TO MILLIONAIRE

Veteran of War Tells The Advertiser of Remarkable Experience.

"Through faith, and faith alone, I was cured of lameness and excruciating pain, from which I had suffered for five years. Praise the Lord!" said J. H. Struad, a returned soldier, residing on Nelson street. Mr. Struad conducts a shoe repair shop on Rectory street near the Hamilton road.

Close on the heels of the Gipsy Smith revival meeting, which ended here last Monday, comes one of the greatest sermons of faith ever preached in this city. John Struad, who, while serving in 1914 with the 6th Field Battery, under Major Wood Leonard, was smashed and his hip twisted in an entanglement of gun-carriages on Salisbury Flain, said that his cure was a miracle worked by the Lord through his childlike faith. It happened during a meeting held in the Christian Workers' Church on Ottaway avenue on Tuesday night.

Cripple for Five Years.

"For five years I have never walked without the aid of a cane, except for the distance of a few feet, and only a year ago I had to use crutches. Nobody but my family and myself knew the pain I suffered. No medical treatment did me any good. My hip had to be massaged often during the night by my wife and son to relieve the pain. Every movement I made during my work sent a twinge of pain through my slide.

"I would be a cad if I didn't give all the credit to the Lord, and so I will testify for him wherever I go. People might think by the way I am talking that I am a narrow fanatic, but I am far from that. I have been over the bumps' in my day. I served on the Indian frontier and in the South African wars. I have been in the merchant marine service, and worked six months on a sheep ranch in Australia. I have been one of the boys. Those who know me can tell you, and I am well known."

Mr. Struad was one of the first soldiers returned from overseas. He was for a long time secretary of the Great War Veterans, preceding J. W. Cunliffe. Although he had a bad limp and always walked with a cane, he walks perfectly straight now, and is quite active on his feet. The last words heard as the door of his shop closed behing the reporter were: 'Praise the Lord!"

RECONSTRUCTION OF THE CABINET **AGAIN RUMORED**

Borden Government Said To Be Contemplating a Nice Little "Dicker."

NOT SMOOTH SAILING

Intended Parties To the Deal Not Satisfied With "Bargains" Offered.

OTTAWA, Dec. 4 .- The Governmen is making another attempt to patch up the leaky ship of state. There have arrived in Ottawa at the same time Sir Douglas Hasen, chief justice of the supreme court of New Brunswick: R. W. Wigmere, M. P. for St. John, and Lloyd Harris, overseas Canadian trade commissioner. With their arrival have been revived further rumors of cabinet reconstruction.

Sir Douglas and Mr. Wigmere were it is stated, invited to come by the premier. There is a vacancy in the cabinet, created by the moving of Hon. A. L. Sifton from the department of customs to that of public works, from which latter position Hon. F. B. Car-vell retired to become chairman of the railway commission, and the retire-ment of Mr. Carvell has left New Brunswick unrepresented in the cab-

The proposal now is to fill the vac-ancy and give New Brunswick repre-sentation at one and the same time. And it is proposed that Mr. Wigmers give up his seat in St. John and per-mit Sir Douglas to enter the House through that constituency. Mr. Wig-mere it is proposed shall be rewarded through that constituency. Mr. Wig-mere, it is proposed, shall be rewarded for his magnanimity and sacrifice in that regard by being appointed a har-bor commissioner of St. John as soon as the Government takes over the com-mission. In fact, a place little dicker In fact a nice little dicker is planned.

Several Obstacles.

Unfortunately, there are several little obstacles in the way. In the first place, Sir Douglas is just a little doubtful about the idea of exchanging the fairly permanent and honorable position of chief justice of his province for the highly doubtful and possibly very transitory glory of being a minister in the tottering Union cabinet. In the second place, he emphatically does not want the position of minister of customs. He will have the justice department or nothing at all. And the justice department is administered at present by a perfectly healthy individual in the person of Hon. C. J. Doherty, who shows no signs of a desire to quit. In the third place, Sir Douglas is not so certain that he could be elected even in his old constituency of St. John, in spite of promises of harbor and other improvements, which can always be made during an election campaign. Several Obstacles.

during an election campaign.

Even should Mr. Doherty consent to retire, there would still be the problem of placing a man at the head of the highly important department of customs, and the everlasting circle would ommence once more. Sir George is Willing. It is desired that Lloyd Harris be-

othe minister of trade and commerce, but this presumes the retirement of the present head of that depart. It has been unofficially announced that Sir George would succeed Sir George Perley as high commissioner in London. Sir George Fester is perfectly willing to high commissioner in London: Sir George Foster is perfectly willing to go; in fact, it is said that he has set his heart on the job and will sacrifice his portfolio for nothing less. But while Sir George has sat in no less than five governments and one opposition and is a splendid orator, the story of his probable appointment has accused to anthusia. aroused no enthusiant among Canadian businessmen either in the Do-

adian businessmen either in the Do-minion or overseas.

Canadian businessmen would like to see a businessman at the head of the department of trade and commerce, but they also believe that the high commissioner in London should be a man of husiness, young and aggressive man of business, young and aggressive. Sir George was never a man of business, and today he is a veteran of parliament.

A necessary concomitant of reconstruction of the Borden Cabinet would appear to be the finding of lucrative positions in the gift of the public for those who are reconstructed out.

Lloyd George Hopes for Ratification Before Month Ends

LONDON, Dec. 4 .- Premier Lloyd George, speaking in the House of Commons today expressed the hope that the peace treaty would be ratified before the end of the month. He thought Parliament would rise December 23, un-
