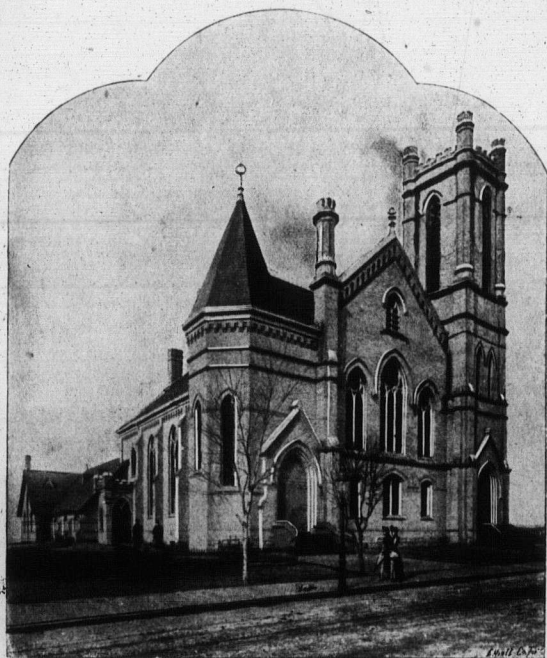

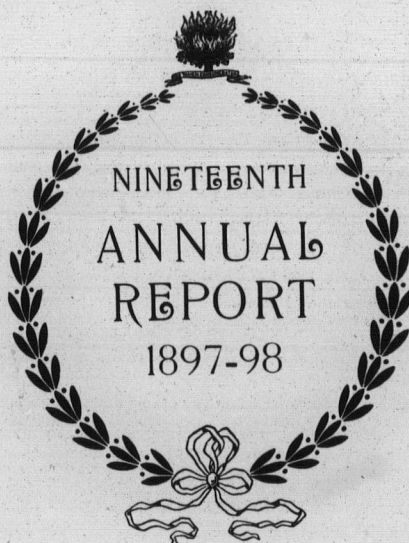

Report of Session

WE desire to recognize with gratitude God's goodness to us in bestowing many blessings. During a time of general depression and discouragement God has given to the great majority of the congregation health and a measure of temporal prosperity. We think the year has been marked by as great blessings as the congregation ever received.

We have experienced many changes but amid them all we have felt God's presence. The work of the congregation has been blessed and many have entered its various departments of labor with renewed zeal. While temporal and spiritual blessings have been apparent, we believe that there have been, in many lives, deep and rich experiences of Divine blessing which have not been revealed to the public gaze.

We feel thankful for the spirit of harmony and fellowship which has characterized the year. It is this which makes easy the toil of all who are actively engaged in church work.

We desire to encourage the congregation in the good work of erecting a new Sabbath School building, of which we have had great need for some time. We hope that the congregation will contribute generously to the Sabbath School Building Fund, in order that a large and well-equipped school may be erected. The contributions of the congregation to the Missionary Schemes of the church have been better than those of the previous year, but there is great room for improvement, and we hope that there will be an increased missionary spirit and more generous missionary offerings in the future.

We have been pleased by the courtesy which the members of the congregation have displayed to strangers coming to the church. We trust that this spirit will continue, that all who visit our church may

feel that they are welcome and that they are worshipping with the followers of Him who said "One is your Master, even Christ; and all ye are brethren."

Without referring in detail to the reports which have been presented by the various organizations of the congregation, the Session expresses its deep gratification at the success which has attended the efforts of all during the year.

As a congregation we mourn the loss of members and adherents who have been translated to the Church Triumphant. The Session tenders its warmest sympathy to the bereaved families. During 1898 death will no doubt visit the congregation and at the close of the year we will again have the sad duty of publishing the names of those called to be forever with the Lord. May the prayer of the psalmist be ours—"So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

Managers' 19th Annual Report

YOUR Board of Managers take the utmost pleasure in presenting to you a record of combined work on the part of the congregation which is creditable to all who contributed to produce it.

The year through which we have passed has been one of practical activity in all branches of the work of the church and of practical unanimity as well, and the results have been most gratifying. The promises of contributions given by members and adherents have been well sustained and the treasury of the church is in consequence in a healthy state. Voluntary offerings have also been beyond the average, but hardly in keeping with the increased numbers who have been in attendance.

