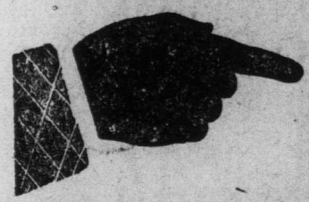

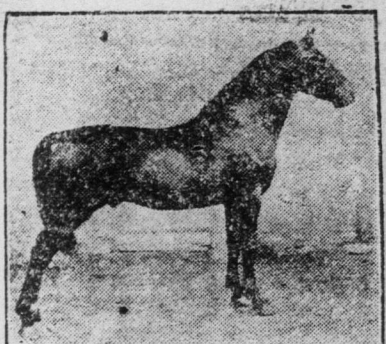

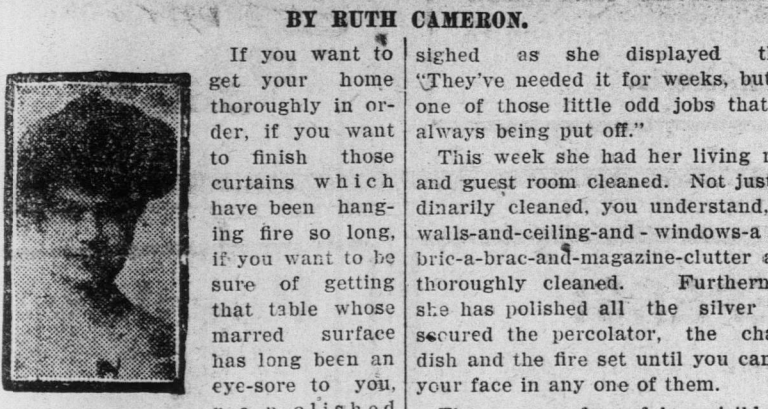

Notes and Comments.

We have protested frequently against the utilization of the Public News Service as a partisan political agency. To-day we publish a letter from a correspondent on the West Coast which gives instances of the use of this service for political purposes during Sir Edward Morris's political campaign in the District of Fogo. Not only have we had offices kept open in order to send inflated and exaggerated messages to a political organ of Sir Edward Morris, but we find that these political messages are re-hashed in St. John's and served out through the telegraph lines to be published in every outpost telegraph office in the Colony. It will be seen that the public outpost news service is being utilized as a publicity bureau for the Morris political party. This public service is being used to boom Sir Edward Morris and his party at public expense. It is a prostitution of a public service which calls for censure and punishment and we have no doubt that next fall the Electorate will find a punishment fit for the crime.

The remarkable inequalities in the holding of property on which death duties are levied was shown up by Lloyd George in last Budget Speech, when dealing with the revenue from this source for the financial year he had under review. Death duties were levied on property last year which was valued at £276,000,000. There

had been 425,000 adult deaths. But one-third of all those millions had belonged to 292 people, and two-thirds to no more than 4,000, while 355,000 people had died without a farthing of benefit to the State by way of death or succession duty.

Excitement in Factory.

BELIEVING PLACE ON FIRE, THE GIRLS RAN FOR FIRE ESCAPE—ONE FAINTS ON REACHING IT.
Shortly after 2 p.m. yesterday, a scene of excitement and confusion occurred at the F. B. Wood Factory, Brien Street, when a pipe burst filling the second flat with steam. A large number of girls work here and when the place filled with the vapor which it did quickly, the cry of "fire" went around and all made for the fire escape on the Brien Street side of the structure. Instead of letting the escape down as they should have done, all crowded out on the landing and the wonder is that some of them were not thrown to the street and killed or severely injured. One of the girls on reaching the window, fainted away and had to be pulled inside to safety by a companion. Mr. Barker, the Manager, and the other officials after some difficulty, reassured the girls, told them there was no fire, and only after some time was the work of the place resumed.

Prospero Back.

Sardinian Arrives.

The R. M. S. Siberian, Capt. Hatherley, five days from Philadelphia, arrived in port early this morning with a hundred tons of cargo. The ship sails at six o'clock this evening for Glasgow taking an outward freight of oil and as passengers—Mr. John Browning and wife.

MINOR THEFT.—At noon to-day Constable Kelly arrested an eleven-year-old boy who is charged with stealing a couple of oranges from a waterfront premises. The boy told that he had bought the fruit. This the police believed and held the lad in custody while an investigation is being made.

