Radical Change in System to Decide British Championship Next Year.

ST. ANNES-ON-THE-SEA, England, Oct. 23-A radical departure in the method of qualifying for the British open golf championship will be instituted next year, when sectional qualifying competitions will be held, two in England and one in Scotland. This was announced following a meeting of the championship committee here at which the plan was suggested by representatives of the Profession als' Association. Heretofore qualification play has been held just before the championship proper on two courses, one of them usually that on which the championship is contested.
