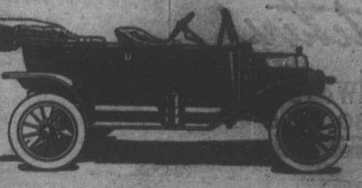

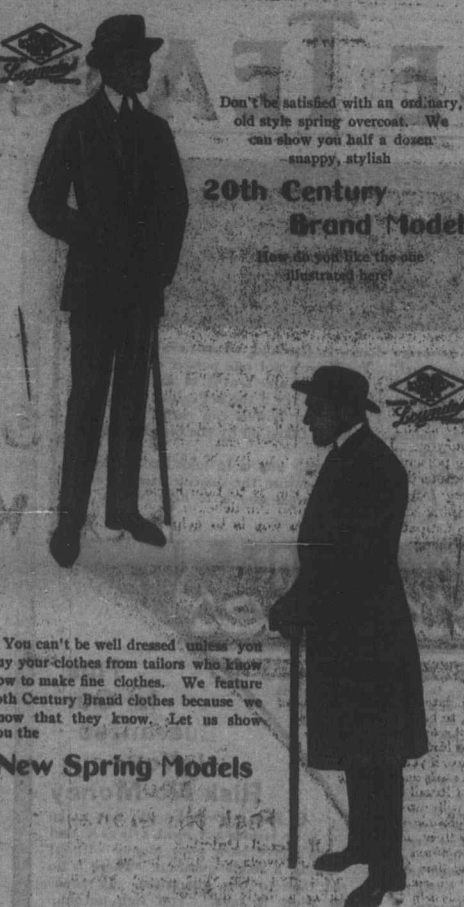

Mrs. Norman Newcombe, Belcher Street, leaves by the steamer Atlantic on the twenty fifth of this month for England, where she will meet her husband, who is returning from a two-year stay in Australia, where he has been the guest of his brother, Mr. and Mrs. Newcombe, who will spend six months on the continent before returning home.

Mr. David R. Collins, a brother of Messrs. E. E. Collins and H. O. Collins, of this town, was recently elected an alderman of Lansing, Michigan. Mr. Collins is a native of Berwick and has been over thirty years a resident of Michigan, where he has filled for many years an important position in connection with the educational department of the state industrial school.

Musical Stars Coming.

Edwin Bower Hesser, the Boston Impresario, is in town on Tuesday to make final arrangements for his spring concert at the Opera House which is scheduled for Wednesday evening, May 13th. Mr. Hesser brought the opera companies last spring and last fall, which were so keenly enjoyed by local music lovers. He told a representative of THE ACADIAN about his future plans for musical presentations in the Maritime Provinces.

"Last spring," he said, "I introduced to you that phenomenal coloratura soprano, Miss Evelyn Scotney, and her husband, Mr. Howard White, the greatest basso, as the stars of the aggregation. The other members, as I freshly stated at the time, were all youngen artists, who had just great things in store."

"Public support," he continued, "was very loyal, and more than expenses were cleared on both tours. This leads me to hope that I will receive such support that each spring and possibly each fall I may bring to the Maritime Provinces some distinguished artists, and be assured of proper patronage. The plan which I wish to work out is that of an annual musical festival, either in the spring or in the fall, of each year, and then a separate tour of some artist in the opera."

"Of course, it would be impossible to bring stars during the regular opera seasons. And were it not for the fact that I contracted with Miss Scotney and Mr. White a year ago for this tour, I could not have brought them. Miss Scotney's success during the past season has been so marked that she has instantly become one of the most sought after stars on the stage today. During the past winter at the Boston Opera House, she sang the stellar roles in Lucia Di Lammermoor, Lakme, Rigoletto, La Traviata, and Martha, also Olympia, in The Tales of Hoffmann."

She was wanted for the season of the Boston Opera Company in Paris this year, but cannot get there until after the close of my Canadian tour, in June.

"Instead of bringing several young singers as assisting artists this season, I decided to bring four artists of established worth, and to give a concert comprising many musical novelties never before heard in this region. Beside Miss Scotney and Mr. White, who both created a tremendous sensation last spring, I am bringing the leading dramatic tenor of the Boston Opera Company, M. Alfredo Ramella, and the splendid prima donna contralto, Miss Cass Sapia. The quartette from 'Rigoletto' will be included in the program, which will be one of the artistic variations," added Mr. Hesser.

Master John Craig Kelley will be the musical director, as on former tours. By special arrangement with Manager Black, I have arranged to present in concert form the complete second act—better known as "The Little Scene," from the grand opera, "Martha," sung in English. In this Miss Scotney shines in the title role—also known as Lady Harriet in the opera. She sings the beautiful "Last Rose of Summer." Mr. Ramella is without a doubt the finest tenor ever brought to the Maritime Provinces. The rest for the "Martha" concert will be:
