Sessional Notes.

On Monday last week, the proceedings in the Legislature were brief. After routine some private bills were advanced a stage, and the bill respecting the Legislature, requiring a deposit of \$200, before any one could proceed, came up for third reading.

At the opening of proceedings on Tuesday, the Premier called attention to a despatch from Ottawa that had appeared in the Guardian, to the effect that the Provincial Government might compromise the claim of the Province to efficient and continuous communication for a money consideration.

After questions and the advancement of a stage in some private bills, on Wednesday the Premier moved the second reading of the bill for the consolidation of the Provincial debt.

Mr Mathieson said he was in favor of funding the debt on the most advantageous terms; but the Premier's proposition should be accompanied by a statement setting forth the true condition of our Provincial finances, and telling us how the business of the Province is to be carried on in the future.

How the Money Goes.

Under the head of miscellaneous expenditure, on page twenty-five of the Public Accounts report the charges given below are entered mostly for delegations and trips abroad:

He pointed out that when the Conservatives came into power the public accounts showed at the close of the previous year a debt of \$52,000, and said that if the amount had been placed at interest and compound interest, according to the arguments of Captain Read and Dr. Warburton, it would have amounted to a very large sum by this time.

Mr Fraser wished to know whether or not the Government would go to the length of taking steps to prevent the yearly recurring deficits which make up the debt. No business firm could exist and have a deficit year after year.

During the evening sitting Mr Mathieson pointed out to the Government ranks. Referring to the expenditures reported on page twenty-five of the Auditor's report, he called attention to an item of \$54,250 "miscellaneous expenditure of the late Hon. D. Farquharson."

After matters of routine on Thursday, the Premier submitted a draft address to the Governor-General in Council, setting forth the conditions and understanding as to the representation under which P. I. Island entered the Union.

Whereas the judicial committee of the Privy Council in its recent decision on the appeal of this Province against the Judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada given on the fourth day of November, decided that the representation of this Province in the Federal Government was liable under the "British North America Act 1867," and the amendments thereto and the terms of Union under which this Province entered Confederation to be reduced to one-half, the number granted to this Province by the terms of Union.

And Whereas under "An Act respecting the establishment of Provinces in the Dominion of Canada of 1871" it was provided by Section 2 that "The Parliament of Canada shall have power to time to time to establish new Provinces in any territory forming or being part of the Dominion of Canada, but not included in any Province thereof, and may, at the time of such establishment, make provision for the constitution and administration of any such Province, and for the passing laws for the peace, order and good government of such Province, and for its representation in the said Parliament."

And Whereas it appears by the correspondence and negotiations between your Government and this Province prior to Prince Edward Island entering the Union, this Province was led to believe that its representation should not be decreased below six but that it should be entitled, under the terms of the "British North America Act" of 1867 to be increased should the population justify such increase.

And Whereas the area of the province of Quebec, which by the terms of the "British North America Act" was made the pivotal province to regulate the number of members representing the different Provinces, has under the terms of the said Act of 1871 been increased to the extent of 155,000 square miles.

And Whereas it is contrary to the spirit of Confederation and to the intention of the contract of Union entered into by this Province that its right to adequate representation in the Federal Parliament should be diminished or lost and that it should thus be treated not as an organized Province having rights as a Province apart from the question of population but as if it were unorganized territory.

And Whereas the failure of this Province to realize its proper proportion of the natural increase of its population has been largely owing to the changed condition brought about by Confederation and to the nonfulfillment by the Government of Canada of the Terms of Union in respect to continuous communication between this province and the Mainland of Canada.

It is therefore resolved that in the opinion of this House the earnest attention of the Government of Canada should be drawn to the serious position which now confronts this Province and that it be urged as strongly as possible upon the Government of Canada that some steps be taken to provide in accordance with the true interest and meaning of the contract of union should be made to restore to this Province its original representation.

Mr. McKinnon, some time ago asked the Commissioner of Public Works to lay on the table of the House a copy of all plans, specifications and estimates of cost made for his department respecting the new bridge now in course of construction at Mossell.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor, entertained the members of the Legislature to dinner tonight and tomorrow night.

The German steamer Mars which sailed from Pensaola for Ler, Germany with a crew of twenty on Feb. 1st is reported as missing. It is likely she foundered with all hands.

The steamers Northumberland and Princess as well as the Minto, are now plying between Charlottetown and Picton. The Stanley is running between Georgetown and Picton.

The golden jubilee of St. Dunstan's College will be celebrated at the College on Wednesday July 19th. There will be a religious celebration in the forenoon and a picnic in the afternoon. Make no other engagement for that date.

