Control of Weed Seed in Clover.

While there are only a few kinds of weed seeds which are commonly found in red clover seed in quantities sufficient to cause it to be prohibited from sale under "The Seed Control Act" it is yet very necessary that the seed for sowing be as pure as possible. It is not easy to say how much damage to soil and injury to live stock may be caused by impurities in red clover seed. For this reason "Pamphlet No. 1" prepared by the Dominion Seed Analyst, and just issued by the Seed Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, is one that should command wide and general attention from farmers. "The Seed Control Act" prohibits the sale of red clover seed if it contains more than 1/100 of a percent of weed seeds or more than 1/100 of a percent of weed seeds per ounce. The pamphlet referred to, which can be had free on application to the Publications Branch, Ottawa, tells of the maximum number of weed seeds per ounce that are permitted in the different crops of timothy, red clover, all its and etc.

The steps that are necessary to purify the seed. Information is given of the relative prevalence of weed seeds; of methods of testing, and instructions for taking and sending to the Branch to be tested. A series of exact illustrations of the commonest weed seeds and of eleven necessary for their removal are given in the pamphlet.

Talk on Privation.



Conference of Live Stock Men.

To formulate a national plan for meeting the new and critical condition in the live stock industry accompanying restoration of peace, some of the leading Canadian live-stock men and representative meat packers are being called to a conference by Hon. T. A. O'Leary, Minister of Agriculture. The war has stimulated live-stock production in Canada. An even greater stimulus is expected to develop with the restoration of normal commercial conditions, as the breeding stock of Europe has seriously declined during the war in nearly all countries. A heavy demand is bound to be made upon this country for meat and breeding stock for some years to come.

District No. 2. This included Kentville and what is known as wards 3 and 6. The sum of \$220,000 was allotted to this district, and the amount subscribed was \$250,000.


