

Alarming Klondike Situation. The official report of Superintendent Constantine, commander of the Mounted Police at Dawson, dated Jan. 18, is not only interesting, but serious. It must impress the country with the immediate need of speedier communicathe Klondike. For over

two years, writes the superintendent. the authorities at Dawson have been unable to obtain sufficient food for full rations. This year the situation is worse than last. The force had, at the time of writing, barely enough supplies to last until June 1 at short rations. the steamship service having been inadequate. The outlook for the coming summer was alarming, as no quantity of food could arrive until nearly the end of July. Probably it would not reach Dawson then, as owing to the scarcity at Circle City, and intervening mining camps, the steamers would he held up there and unloaded. "This

means that we cannot reasonably hope for much relief from the outside until the latter part of August," says the writer. Last fall it looked as if half the police would have to be sent out, because of short supplies, but fortunately a cargo arrived, and the inspector purchased 6,812 pounds of beef at \$1 to \$1 50 per pound.

This is not the only alarming feature of the report. The inspector says that the population at Dawson is chiefly American, and many are not disposed to view with favor the restrictions placed on them by the ordinary laws of Canada. Some have been heard to say that it was high time the British flag was hauled down and the Stars and Stripes hoisted instead. They did not consider it a privilege to hold mining property in this country, but construed it into a right that they would like to hold to the utmost.

With the influx of thousands of aliens into the Klondike this spring, the outlook is threatening, and an attempt may be made to subvert British and all-Canadian route.

It is to be hoped the knights of Tacoma and Seattle in the Canadian Senate will read the report.



According to some authorities the Pharaohs of Egypt, the Incas of Peru, Emperors of Mexico, and the Kings of Assyria, Babylon and Persia were regarded as gods while still alive. So I was Attila by his Huns, though probably this reverence diminished after his crushing defeat at the battle of Chalons. All the Emperors of Rome, be ginning from Augustus Caesar and ending when Constantine embraced Christianity, were worshiped in their own lifetime, temples and statues to each being erected and priests appointed to

serve them. And really, when one considers how ignorant the majority of men must be, owing to the force of circumstances, it certainly seems much more reasonable for them to worship a living power incarnate in so tremendous a being, as, say, Trajan was, whose works they saw and whose majesty they knew, than to fall down before images to whose power only legend attested. The reasonableness of this view is shown by the fact that when Marcus Aurelius, the wisest and best of all the Roman Emperors, tried to suppress the worship of

himself, he had even less success than Gen. Nicholson. Nearly all primitive tribes look on their kings as living gods, and many go to the extreme of putting them to death if great national misfortunes come too thickly; even two or three years of drought would be enough with some savage tribes. There is the wellauthenticated case of the island called Savage Island, in the South Pacific, where the kingly office has lapsed completely, because none could be found rash enough to assume the dangerous



The Tilsonburg Catastrophe.

Dalton, deserves great credit for the Signal House at Port Burwell Burned-How the Collision Happened.

> Tilsonburg. April 19.-In connection with the rear end collision at the Air Line station, Tilsonburg, about 4 a.m. yesterday, it appears that it occurred where the Port Burwell Railway cross the Air Line. The Wabash train from the east was standing in the yard taking water and the danger signals all set, the train being some five or six lengths inside of the danger signals. The other Wabash train, driven by Engineer Leonard Jones, of St. Thomas, collided with the standing train, three or four cars of which were badly wrecked. The engine and tender and four or five cars of the colliding train were thrown off the track and wrecked. Engineer Jones, who stuck to his post, was badly mangled. Fireman Logan escaped by jumping. No one else on board was injured. The signal house on the Port Bur-

well was burned to the ground, with several of the cars. The train taking water was in charge of Conductor Geo. Jeffries, of Windsor; Engineer Geo. Smith, of St. Thomas. Engineer Jones' train was in charge of Conductor Walter Freeman. Fireman Logan, who escaped with his life by jumping, was considerably bruised. Engineer Jones was caught between the cab and tender of his engine and crushed to death. The semaphore was against Engineer Jones' train, and Fireman Logan, seeing the danger, called upon him to jump, but he did not do so, believing he had his train under control and could stop it in time to avoid an acci-

The body of deceased was taken from the wreck just in time to prevent it from being consumed, the woodwork of the tender being burned The deceased was one of the oldest G. T. R. engineers in St. Thomas, being employed on the Air Line and residing in St. Thomas for the past 24 or 25 years. He was highly respected by his fellow-employes and everyone who knew him. Deceased, who was in his 56th year was a member of the B. of L. E. and G. T. R. Provident Association and of the I. O. O. F. He was insured in these societies, besides being insured in the Waterloo Mutual. He had accumulated considerable
