



foundal regime is best for them. There is in the country the elements of such a solution; but the Ethiopians need foreign support to prevent them from falling back into anarchy. Three princes, we have seen, are in a position to divide among them the spoils of the Kingdom of Ethiopia—Menelek in the South, Kassa in the Tigré, and Gozab in the central region of Amhara. Left to themselves, they will not oppose each other instead of coming to an understanding. The stranger only will profit by their divisions. It will not be England, nor indeed any other European nation, that will take their place. Two Mussulman populations—the Gallas to the South, and Turks to the North—covet these mountains, and history teaches us that the successes of the Mahometans, wherever they have triumphed, have not been advantageous either to the natives of the conquered countries or to European interests. It would be a matter of regret if the definitive result of the English campaign in Abyssinia only promoted the progress of Mahometanism in a country which has so long resisted it.

RECIPROCAL FREE TRADE WITH THE UNITED STATES.

(REVISED AND CORRECTED.)

Charlottetown, 21st August, 1868. At two o'clock this day, a number of influential gentlemen of this City and County assembled to consider the propriety of adopting measures to facilitate the establishment of Reciprocal Free Trade with the United States, in conformity with a Resolution, unanimously and respectively signed, addressed to the High Sheriff of the County (the Hon. Francis Longworth). The latter gentleman, after reading the said resolution, and the notice of the meeting issued in conformity therewith, called upon the gentlemen present to organize the meeting by the appointment of a Chairman and Secretary.

It was thereupon moved by the Hon. Joseph Henley, Attorney General, seconded by the Hon. E. Palmer, that the High Sheriff of the County be requested to preside. The heavy rain of the previous night, and the still unsettled state of the weather, having prevented the attendance of a number of persons resident in the County districts, who would, in all probability, have been present had the day been favorable, it was at first proposed to adjourn the meeting on the following day, of securing a larger representation from all parts of the County. It was, however, ultimately decided that, although the meeting was not so well attended as could be wished, it was inexpedient to adopt the course suggested.
