THE BRITISH ISLES TIED UP BY STORM.

London, Dec. 27. - The blizzard which commenced Christmas night continued throughout Great Britain. The country districts in most of the northern parts of the country are snowbound, trains are blocked, the roads are impassable, and isolated villages are temporarily cut off from communication with the neighboring towns. A number of deaths have been reported of pedestrians who were overtaken by snowstorms in the bleak Scottish hills. Telegraphic communication with the north of England and Scotland is generally interrupted, and steamer traffic across the channel and Irish Sea is greatly impeded. In some instances mail steamers had to suspend their trips owing to the fierceness of the gale and heavy fall of snow.

NEAR WHITBY

Camp Is Now Located in Town— Three Railways May Soon Pass Through.

Whitby, Dec. 27. - The Canadian Pacific Railway surveying party arrived from Bowmanville and went into camp here Saturday afternoon. Mr D. Hillman, C. E., is in charge. There are about 20 in the camp. They occupy five large tents, comfortably warmed by bottomless wood-burning stoves that sit on the ground, and equipped with individual camp beds and woolen blankets galore. The camp is pitched on a vacant lot of the Annes estate, adjoining Mr. John Thomson's residence, Dundas street west, where a 40-foot cedar hedge protects it from the northeast winds. Much difficulty was experienced in

securing a satisfactory route between Bowmanville and Oshawa, but finally it was run south of the Kingston road between that and the old Grand Trunk line, which, it will be recalled, was abandoned for a more southerly one when that railway was double-tracked a few years ago. This projected route will locate the station in Oshawa between the center of the town and the Grand Trunk. Coming on towards Whitby a splendid route is available about midway between the Kingston road and the Baseline road. It is yet to be determined how the line will pass through this town, whether to the north or south of the center. Mr. Wellwood, C. E., and party, at Scarboro Junction, are working east to meet Mr. Hillman. There is the greatest satisfaction generally amongst citizens at the prospect of the Canadian Pacific's coming, and the hope that the Canadian Northern, which is projected to run four miles north, may change its plans, so as to afford Whitby the advantage of having all three of the great transcontinental railway systems.
