The probability of a national coal strike and the complete dislocation of industry has been greatly increased by the failure of the National Conference of coal owners and miners to effect a settlement. The der were discussed at a prolonged session yesterday with the result that the coal owners adopted a resolution declaring the owners prepared to consent to a proposition, that each person in their employment should receive a fair day's wage for a day's work, but they are convinced that payment in proportion to the amount; of work performed is the only rule which can be successfully applied in the case of a coal-getter. The resolution concluded with a reservation of the right to continue the negotiations. The miners replied expressing regret that the refusal of the owners to accept the principle of a minimum wage adding: "We know that there can be no settlement of the present dispute unless this principle is agreed to." At the conclusion the miners announced their desire to avert a serious rupture in the coal trade and their willingness for this reason to meet the coal owners at any time in further discussion if the coal owners express a desire to do so. The owners promised to give this subject further consideration and in this attitude lies the hope that the coal strike may be averted.
