



New York, Jan. 7 .- The registration committee of the Jockey Club has completed figures which show that the annual cost of race horses in America is practically \$10,000,000. The figures will be printed in a report of the national bureau of animal industry, a branch of the department of agriculture. The report shows that last year \$8,-212,500 was spent for the care of 7,500 thoroughbred race horses in various parts of the country, an average of \$3 a day for each animal.
