### REGULAR MEETING TOWN COUNCIL

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held in the Town Office on Thursday, February 29, 1924. The meeting was moved and carried that the Council adjourn until Monday, Feb. 25th.

The adjourned meeting was held on Monday February 25th at eight o'clock p. m. Those present were Mayor Creaghan, Ald. Dickson, MacKay, McGrath, Morris and Russell and Atkinson. Minutes of meeting of January 17th and Feb. 21st were read and confirmed.

A copy of a Resolution passed by the Gloucester County Council with reference to the Caraqueet Railway was submitted, and on motion the same was received and ordered filed.

The Board of School Trustees presented their estimates for the next year (\$23000.00) and it was moved by Ald. Morris, seconded by Ald. Mackay and carried that these estimates be received and included in the year's assessment.

Reports of Committees:  
The Light & Water Committee recommended payment of the following bills:—Barnes & Co. Ltd., \$23.42; Lounsbury Co. Ltd., \$2.00; Wm. M. Sullivan Ltd. \$30.00; Can. Gen. Electric Co. Ltd. \$163.71; Northern Electric Co. Ltd. \$87.68; and on motion of Ald. Mackay seconded by Ald. Dickson these bills were passed and ordered paid.

The bill of Robinson, Co. Ltd., \$78.15 from the Public Works Committee was passed and ordered paid on motion of Ald. McGrath seconded by Ald. Mackay and the bill of J. R. Lawlor \$11.60 recommended by the Finance Committee was passed and ordered paid on motion of Ald. Morris seconded by Ald. Dickson. County Warrants totaling \$1,833.40 were presented and it was moved by Ald. Dickson seconded by Ald. Russell and carried that the same be received and handed to the assessors for inclusion in the assessment for 1924.

It was moved by Ald. McGrath, seconded by Ald. Russell and carried that this Council place itself on record as being opposed to valuation placed on the Town of Newcastle by the County Valuator, as being too high in proportion to the rest of the County, thereby causing an over-assessment of the Town for County purposes.

The annual reports of the Mayor and of the Finance, the Public Works the Police, the Light and Water, and the Park and Fire Committees were read and on motion were received and ordered printed in the Annual Report.

It was moved by Ald. Dickson seconded by Ald. Morris and carried that Messrs H. R. Moody, A. L. Barry and J. H. Sargeant be appointed Assessors for the year 1924 and the Mayor declared Messrs. Moody, Barry and Sargeant duly appointed.

On motion the Council resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider the appropriation for the year and Ald. Mackay was appointed Chairman.

The Committee of the Whole would recommend the adoption of the following assessment for 1924:

The committee also recommended the acceptance of the tender of the North Shore Leader (\$2.35 per page for printing 400 copies of the Annual Report and on motion the recommendation was adopted.

The reports of the Auditor of Town Accounts and the Auditors of School Accounts were read and on motion they were received and ordered printed in the Town Report. On motion the Council adjourned.

## EXAMINATIONS FOR GROCERS

In Great Britain Such Persons are Socially Trained

London, Feb. 27.—England is probably the only country in the world where men are specially trained for the grocery trade and are given certificates of efficiency. In this country the up to date grocer is every bit as much a specialist in his line as the eminent physician or surgeon. The would-be grocer does not now merely find a shop stock it indiscriminately and call himself a grocer. He approaches the subject warily and often goes through a three-year course with the knowledge that a row of critical examiners and a stiff examination paper await him at the end of his term.

Although this course is by no means compulsory each year there is a larger percentage of budding grocers who enter for the trade is becoming more and more highly specialized.

During the first year he learns the many varieties of sugar he can readily differentiate between Demerara; Muscovado; Jaggery; Centa; and Sorghum. He can hold forth on the virtues of tea grown in any country; he knows the best sort of coffee and is readily an authority on "cuts" of bacon. He has

all the best methods of curing at his finger tips and can give the wherefores and whyfores of each.

At the end of the second year he goes into the subject more deeply and gives greater attention to detail. He makes a special study of the most up-to-date business methods and has a good working knowledge of all the Food Acts.

At the end of the third year he faces a practical test of his abilities.

At a spotless apron he stands behind the counter in a specially stocked store while the judges watch him critically. Before him are a bewildering number of samples of tea and coffee. It is his task to give the name, grade each one. He must be able to give price and the country of origin of discourse readily on the respective merits of each different brand.

Next he is confronted with basins of liquid tea. Perhaps there will be five or six different samples but there will be two basins of each. He will be required to sort them in to pairs and grade them according to merit.

He must know how to blend the various packets of tea given him for the English grocer is very often his own tea-taster and blender. For this reason the majority of grocers are non-smokers as smoking tends with some men to obliterate the sense of taste.

