

By increasing the value of manure produced, concrete floors for feeding stables will return their cost in about one year. This is shown by tests at the Ohio Experiment Station. The extra crop returns from manure kept on concrete floors is due to the soluble plantfood saved.

The cost of concreting floors generally amounts to about \$5 an animal in the ordinary feeding stable, and the saving in manure is equal to this amount of every 1,000 pounds in live weight of steers or cattle fed for the year, as compared with animals fed on earth floors.

Concrete floors also make it easier to provide sanitary places for ani-

Imperial Chapel Choir he was entitled to free musical education. Schubert was continually composing and died in 1828 thus living only 31 and music came from his brain as years. Beethoven said of him: Truly fast as he could write it. Schubert's 18th year was the most prolific, for during that year he wrote no less than 195 compositions, including 2 symphonies and 6 operas. Yet his struggles were many and severe. He had always suffered privations and often cold and hunger. He often had not the money to buy even the music paper on which to write his thoughts was in the habit of borrowing small sums of money and leaving a manuscript as security with his creditor and in this way many of his greatest works were undoubtedly He seemed to live for his art alone, for he spoke, thought, and lived in music. Though Schubert lived but 31 years he wrote more than eleven hundred compositions— mostly songs. His music is of the most wonderful beauty, tenderness. sweetness and purity, blended with strength, nobility and grandeur. Dvorak the great Bohemian compose of modern times declared that he had no hesitation in placing him next to Beethoven and far above Mende ssohn and Schumann.







Ontario Rural School Fairs

During the year 1919 the Ontario Department of Agriculture, through its agricultural representatives. distributed seeds and eggs to 78,946 pupils in 3,278 rural schools of the R. S. Duncan, B.S.A. provinnce. writing to the Agricultural Gazett for January states that the following quantities were distributed:-1,890

bushels of potatoes, 433 bushels of grain, 12,575 packages of root seeds, 30,700 packages of vegetable seeds, 21,900 packages of flower seeds and 11,045 dozens of eggs of a bred-to-lay strain of Barred Plymouth Rocks These figures give some idea of the magnitude of the school fair movement in Ontario.

The first school fair was organize The first school fair was organised in 1999 with three schools taking part. Ten years later 857 rural school fairs were held in the province and the pupils had 69,848 home plots and made 111,238 entries. It estimated that about 250 people saw the first school fair in which 55 pupils took part, while last fall 93,600 children and 107,590 adults attended the school fairs in Ontario This is truly a worderful growth.



Autumn Versus Spring Ploughing

There are so many different soils o plough and so many kinds of ploughs to plough them with, that no definite rule can be laid down as the best method for all soils.

We plough to bury vegetation and manure, so that they may decay and feed the future plants. We plough to pulverize the soil and fit it to receive the seed. No other implement will do so much in one operation toward the making of an ideal seed bed, as a good plough in skilled hands. We plough to increase the water holding capacity of the soil. We plough to destroy weeds, insects and rodents.

WHY SHOULD WE PLOUGH IN THE AUTUMN? Because this com paratively slow operation may be performed mor economically when norse and man power are not at such a premium as they are during the rush of spring seeding. Early autumn ploughing enables the heat from the September sun to hasten the decomposition of one season's refuse plant growth so that it may feed the succeeding one. Late autumn ridging with a plough greatly benefits many soils by exposing the greatest possible surface to the action of freezing and thawing, nat-ure's most wonderful pulverizer, which has made most of the seed eds throughout the ages, and is today our greatest agent in producing the tilth so necessary for large crops. In the autumn a dry soil may be ploughed without causing the same injury that would follow plough ing a soil in that condition in the spring. It is also possible to plough and so wet in the late autumn that there is a gloss or sheen from the mould-board, knowing that the frost of winter will turn what would make

seed beds in the spring. SOILS THAT SHOULD BE LEFT AND NOT PLOUGHED UNTIL SPRING. Light soils that blow, and oils on steep hill sides that wash. should not be exposed to the gales and heavy rains of winter and early spring. Some heavy clay soils that puddle during the heavy spring rains are better left and ploughed when they have reached the right degree of liability to crumble under

nould-board LAND THAT BARLEY NEEDS THE PLOUGH TO PREPARE IT. Land that has produced a hoed crop such as potatoes, turnips, mangels or vegetables, usually produces a better crop if the seed bed is formed for the following grain crop without using the plough. Ribbing in late autumn has been the only use of the plough that has increased such crops at Charlottetown.

A few results from cultural ex

periments at Charlottetown, that bear directly on this problem, are of interest. The figures secured are from average yields covering four seasons from fields of oats on a omparatively level, sandy loam soil od ploughed in August gave 47 bus shels and 14 pounds; sod ploughed in November (no other autumn work), 42 bushels and 32 pounds; sod ploughed in spring, 34 bushels and 9 pounds. Loss from spring ploughing compared with August ploughing, 13 bushels and 5 pounds; compared with November ploughing 8 bushels and 23 pounds. There were 45 plots in this particular five year rotation, and the spring plough ing of sod averaged 6 bushels below the poorest autumn method of break ing sod. Therefore plough your so in the autumn, and as much of your stubble as you can. Leave your land after a hoed crop without ploughing except to rib it.
