

ON TRIAL FOR THEIR LIVES

INVESTIGATING THE MURDER OF LUCY DENNING.

Random Andrew, his wife and daughter-in-law Arraigned on the Charge of Placing a Young Girl Who Had Been Murdered Under the "Doctor's" Treatment.

"Dr." Random Andrew, Alice Andrews, his wife, and Cassie Andrews were yesterday put on trial for their lives in the Criminal Assizes.

The three are charged with having murdered Lucy Denning, a young woman who placed herself under the "doctor's" treatment. Justice Meredith presided.

The prisoners in the dock. "Dr." Andrew sat at the right of the witness. She and Cassie Andrews, daughter-in-law of the doctor, were garbed entirely in black.

The selection of a jury did not take much time, and Mr. Clute explained the case to them.

Mrs. Helen Lewis, a sister of the dead girl, was the first witness to be called. She said that in October last she accompanied her sister to Dr. Andrew's house at 237 Shaw-street.

On Oct. 21 Lucy and I went to Dr. Andrew's house, continued Mrs. Lewis. "My wife, Mrs. Alice Andrews, came to the door. We went upstairs and the doctor took Lucy into the bathroom.

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LIBERALS OF WEST TORONTO.

G. G. & LINDSEY THE CHOICE OF THE PARTY.

Convention at the West End Y.M.C.A. Hall Last Evening—All Other Candidates Retire in His Favor—Address by the Hon. Mr. Joseph Tait and Others.

The Liberal convention for the electoral division of West Toronto for the nomination of a candidate for the Provincial Legislature in the approaching general election was held last evening at the West End Y.M.C.A. Hall on the corner of Queen-street west and Dovercourt-road.

It was fully 20 minutes to 9 before Dr. Lynd, president of the West Toronto Reform Association, the chairman, opened the convention, the gathering meantime having become somewhat impatient at the delay.

These gentlemen occupied seats as follows: Messrs. G. G. Lindsey, Ex-Ald. Verall, W. L. Mackenzie, Dr. Hunter, Hugh McNeil, Dr. Sloan, George Evans, Robert Young, Hon. S. C. Biggs, Mr. Wingfield, T. A. Thompson, William Adams and John Mallon.

The chairman, urging the necessity of sending a representative to sustain the convention, was followed by a central committee, representing the Reform Association, included in West Toronto. The choice of a candidate was entirely in their hands and no arrangement had been made.

A period of 15 minutes would be allowed for nominations.

The Nominations. Ald. Graham said it afforded him great pleasure to nominate G. G. Lindsey. Hugh McNeil in an equally brief speech seconded the nomination.

Other nominations made were as follows: Dr. Lynd by J. Nolan, seconded by Douglas Campbell, well.

Hon. S. C. Biggs by James Tennant, seconded by Thomas Wilson.

W. L. Mackenzie by Dr. Lynd, seconded by G. E. Ryan.

J. M. Wingfield by Dr. Sloan.

Frank Peddie by J. M. Sutherland and Sturgeon Stewart.

Nominations now came in thick and fast from all parts of the hall, among those being mentioned being Messrs. Benjamin Westwood, Dr. Hunter, J. C. Morgan, J. B. Hay, G. E. Myles, Ald. Graham, W. H. P. Clement, George Evans and John Mallon.

Declared by the House. Brief addresses were made by J. C. Morgan, J. M. Wingfield, W. W. P. Clement, W. L. Mackenzie, John B. Hay, Verall and George Evans withdrawing from the contest in favor of Mr. Lindsey.

Dr. Westwood withdrew in favor of Mr. Lindsey, who was then nominated.

Ald. Graham was not seeking legislative honors, as his business occupied all his time. The constituency would do itself honor if they elected Mr. Lindsey.

Dr. Hunter said they were there to express confidence in a leader and a man who would take a conspicuous place and make his mark in the legislative hall. It was not sufficient to send an ordinary member of the House.

Mr. Lindsey, in declining the nomination, said he thought the prospects of success must be gratifying to the Liberal party, but he had no time to spare. Instead of being, as formerly, a Conservative he now offered a fair fighting chance in at least three constituencies. He urged the perfecting of the organization, as was now being done in North and South Toronto. If the full strength of the Liberal party were brought to the front success would crown their efforts.

Hugh McNeil was satisfied that the right man had been chosen and that the nomination of Mr. Lindsey was a success. He passed a glowing eulogium upon the Mowat Government and urged Mr. Lindsey's nomination, in whose favor he retired.

