MACHIN'S CHARGES SHAKING CAPITAL LIKE A BOMBSHELL Did Not Register Until After

CAUGHT REPORTED

Powerful Forces of Enemy Said To Have Been Surrounded and Must Surrender Or Face Death.

London, June 25 .- The extent to which the Italian pursuit of the Austrians across the Piave has developed is not known here and no detailed reports have been received bringing events up to date.

A statement current in London yesterday, that the Italians had taken 45,000 prisoners, is said by the morning newspapers to be confirmed by the Italian embassy. The same statement is attributed to Premier Orlando by the Rome correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company.

The same correspondent quotes the Giornale D'Italia as saying that the troops of Archduke Joseph and of Gen. Wurm are virtually surrounded and must surrender or be annihilated.

PRISONERS TAKEN, 45,000.

Washington, June 25 .- A dispatch to the Italian embassy from Rome today confirmed the announcement yesterday that prisoners taken by the Italians in the fighting at the Piave numbered 45,000. This includes some 12,000 or 15,000 captured during the past week before the Austrian offensive was turned into a rout

London, June 25.-Dr. Richard von Kuehlmann, the German foreign secrelin yesterday that Germany could not bind herself to any pledges in regard to Belgium, says a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam today.

Amsterdam, June 25.—Chief blame for instigating the war was laid at Russia's door by Dr. von Kuehlmann, the German foreign secretary, in an address to the Reichstag yesterday, in which he also dealt with Germany's war aims. France and England were named as the next powers in order of culpabil-

"I believe." said Dr. von Kuehlmann "that one can say without fear of contradiction, as the result of revelations that the deeper we go into the causes of this war, the clearer it becomes that

of this war, the clearer it becomes that the power which planned and desired the war was Russia, that France played the next worse role as instigator, and that England's policy has very dark pages to show."

Referring to Germany's war aims, Dr. von Kuehlmann said:

What Germany Wants.

"We wish for the German people and our allies a free, strong, independent existence within the boundaries drawn for us by history. We desire overseas possessions corresponding to our greatness and wealth; the freedom of the sea, carrying our trade to all parts of the world."

Dealing with the question of Poland, Dr. von Kuehlmann said that not only was the Polish question inherently a difficult one, but that the almost insuperable connection between it and the solution of the economic questions existing between Austria-Hungary and Germany had so far prevented the attainment of a definite result.

Washington, D. C., June 25.—An official dispatch from Rome today says the Austrians are in full retreat, and that papers taken from prisoners show that Austria had not contemplated the possibility of defeat and was promising her soldiers this offensive would be the last stroke to put Italy out of the war.

Geneva, June 24.—The Austrian retreat across the Piave continues in the greatest disorder under the Allied fire, according to news received here this morning. British gunners, especially, are doing heavy execution in this

Hundreds of the enemy, the report states, were drowned in the swollen river, into which the Austrians are throwing their machine guns and light cannon.

Meantime the Austrians are rushing up new reserves to fill the breach between the Montello Plateau and the Adriatic in order to avert a disaster. In spite of the official announcement from Vienna that the retreat was due entirely to the flood in the Piave, the report states that the Italian armies caused the breaking of the offensive by their continuous pressure against the enemy.

AUSTRIAN LOSSES 200,000

Paris, June 25.—(Havas Agency).—Austrian losses total 200,000 men, according to the Secolo of Milan. Certain enemy divisions lost two-thirds of their effectives. A dispatch to the Matin from Turin says that the rout of the Austrians is complete and that the Piave has carried away many Austrian dead. Those who must use the voice, such as singers and speakers, are often thrown out of their routine by the development of more or less hoarseness.

The replies you thus receive in the early morning are in a hoarse, rasping voice. This kind of hoarseness could be named "the morning-after-thenight-before-voice." It is the common garden variety of voice in those who rest too little and eat too much. Happily, hoarsenesses of this variety frequently disappears as suddenly as it comes, after the victim has taken his cold shower and his "soft-boiled" breakfast. Small quantities of mucus are visible on the vocal cords when hoarseness is present. The cords, too, are relaxed and tired.

