Madrid, March 9.—This city was horrified last night when it became known that Eduardo Dato, premier and minister of marine, had been assassinated while returning to his home from a late session of the Spanish Senate.

Immediately after the news was received in official quarters, arrangements were made to carry on the Government until a new premier could be appointed by King Alfonso. The Count De Bugallal, minister of interior, will act as temporary premier.

Murder Well Planned.

Premier Dato left the Senate chamber at 8:30 o'clock and entered his car, which was waiting for him. The machine was driven through Calle Arenal to Puerta Delsoi, and thence through Calle De Alca La. A motorcycle with a sidecar, carrying two men, had followed the premier's motor unnoticed, there being many other similar machines on the streets. When the premier's car had reached Plaza Independencia, near Senor Dato's home, the motorcycle increased its speed and approached the side of the premier's automobile. At that point the streets are quite dark, owing to the fact that a large park borders on the right side of the Plaza.

When the motorcycle had drawn up even with the automobile, the two men in the side car and the driver of the machine opened fire upon the premier, 21 shots being discharged. The whole tragedy was enacted in a few moments, and as the last shot rang out the motorcycle swung into a side street and vanished.

ADMITS GERMANY AIDED CAUSE OF IRISH REBELS

Boston, March 9.—Germany's participation in the Irish revolution, which started at Dublin on Easter Sunday, 1916, was admitted by John Devoy, a New York Sinn Feiner, in an address delivered here last night. He said that this was brought about by Sinn Fein sympathizers in the United States, who made a deal with the Germans for a shipload of arms to be delivered in Ireland

Devoy said the "Irish republican brotherhood" sent word to sympathizers in the United States of the plans for the Easter Sunday attack upon the British forces in the previous January, and requested that the Clan-Gael in the United States furnish a shipload of arms to be delivered in Limerick as soon as possible. "It was not possible to get ny such quantity of arms in the United States without the knowledge of the United States Government," Devoy said. Therefore, he added, the aid of Germany in securing these arms was enlisted. He declared no other help had been re ceived by the revolutionaries from German sources.

Terrific Battle Staged in the Streets of City.

Reds Suffer Heavy Losses in Attack Upon Kronstadt.

CONFLICTING REPORTS

Copenhagen, March 9.-News of the Russian situation today was conflicting with the latest Helsingfors Government forces had recaptured the fortresses of Krannoya, Gorko and Systerbak this morning, and were training the big guns of these fortresses upon Kronstadt, where fortresses upon Kronstadt, where fires were observed. An infantry assault by the Soviet troops upon Kronstadt is reported to have been repulsed with enormous loss to the attacking forces.

These reports wer preceded by claims made in Helsingfors dispatches that Petrograd was in the hands of the revolutionaries. According to a Reval special, however, the Soviet troops recaptured the southeastern suburbs of Petrograd. Thousands of fugitives from Petrograd are clamoring for entry into Finland, the Finnish advices state.

Copenhagen, March 9.—Petrograd is reported to be in the hands of revolutionary forces which for several days have been fighting against Russian Bolshevik troops near that city, says a special dispatch from Helsingfors received here this morning. The revolutionary forces were victorious, the dispatch declares, after a terrific bombardment of Petrograd from Kronstadt, Krasnoya, Glorko and Systerbak, which was followed by machine gun battles in the streets of the city.

SEES RUIN IN RAILWAY COSTS

McAdoo Award Has Done Serious Harm, Declares Hon. Dr. Reid.

OTTAWA, March 5 .- (By Canadian Press.)-The high cost of railway operations will ruin the railway development in Canada in the immediate future,

in Canada in the immediate future, Hon. Dr. J. D. Reid, minister of rall-ways, told the House of Commons late tonight. The McAdoo award, he said, had done Canadian railways a great deal of harm, and railways a great deal of harm, and railway workers themselves should take the problem into consideration.

The increased estimates for railways, tabled today, said Dr. Reid, should not be taken as meaning that there be necessarily a big deficit in the operation of national railways, this year. The officials of the various roads that go to make up the Canadian National Railways, he said, had estimated that there will be a loss of some \$50,000,000 this year in one way and another. In addition to this, there will be large amounts required for extension, and also certain refunds on behalf of Grand Trunk stock, which the Government will have to take care of. The United States railways are losing even larger amounts in proportion, said the minister.
