Colonel Vollum, one of the association's supporters. Colonel Vollum, it was mentioned, became interested in the question "in consequence of his own very narrow escape from live sepulture, having been pronounced dead from drowning, and prepared for interment, when consciousness, happily, returned spontaneously. On more than one occasion Dr. Vollum was instrumental in rescuing persons from the most horrible imaginable of fates, in spite of the opposition and ridicule of physicians, priests and relatives, who loudly protested against the delay in the obsequies of those whom they erroneously declared to be unmistakably. The report indicated the legislative

The report indicated the legislative aspirations of the association, and mentioned that Mr. George W. Allen, of the Massachusetts Legislature, had written, saying, "I have introduced a Bill at the last Legislature sessions; it was opposed by the undertakers, and the bill was killed."

The meeting passed a resolution in favor of a bill "to provide that no burial shall take place without a medical certificate of death, and that no such certificate shall be given without personal examination and inspection of the body for the purpose of seeing whether putrefactive decomposition has commenced; and by requiring rural and sanitary authorities to establish waiting mortuaries in or conveniently waiting mortuaries in or conveniently near to their respective districts."

Out of the twenty-four samples analyzed, eight had over 1,000 weed seeds per pound; one sample contained no less than eleven different species of wood seeds; and another, sample thirteen. Each of these samples had been obtained from a prominent seed firm, and there was no reason why the greater part of these impurities could not have been taken out by the use of the machinery which is in the possession of that seed firm.

Canada Thistle, Ox-eye Daisy, Cockle, Dock, Mayweed, Chicory, and Sheep Sorrel were the noxious weeds most prevalent in the Nova Scotia Timothy. Others quite prevalent, but less noxious, are Green Foxtail, Ribgrass, Cinquefoil, Lamb's-quarters, and Plantain. The nature of the impurities in general were not dissimilar to those of New Brunswick and Ontario. About fifty per cent of the samples had passed through Toronto seed houses.