Your Board regrets that accommodation cannot at all times be provided for those who seek admission, and at the same time expresses its thanks for the generous willingness of regular pew-holders to make provision for strangers. It is known to your Board that very many of those who would attend both morning and evening services do not do so because of the inadequate space at the command of the ushers, and it is becoming more conspicuously evident from Sabbath to Sabbath that conditions are not likely to improve in this respect unless enlargement of the church can become an early possibility. The recent decision of your Board to observe the provisions of a civic by-law which prohibits the use of any obstruction in the aisles of churches and public buildings limits still more our accommodation in this respect.

During the year steps have been taken to raise subscriptions for the erection of a new school, and while your Board has had no direct part in the work, it is pleased to voice a desire that so important and necessary an object shall have the sanction and material support of our people. The wishes of the congregation expressed at the Annual meeting last year that the primary class room be enlarged and that the choir platform be remodeled have been carried out, and we trust so as to meet the present needs of these important departments of our church work. The expenditure upon the church edifice during the past year has been but slight

owing to doubt as to whether radical changes were likely to be made in the construction of the same, but, unless the congregation are desirous of doing something definite in the year now opening, your Board would ask that they be empowered to ventilate and decorate the church proper as it now stands.

The following members of the Board retire this year, Messrs. Murchison, Jameson, Hooey, Little, McCrimmon, McKenzie, and Perry.

The attention of the congregation is especially directed to the Financial Statement hereto attached; and all who take an interest in the present and future prosperity of our church are respectfully urged to familiarize themselves with the contents of the Annual Report so that they can intelligently support the various departments of effort which may appeal for their immediate sympathies. Our congregation has done good and generous work in the past and is yet able, and willing we trust, to meet every reasonable demand which may be made to further the interests of Parkdale Presbyterian Church and the various dependencies which elicit her sympathy.

WEEKLY OFFERING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

At the beginning of the year there were supposed to be 308 contributors on the books, but it is doubtful if the actual number was more than 275, of these 23 have been removed whose average contributions would amount to \$6.82, weekly.

Thirty-one names averaging \$9.30 per week have been added to the books. During the year there were 296 contributors made up as follows :

There are 45 contributors who have given \$74.15 more than promised, averaging \$1.65 each. Leaving the net arrears about \$252.47, or about 5 per cent. of amount promised.

Twenty-two contributors have given nothing for periods varying from two months to nearly twelve months and no doubt a large portion of the sum of \$280.45 before mentioned may be charged them. It is possible that several of these may have ceased attending, but they have given no notice to that effect.

Five names in the book gave nothing during the year, but were expected to do so as still attending the Church and promising to renew. These are not included in the 296 contributors before mentioned.

There are about 34 pew holders occupying nearly 65 sittings who do not contribute by the envelope system and consequently receive no proper credit for any sums they may give in the open collection. To these pew holders there has been sent cards with the request that they be filled in with name, address, pew No. and amount of intended weekly offering. These cards to be placed on the collection plate when envelopes for weekly offering will be supplied. As the managers are convinced of the necessity of each pew-holder contributing their share towards the maintenance of the Church and its services as liberally as their means will admit, it is hoped all will comply with this request.

The contributions as a whole during the year have been very satisfactory and a large amount of the arrears have been paid in since the 1st of January.

Pew Secretary's Report

DURING the past year pews have been allocated to twenty-nine families, and there are still a number of applicants waiting to secure desirable sittings. All sittings on the ground floor except five have been allocated. There are several vacant sittings in the gallery which would be taken up if there were some improvement in the ventilation. Complaints are made of the excessive heat in the gallery, more especially when the lower part of the church is crowded and in the summer time. If this defect were remedied about thirty families could be accommodated with desirable pews in the gallery and many of the pews now occupied would be made much more comfortable. A special committee has been appointed to consider and report on the question of sittings allocated to parties who are not contributors, with a view of having all those enjoying the accommodation afforded bear a fair share of the church expenses.

