ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY LIES IN GROWING FLAX

J. G. Crawford of Belfast Says Industry Would Prove Paying Proposition.

As the result of the German invasion of Belgium and the ruthless laying to waste of that country, 33 per cent of the flax resources of the world have been cut off. "Few people in Canada realize the significance of this fact," said J. G. Crawford, secretary of the York Street Flax Spinning Mills of Belfast, Ireland, last night. Mr. Crawford came to Canada some weeks ago on his own initiative to see what could be done to increase the output of flax fibre in this country, and to interest capital here in the possibilities of the methods used to produce raw material for use in Britain and France.

Flax fibre for spinning fibres largely in the manufacture of army supplies, being used for weaving all grades of canvas, used in tents, machine construction and also for thread used in stitching shoes, and all kinds of saddlery. Some idea of the extent of the industry may be judged by the fact that in the Belfast Spinning Mills, with which I am associated, there are 4500 employees. With the almost complete elimination of the supply of raw material, which we have relied upon in the past, we have been forced to look elsewhere for fibre to fill the demand, and therefore I have made this trip to Canada and investigated the situation throughout the country from coast to coast. At present no flax fibre is being cultivated in western Canada, as the farmers use what little is raised for seed purposes in Ontario, and particularly in Huron, Lambton and Essex Counties, the opportunity for producing flax fibre for spinning are most promising.

Mr. Crawford stated that only 145 tons of flax fibre were raised in Ontario during 1914 and but nine million dressed flax for spinning. "I tell you, Ontario doesn't realize the great opportunity that lies before her," he said earnestly. "There are twenty-five million in western Ontario who have produced nothing last year. They have produced nothing standing idle, and a high grade of fibre could be produced by modern methods, which would be put into operation. If these mills were employed and the same methods are employed and the western Ontario farmers who turn their attention to developing this industry, my experience tells me that without added expense the quality of output could be raised to the standard in Europe who have been ruined by the war. With proper attention a few per cent increase in the price of the material could be obtained abroad."

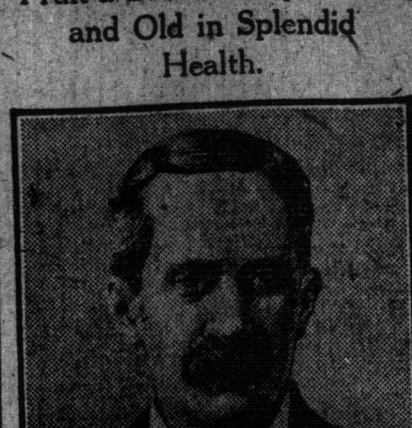

PARIS, Feb. 5.—Austro-German troops along the Serbian frontier have been dispersed along an immense front because of the menace presented by the possibility of Roumania's entrance into the war, and plans for a new offensive against Serbia have been abandoned in consequence, declares the Petit Parisien, which does not give the source of its information, but declares it authentic. In the meantime, the Serbians are completely rearming and refitting their army and have received large reinforcements of reserves and supplies of munitions.

