MUNICH, July 16 .- The cyclone which swept Upper Bavaria on Saturday did great damage. Scores of houses and barns were wrecked, domestic animals killed and crops injured. The village of Forstinning was almost obliterated, several inhabitants were killed and scores wounded. The church tower at Fostern fell in on a crowd seeking shelter, injuring a dozen persons. Reports of accidents and heavy losses are still coming from the remote northern districts.

Pointing for the Pole.

CERISTIANIA, July 16 .- The yacht Saide has brought to Tromsoe a dispatch dated at Danes Island, on the northwest coast of polar expedition into those waters. The the passage of the 80th parallel was never reached previously so early in the year. We met little ice. All are well."

The party sailed on May 10 for the Seven Islands, and had not returned when the Saide started for Tromsoe. After a search the Saide found their vessel, the Ragn vald Jarl, fixed in the ice in latitude 80° 12' N. The ice formation, however, seemed to be enly temporary.

Elffel Out-Eiffeled.

PARIS, July 16 .- The French Government has ordered that the plans for the exposition of 1900 shall provide for an entirely new group of buildings with the exception of the Trocadero, which will be used for the same purposes as in 1889, and the Eiffel tower, which will be once more an integral part of the show. But Eiffel has been surpassed in sky-climbing. The Watkin tower at Wembley Park, fifteen minutes from London, is being pushed rapidly. Its height will be as near 1,200 feet as Eiffel was near 1,000, for it lacked half that number, although generally said to be 1,000 feet high. It will require another year to finish the Watkin tower. It cannot be fairly said that this is imitation, for an Englishman named Trevellick proposed a 1-000-foot tower in the last century, and his plans were approved by competent engineers. SHOT AND SHELL !

Sickening Carnage in the Streets of Chicago

Result from the Explosion of an Artillery Caisson-Four Men Killed, Two Mortally Wounded and Many Hurt.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 16.—Exploding shot and shell wrought sickening carnage among soldiers, civilians and horses this afternoon on Grand Boulevard, one of Chicago's fine driveways. Four United States soldiers were injured by projectiles so that they died instantly. Two of the wounded soldiers are not expected to live. Eight more were burned and struck with missiles and half a dozen more civilians were in-

Many citizens who followed the military column were thrown to the ground and more or less bruised. At least \$25,000 worth of damage was done to the property of the residents on both sides of Grand Boulevard for half a block north of Oak-wood Boulevard. Houses in adjoining

streets were also damaged. The ill-fated body of troops was proceeding south from the lake front camp along Grand Boulevard at a trot. The soldiers having no riot to quell or railroad property to guard were out for drill and exercise. Among other corps were the ill-starred section of Battery "F," Second Artillery, from Fort Riley, Lieut. Gayle and 40 men, bearing two Hotchkiss field pieces and four caissons filled with shrapnell, common shell

and bags of powder. When within 160 feet of Oakwood boulevard there was a roar like a mighty burst of thunder, followed in an instant by a succession of sharp explosions. The artillerymen received the brunt of the explosion, being directly in rear of the caisson. Donovan and Doyle were sitting on the caisson which exploded. Donovan was blown through the air over trees 50 feet high a distance of 500 feet across a vacant lot. His companion, Doyle, was hurled 300

feet away. All the eight artillery horses are dead.

BLOWN TO BITS!

A Terrible Explosion in a Pennsylvania Mine.

From Nine to Eleven Men Torn to Shreds-An Aw ul Sight.

HAZELTON, Pa., July 17 .- A most horrible accident took place at No. 8 Strickland mine this morning. Two hundred sticks of dynamite exploded. A number of men were going to their daily work. All of the unfortunates were shattered and torn to fragments. The exact number killed is not positively known at this writing, but it is placed between 8 and 11.

The true cause of the explosion will never be known, as none of the men are living. It occurred at 7 o'clock. The men were descending the slope at the time and distributing themselves in the various chambers and gangways where they were employed at the bottom of the slope. Although the explosion took place twenty yards below the surface the shock was felt over an area of surface extending three for employment and ask the company to miles south. Pushing forward towards the bottom they came upon a scene which beffles description-huge timbers were twisted and torn and scattered about promiscuously, rocks and debris were everywhere and over all was strewn the flesh, legs and arms of the unfortunate victims, and from the jagged sides hung two shattered bodies. Not one of the several bodies was left sufficiently intact to permit of identity.

Men and women gathered about the dark mouth in hundreds. Rescue parties were formed at once. Miners would be lowered into the pitand on the return of the cage a number of men and boys would be brought to the surface who had escaped.

The Council Draws Up a Proposal of Its Own

Submits it for President Everett's Consideration.

No Percentage is Asked-The Company to Supply All Material.

Cheap Fares-An Option of a Road to Springbank-Inspector Isaacs and Assistant Engineer Irenside Retained-No Road Roller This Year-New Gas Lamps to be Tried on City Streets.