Report of Sabbath School Building Committee

THE Sabbath School Building Committee, which consisted of five members selected by the congregation, five from the Session and five from the Board of Managers, met on the following dates:—The 19th of Feb. the 12th of March, the 1st of May and the 22nd of May, and the interest manifested by the large attendance of members showed that the question was a live and important issue. Mr. Pearson who was a member of our Committee generously volunteered to get out plans free of charge, and through the influence of other members of our congregation other well known architects were induced to do the same. These were finally presented to the Committee and their details explained by members of the firms designing them. The cost of erecting a new and modern school in the rear of the church, was found to be within the sum which it was believed our congregation would sanction, and steps were taken by members of the Board and of the Sabbath School to raise by subscription as much as possible of the sum needed. There is now on hand available for the

purpose nearly \$1400.00, besides subscribed sums amounting to over \$2000.00, and the canvass has but fairly commenced. The canvass so far has been very encouraging, several promising to give additional sums at later periods. Your Committee feels that, with the interest and active co-operation of the Sabbath School Association, coupled with the moral and financial support of the congregation as a body, the erection of a new school will be an event of almost immediate realization. As an incentive to increased and energetic effort on the part of the Canvassers your Committee would recommend that the sum of \$1000.00 be placed in the estimates as a congregational donation towards the erection of the school, and that when two-thirds of the amount needed has been subscribed they be empowered to let the contract for the erection of the same.

Superintendent's Report

THE teachers are pleased to be able to report to the congregation a year's record marked by decided progress and increasing interest in the work carried on.

The attendance in every department has been good, with the exception of the three summer months when the school was held in the morning, thus making the average attendance for the year appear much lower, but a decided improvement was manifested in all the classes in the lessons for each Sabbath. The spirit of reverence in the worship and respectful engagement in the exercises of the afternoon have been very marked among the children, and the exercises have been not only interesting but instructive and enjoyed by all connected with the school. The teachers are thankful to the Giver of all mercies that the seed sown has brought forth fruit and that a number of the scholars have become members of the church.

We would like to see many more of the adults of the congregation coming to the afternoon service, and while the children attend the Sabbath School the others will find a warm welcome in the Pastor's Bible Class. There have been a number of changes made in the classes during the year, the school having been thoroughly graded with a view of making the best use of all the available space in the school.

We have at present forty-three classes all supplied with regular teachers, but we feel the great need of a number of volunteer teachers who will come prepared to take the place of those who are unavoidably absent and cannot find a substitute.

There has been an improvement in the home study of the lessons and we earnestly desire that parents will assist the children in the preparation of the lesson.

We wish again to bring before the congregation the need for better accommodation for our school. There has been some progress made towards this end during the past year, and whilst we have almost half of the desired funds in sight, it remains with the congregation to come to our assistance in order that the desired building may be erected.

The primary class-room has been enlarged, but the space taken leaves so much less for the other portion of the school, and the whole room being so poorly ventilated, we feel that we cannot too strongly urge upon the parents and others their liberal assistance to the Sabbath School Extension Fund.

The Lord has visited us during the year and several members of the school have been called to their home above. These sudden calls should inspire us all to greater diligence and faithfulness and to "Work while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work."

Report of Missionary Committee

IT is our duty and pleasure to present to the congregation a record of another year's work in this very important branch of our church organization, and in so doing we would respectfully and earnestly ask every member to give serious consideration as to the position they occupy and what they are doing as members of Christ's kingdom towards spreading that kingdom through all the world.

During the past year we have slightly advanced both in the number and amount of contributions, but it is still a lamentable fact that the very large majority of our membership do not display any practical anxiety for the salvation of the heathen in foreign lands, or for the spread of the gospel in the homeland. The number at present contributing to the mission schemes average about sixty a month, and they have contributed to the regular missionary offerings during the year \$873.68, against \$797.67 in 1896, an increase of \$76.11, or an average of \$1.21 a month per member. In addition to the foregoing, there were two special appeals, one for the Foreign Mission Deficit and the other for the Indian Famine Fund; the former realizing \$103.78, and the latter \$204.17, which, combined with the regular missionary offerings has enabled us to show a total revenue of \$1238.65 against \$1022.36 for the previous year. While this statement shows a net increase of \$216.29, it must be remembered that if we deduct the amount given to the Indian Famine Fund, it leaves us with an increase over 1896 of only \$12.12 for the mission schemes of the church.