There are other similar tests for the candidate for grocery honors for butter; sugar; spices and so on. Then comes the most difficult part of the ordeal—the actual sale of goods across the counter. It is at this point that so many nervous grocers fail; they are liable to get a little flustered should the purchaser prove too "trying".

Points are awarded for tact; salesmanship and general knowledge of the business. The candidate must also be able to pack up the purchases and tie them into a neat parcel with reasonable speed.

There is in addition a written examination paper which is equally stiff. The most searching questions are asked; one of the recent ones being "How many days after laying are you entitled to call an egg new laid?" It is a question which many purchasers would be glad to give their opinions.

## Rigid Economy At The Capital

Rumors current for some days that the Government was requiring the heads of departments to cut down their salaries, estimates and staffs are now learned to have been well founded according to the Ottawa Journal. Deputy ministers throughout the service are getting under pressure from the Government and revising their estimates. The revisions on top of cuts already made, will result in extensive deductions in staff, and in salary reductions for a number of the more highly paid officials who remain. In some cases abolished.

SAMUEL RUSSELL DIES IN ONTARIO

Was Native of Newcastle Former Minister and M. P. P. For Six Years

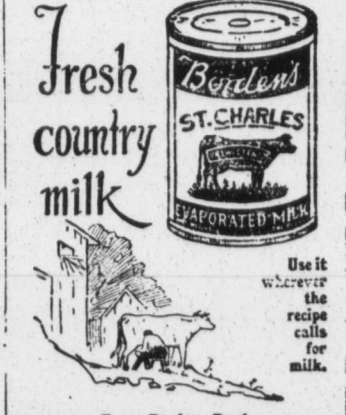
Rev. Samuel Russell, B.A. Registrar for the county of Hastings; Ont. and formerly M.P.P. for East Hastings died at Belleville; Ont. Tuesday afternoon. He was a graduate of the University of New Brunswick and classmate of Sir George Foster; Sir George Perkin and Hon. Dr. William Pugsley.

Mr. Russell was born in Newcastle, N.B. on Jan. 29, 1848 the son of James and Annie Russell both natives of Ireland. He attended the Newcastle grammar school. At the University of New Brunswick he won the Douglas gold medal for English essay and was graduated with honors. Subsequently he studied theology at Queen's University; Kingston, Ont. and Glasgow University Scotland. He held the degree of B.A. from the University of New Brunswick and an education degree of B.A. from Queens.

He was for some time editor of the Tribune of Deseronto Ont. and secretary-treasurer of the Deseronto News Co. He had been trustee of the grammar school of Northumberland County; N.B. for several years. He held various pastorates in New Brunswick and since his retirement from the ministry had been elder of the Presbyterian Church. He had always manifested an interest in educational works and moral reforms.

In 1898 he entered politics and was elected member of the provincial parliament of Ontario as a Liberal in that year. He was re-elected in 1902 retired in 1904. His wife was M. Evelyn Davis daughter of James A. Davis of Deseronto.

He was a brother of the late Judge W. A. Russell of Shediac and Mrs. John Jones of Newcastle is a sister. The funeral took place at Belleville; Ont.

It was twenty five dollars and costs! But he had caused a loss to the community of Two Millions.

Why should this farce continue? Why should not imprisonment, without the option of a fine be the penalty for such a crime against the community? Why should a man by breaking the law, be allowed to burn up his neighbor's property as well as that of the public, and escape with a trifling fine? Why are insurance rates so high? Because of the acts of criminals such as this. The honest have to pay higher rates because the law lets off scoundrels such as he. Arson is one of the most awful crimes, for it may result not only in loss of property but of life. And arson is the setting on fire of slash if it results in loss after a re-fusal has been given to fire the slash. Anyone found guilty of arson should be sent to jail for life as the most dangerous kind of criminal.

## The Meaning of Education

The one great purpose of all education is to make life better.

A boy with round shoulders and slouching gait is given exercises of such a character that he learns to walk with head erect and with a springing step, that is a sample of physical education. If one whose greatest delight is to sing "Barney Google" or "Yes! We Have No Bananas" is so influenced as willingly to choose instead of these songs those that have real merit and feeling that is musical education.

If a boy is ignorant and superstitious and this under tuition gives way to wisdom and understanding that is intellectual education. If he is brutal and is so influenced by his teachers and others that he becomes kindly and gentle, that is social education. If he is irreverent and selfish and learns to worship God and love his fellow men that is religious education. Nothing can be considered educative unless it improves life.

In school there are doubtless some things done that are not of educative value at all and it may also be true that some things that do not count on formal examination have the highest educational value.

For example, working a problem in the highest common factor by rule of thumb appears to have very little value for life and certainly does not help pupils physically, intellectually or religiously. It is as nearly a barren exercise as could be devised in the name of education.