Hon. S. C. Biggs was not a candidate and would do all he could to elect the nominee. Dr. Lynd, while glad to see a man who was not in a position to accept it. He retired in Mr. Lindsey's favor.

Mr. Lindsey's acceptance. This cleared the slate and Mr. Lindsey was declared the nominee by acclamation and loud applause.

Mr. Lindsey, in accepting the nomination, said there was only one thing that stood in the way, viz. the state of the health, and he hoped that on this subject his supporters would relieve him as far as possible from the fatigue and excitement of the campaign.

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QUEBEC MEMBERS OPPOSE.

DR. WELDON'S BILL TO DISFRANCHISE BRIBED VOTERS.

They Claim the Bill Will Be Expensive to Enforce, and that Prosecutions Would Arise From Malice—Clause Two Not Passed After an All-Day Discussion.

Ottawa, Ont., May 9.—After a few unimportant questions had been asked and answered, the House went into committee on Dr. Weldon's bill to disfranchise voters who have taken bribes.

Messrs. Jeannotte and Dupont objected to the principle of the bill, on the grounds of its expense to the public and to the person whose vote was challenged.

Mr. Dupont pointed out that there were laws already against bribery; why then put on a new one? He feared that the bill would cause a feeling of indignation for the gratification of private malice.

Will the Government Pay Expenses? Mr. Jeannotte asked: Has the Government money enough to put this act in force with all its expense of judges, lawyers and clerks?

Mr. Thompson replied: This is a very bad year to have such a question put to us, and in the absence of the Finance Minister I am sure the safe thing for me will be to say no.

Hon. Mr. Miller was sure the bill would be more useful if the Government would provide for the expense of its enforcement out of the public fund.

Dr. Weldon held that where there was sufficient public opinion to evoke the operation of the act, there would be no danger of neglect to enforce it, besides the guarantee also against its exercise for the gratification of private malice.

Clause Two Strongly Opposed. Discussion was then continued upon the second clause, which provides that: "Whenever within 90 days after the day on which an election is held under the Dominion Election Act a petition has been presented to the court, signed by five or more voters of an electoral district, stating that they have reason to believe, and do verily believe, that bribery has extensively prevailed at the election, and having annexed thereto affidavits or affidavits sworn by all the petitioners, stating that the allegations of the petition are true to the best of their knowledge and belief, the court shall have power to cause an enquiry to be made for the purpose of making enquiry into such bribery under this act."

Col. Army spoke strenuously against this provision and strenuously against the bill in general. He pointed out the enormous expense involved in the operation of the act, the cost entailed upon the judge and the avenue thereby opened up for the gratification of private revenge on the part of the defeated candidate and his friends. Again, in the event of the accused vindictive his innocence, who would pay the \$200 or \$300 damages he might reasonably be found to have sustained? He quoted from the Elections Act, providing that the law already provided adequate means of punishing bribery and maintaining the purity of the electoral process.

Particulars should accompany a petition. Mr. Jeannotte moved to amend the foregoing section by providing that it shall be incumbent upon the petitioners to state in the declaration not only that "bribery has extensively prevailed at the election, but to state with particulars the cases of bribery that have taken place at the election." He was still speaking to this amendment when the committee rose at 6 o'clock.

After recess. The bill to incorporate the Alberta Southern Railway Company was read a second time, and referred to the Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.

Mr. Coatsworth moved the second reading of the bill for the incorporation of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and objection being taken as usual by some of the Catholics, the members were called in, and the bill was passed by a vote of 70 for 31 against.

Mr. Jeannotte then resumed the debate on Mr. Weldon's bill for the disfranchisement of voters who have taken bribes, and the whole evening up to 11 o'clock was taken up discussing clause 2, to which several amendments were proposed. The committee reported progress and the House adjourned at 11.

Railway stocks became very weak in Wall-street yesterday afternoon. The decline was chiefly due to reports of rate cutting in the West and Southwest, and gold engagements of about \$1,500,000 for export to-day's steamer.

There was a fair attendance at Suckling & Co.'s auction room yesterday. The stock of E. Hallebrand in London consisting of general drygoods, was sold to Mrs. Hallebrand at 55c on the dollar.

It was said that a considerable section of the Irish party would vote against the Ministry. What, however, had any section of Irishmen with the cause of Home Rule at heart to gain by putting the Government in the minority.

It is said that the Government will be defeated by the Liberal party. The Government was determined to fight the battle to the end.

Later in the evening, Lord Rosebery said: "We have no reason to believe that the Government will be defeated."

The Premier's speech was a masterpiece of statesmanship. He showed that the Government was determined to persevere.