While a party of eight young men were enjoying a walk on the beach near Manchester N. H. Sunday a small steamer, the boat, when 200 yards from the shore, causing a panic among those on board and swamping the craft. The result was the death of two of the party viz: Charles Kettle, aged 22; Louis B. Bedard aged 21. Kettle became exhausted in trying to swim ashore and was unable to do so. Bedard was not seen after the accident. It is believed he was struck by the boom.

Two of Quebec's big men have passed away: Hon. Gibernou, Attorney-General in first Government formed after confederation, and later on Prime Minister, is dead, at a ripe old age. He had also been Superintendent of Education, and a Legislative Councillor. L. P. Tardivel, editor of La Verite, Quebec is also dead. When he entered St. Hyacinthe College at nineteen years of age, he knew no French, having been born in the United States; yet he lived to be perhaps the most correct French writer in the province of Quebec.

A man named Thomas Forrest, hailing from Halifax and holding a through ticket from Halifax to Reno Nevada, fell off the G. T. R. train going west and was killed. The body was found between the double tracks, two miles east of Prescott, Ont., about ten o'clock Saturday morning. His head was stove in on one side and his face was scratched. He must have been instantly killed. From papers and postal cards found in his possession it would appear that there was a lady travelling with him—probably his wife. A recommendation was found in his pocket from Kelly and Glassy, Halifax; also postal cards giving the address of Miller Forrest, Ellerslie and William Davis, Halifax.

One woman was badly burned while a score of women and children had a narrow escape from death in a fire in a tenement house, 24 Bilerica St., Boston, in the west end of the city last Sunday night. The fire which is believed to be of incendiary origin started beside the front stairs in the hall and the draught carried the flames up to the top of the house. Bridget Whalen, 45 years old was terribly burned. She was found lying on her face in an upper hallway, with the flames about her and her clothing on fire. Firemen took her down the ladder to the street. Many other persons were rescued by the firemen. The damage is estimated at several thousand dollars.

Fifteen dead, and five injured is the result of a fire which destroyed the convent of the Sisters of St. Anne at St. Genevieve near Montreal Good Friday morning. When the inmates of St. Genevieve convent retired to bed there were ten sisters and thirty seven pupils and five old ladies. Of these, one reverend lady, nine pupils and four old women perished. One old woman who fell a victim to the flames, Madame Tolvin would have been 100 years old had she lived till next month. The Parish Priest of St. Genevieve is Rev. J. B. Bourget was on the ground early and did splendid work attending to the wounded. Early in the morning the reverend gentleman received the following despatch from the Archbishop of Montreal "stricken down by the terrible catastrophe which has brought mourning to so many families, to the Sisters of St. Anne and to the whole parish. I pray God may console you, fortify and strengthen you. Tomorrow I will repair to your village in order to extend my profound sympathy. Paul, Archbishop. The loss sustained by the Sisters of St. Anne by the destruction in their convent reaches about \$15,000 the amount being covered by insurance.

The Solemn offices of Holy Week and Easter were well carried out in St. Dunstan's Cathedral. The Te Deum was sung in the Cathedral on the evenings of Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, by his Lordship, the Bishop, the Cathedral clergy, the Cathedral choir and the priests and Students of St. Dunstan's College. His Lordship celebrated Solemn Pontifical Mass and blessed the Oils on Holy Thursday, assisted by the priests of the Cathedral and the College. The Blessed Sacrament was borne in solemn procession to a repository suitable adjoined at the altar of the Sacred Heart. At the adoration of the Cross and the Mass of the Pre Sanctified on Good Friday, his Lordship officiated assisted by Rev. B. D. McDonald, D. D., as deacon and Rev. Father Gaudet as sub-deacon, and Rev. Dr. McLellan as master of ceremonies. The Passion was sung by Rev. Dr. Morrison, who sang the narrative part, Rev. Dr. Curran, who sang whatever was said by our Lord, and Rev. Theodore Gallant, who sang whatever was said by a third party. On Holy Saturday, Rev. Dr. Morrison was celebrant; Rev. Dr. Curran was deacon and sang the exultet, Rev. Joseph Gallant was sub-deacon and Rev. Dr. McLellan master of ceremonies. His Lordship, the Bishop celebrated Solemn Pontifical Mass on Easter Sunday, assisted by Rev. Dr. Curran as arch-priest, Rev. Dr. McLellan and Joseph Gallant as deacons of honor, Rev. Fathers McPherson and Gaudet as deacon and sub-deacon of office. The ceremonies were directed by Rev. Dr. Morrison. Rev. Dr. Morrison was also the preacher of the occasion. His sermon was a powerful presentation of the miracle of our Lord's resurrection. Solemn Pontifical Vespers and Benediction were given in the evening.