We desire to impress on the congregation the urgency of the need for help in all sections of the mission field. In the home fields there is unusual activity in many sections owing to the great mining developments, and many of our young men, who are going from the protection of home and church to seek livelihoods in remote places of this great country, will greatly need the help and counsel of the missionary in the struggle against the manifold evils and temptations that will beset them in these far away fields; and from the heathen lands during these latter years there comes a constant cry for light and liberty from the thralldom of darkness and superstition, and yet, for lack of funds, the Missionary Committee of the Presbyterian Church has not only been

compelled in many cases to turn a deaf ear to the cry, but in some cases has actually had to withdraw from work already inaugurated, much to the sorrow and discouragement of those laboring so zealously for the salvation of the heathen. Surely this ought not to be, when a small regular contribution from the large membership of the Presbyterian Church in Canada would enable the Missionary Committee not only to sustain present operations, but to vastly increase and extend this supreme work, and we as a congregation, if fully realizing our indebtedness to the Master both for spiritual blessings as also for social and temporal privileges such as are only enjoyed where He holds sway, ought to feel it our bounden duty and privilege to give help where help is needed, and to make known the blessed and only source of true light and liberty to those in gross darkness and who for centuries have groaned and are still groaning under the heel of the oppressor, while we have enjoyed all the advantages of the reign of Christ.

We cannot but commend the spirit of liberality that has pervaded the comparative few who contribute to missions in our church, and we express the hope that very many this year may feel constrained to help in this estimable work and become regular contributors to those so much needing our assistance, and thus be practical helpers in the Christ-given work of carrying the gospel to all nations.

We have received communications during the year from several of the friends who left this congregation to labor in various parts of the mission fields, and rejoice to know of effective work being accomplished, though often in the face of much personal discomfort and even danger to life; and in thanking the congregation for help bestowed and interest manifested, they also desire our prayers that God would abundantly own and bless their labors.

For a few months we have been favored with the presence in our midst of Mr. James Lawson, of the China Inland Mission, who, after nearly nine years' service in central China, has been home on furlough, and though coming for rest and recuperation, yet with true missionary spirit has made his presence very helpful to us in many ways, and now that he has gone back to his field of labor, we pray that he and his wife may still continue and even be more abundantly successful in spreading the glad tidings of salvation.

In conclusion, we would again earnestly emphasize the importance of this great and glorious work as of vital issue to every professing member of Christ's kingdom, for no excuse or reasoning can set aside His command to "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," and the reward is the satisfaction of knowing that "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye did it unto me."

During the summer months our meetings were discontinued and during this period a picnic was held in High Park which was much enjoyed by the members.

A missionary quilt was made by the members and when completed was quite attractive, there having been worked upon it, the names of many of the congregation, as well as members of the society.

We have raised for missionary purposes \$41.50, of which \$30.00 have been given to Foreign Missions, the remainder to Home Missions.

We wish to express our thanks to all those who have assisted us in any way, either by addressing our meetings or by assisting with the music or in speaking words of sympathy and encouragement.

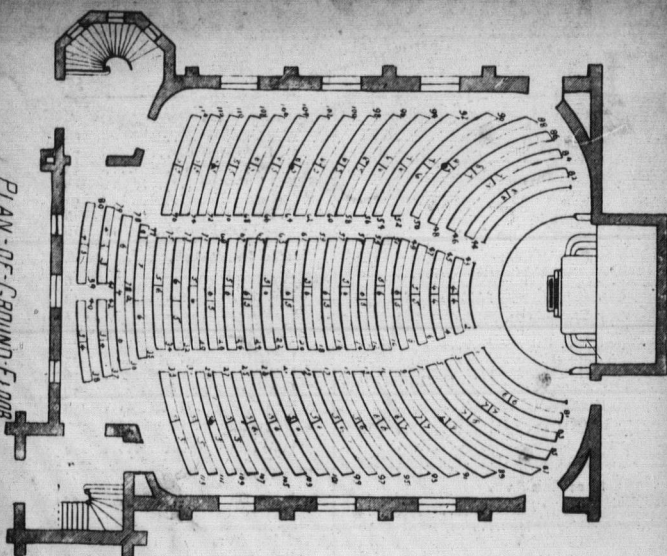