A Partisan News Service.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—The political packman, the peripatetic politician, the perambulating Premier, (in other words Sir Edward Morris) is abroad in the land, vouching his election wares, while his henchman at St. John's is daily violating all the known canons of decency by using the outpost daily despatch, to chronicle the movements of the Prime Minister, while on his political rampage. That the telegraph service is being prostituted matters not a whit. To those who, like the compiler of the news despatch, have sounded the lowest depths of political turpitude this advertising of the first minister is not by any means considered a breach of propriety. In fact the more one studies this despatch the more one is convinced that the beginning and ending of its purpose is to proclaim throughout the length and breadth of the land, praise of Morris and his doings regardless of its conveniences.

In testimony whereof the following verbatim extracts from the daily despatch aforesaid are adduced:—

"St. John's, May 10.—Message from Seldom Come By, states Premier left steamer Prospero there yesterday by invitation of people to address public

meeting last night and drove to Fogo by wagon to-day. Premier met great reception; flags flying, guns firing. Public meeting last night attracted largest gathering in history of place. Premier spoke two hours. Was most cordially received and cheered heartily during meeting and at its close."

"May 12.—Message from Fogo states Premier Morris met greatest reception there Saturday ever given public man in that place and addressed largest public meeting Saturday night with immense effect. Premier justified Government's policy and warned people of danger that unfounded attacks by irresponsible persons on commercial fabric of Colony might bring about repetition of Bank Crash of twenty years ago."

"May 13.—Message from Joe Batt's

Arm, to-day, reports Premier Morris had another highly successful reception and meeting there and at Barr'd Island yesterday and last night. Addressed great public meeting in Methodist Hall and was presented with address of welcome as being the first Premier that ever visited place. He speaks again."

The foregoing is but a sample of the stuff that will be served up to the public from now until election day, and nauseam, and it is high time that a halt was called. If the news report is to be but campaign literature for the Morris party, some means should be taken to either prevent this or eliminate the despatch altogether. The reports of the Premier's reception in Fogo District are on a par with similar reports of his reception in St. Barbe, and Burgeo and LaPoile last year, and contain about as much truth. This much, however, is certain, Morris Must Go in November next.

Cable News.

OTTAWA, May 16.
The Naval Aid Bill passed the House of Commons last night without any disorder, after five months of discussion.

LONDON, May 16.
Miss Emerson, the American suffragette, has developed appendicitis, and has been operated on. She was on hunger strike in Holloway jail.

BUFFALO, May 16.
The Erie elevator, an old-style wooden structure filled with wheat, corn and other grains, was completely destroyed here last night, and caused a water-front loss of half a million dollars, as well as setting fire to freight sheds and their contents.

WASHINGTON, May 16.
President Wilson declared to fifty newspaper reporters here to-day that he would consent to no compromise on the question of free wool and free sugar, but insists on the Democrats in the Senate passing the Tariff Bill as it went through the House.

LONDON, May 16.
Several more suffragette bombs were discovered last night, but no damage resulted. One was found in the railway station at Salisbury, another at the hotel Brentwood, and a third in the private chapel at the Buccleuch Estate in Scotland.

WASHINGTON, May 16.
President Wilson has decided that no warships or troops shall be moved or anything resembling military or naval demonstrations carried on by America while diplomatic negotiations with Japan over the California legislation are in progress, so that no alarming motives can be implied from even the ordinary manoeuvres of the army and navy.

LONDON, May 16.
School boys on being released from lessons, are helping the militants in the reign of terror. Several bombs found yesterday and to-day, and which proved to be "dummies," have been traced to scholars, the latest being picked up in the yard of the Church House, Westminster Abbey. It created a sensation until the police discovered it was harmless.

BERLIN, May 16.
German military airmen are in future to be punished by at least two weeks close arrest in the event of their crossing a foreign frontier. An airship, according to orders issued by the German War Office to-day, which declares that this step has been forced by repeated instances in which frontiers have been crossed and international misunderstandings have resulted.