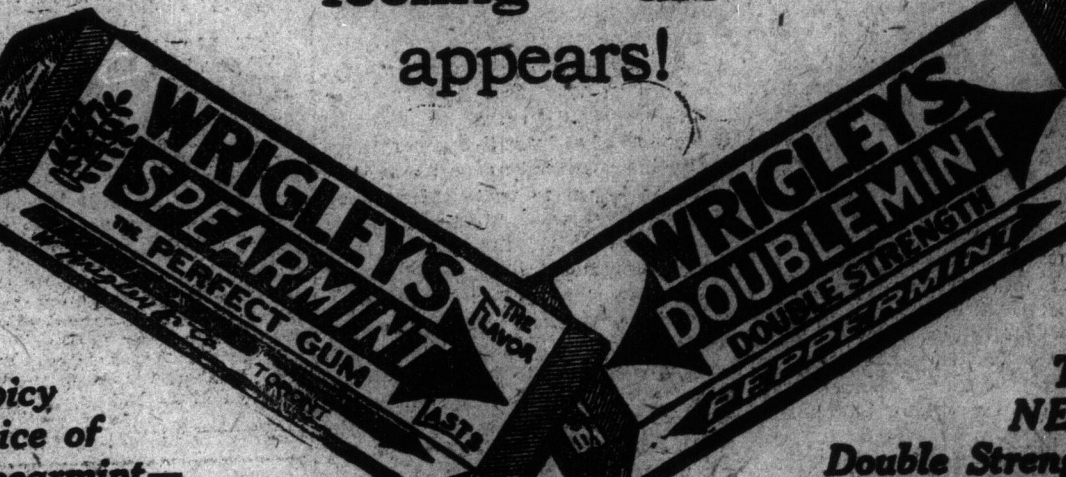

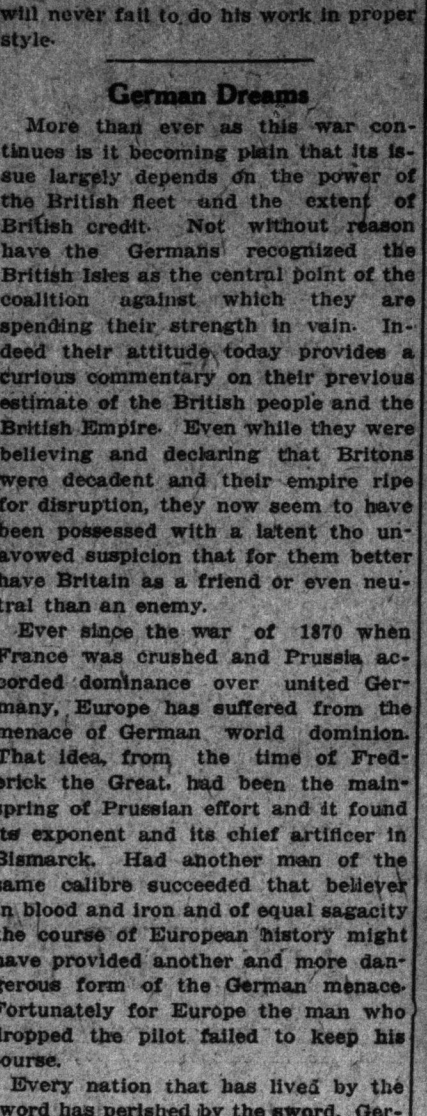

GRANTS NEW TRIAL TO CLYDE GARAGE

Windsor Company Awarded Damages, But Verdict Not Entered. WOULD QUASH BYLAW

Ottawa Concern is Liable to Legislation According to Decision.

In the first appellate court at Osgoode Hall yesterday, the Curry and Clyde Garage Company of Windsor was granted a new trial in the action against the Sandwich and Windsor Railway Company for damages. The case was tried before Mr. Justice Middleton and a jury and the company was awarded \$1069 damages, but Justice Middleton refused to enter the verdict. In an application before Mr. Justice Lennox the Major Hill Taxicab and Transfer Company of Ottawa asked that a bylaw passed by the board of police commissioners of Ottawa requiring all owners of livery business and drivers to have a license at \$5 and \$1 respectively, be quashed on the grounds that the board has no power to pass such legislation. His lordship thought that the matter of whether the company was different from any other was the real question for him to decide and he concluded that it was liable to legislation. With regard to the drivers' fees, he said the question of quashing the bylaw was quite discretionary and he was of the opinion that it was better to leave the matter as if it had not been included in the motion. Called to the Bar. Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, M.P. and postmaster-general in the Laurier government, was called to the Ontario Bar before Mr. Justice Sutherland. The ceremony was attended by a number of the bench and those most prominent among the members of the Upper Canada Law Society. Mr. Lemieux was introduced by G. F. Shepley, K.C. The new Ontario council was afterwards entertained to luncheon by the benchers. Other graduates sworn in yesterday were: Harvey Obee, Howard Morwick, Stanley Le Vernols, Bruce Fitzgerald Fisher and William Alfred Olmstead. The appellate court reserved judgment in the Wetland Soots Act case. Mr. Justice Lennox declared the vote invalid and held that the bylaw could be submitted again. AGGRESSIVE WAR AND UNPROVOKED Characterization Made by Cecil Chesterton Before Large Audience.

PLANNED FOR ATTACK Germany and Austria Had Designs on Serbia Two Years Ago.

