mental training possible. The right of each individual to such training, the spiritual dangers which especially beset the ignorant and undisciplined mind, the world's great and growing need for the best efforts of cultivated men and women, make this duty a most imperative one. Do not leave them untaught weaklings in danger of falling before the earliest attack of subtle

soul-destroyers ; do not we beseech you leave them so *imperfectly* trained that they shall become the dupes of a "philosophy falsely so called." In the Mount Allison Institutions our Church is laboring with strenuous effort to provide increasing facilities for giving the higher education under her own immediate supervision. The great purposes there sought are to lead the youth to Christ and to give the fullest training for His service. The principles adopted, the established character of the officers of the institutions, the widely acknowledged faithfulness with which the educational work is here done, and the gracious manifestations of the saving power of the Divine Spirit, combine to recommend this seat of learning to the parents and guardians of youth.

And for these Institutions, indispensable to us as a Church, we ask your fullest practical sympathy. One year since in the inception of a plan for endowment, the members of the Conference pledged themselves to raise one-eighth of a fund of one hundred thousand dollars ; they more than redeem that pledge, as to-day they *unconditionally* give the amount promised. We send an honored member of our body, the Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., to bring this fund to its maturity. For the education of your children, for the training of the ministry who shall occupy your pulpits, for the fuller realization of the moral power which as a Church we should exert through all the land, we ask, God asks, your generous response. And we venture furthermore to suggest that in devising that wealth with which God has for a time entrusted you, the importance of our Mount Allison Institution shall not be overlooked.

In these days of danger when foes from every quarter assail "the faith once delivered to the saints," and many are "deceiving and being deceived," we exhort you to hold fast the doctrines which ye have received. The best guard against skepticism is an enlarged experience of the work of the Holy Spirit upon the heart,

and a deeper drinking into the mind of Christ. Doubts less frequently disturb the sincerely obedient, and "the path of the just is as the shining light that shineth more and more unto the perfect day." Secure for yourselves, therefore, the most intimate communion with God, and seek in your own hearts such a fulfilment of Divine promises as will satisfy yourselves of their truth. The bewildering and destructive falsehoods of infidelity will have only the most transient duration in your hearts, while the Spirit itself bears witness to your adoption into the family of God.

Strenuously labour for a steady growth in grace. If, forgetting the things which are behind,—the lower level of opinion and practice—you are constantly reaching forth unto those things which are before; seeking for Christ as eagerly as for hid treasure your mind will reject the distractions which supervene upon sluggishness and inattention. Have a high moral aim. Seek deliverance from all sin. Have your souls thoroughly imbued with a sense of God's tender and infinite love, giving to him an ardent and grateful affection, toned by the deepest reverence. Consecration is the outgrowth of this love. "The Christian lives to Christ alone." He listens in the attitude of earnest attention to every expression of the Divine will, and he obeys with promptitude and unreserve. Let such consecration be yours and let the Divine direction "ye are not your own, ye are bought with a price, therefore glorify God in your body and in your spirit which are God's," be not merely regarded by you as a principle laid down in Holy Writ but be realized as the habitual experience of your lives.

Let the utmost assiduity be shewn in training your children in truth and virtue. Too much stress cannot be laid upon the inculcation of these duties, either in their relation to the church of which you design your children to be faithful members, or in relation to your children themselves, whose everlasting salvation you

greatly desire. The Sabbath School will prove a powerful auxiliary in this duty, but it is an auxiliary only. It must not be allowed to supercede your personal endeavour and supervision. Carefully teach them the leading truths of religion, guard them as they need it against the prevalent errors of the day, caution them against the seductive attractions of vice, and fortify them in virtuous habits. It will be your duty to provide them with such books for reading and study as will strengthen their minds, enlarge their acquaintance with the world and give them broad and liberal views, without weakening in them the principles of virtue or sapping the foundations of truth. Meanwhile purge your houses of all injurious literature, remembering that it both poisons and defiles.

We address you with full confidence upon the subject of improper amusements, and exhort you to bear your testimony with holy boldness. Rejoicing to recognize you as partakers of true Christian liberty—a liberty not to indulge in questionable pleasures, but to rise above the desire for them. The spirit of God brings the true enfranchisement when He gives us to feel that for happiness we are in no sense dependent upon semi-barbarous amusements and doubtful recreations. If it be our lot in bearing testimony against these things by word or practice to be in advance of the general spirit of the age, we must bear our testimony faithfully, looking for a better era with nobler and truer conceptions of the nature of religion and the dignity of the human soul to justify us in this fuller interpretation of the spirit of God's word, and a closer adherence to its teachings. Avoid the perilous precincts of the ball-room; yield not to the soul-destroying seductions of the wine cup; reject the baited enticements of gambling in their every form, remembering always that ye may not "make provision for the flesh to fulfil the lusts thereof."

