Agriculture.
Draining Land.
To the Editor of the Maritime Farmer:
DEAR SIR,—As so much has been written upon this subject, I do not hope to add much that is new, but a few practical words from a farmer's experience are generally well received by the readers of the agricultural department of the FARMER. I will therefore introduce my subject by saying that many farmers have fields which need draining, and they would be much benefited by value thereby, but as underdraining is generally looked upon as an expensive work such fields are too often neglected.

Market Value of Beef.
The market value of beef is not what the butcher wants to show off with at Christmas—says Prof. Brown and Guelph, and for which as a business proposition he gives more than anything else, but it is what suits the average consumer, who requires the most economical roast or boil at any time. When the farmer feeds and the butcher cuts up just that stamp of animal from which both the carcass and the unutilized hungry can be served, it may be concluded that the standard has been produced. In order to bring this to the test, four kinds of fat steers, (grades,)—Shorthorn, Hereford, Ayrshire, and Devon—were cut up on the Experimental Farm. The standard of what is called first class beef, without regard to breed is said to be clear, cherry-red color; juiciness; fine smooth grain to the touch; fat of little bone anywhere; and a clear straw color; suit of brighter shade than the fat, with little fibrous crumpling easily; loins and ribs to be covered with fat more or less in thickness; the sirloin when cut to be about equal thickness at both ends; little bone anywhere; flesh and fat well distributed everywhere. These points constitute merit by appearance; then there is merit by actual cooking—boiling and roasting—and eating. The standard of value then consists of 13 points, and the value of the whole points make up a total of 100.

immediate advantages, he may disqualify the earth for a human abode. This matter has been strangely overlooked by legislators. How few persons suspect that in less than a century the greatest affliction this country is doomed may be caused by the destruction of its forests. Springs, once for all the year, will be dry every summer and autumn; small rivers will desert their channels; once profitable mill privileges will cease to be of any value; every shower will produce inundations; every summer will be subject to pernicious droughts. The question is very difficult to answer, how large a proportion of the territory of any country may be kept in forest consistently with the greatest amount of agricultural prosperity. But he who believes that every acre of waste land is so much lost to the nation, and who is not content upon national wealth must have very imperfect views of nature's economy. Even if our continent were circumscribed within bounds as narrow as those of Great Britain's island, we could not be so content to a certain extent, though they might check the increase of our population. The superfluous lands of the British nobility have saved their country from the general depopulation which has been foreseen when their estates were originally divided. The very selfishness of princes and lords has prevented the extirpation of European forests. The general practice of the pioneers of civilization on this continent was to cut down the wood chiefly from the uplands and the lower slopes of the mountains. They cleared these tracts which were most valuable for immediate use and cultivation. Necessity led them to pursue the very course required by the laws of nature. The first clearings were made chiefly for purposes of agriculture, and as every farm was surrounded by a rampart of woods it was sheltered from the winds of the winter, and open to the sun. But when men began to fell the woods to supply the demands of towns and cities for fuel and lumber, these clearings were made in the summer, and by leveling the surrounding forest and opening the country to the wind from every quarter. But the clearing has rendered the climate unstable, has not been the cause of invasions or the diminution of streams. This evil has been produced by clearing the woods for other good things; Devon, Somerset, Ayrshire, and the Shorthorn were the next to be liberal with parting with these. On the point of eating with the Hereford score 20, Ayrshire 19, Devon 18, and Shorthorn 17. According to the tests of values by points, both by merit of appearance and cooking, the Hereford score 91, Shorthorn 90, Devon 76, Ayrshire 75. The conclusion is that the flesh of the Hereford grade was of greatest market value.

ing the first row straight the others will be also straight and of uniform distance apart. The machine will carry a half peck of seed at once; it makes the furrow, drops, covers, and rolls the ground firm over the corn, and the depth can be regulated by the operator, from half inch to four inches if desired. The Emery planter will not drop the corn wholly in hills, but will scatter it somewhat like drill sowing. A little practice dropping on the surface will show just how thick the kernels will be. The quantity of seed can be regulated very nicely by the use of adjustable apparatus. If the corn is planted two inches below the level of the surface, the smoothing harrow may be used every week till the land is entirely free from weeds. Now if the above harrow be followed six inches high, then we use the cultivator or horse hoe till the tassels appear. There are several excellent horse hoes and one's choice should depend chiefly upon the character of the land he has to work.