Ocell Chesterton lectured in Massey Hall last night to an audience of over 2000. He is an entertaining speaker with a neat vein of facetiousness and a general style which would make him popular as a low comedian.

He made his points clearly and accurately, and his delivery was full of laughter and applause at all times. He is not so massive as his celebrated brother, but has individuality of his own.

Premier Hearst esteemed it a high honor to preside. They were much indebted to His Grace Archbishop McNeil, whose illness prevented his being present for affording them an opportunity of listening to Mr. Chesterton, and he desired to express his own acknowledgments and welcome him.

This said Mr. Chesterton: was outside ordinary categories, and one of entirely unprovoked aggression, one power using another as a cat's paw. They had the word of the prime minister of Italy that Germany and Austria contemplated an attack on Serbia in 1913, and had invited Italy to participate.

It was not on account of the murder of the archduke that Germany wanted to go to war while the world was still walking around in good faith. Austria declared war against Serbia, and Russia came to its aid.

Part of Policy. The soldiers in the passion of war, or by troops getting out of hand, but as in the bombardment of Scarborough, were part of a settled policy, as was proved by their official proclamations. He hoped that any of the officers who acted on the proclamations, under which innocent civilians were shot, would be treated as murderers if caught by the allies.

TORONTO THE HUB OF RADIAL SYSTEM

Hydro-Electric Commission Interested in Entrances East and West.

MUNICIPALITIES AGREE

Two Hundred and Thirty-Four Included and Will Build.

When the special committee on rapid transit met Thursday afternoon Sir Adam Beck pointed out that the Hydro-Electric Radial Railway scheme had for its hub the City of Toronto. In other words Toronto is to become the centre of Ontario's radial railway system.

He said that the hydro commission was willing to assist in any way in the solving of Toronto's transportation problem. "We are interested in the matter of entrances for our radial railways from the east and from the west. All the municipalities that have linked up with the hydro-radial system upon entrance into Toronto, which is the hub of the territory we are preparing estimates for."

The hydro-radial system includes 234 municipalities, and will have 1600 miles of railway. "The commission has developed into a hydro-electric radial commission, and in a sense a public utility commission in Ontario, and we must include Toronto in our scheme," said Sir Adam. The commission has received petitions from three municipalities for radials with a total mileage of about 30 miles, and these depend upon a rapid entrance to the City of Toronto. In planning the hydro-radial scheme the commission had in mind the scheme of the harbor board formulated about a year ago, which was considered essential if the radials are to have a rapid entrance into the city. If we can't get rapidly the city railways will be lost," he said.

The hydro commission is only interested in Toronto so far as radial entrances are concerned, and Sir Adam pointed out that it was the interest of the city to be a party to the scheme. He offered the city the assistance of the staff of the hydro-electric organization thru its engineer.

Car Lines Touched. Part of the radial system will run thru the Counties of Huron, Wellington, Stratford, E. York, Norfolk and Peel. Twelve municipalities have passed bylaws and are preparing to issue debentures and the work will be commenced as soon as the approval of the government is received. It is understood that these roads will be subsidised by the government. The commission is now preparing a plan for a railway to run from the Humber, thru Milton and Guelph and on to London, and this will be ready within two months. The radials will carry freight, as well as passengers, and the road-bed equipment will be equal to any in the province. Sir Adam Beck said that the hydro had been opposed to all franchises, bonuses and other privileges asked for by private companies in the past. He said that he was interested, and advised Toronto to take the same attitude.

CANADA WILL VOTE HUNDRED MILLION

Premier's Resolution Will Probably Be Adopted Without Discussion.

- Resolved, that it is expedient to provide that a sum not exceeding one hundred million dollars (\$100,000,000) be granted to his majesty toward defraying any expenses that may be incurred by or under the authority of the Governor-in-council during the year ending the 31st day of March 1916, for:
 - The defence and security of Canada.
 - The conduct of all military operations in any part of Canada.
 - The promotion of Trade.
 - Promoting the maintenance of trade, industry and business communications, whether by means of insurance indemnity against war risk or otherwise, and
 - The carrying out of any measures