Guard diligently against drinking into the spirit of the world. The danger here is incalculable. There is a mad rush after sensuous delights, the luxurious in living, the gay in dress, the material in wealth, the animal in pleasure, are made the supreme objects of life for thousands. Keep yourselves pure. And while in the fierce struggle for gain so many are making shipwreck of character and of their hopes for eternity, be it yours to show that the laws of business morality are coincident with the highest demands of integrity and virtue, remembering that, from age to age, the injunction is repeated, "I am the Almighty God, walk before me and be thou perfect."

It becomes our duty to inform you of advancing measures taken towards organic changes in our body. A common basis of union has been agreed upon between the Canada Conference and ourselves for which we expect the endorsement of the British Conference, and in the course of the year the measure will be placed before the respective Quarterly Boards throughout our Conferential territory. In the consummation of this great work which we now confidently anticipate, we shall not only have a strong organization spanning the continent from ocean to ocean, but we shall as a Church, occupy a position and possess resources which shall make us mighty through God, to take no mean part of the Church's mission, that of conquering the world for Christ.

Finally, brethren, farewell. Be perfect, be of good comfort; be of one mind; live in peace; and the God of love and peace shall be with you.

THE ANSWER
OF THE
BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1872
TO THE
Address of the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church
IN EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA, 1872.

REVEREND AND VERY DEAR BRETHREN,—

Your fraternal greetings are welcome to us for manifold reasons, but chiefly as a proof that we mutually "dwell in God." "Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another."

The Address of your Conference was read to the largest assembly of Methodist Ministers which has ever been gathered, even in this Metropolis. Your able representative, the Rev. George Scott, D.D., in simple and telling words deepened the impression which your message was so well calculated to make.

You will rejoice with us, we are persuaded, when we record the financial success of a noble scheme for the erection of fifty new chapels in London, each to accommodate a thousand worshippers; the steady increase in the number of our houses of prayer throughout the country; the multiplication of our day schools; and the sustentation of our funds for the spread of the Gospel at home, and in "all the world." Earnest and faithful Ministers, nobly supported by praying and able volunteers, are seeking, in order to save, the most degraded of our home population, while, amidst many instances

of progress in "regions beyond," we may point with adoring gratitude to the deepening and widening influence of our Italian Mission, and to the raising up of a powerful native ministry in India.

Yet, while we thus write, we are saddened at the remembrance that this year our numerical returns show a decrease of two hundred and forty members. While we are not unmindful of the thought, that there may be no loss of vitality in the parent-trunk, even when some of the branches are removed, yet we would commune with our own hearts, and ask whether the "whole economy of grace," which is at the service of the Church, would not have produced new and abundant life all around, if we had not too often "received the grace of God in vain?" It may be that if we were more tenderly anxious to arrest the backsliding, and to recover the fallen, our love would have a healthier glow and our vigilance and fidelity be more commensurate with our responsibilities. In saving others we should save ourselves. The Church conquers by her fears as well as by her sword. We hail accessions to our Churches; ought we not, then, to pursue with earnest and loving entreaty those who wander from the fold?

We are one with you, blessed be God, in doctrine as in affection. We heartily reciprocate your congratulations upon the maintenance of unmistakable evangelical truth in our public pulpits and among our societies. We could not, as we would not, vie with those who seek to attract men by histrionic pageantry. We call to mind the simplicity of our blessed Saviour's life, ministry and sacraments, and we recoil from ostentatious observances, which are rebuked in every chapter of the Holy Gospels. "Our rejoicing is this, the testimony of our conscience, that in simplicity and Godly sincerity, not with fleshly wisdom, but by the grace of God, we have had our conversation in the world." To all those who would stimulate us to seek warmth at the painted fires

of Ritualism, by the citation of sacramentarian tenets from the writings of the immortal brothers who gave Methodism her theology and her songs, our reply is simple. We allow infallibility to no man, not even to those true successors of the Apostles—John and Charles Wesley. As the venerable Founder of our polity himself has said, "We are no more to expect any living man to be infallible than to be omniscient." And it is due to the memory of our Founder that we should remind ourselves of the marked difference in his teaching, upon the points in question, before and after his personal acceptance of salvation by faith.

