HARTLAND TWENTY YEARS AGO

The following appears in the Carleton Sentinel's "Twenty Years Ago" column:

Hartland has completed its system of waterworks, with a reservoir capable of holding 125,000 gallons, supplied from a spring that now when most wells and springs are dry, gives 500 gallons an hour; with pipes laid for protection and a supply along all the streets; with 9 hydrants and 600 feet of hose, a cart for which is being built by John Loane, Woodstock. The pressure in the village is 52 lbs. and the water goes well over the high buildings. The residents are fast having the water service introduced into their homes. The entire cost was about \$6,000.

Having the invaluable institution working the people seem determined immediately to have introduced an electric light system.

With the before mentioned evidence of advanced civilization, with the many new buildings, including Taylor's imposing brick block, now nearly completed; with the streets levelled, Hartland will be indeed a model village, not to forget the bridge which sooner or later must come.

We should mention that Hartland has now telephone connection with Woodstock, which is a great convenience.

The following letter was received from "somewhere in France" by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Gillin on Monday:

Dear Grace and Harry: I got your letter to-day and was glad to hear from you. I am well, and I hope this will find you and all the family well at home. You know we dare not say anything much outside about the war but I have got along through it so far, and I hope to pull through it all right. I see lots of shots and shells every day. See Blizzard once in a while. The 2nd Cont. is over here now somewhere but I have not seen any of them yet. I am a spare driver for the boys going on leave to England. We all get seven days leave. Blizzard is just a little ways from me, he is in the same company and we go to town once in a while together.

You can read this letter to mother and father and it will be the same as a letter to them. I hope they have a nice time in New York.

The bunch I am with are Toronto and Western boys, good fellows and jolly, and there are some fellows from your home (Nova Scotia). When you write again this same address will do. There is nothing I need very badly. I ain't a very fussy fellow only about my hair.

POTATO PRODUCTS CO.

In less than three weeks the Potato Products Co., Ltd., will start its new industry in Woodstock for the manufacture of dried potatoes, potato flour and starch. At first the company will employ 70 hands, day and night shifts, for eight months in the year, and the number of employees will be increased later. The entire output for the first year has been sold. The large foundry building formerly conducted by A. Dunbar & Son, but who now have their plant in another building, has been purchased from the Bank of Montreal, and the work of remodelling is now going on. The enterprise is promoted largely by Hatfield & Scott and is likely to develop into a big business. In another season it is expected that factories for reducing potatoes into starch will be established here and at other points along the line.

Leslie Moreland Morse

Leslie Moreland Morse the nine year old son of Edward and Lettie Fowler Morse died in Presque Isle hospital Saturday morning, Sept. 18, 1915, from concussion of the brain, caused by a sudden blow, it is thought, dealt by some pupil shortly after school Friday night.

The lad was a remarkably bright child and his untimely death has stirred the authorities into a thorough investigation of the matter as this is the second violent death of a child at the hands of other children in Presque Isle within a year.

The funeral was held from his home on Chapman Street Monday, Rev. Mr. Tripp in attendance. Grade IV was marched by their teacher and stood in two ranks during the service, afterwards they marched by the remains of their little comrade, a silent warning against rash deeds of childhood.

The floral tributes were many and beautiful, including a wreath from the Aunts and Uncles, Sprays from St. John's church and Sunday school, St. Agnes Guild, Blacksmith's Union, Young ladies of Western Union and N. B. Telephone, School Teachers of Presque Isle and many others.

Interment was made at Williamstown cemetery, Carleton county, in J. R. Fowler's lot the funeral going by auto.

The grief stricken parents have the deepest sympathy of all.

Albion R. Foster and Mrs. Foster who were so seriously injured when their auto went over the bank into the Big Shikto-hawk stream at Bristol on Friday, are well on the way to recovery, although both are still in bed at the residence of their sister, Mrs. Reed Chase, Maple street.

Neither party sustained more serious injuries than terrible bruises and abrasions, and severe nervous shock, all rumors to the contrary notwithstanding. While both have been suffering extremely at no time was their condition alarmingly serious.

That the car turned clear over and landed in the stream right side up with its four occupants still in it is evidence of a performance no one would care to repeat. Guy Welch of Bristol was among the first to the rescue and the injured party was taken to his home. Dr. Somerville rendered first aid until the arrival of Dr. Curtis, the family physician. Brought to Hartland on the express the injured people were taken to Mrs. Chase's home, where Dr. Rankine assisted Dr. Curtis in minute examination. The two have since been under the immediate care of Miss Stevens and Mrs. Barter, trained nurses. It is expected Mr. Foster will be on his feet in a few days while it is feared Mrs. Foster will require a longer time to recover, her injuries being more serious.

The other members of the party, Mrs. Geo. Colwell and daughter Della, are quite recovered.

The auto was a sorry looking vehicle but under the skilful hands of R. S. Semple of East Florenceville it is being repaired to cavort the roads some more.