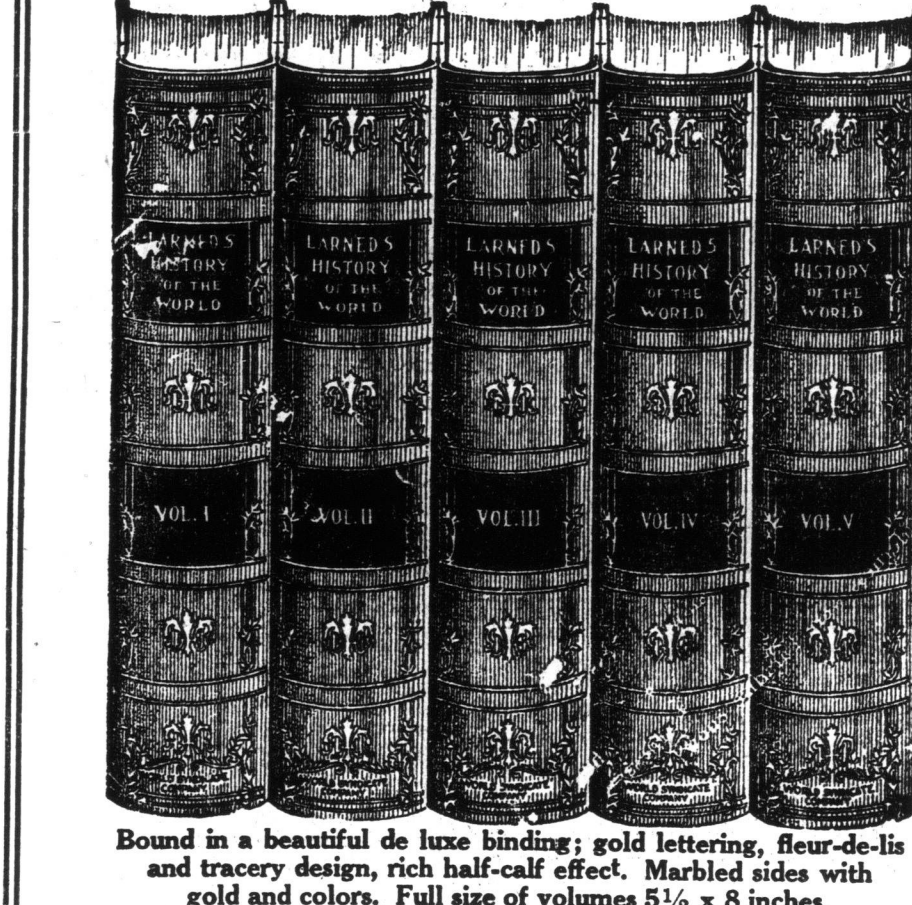

FEDERAL REVENUE HOLDING UP WELL

Increase in January Only Slightly Over a Million and a Half.

INCREASE IN EXCISE Postoffice and Several Other Departments Also Show Gains.

The January statement of the finance department shows a picking up in excise duties. The revenue from this source was \$1,640,121, an increase of \$121,614 over a year ago.

The postoffice revenue of \$1,385,900 was an increase of \$18,646, while public works, railways and canals and miscellaneous sources also showed increases.

The customs revenue of \$4,787,215 was more than two millions less than the same month last year. The total revenue from all sources of nearly 15 millions was only a little over a million and a half less than last year.

The net debt of the Dominion increased by \$18,500,000 during January, and now stands at \$35,000,000.

Temporary loans are \$38,000,000 as compared with \$275,000,000 a year ago. Dominion notes have been increased from \$12,000,000 to \$15,000,000.

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GERMANY'S THREAT MERELY A BLUFF?

British Naval Experts Think So Despite Submarine's Recent Exploits.

Special Cable to The Toronto World. LONDON, Feb. 5.—Germany's threat about a submarine blockade is received with mixed emotions.

It is a bluff, and that Germany is setting up a jack-of-lantern, to scare the people. While it is admitted that the exploits of the U 21 in the Irish channel last week show the damage that can be done, it is not believed that Germany has a submarine fleet capable of causing any total paralysis of commerce.

Bigger ships which can make over 15 knots are protected from submarine attack by their speed. Slow going freighters, however, are more vulnerable.

America's attitude toward this new method of warfare is a subject of the keenest interest, particularly in view of Germany's open declaration of unrestricted submarine warfare.
