Talf the Nickel Battle Won! [] But Prohibition Must Be Declared!

Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, the new minister of mines in the Hearst Government, handed out last night the following official announcement rearding nickel, following a study of the subject on his part since he came into office. It reads:

Conditions that have arisen out of the present war have made the nickel industry of Ontario the subject of a great deal of discussion.

The nickel lands of the Canadian Copper Company, the Mond Nickel Company, the British American Nickel Corporation, and other corporations and individuals, were sold years ago under a former government in tee simple, without any restrictions or limitations as to the working of the mines or the disposition of the products thereof.

The question, however, of refining nickel in Ontario is by no means a new one. It has received the attention of successive governments, and it was the well-known policy of the Whitney Government, as it of the present government, to do everything possible to secure the refining of nickel in Ontario, when satisfied that it was commercially practicable so to do.

To this end legislation was passed in 1907 authorizing the payment of a bonus of 6c per pound on nickel refined in this province, and that legislation is still in force. Moreover, the department of mines has constantly had this matter in view with the same object. The nickel industry in Ontario is a very large and important one, expending several millions of dollars in labor and supplies in this province, and up to the present time the government has not been convinced that any action preventing the export of nickel would not have the effect of transferring the nickel business, or a sutstantial part thereof, from Ontario to New Caledonia, Norway or elsewhere.

Up to the present there does not appear to have been any known process of refining the Sudbury copper-nickel matte that would have permitted of the operation being a commercial and economical success in Ontario.

Metallurgical science, however, has made rapid advances in recent years, and it may be that the conditions with respect to the nickel industry have materially changed. In order to ascertain all the facts and acquire full knowledge of the situation, it has been decided to appoint a commission to investigate the whole question. If the report of the commission makes clear the practicability of refining nickel in Ontario, the necessary steps will be taken to see that this is brought

This commission will also consider whether the nickel and other mining industries of the province are paying their full share of provincial taxation, and the proper basis upon which such taxation should be levied. The commission will have plenary power to exhaust every possible source of information and make a careful study of every phase of the question and make a complete report thereon to the

It is scarcely necessary to add that a subject of such magnitude and complexity can only be properly dealt with by men of exceptional ability, and those to be selected will be men of special qualifications, who will command the fullest confidence of the public.

Cecil Chesterton Says the Rights of Man Must Triumph in the War.

this present war," said Cecil Chesterton, the eminent English journalist and lecturer who spoke to the Can-adian Club at luncheon in Dunning's yesterday, "is that the enemies of the ast generation are coming together, because they have seen something iominant and apparently omnipotent which they hate more than they hate each other, and they are right." It had been true, he declared, since

the days of Federick the Great, who had pooh-poohed treatiles as "pretty fiftigmee work," of Bismarck, whose predecessors had taken whole states from their neighbors, and he felt that he could do the same, and it was true now of Von Bethmann-Hollweg who had referred to the treaty covering Belgian neutrality as "a scrap of paper." It was the German belief that "rights" were the prerogative of supermen or Prinssians.

Mr. Chesterton spoke on "The French Revolution and Modern Europe" and he showed by an anayists of the causes which led to the great French upheaval how the rights of man had been preserved thru it all. Ever since 1870, he said, the cloud of German ascendancy had hung over Europe. What he hoped for was a confederation of the nations which would preserve the ideals for which France had stood and which must surely triumph.

LIES IN GROWING FLAX

. G. Crawford of Belfast Says Industry Would Prove Paying Proposition.

As the result of the German invasion of Belgium and the ruthless laying to waste of that country, 83 per cent. of the flax resources of the world have been cut off. "Few people in Canada realize the significance of this fact," said J. G. Crawford, secretary of the York Street Flax Spinning Mils of Belfast, Ireland, last night. Mr. Crawford came to Canada some weeks ago on his own initiative to see what could be done to increase the output of flax fibre in this country, and to interest capital here in the improvement of the methods used to produce raw material for use in Britain and France.

ment of the methods used to produce raw material for use in Britain and France.

"Flax fibre for spinning figures largely in the manufacture of army supplies, being used for weaving all grades of canvas, used in tents, stretchers for Red Cross work, aeroplane construction and also for thread used in stitching shoes, and all kinds of saddlery. Some idea of the extent of the industry may be judged by the fact that in the Beifast Spinning Mils, with which I am associated, there are 4500 employes.