On the other hand the gracious demeanor of a trusted teacher has probably more influence on the children than most of the lessons she conducts. It prompts them to act as she does. One of the best things a teacher can do is to consider the life value of every movement in school. The one supreme question is: How is life being modified for better?

The work of the teacher will therefore consist in setting up ideals, encouraging effort, suggesting methods of attack. It will also consist in showing the children how worthy actions should be performed; and in requiring repetition of these actions until they are performed automatically.—The Western School Journal, Winnipeg.

**HOW THEY DO IT**

**SERIOUS CRIMES IN BUCKIE**

It will be learned with feelings of  
concern in the county generally  
that in Buckie in the course of the  
last few days serious offences have  
been committed against all establish-  
ed law and order.

At Buckie, before Police-Judge

rect menace to the general well-  
being of society, and in the period  
of unsettlement through which the  
nation is passing it is a reassur-  
ing and comforting circumstance  
that there is an Act of Parliament  
which permits this dangerous and  
insidious evil to be dealt with and  
if possible effectually checked.

**MCMURRAY TO**  
**FIGHT IT OUT**

Apparently the old political game  
of "passing the buck" is being play-  
ed in connection with the McMur-  
ray case. Hon. Mr. McMurray  
stated that the whole

## Here and There

The gold mines of Northern Ontario broke all previous records in the month of January, when they produced approximately \$2,100,000, based on preliminary reports received from the mines.

It is reported that arrangements have been made for the financing of a \$500,000 plant in Edmonton, Alta., for the manufacture of paving blocks from the tar sands of Fort McMurray.

The first of the private fur auction sales which the Hudson Bay Company has decided to hold in future at their head office in Montreal took place recently, when a collection of various furs, estimated roughly at \$25,000 to \$30,000 value, was put up for sale by sealed bids.

Grain handled at the port of Montreal in 1923 totalled 120,013,938 bushels, the largest amount shipped through any port in North America during the year. Montreal thus maintains for the third consecutive year her position as the leading grain exporting port of the continent.

Dr. Geo. H. Locke, chief librarian, Toronto, at the request of the Canadian Authors' Association, has undertaken to supervise the selection of volumes for the Canadian literature exhibit at the British Empire Exhibition. The task involves the gathering together of 500 representative books and it is anticipated will take about a fortnight.

From all indications, the potato shipments to Havana this season from the port of St. John, New Brunswick, will greatly exceed those of last year. To date there have been 750,307 bushels sent forward in twenty steamers, while from September 1, 1922, until January 31, 1923, a total of 505,568 bushels were shipped in seventeen steamers.

With heavy enquiries from South American sources for Canadian flour, millers expect to see their export volume substantially increased during the month of February, as compared with January. This movement, together with offerings of a premium for wheat at Vancouver, has been the most encouraging trade feature of the past month in Winnipeg, Man.

Colonel Geo. H. Ham, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who recently returned from Florida, reports that Canada was prominently featured at the South Florida fair, held at Tampa some time ago. A very striking exhibit of Canadian products and natural resources was displayed and a "Canada Day" was celebrated, all of which is said to have been a revelation to those who attended.

Buffalo meat from the park at Wainwright has recently been on sale throughout Canada and has been extremely well received. It is described as resembling beef but of a more gamey flavor. Government officials expect that this meat, with hides and other buffalo products, will become a regular source of income to the people of Canada in the future.

Work on the Kenogami dam, in the Province of Quebec, is reported as progressing very well and the \$2,000,000 work located at the upper part of the Saguenay River are expected to be completed within 15 months. As a result of these works, the mills operated by the Price interests will be kept in full activity during the whole year, instead of partly closing down in the winter months, as they have had to do in the past.

More than \$12,000,000 worth of equipment was added to the Canadian Pacific Railway's service during 1923. Included were 16 Pacific and 20 Mikado type locomotives, all very powerful and equipped with the most modern devices for power, speed and economical operation. Other items were 15 steel baggage cars, 12 mail and express, 15 first class coaches, 6 cafe-parlor and buffet-parlor cars, 1,000 box cars, 250 freight refrigerator cars, 300 coal cars, 50 oil tank cars, 300 automobile cars, 36 vans for freight conductors and 14 snow-ploughs.

The seventh of Canada's directional stations was recently completed for service by the branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, to assist the boats and ships navigating the Bay of Fundy and the coastal waters extending to Boston. This station tends to make the route favored by the Canadian Pacific steamships in winter, already splendidly equipped with safety devices, still safer. By means of the apparatus, the wireless operator of any ship in distress within 400 miles of the Canadian shore can find his location simply by pressing a spring. These stations have been described as "a Godsend to the mariners."
