Cold Storage Bill.

Yesterday the Premier moved the House of Assembly into Committee to seek confirmation of a contract made on May 5th, between the Government and the American-Newfoundland Packing Company. The Company proposes to establish a business in connection with the freezing, handling and dehydration of fish, canning of lobsters, smoking and can-

ning and packing other fishes, and the dehydration of roots and berries. The Company undertakes to erect three Cold Storage plants for fresh fish and fresh products. The capa-city of each of these is to be not less inet on the policy which they believe the United States should adopt as a than 500,000 lbs. 