1 "With the almost complete elimination of the supply of raw material, which we have relied upon in the past, we have been forced to look elsewhere for fibre to fill the demand, and therefore I have made this trip to Canada and investigated the situation thruout the country from coast to coast. At present no flax fibre is being cultivated in western Canada, as the farmers use what little is grown for seed purposes, but in Ontario, and particularly in Huron, Lambton and Essex Counties, the opportunities for producing flax fibre for spinning are most promising."

Mr. Crawford stated that only 140 tons of flax fibre were raised in Ontario during 1914 and but nine mills dressed flax for spinning. "I tell you, Ontario doesn't realize the great opportunity that lies to ber hand." he said earnestly. "There are twenty-five mills in western Ontario which produced nothing last year. They have their equipment standing idle and a high grade of fibre could be produced if modern methods were used and these mills put into operation. If these methods are employed and the western Ontario farmers will turn their attention to developing this industry, my experience tells me that without added expense the quality of output could be raised to a standard that would rival that of the producers in Europe who have been ruined by the war. With proper attention a forty per cent increase in price over what is being palid now for the Ontario raw material could be obtained abroad."



Characterization Made by Cecil Chesterton Before Large Audience.

PLANNED FOR ATTACK

Cecil Chesterton lectured in Massey Hall last night to an audience of over 2000. He is an entertaining speaker with a neat vein of facetiousness and a general style which would make him popular as a low comedian. He made his points clearly and aroused laughter and applause at will. Ho is not so massive as his celebrated brother, but has individuality of his

Premier Hearst esteemed it a high honor to preside. They were much indebted to His Grace Archbishop Mc-Neil. whose illness prevented his being present, for affording them an opportunity of listening to Mr. Chesterton, and he desired to express his own acknowledgments and welcome him.



Hydro - Electric Commission Interested in Entrances East and West.

MUNICIPALITIES AGREE

Two Hundred and Thirty-Four Included and Will Build.

When the special committee on rapid transit met Thursday afternoon Sir Adam Beck pointed out that the Hydro-Electric Radial Railway scheme had for its hub the City of Toronto. In other words Toronto is to become the centre of Ontario's radial railway system.

He said that the hydro commission was willing to assist in any way in the solving of Toronto's transportation problem. We are interested in the matter of entrances for our radial railways from the east and from the west. All the municipalities that have linked up with the hydro-radial system depend upon entrance into Toron.o, which is the hub of the territory we are preparing estimates for."

mates for."

The hydro-radial system includes 234 municipalities, and will have 1600 miles of railway. "The commission has developed into a hydro-electric radial commission, and in a sense a public utility commission in Ontario, and we must include Toronto in our scheme." said Sir Adam. The commission has received petitions from three municipalities for redials with a total mileage of about 90 miles, and these depend upon a rapid entrance to the City of Toronto. In planning the hydro-radial scheme the commission had in mind the scheme of the harbor board formulated about a year ago, which latter scheme is essential if the radials are to have a rapid entrance into the city. "If we can't get in rapidly the steam railways will be the steam railways wi

in rapidly the steam railways will beat us," he said. The hydro commission is only interested in Toronto so far as radial entrances are concerned, and Sir Adam pointed out that it was in the interest of the city to be a party to the scheme. He offered the city the assistance of the staff of the hydro-electric organization thru its engine.

Text of the radial system will run thru the Courts of Huron, Wellington, Stratford, F. an. Norfolk and Peel. Twelve munit palities have passed bylaws and ar preparing to issue debentures and the sork will be commenced as soon as the approval of the government is received. It is understood that these roads will be subsidized by the government. The commission is now preparing a plan for a rallway to run from the Humber, thru Milton and Guelph and on to London, and this will be ready within two months. The radials will carry freight, as well as passengers, and the road-bed and equipment will be equal to any in the province. Sir Adam Beck said that the hydro had been opposed to all franchises, bonuses and other privileges asked for by private companies in the municipalities where it was interested, and advised Toronto to take the same attitude.



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

BERLIN, Feb. 5, via wireless to Sayville.—The German Government, there a neutral channel, has protested strongly against Russia's intention to sentence like criminals the crew of the German Parsefal balloon shot down near Libau, says the overseas news agency. 