But while we refuse to be enchained by Ritualism, seeing that we were "free born," we do not understand that repugnance to what you justly designate as the "gaudy rites of a Godless ceremonial," implies a careless, perfunctory, and irreverent celebration of the solemn services of the sanctuary. The love which is not reverent and devout in all holy exercises we believe to be "another" love than that of which an Apostle has said, "It doth not behave itself unseemly."

We sympathize with you in the losses you have sustained by death. Illustrious names have been added this year to our death-roll. Conspicuous among them are those of the revered and beloved James Dixon, D.D., an eloquent champion of the oppressed, a mighty interpreter of the oracles of God, a child in malice, a man in understanding; the venerable Elijah Hoole, D.D., who, despite continuous physical suffering, persistently toiled in the service of our Foreign Missions, and was "ready to every good work; and Thomas Vasey, a tender, genial, and noble Christian, a daring and successful evangelist, who, when nearing the highest honors our connexion can bestow, passed triumphantly to the "inheritance of the saints in light."

Bowed by the memory of the illustrious dead, we are resolved to present a bold and unyielding front to the

encroachments of the "Man of Sin;" to the blasphemous attacks of an infidelity now open, and now lurking under the apologetic designation of Rationalism; and to the seductions of a worldliness, which divides its homage between gold and pleasure. God help each one of us to "endure hardness, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ."

It gladdens us to know that your Educational department is in so efficient and prosperous a condition. Be not disquieted, even though, as you inform us, "all Legislative aid has been withdrawn from denominational education." Whatever diversity of opinion may exist among us or among you, as to the relative merits of a denominational or a national education, history will not fail to record that, at a time when the nation inadequately cared for the children of the people, the churches sedulously strove to remedy this defect. And if the persistent activity of Godly people in the past has at length aroused the nation to do its duty, and to resolve to give to every child that education which is a birth-right of Christianity, let us be thankful that by-gone labour has not been "in vain in the Lord."

We have pleasure in acceding to your request, and in appointing the Rev. Charles Stewart, D.D., to be your next President, and the Rev. Elias Brettle as Co-Delegate.

"And now," beloved Brethren, we "commend you to God, and to the word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified." Let us heed the stirring call of our Israel's sweet singer:

"Strive we in affection strive;
Let the purer flame revive,
Such as in the martyrs glow'd,
Dying champions for their God."

Let us dare for Christ. And when the "Chief Shepherd" shall appear, may we receive a crown of glory, which fadeth not away!

THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE

OF THE

Wesleyan Methodist Church in Eastern British America.

TO THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1873.

REVEREND AND VERY DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—

To greet you with our filial and fraternal salutations is not a matter of mere routine. Those of us who were born across the Atlantic, and came to this country to prosecute Missionary labours, have lost none of our love and loyalty to the old land and the mother church. Those of us who are natives of this land rejoice that we live under British laws and institutions, and trace with gratitude and joy the history, both at home and abroad, of the church founded by the Wesleys, and early planted in the Western world.

The address from your venerable body is always listened to with most respectful attention. The address read to us during our present session afforded us much

delight. We do indeed rejoice with you in the stability and extension of your work among the dense populations of your own land, and in the magnitude and success of your Missionary operations on many shores. The decrease in your membership at home, which you were compelled to report a year ago, was an occasion of sorrow to us also. We hope, however, that at your approaching Conference you will be able to record a large accession. We are encouraged in this hope by the tidings of revivals, in many parts of your work, over which we have rejoiced, during the months which have elapsed since your address was written. The position of Methodism in the old country is a matter of deepest interest to us, and we shall rejoice as Methodists and Britons over your continued progress.

We sympathize with you in the loss your connexion has sustained by the death of such eminent and devoted men as Dixon, Hoole, and Vasey, as mentioned in your address and of others, especially the venerable Thomas Jackson, of whose departure we have otherwise heard. But we rejoice that God ever raises up for your Ministry worthy successors of the illustrious and sainted dead.

A review of our year's work, and its apparent results, is, on the whole, encouraging. Several young men have come to us, since last Conference, from various English circuits; but the supply of Ministerial labour is not yet equal to the growth and demands of our work. Two young men, sons of two of our own aged Ministers, having honorably finished their probation, have been now ordained to the office and work of the Ministry. Seventeen young men have been received at this Conference as candidates for our work, so that we have now upon probation sixty-four young men, a greater number than for several years past. Six brethren, who were compelled to retire from active work last year have been so benefitted by the rest thus secured as to be able

to return to the active work this year. On the other hand, however, five of our brethren become supernumeraries, of whom all but two have long laboured in the Master's service, and probably retire permanently from full circuit work.