The electric street railway matter took on a new phase at last night's meeting of the aldermen. This time the city draws up a proposal and submits it to the street railway company for their acceptance or rejection. The aldermen have clearly abandoned all idea of getting a percentage, just at present anyhow, as nothing is said about it. They ask that the company supply labor and material for paving and repairs, and extensions; that eight tickets be given for 25 cents from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. with transfers, and then a 5-cent fare for the balance of the day. The city names its own extensions and only of Indian Muslin, very fine, worth provides the company with an option of running a road to Springbank, providing they became responsible for any electrolytic action on gas or water mains. The proposition drawn up differs from the last one received from the company in the supplying of materials for paying and in some of the extensions. It also extends the hour of reduced fares from 6 p.m in the last offer to 9 p.m. The whole offer is the result of the recent private deliberations of the council and passed through without discussion. It is thought that it will receive favorable consideration from the street railway company. All the members were present.

COMMITTEE REPORTS. No. 3 committee submitted its report re the gas lighting of the city streets, and recommended that no action be taken at present until the gas company erect a

number of lamps for inspection. The offer provides for the erection of a very artistic post and glass globe, and where the gas mains do not reach a 20candle power coal oil touch light. Ald, Parnell said that it would do no

THE COST OF NATIONAL DEG-RADATION.

The Montreal Witness suggests that Partiament should inquire into the contract system, so as to ascertain just how much each contractor for Dominion Government work is expected to pay to the election funds of the men now in power.

If anyone proposes such a motion it will be voted down by the men who refused to investigate the charges made against Sir Adolphe Caron, who was one of the handlers of the gigantic Quebec corruption fund. Perhaps an easier way of getting at the truth would be to ask for the name of tho contractor who has done business with the Government in the last twelve years who has not been much overpaid in order that he, in turn, might contribute to the Conservative election fund. Has there been one contract honestly awarded, honestly carried out in that time? Has there been one contractor who has not been enabled to collect more than his agreement called for, in order that he might be able to bleed for the benefit of the political leaders in power.

The president handed \$25,000 to Sir Adolphe Caron, the Postmaster General, McGreevy, the treasurer of the Conservative election fund. The money thus obtained was spent to defeat legitimate tariff reform in this country. And when a motion was made that the whole expenditure should be investigated, and the proper relation of contractors to the Government, and the Government to the people declided on, Sir John Thompson called upon his majority to vote down all inquiry. Sir Adolphe Caron, it is understood, threatened to go into rebellion unless this was done.

Just as these unsavory revelations were being made came the announcement that, through handing over the management of the Curran bridge at Montreal to Mr. St. Louis, a notorious political boss, the country had been filched out of several hundred thousand dollars. The pay rolls were stuffed, false statements of material in the Forest City, and with life generally purchased were prepared, the grossest of in that progressive place.-[Chatham jobbery prevailed, and the Government at Ottawa directly and indirectly profited by the iniquity.

Let it be remembered that this wholesale thieving from the people of Canada was resolved on after the McGreevy-Langevin exposure, and when the Ministers at Ottawa knew full well the danger to public interests from laxity of management and from the condoning of wrongdoing. The contractors seemed to have evened up matters by liberal subscriptions to aid in winning elections then pending. But how many thousands they paid out, and how much of the money stuck to the fing ers of the men who handled the boodle, will never be known, as the moment an investigation was resolved on the contractor burned his books, and thus destroyed all trace of the disposal of the ill-gotten gains.

As usual, an attempt is being made to shoulder the blame of the evil-doing on wicked overseers. The politicians who profited by the rascalities, and who ought to have so managed the work that the people would have received honest value for their money, are inclined to wash their hands clean of the whole affair. Just as, after conniving with McGreevy and Connolly, and accepting many thousands of dollars of their money to help to retain power, they offered these men up as a sacrifice to palliate wrong-doing in high places, so they now seem inclined to shirk responsibility for the robbery of the public in the latest scandalous job. The Montreal Star, which has generally supported the Government. calls for the punishment of some one and asks, "Do the Ministers imagine that Cansuch means it is time for decent men to wash their hands of the party." 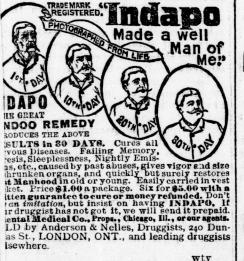



The events were all pretty well contested.

How Royal Birth : Are Witnessed [From the New York Home Journal.] The attendance of Mr. Asquith, the Eng-

ish Home Secretary, at the birth of the little Duke of Kent gives rise to the story of the origin of the custom. It arose out of the dispute that followed the birth of the eldest son of King James II. of England. This led to the enacting of the law which requires one of the secretaries of state to be present whenever there is a birth in the reigning family of Great Britain. When the eldest son of King James was born the king's enemies maintained that his heir was not the offspring of the queen, but that an infant had been procured elsewhere for the purpose. Since then a Cabinet minister has been present in the room when a royal birth has taken place, and the custom has been adopted by all the continental courts.

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


