Ministers Refuse to Answer Some Important Questions,

But Are Not Allowed to Evade the Reonsibility of Replying.

OTTAWA, May 14.—Mr. Costigan, replying to Mr. Gauthier, said it was the intention of the Government to continue the operation of the law preventing cultivators from manufacturing into cut tobacco or cigars tobacco required for their personal

or cigars tobacco required for their personal use.

Mr. Costigan replied again to Mr. Gauthier that merchants bear only a portion of the costs of inspecting weights and measures, and that it is not the intention of the Government to relieve them from the payment of fees and thus throw the entire cost upon the public.

For Mr. Barron, Mr. Burdett asked whether the Trent Valley Canal Commission had reported in favor of the completion of the scheme; if so, does the Government intend to ask Parliament this session for a grant for that scheme?

In the absence of the First Minister Sir Hector Langevin replied: "The commission has reported. I am not in a position to state the contents of the report, which will speak for itself. With regard to the second question the Government has come to no decision."

Mr. Burdett was not satisfied with this shuffling reply. He told Sir Hector no answer had been given whether the report was favorable, and Sir Hector's laconic reply was, "I have given the reply of the Government."

The Opposition resented this discourtesy, and a moment later, when the Minister of Finance declined to answer a question by Mr. Davies, a protest was made which brought the Ministers to their senses.

Mr. Davies' question was: "How many trips were male by the steamers subsidized to carry on the steam service between the Maritime Provinces and the West India ports during the year 1890; what were the dates of such trips; what amounts were paid for each trip; what person or company is carrying out that service for the present year; has any contract been entered into for such service this year and what rates are being paid therefor and to whom?"

The Opposition was in no humor to receive Mr. Foster's reply that Mr. Davies had better let the question go on the paper as a notice of motion.
