CYCLONE IN BRANTFORD.

BRANTFORD, Aug. 10. — About 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon the city was enveloped in a severe cyclone. Three black clouds drove up from the west and darkened down over the city. The People Should Keep Accounts with the N. P.

[Monireal Heraid.]

We read that Robinson Crusoe, on his desolate island, kept a regular account with Providence, setting on one side of his ledger all the blessings he enjoyed and on the other all disadvantages he labored under. On casting up his accounts he found that the blessings greatly preponderated, so he ceased his repinings, and for the future resolved to lead a more religious life and give daily thanks for all things.

If our farmers, in their dealings with the National Policy, would only follow the example of Daniel Defoe's hero and keep a strict account of the gains and losses accruing to them through the famous measure, they would soon arrive at some practical resolution. We will try and give them a sample page for such a book of accounts.

First, what the N. P. does for them.

It increases the price of everything he uses, from the swaddling clothes in which he is laid, to the shroud and the cfflin in which he is carried away to his final resting place.

As a schoolboy or student it stands in the way of his education by laying a heavy tax upon the necessary books.

As a young man its exactions of 30 to 50 per cent. prevent him from obtaining such clothes and personal ornaments as he would desire to recommend him to the girl of his shoice. The buggy in which he drives her out is taxed from 15 to 35 per cent., and it even lays its mean hands on the candies that are enjoyed during the ride.

As a householder, its tax of 35 per cent., upon builders' hardware increases the cost of his dwelling. His furniture is loaded with another 35 per cent. His kitchen utensils, his table cutlery, his linen, pictures, ornaments; in fact there is nothing so small or insignificant as to escape its house on the long winter nights is doubled.

The coal oil with which he lights up his house on the long winter nights is doubled in price by the N. P., and even the light of the sun is taxed by means of an imposition upon window glass.

For his work his plows, harrows, harvesters, seeders, churns, axes, forks, spades, harness, binding twine, wire fencing and everything he uses costs from 20 to 50 per cent. more on account of the N. P. He cannot even escape on Sunday. His Bible, prayer book and hymn book are all taxed, and if his age calls for the use of spectacles, there is 50 per cent upon them. The stove and the coal to burn in it and the comfortable rug or carpet under his feet all pay their share.

Every tick of the clock tells a tale of 35 per cent. The watch in his pocket, his daughter's jewelry, and all the Sunday finery, all tell the same story.

This is only a simple outline of the entries to the wrong side of the account with the N. P., which every practical man may multiply indefinitely for himself.

He may try to find for himself also where the benefits come in, but he will search in vain. We can only tell him what it does not do, that was promised for it.



Able Speech in the British Metropolis

Sound Advice to the People of Ireland

London, Aug. 11.—Hon. Edward Blake addressed a meeting of the Home Rule Union of London last night. Viewed in Union of London last night. Viewed in the light of a curious tendency to equality in popular opinion he said the Liberal majority was a substantial one. Conservative advocates of unity had analyzed and cut the majority into sections, declaring that the majority had emanated from Ireland and therefore did not count. Would they have said that if the circumstances had been reversed and Ireland had declared against home rule? The Liberals must be prepared for exaggerated accounts of Irish outrages in the Tory papers. That was part of their game.

If the Protestants in the various parts of Ireland were to combine—he hoped that they would not—they could get what terms they liked from either side of the divided majority. He recommended to them an altogether different policy, namely to banish forever from the arena all religious questions and to join hands with the Catholics and to discuss intelligible differences of opinion instead of the character of their creeds or the color of their hair. Doubtless there would be blunders and friction in inaugurating the new regime in Ireland—bearings would get heated, pipes burst and steam escape, but that would be soon overcome.

He did not idealize democracy. He believed it was being put to the severest test as to whether it would be able to use its new power with wisdom, self-restraint and discernment; but he hoped it would be equal to the task. Let them advance, and soon the dawn now visible would blaze into the perfect sunshine of the blessed day of reconciliation for joyful and regenerated Ireland, no longer the weakness, despair and shame, but the strength, the pride and the glory of the United Kingdom.

A MOTHER'S CURSE!

Chance for the Superstition to Speculate.

Facts in Connection with Judge Nor mile's Suicide—Reminiscence of the Preller Murder.

New York, Aug. 11.—The suicide of Judge James C. Normile, of the St. Louis Criminal Court, will afford the superstitious a chance to speculate. He was one of three whom a desparing and heartbroken mother is said to have called down a curse upon, and he is the second of the trio to die by his own hand. Judge Normile was prosecuting attorney at the trial of Walter H. Lennox-Maxwell, alias Brooks, who was convicted and executed for the murder of his friend and benefactor, Arthur C. Preller, at the Southern Hotel, St. Louis. The case was known as the trunk mystery, and was noted throughout the world.

The parents of the murderer came from England, where Brooks, sen., is a school-master, and left no stone naturated to obtain his acquittal, but to no purpose. After the execution it was reported that Mrs. Brooks called down a curse upon the head of the trial judge, the prosecutor, and lastly, Gov. Morehouse, who refused to commute the sentence.

It is interesting now to recall the fact that Judge Van Wagoner failed of a relection, that Gov. Morehouse, in a fit of delirium, committed suicide less than a year ago, and now the presecutor in the case has died by his own band.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 11.—Before taking the poison, Judge Normile made his will and had two signatures to ig. In his will he directed that his body he cremated and his ashes thrown in the Mississippi River. He had been judge of the Criminal Court since 1876, and his present term would not have expired until 1894. He was a fine lawyer, a graceful apeaker and a learned man. He was 48 years old and had never married.

"For more than a year the atrocious libelers of the Post-Dispatch have had me on the rack. They have almost unfitted me from performing my judicial duties, and made life little less than a protracted torture. For the past week I have slept little. I concluded to go to the office and kill Florence White. But I have just this morning abandoned this purpose, as I shrink from taking human life, especially while being judge. I cannot fight the paper in the courts. The law is slow, and it would be more than a year probably before I could get the damage case brought to trial I crave rest, which, alas! I must seek in the grave."


