Local News.

SUDDEN DEATH.—A young man named Alex. Skeoch died very suddenly on Monday night last, at Fergus. He had attended an auction sale during the day, and on returning retired to bed, where he was found soon afterwards smothered.

BREWERY FRAUDS.—Mr. Bowman, M. P. for Waterloo, has given notice of an address for a return of the evidence and report of the enquiry into the frauds alleged to have been committed by the brewers in the county of Waterloo.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—On the evening of Friday, 29th ult., a young man named John Paxton, of Fergus, was seriously injured by the bursting of a gun. He was on his way home from hunting, and wishing to empty his fowling piece, fired, when a piece of the breech flew out and entered his forehead. It was extracted, and the patient is under the care of Dr. Orton, but it is not believed he will recover.

ACCIDENT.—The Mount Forest Examiner says that Andrew Swanson, jun., 14th concession of Egremont, met with a most painful accident on the morning of Friday last, by having his arm drawn into the machinery of a threshing machine, by which the flesh from the elbow to the wrist was lacerated in a frightful manner, and two of the bones of the hand broken.

CONFECTIONERY.—The attention of country dealers is invited to Mr. Berry's advertisement of confectionery which appears to-day. His establishment is largely stocked with everything in his line that the holidays demand. DEATH IN A BROTHEL.—The London "Advertiser" says that on Monday night a young woman, Maria Wilson, an inmate of a house of ill-fame, was taken suddenly ill. Dr. Moore was sent for, but on his arrival he found the unfortunate creature insensible from the effects of morphia, which it was stated by the other inmates of the place she had taken while under the influence of liquor. Remedies were applied, but she never rallied sufficiently to give any particulars as to how or why she committed the deed, nor even to tell her name, which her companions in shame also at the time pretended to be ignorant of. She died shortly after the arrival of the doctor. It is said that deceased's real name was Lawrie, and that she comes of a very respectable family in Toronto, from

Mount Forest News.

From our own Correspondent.

Winter at last, accompanied with plenty of frost and snow. Sleighing very good, and in consequence business men are on the *qui vive*, making preparation for a busy season. The surveyors, the precursors of all railroad enterprise, have made their welcome appearance here. This event is hailed with delight by the inhabitants of this village and the surrounding country, in the southern portion of the county of Grey in particular. A majority of the inhabitants of Grey will now support the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railroad, believing it to be the best for their interests. Apropos, the municipalities of Normanby, Egremont, Arthur and Mount Forest are now about to submit their by-laws at once, so that there can possibly be no hindrance to constructive operations commencing at once, in so far as the needful is concerned.

The St. Andrew's Society of this place duly celebrated the Natal Day of their Patron Saint on Friday, the 29th ult., at Coyne's Hotel. To say the least of the national gathering, it was most enthusiastically remembered by all nationalities, a fair sprinkling of English, Irish and Scotch being present. The dinner and fittings were splendid, and were in accordance with the usual style of "mine host" Coyne, of the "American."

Mount Forest, Dec. 3, 1867.

Nassagaweya Township Council.

The Municipal Council of Nassagaweya met, pursuant to adjournment, on Monday, 2nd December—members all present—the Reeve in the chair. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Moved by Mr. B. H. Kean, seconded by Mr. Elliott, that the petition of John A. Peacock and 25 others, praying the Council to petition the Commissioner of Crown Lands, requesting him to send a Government Surveyor to survey the sideroad between Lots 10 and 11, in the 1st con. of Nassagaweya; Resolved, that the Reeve be instructed to pray the Governor-General to order a survey to be made on the said sideroad in dispute.—Carried. The Surveyor presented his report, to the effect that he had inspected the Towns within the municipality, and found them all correct according to statute and by-law, with the exception of the Inn kept by D. Deishman, there being no oats. The account of Thos. M. Taylor, for inspecting Taverns and for acting as Road Commissioner, amounting in all to \$8.75, was ordered to be paid. On motion, the Council adjourned for one hour. Council resumed, the Reeve in the chair. Leave was granted to introduce a By-law for the appointment of a place or places for holding the ensuing municipal elections, and for the appointment of Returning Officers, which was read a first time. Moved by Mr. Elliott, sec. by Mr. Ramsey, that whereas the Trustees of School Section No. 9 having made application for a loan not exceeding \$200, to purchase a site and build a dwelling house for the school teacher of said section; Resolved, that the said amount be loaned from Clergy Reserve Fund, with interest at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum.—Carried. The by-law appointing places for the next municipal election and appointing Returning Officers, was read the second and third time and passed. The sum of \$10 was granted to D. Munn, in aid of Elizabeth Congden, and the sum of \$5 to John Eastbrook, in aid of Ann Taylor. Leave was granted to Mr. J. Kean, that the following sums be paid to the under-mentioned parties for damages to sheep, viz: D. Dudgeon, \$3.75; M. McPherson, \$2.75; J. Caverhill, \$2.50; J. Ramage, \$35.50; J. Winyard, \$19.50; T. Easton, \$29; J. Roberts, \$11.50; J. Armstrong, \$6; A. McLaren, \$41.25; J. Marks, \$5; J. Dumeau, \$8.50; D. Campbell, \$16.50; and J. Norris, \$4.50. The sum of 25c. was ordered to be refunded to W. Cusick and \$1 to F. S. Clark, being overcharge of taxes. On motion of Mr. J. Kean, sec. by Mr. Ramsey, the time allowed for the collector to collect the arrears of taxes in this municipality was extended to the 1st of February next. Moved by Mr. B. H. Kean, sec. by Mr. Ramsey, that the following sums be paid to the parties named below for acting as Returning Officers for the year 1867, viz: J. Easterbrook, \$4; J. Menzies, \$2; T. M. Taylor, \$2. On motion the Council adjourned.

