Arrest of Officials of the Union General. PARIS, Feb. 2.—Bontoux, president, and Feder, manager, of the Union generale were arrested last evening at a meeting of directors. It is stated that legal proceedings will be commenced against several directors.

Bel has been refused for their release. The Credit Provincial bank and a few outside brokers are unable to fill engagements on account of the collapse of the union general. Bontoux and Feder are charged with abuse of trust by speculating with customers' funds.

Paris Correspondence. CAIRO, Feb. 2.—A deputation of notables today waited upon Chirif Easha, president of the council, and requested him to sign a draft the organ of law. Chirif referred them to the palace. The khedive summoned the English and French consuls to a consultation, in the course of which Chirif arrived and tendered his resignation.

It is expected the new ministry will be entirely composed of men who favor the aspirations of the notables.