The hoarseness of public speakers, college coaches and others who talk and yell much is due to a straining and inflammation of the vocal cords. Irritation of the throat, dust, dirt, fatigue, infection, emotional strain and excitement may also cause hoarseness.







BANKING AND FINANCE.

The statement made by the Canadian finance minister to the effect that he had obtained from the capital issues committee of the United States, permission for the issue of certain Canadian securities in New York, and the hope he expressed at the same time for a satisfactory outcome of the exchange situation, have not yet had an appreciable effect upon the price of New York funds in Canada. At the close of last month the quotation was 19-32, and since that time the price has strengthened. It is anticipated, however, that the more drastic prohibition of the importation of commodities not regarded as essential and increased exports of manufactures, will, in due course, bring about an adjustment of the trade position. During the present month Canadian maturities in the United States are negligible, but during the next three months the aggregate will be \$35,000,000. Exports of gold amounting to \$4,000,000 were recently made to the United States.

In the securities market there has been a very ready absorption of municipal and provincial issues, and at prices much better than those obtained in the early part of the year. One provincial issue of under a million offered in the local market was withdrawn, the best offer being on the basis of about 6.70 per cent. Other issues are pending which will make the total amount offered during June higher than usual. In many cases municipalities have offered their securities to their own citizens and the quantity absorbed in this way has been

The April bank statement showed marked increases in cash resources and The April bank statement showed marked increases in cash resources and deposits, but commercial loans declined as is usual at this season. There was a decided increase in loans to municipalities, which stood at \$55,685,000 as compared with \$36,000,000 at the close of April a year ago. They will, however, be reduced by the proceeds of issues about to be made. With a view to retiring some of their maturing obligations which are secured by arrears of taxes, municipalities are prosecuting the collection of these taxes with greater vigor. The total deposits of the banks including those of the Provincial and Dominion Governments, amounted at the close of April to \$1,840,000,000, or \$23,000,000 in excess of the figures of the previous month, and \$164,000,000 more than at the corresponding period a year ago. The requirements of the Dominion Government responding period a year ago. The requirements of the Dominion Government during the next few months, or until the next loan is issued, will, it is estimated, be fully \$200,000,000, and formed the subject of discussion at a recent meeting between the bankers and the finance minister. The proceeds of the last loan, as indicated by the bank statement, are almost exhausted.

The city has good credit here and in London, and these notes can be bought at 97 to yield 6.25 per cent. They are classed as a good short term purchase, and are likely to carry beyond the return of peace..

The province of Quebec in which the city of Quebec is situated has 5 per cent notes also due in April, 1920, and which can be had at 96 to 97, to yield 6.60 to 6.75 per cent.

Having piled up in less than four years a combined indebtedness that reaches the appailing total of 50 billion dollars, having flooded the length and breadth of Central Europe with 15 billion dollars of irredeemable paper money, and having saddled obligations upon their citizens that will require henceforward more than five million dollars yearly to maintain—in other words, having committed their citizens in a manner that in the ordinary way of thinking would be ruinous—the German leaders have convinced those citizens that nevertheless all is well. How? By promising that wealth will soon be taken from their enemies to wipe the slate clean.

"Place yourself for a moment in the position of the German people, and judge that position from their point of view. Germany is laden with debt, her public obligations equal a full third of her wealth, her paper money is vastly inflated, her apparent legacy of the war is overwhelming. Ah!—but offsetting all is the great Hindenburg's promise of victory to come, and an pledge of vast annexations and tremendous indemnities.





FOOD LAW QUERIES

The following query has been receiving regarding the necessity of a license serve meals: ed regarding the necessity of a license to serve meals:

A lady has five in family and two boarders, and intends taking from four to five men for midday dinners. Would she require a license, if so, what is the charge, and where can it be obtained?

ONE WHO WANTS TO KNOW.

Referring the query to James Gray, local representative of the publicity department of the Canada Food Board, he reports that a license is required when the number of meals served daily to others than the family is fifteen or more. This can be obtained from the license department of the Canada Food Board at Ottawa, and will cost \$2. "If you do not take more than eight for dinner with the two boarders, you will not need a license, as you would be serving only fourteen meals outside your own family. You must, however, observe the regulations in regard to the serving of meats, etc.," Mr. Gray says.