FAT CATTLE SHOW IN FERGUS.—The Fair Committee of Fergus announce their intention of holding a Fat Cattle Show, and Fair on the 10th inst. A number of prizes are offered for cattle of various descriptions. Full particulars may be seen by reference to the bills.

NEW SALT COMPANY IN GODERICH.—A new company has been organized in Goderich to bore for more salt. It is called the Dominion Salt Company, and owns three acres of land for which the sum of \$3,300 was paid. A few months ago the Signal says this same land was not worth more than \$300 per acre.

MURDER IN CALEDONIA.—The Hamilton Times of Wednesday says:—A shocking murder occurred on Monday afternoon last in the vicinity of a tavern stand on the Port Dover road, about three miles from Caledonia. It appears that a party of three or four Indians from the Grand River Reservation, became involved in a quarrel through liquor, when an Indian, who had not at first taken part in the fracas, rushed in with his knife and stabbed one of the combatants, a half-breed, through the heart, causing his death almost instantly. The murderer took himself off, and up to last night had not been apprehended. He is known by the name of Jim Curly, and is about twenty-five years of age.

Guelph Rifle Match.

The first grand Rifle Match under the auspices of the Guelph Rifle Association was begun at the new ranges, on Thursday. The day was not the most favorable that could be desired for rifle shooting, being very cold, and except during an occasional interval of no long continuance the sky was cloudy from morning until night. Nevertheless as the score which we publish shows, there was shooting made much above the common average, and the turn out of spectators, who took quite an interest in the match, was large considering the cold day. From Ottawa.

The proposed change in the tariff continues to be a subject of considerable interest, but nothing trustworthy is known concerning the nature of the alterations to be made.

Only about twenty Bills thus far have been introduced into the Commons. When the Parliament of Canada had at four weeks, in 1866, one hundred and sixty-eight Bills had been introduced.

There are rumours that it is the intention of the Government to propose an adjournment of parliament at an earlier day than has been supposed probable, and that one or two measures, which it was stated would be proceeded with before the adjournment, will be adjourned till the second part of the session.

The Globe's correspondent says:—Mr. McDougall's speech on the North-West question was not at all equal to the large subject with which he had to deal.

Niagara Election.

The Hon. Stephen Richards was nominated yesterday by Mayor Pafford and seconded by Mr. Stephen. Capt. Geale was nominated by Thomas N. Bull, Esq., and seconded by Mr. Connell.

NOT EXACTLY.—Some person who has the audacity to style himself a "Canadian" writes to one of the London (England) papers upon the state of Canada, and says:—"There are few large towns in which are to be found the educated and civilized, but these are full of discordant elements; while the farmers and settlers in the back woods are in a most unfortunate position, and their children grow up to be as uncivilized as natives of Siberia."

THE EFFECTS OF WHISKEY.—The Berlin Telegraph says:—"On Saturday night last a farmer named Rellingger, residing in the neighborhood of Williamsburg, had his head badly cut by falling from a waggon. It appears he and several neighbors were on their way home from a sale where they had imbibed rather freely, and when nearly opposite Mr. Joseph E. Snyder's, Bellingger became quite helpless, and falling off the waggon was so stunned that his companions imagined he had been killed. He was carried into Mr. Snyder's house, and Dr. Bowly notified of the occurrence. On examination, however, it was found that, with the exception of several cuts and bruises about the head and face, he had sustained no serious injury."

VERY KIND.—Mr. Robinson, of Brooklyn, N. Y., wishes the United States Government to give notice to the Imperial authorities of Great Britain that the United States is ready to purchase Ireland at a fair price, and if Great Britain will not make the sale, then the United States will forcibly take and annex the Emerald Isle to the Great Republic.

The Intercolonial Railway Bill.

The Intercolonial railway bill is printed. The preamble recites the joint declaration of the provinces that the construction of a railway is essential to the consolidation of the union, the obligation imposed by the Confederation Act and the Imperial Guarantee Act.

The commissioners are to build the railway by tender and contract after the plans and specifications are fully advertised, accepting tenders of such contractors as appear possessed of sufficient skill, experience and resource to carry on the work; they are not obliged to accept the lowest tender, and can make no contract involving an expense of \$10,000 or upwards unless sanctioned by the Governor-General-in-Council.

When any part of the railway is completed the government may make arrangements for working it for a period until the end of the next session of Parliament. The balance of the bill is the same as the resolutions already published.

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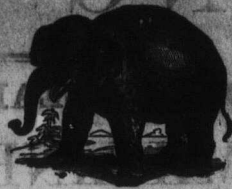