HALIFAX, May 16.
Rioting took place this afternoon in connection with the strike of motormen, conductors and Power House employees. Although the service is partly tied up, the Company succeeded with imported strikebreakers in keeping ten or twelve cars running till late this afternoon, when crowds of sympathizers took charge, and roughly handled the substitutes. The cars were wrecked, conditions becoming so bad that the Company decided to discontinue the service entirely. During the afternoon the front of the Company's office building was completely wrecked. Many arrests were made. No further trouble is anticipated till the Company again attempt to operate the trams.

LONDON, May 16.
The arsonette bomb campaign continues. Several were placed in London and the provinces to-day. A very workmanlike canister with explosives and a clockwork attachment was found in the Rotherhithe Public Library, this morning, with the usual label. It was probably placed there by a man. The police believe that many men have been engaged by the women to do their work. Another machine was found in a letter box in the Wandsworth District Post office. Another with a partly burned fuse was found in Holy Trinity Church, Hastings, where the suffragettes have been peculiarly active of late.

LONDON, May 16.
It is officially announced that Viscount Morley's visit to Berlin is purely a private matter. It is understood, however, that he will not devote all his time to sight-seeing, but will meet the Kaiser, Chancellor Von Behmann, Holweg, and Germany's leading foreign politicians, and discuss with them all problems, including Mediterranean and Turkish questions, and the boundaries of German South Africa. Limitation of armaments will not be discussed, as it wrecked Lord Haldane's visit to Germany. Apparently no one in England is anxious to revive it just now. King George starts on Monday for the wedding on the following Saturday of the Kaiser's daughter. The Czar will also be present at the ceremony; and the meeting is generally expected to have important political consequences.

LONDON, May 16.
The Oxford Union, the principal debating Society of the University, last night, debated the question of woman suffrage, Israel Zangwill being the chief speaker. A motion for votes for women was passed.

WASHINGTON, May 16.
Whether the States as innocent receivers of stolen property is responsible for its value, is a question that the international arbitral tribunal was asked to decide yesterday. The Canadian Government demands about five hundred dollars value of lumber used in 1900 to construct a military barracks at Eagle City, Alaska. Canada alleges that the States bought lumber from a man, named Howard Mountain, who cut it from the Canadian domain without permit and without payment. He is alleged to have left the country later.

LONDON, May 16.
The Home Office has issued a statement explaining that the Government's attitude as to the suffragettes has been misunderstood; that the suppression of their paper has not been ordered, and that it may be published without fear so long as no incitement to crime is printed. The militants claim that this is a complete turn down for Home Secretary McKenna, who, they say, was afraid to tackle the Labor Party, which has undertaken as a matter of principle, to back the militant organ.

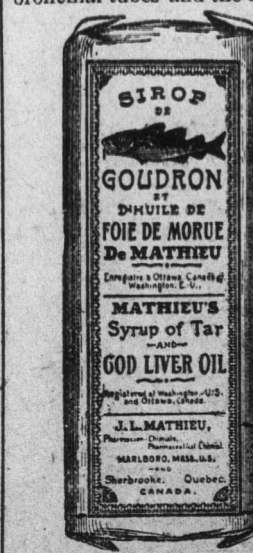

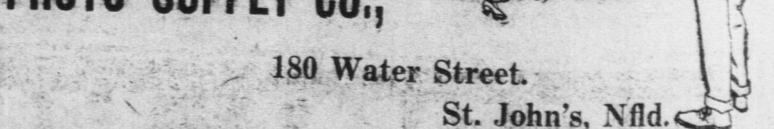

I had, of course, to disguise myself. In order to do this I walked to the railway station, which was about a mile from the house. I carried a small handbag and effected my disguise in a dilapidated cottage by the roadside. I reached the station a few minutes in advance of the gentleman I suspected, and went up to London in the same train with him. Three hours after arriving in London I succeeded in obtaining conclusive proof that he had stolen the necklace. I followed him to a pawnshop, and on his leaving it, ascertained that he had pawned the diamond necklace for £200.

In accordance with an arrangement with my client, directly I saw him cheat I rose and left the room, and the gentleman was there and then accused of cheating by the hostess.

She was certainly not a day less than fifty, and to imagine her guilty of carrying on a romantic intrigue with anyone was really ridiculous. She was, as a matter of fact, an extremely nice lady, and her husband's suspicions about her were evidence that the old gentleman was falling in to his dotage.