It is our mournful duty to report the deaths of three members of our body. One, the Rev. William Temple, after a long life of devoted and useful toil in the service of God and his Church, has gone to his rest; one after nine years' of labor in Newfoundland, where pleasing memories of him will linger long; and one who had just gone out from the Sackville institutions, as we hoped, for many years of honourable warfare. But His will is best, who ruleth over all; and knowing that "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord," we "comfort one another with these words."

The increase of our membership, though not equal to our desires, is still sufficient to make us thankful to God, and encourage us in our work. Blessed revivals have been given, in answer to prayer, on many of our circuits, especially in Newfoundland; and we find ourselves able to report a nett increase of five hundred and sixty-seven members, and two thousand two hundred and thirty-one on trial.

Our funds generally show a corresponding advancement, especially our Home Mission fund, which three years ago had an income of only three thousand dollars, and this year is in receipt of ten thousand seven hundred and three dollars. We will have, for many years to come, abundant demands on this fund, and, realizing that the extension of our work depends largely upon it, we are making earnest efforts to raise it to a state of adequate efficiency. While we are trying to do our duty toward our own land, and are eager to extend our home work, much of which, especially in Newfoundland, is truly missionary in character, we do not forget the claims of the world upon us, and the cry "Come over

and help us," reaching us from distant shores, evokes the sympathies of our people and of ourselves.

Our educational institutions continue to prosper. Though the withdrawal of Government aid has been an occasion of temporary difficulty, it will, we believe, ultimately result in great and permanent good to this department of our work. The Endowment fund, now a matter of necessity, has reached the sum of forty-five thousand dollars. We aim at raising it to the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, and have set apart as agent of this fund the Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., whose long connection with our Educational enterprise, and business tact and energy, well qualify him for this work. In our young country, with its growing population, its increasing wealth and culture, and its brightening future, we feel called to do our best in the great work of liberal and Christian education.

The affairs of our Book-room, under prudent management, continue to improve, and this establishment, which we once feared it would be impossible to maintain, now promises to be, at least, a self-supporting institution, and we trust an instrument of great good.

A plan for the union of our Conference with the Canada Conference, under one general administration, having already been accepted by the latter body, has been approved of by us with great unanimity. From the consummation of this great object, for the inception of which we are largely indebted to the wisdom and faithful labours of your own Dr. Punshon, we hope for great and blessed results. We have appointed as a deputation to represent us in your approaching Conference, and to negotiate with you on all matters likely to be affected by the contemplated union of our Conference with the Canada Conference, our esteemed brethren, Reverends Dr. Stewart, President of the Conference, and Dr. Pickard, our Financial Agent.

We request that you will appoint as our next President the Rev. John McMurray, and as Co-Delegate the Rev. George S. Milligan, A.M.

The interest of our session, which has been one of great harmony, has been increased by the presence of Dr. Rice, the esteemed President of the Canada Conference. In all our meetings, confederal and public, the presence of our gracious Master has been felt. And from this happy re-union we go forth expecting on our circuits "times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord." And now, and ever, for all his care and mercies, and for all our success, we will say, "Blessed be the Lord God, the God of Israel, who only doeth wondrous things. And blessed be his glorious name forever, and let the whole earth be filled with his glory. Amen and Amen."

ADDRESS

*To His Excellency the Honorable Lemuel Allan Wilmot,
D.C.L., Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

We the Ministers of the Wesleyan Conference of E. B. America now assembled in this city, cannot close our session without availing ourselves of the opportunity afforded us for the first time, of tendering to you our most cordial congratulations and the expression of our highest esteem.

Your possession of eminent personal qualifications, and the distinguished services of your long and hon-

ourable public life, led us to regard with unmingled satisfaction your appointment as Lieutenant Governor of this your native province; and we rejoice that your administration, associated as it has been with important measures affecting the welfare and prosperity of all classes and sections of the community, has been attended with acknowledged success.

That you may long be spared for the advancement of public, philanthropic and religious interests, which in any position you may occupy, will we are assured have your enlightened and influential advocacy, and that upon yourself and Mrs. Wilmot the Divine blessing may abundantly rest, is our most earnest wish and prayer.
