> . The letter is written in reply to a letter appearing in a previous issue over the nom de plume "Elector," who claims that the charges which were made in a previous issue of some time ago are not true.

As to the truth or falsity of these charges we will have little to say; except that our legislature has imposed a heavy penalty against assessors, who negligently do their duty.

> Ms. Davidson is a lawyer and no one knows better the course of procedure under the law, to properly investigate these charges, than he does.'

It is this fact, that he has not take en the proper steps to have these charges investigated, that makes us suspicious that his (Davidson's) motive in preferring them may have been actuated by other considerations than the public good.


