Damascus is Now in the Prossession of the British.

London, Oct. 3rd.-More than seven thousand Turks were taken prisoners when General Allenby's forces oceupied Damascus, the war office announced last night

The statement says:
in Palestine, troops of an Australian mounted division entered Damascus Mondy the British forces and by a portion of the Ararb army of King Hussein. Over seven thousand prisoners were taken.

After its surrender with the exception of necessary guards; all the Allied troops were withdrawn from the city
for the time being. The local authorities remain responsible for its administration.
