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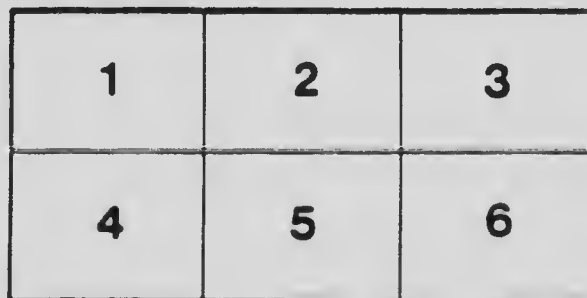
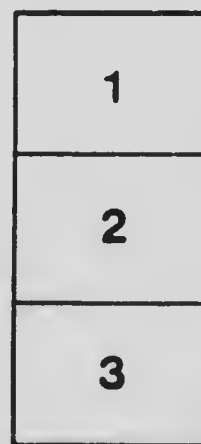

MINUTES OF SPECIAL MEETING

Held in the Board Room of the College, Feb. 24th and 25th, 1910.

THURSDAY, February 24th, 1910.

The Special Meeting of the Council of the Ontario College of Pharmacy, called by the President on February the 24th to consider amendments to the Pharmacy Act and other business, was held in the Board Room of the College at 2.30 p.m. on Thursday, the 24th inst. and on the following day, President Hargreaves in the chair, and the following members were present: Messrs. Henry Watters, E. W. Case, J. H. H. Jun., John F. Taylor, C. T. Adams, Alex. Stewart, R. A. Harrison, W. A. Karn, J. F. Roberts, E. R. Wigle and A. J. Johnston.

The President said that he had taken on himself to call the meeting to consider some amendments to the Act which he thought might well be brought before the Legislature now in session, and also for considering any other business requiring immediate attention. He then called on the Registrar to read the proposed amendments, which were as follows:

BILL.

AN ACT TO AMEND "THE PHARMACY ACT."

HIS MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:

1. Schedule "A" of the Pharmacy Act as amended by Sec. 3 of the Act passed in the 9th year of His Majesty's reign, Chaptered 64, is amended by striking out the word "not" before the words "exceeding a 5 per cent. solution," in the third line of the said amending section.

2. Sec. 10 of The Pharmacy Act is amended by adding as Sub. Sec. 3 thereto the following:—S.S. 3. The Council of the said College may appoint, from time to time, from the members of the said College, one or more representatives to attend meetings of Inter-Provincial, Colonial or Imperial Pharmaceutical Associations, and the said Council may pay out of the College funds yearly, as annual membership fees, to any one or more of said Pharmaceutical Associations, such sums as it may deem proper, but not exceeding in the aggregate a sum equivalent to 50c for each member of the Ontario College of Pharmacy, and the payment of all such sums heretofore made by the said Council, is hereby ratified and confirmed.

Moved by H. Southcott, seconded by E. R. Wigle, that the Council go into a Committee of the Whole to discuss the proposed amendments to the Pharmacy Act. Carried.

The Council then went into a Committee of the Whole, Vice-President Harrison in the chair.

After being in session until 6 p.m. the Committee rose, and on the Council resuming with President Hargreaves in the chair, the Chairman of the Committee announced that he was unable to report.

Moved by A. J. Johnston, that the Council do now adjourn, to meet on Friday at 2 p.m. Carried.

FRIDAY, February 25th, 1910.

The Council met at 2 p.m., President Hargreaves in the chair, and all the members present.

Moved by A. J. Johnston, seconded by J. H. H. Jury, that this Council do now go into a Committee of the Whole to again discuss the proposed amendments to the Act. Carried.

The Council then went into Committee of the Whole, Vice-President Harrison in the chair, discussed the proposed amendments, then rose and the Council resumed, President Hargreaves in the chair.

Chairman Harrison reported that the Council in Committee of the Whole decided to strike out Clause 1 of the proposed amendments, and adopted a resolution made by Messrs. Watters and Karn, that the words "from the members of the said College" be struck out, and that the words "or o' r" be added in place of "Colonial or Imperial," and that the words "yearly as annual membership fee" be struck out, and also the words "but not exceeding in the aggregate a sum equivalent to fifty cents yearly for each member of the Ontario College of Pharmacy."

Moved by A. J. Johnston, seconded by E. W. Case, that the report of the Committee be concurred in and adopted. Carried.

Moved by C. T. Adams, seconded by J. F. Roberts, that the Divisional Committee be instructed to report at the next meeting as to a redistribution of the electoral divisions, and that such Committee give due notice of the necessary amendments to the By-laws for such purpose, pursuant to By-law No. 24. Carried.

Moved by H. Watters, seconded by R. A. Harrison, that in view of the proposed amendment to the Pharmacy Act and desirability of securing authority to register Apprentices who may be deficient in one or more subjects at the time of application for apprenticeship, it is resolved that this Council do apply to the Legislature for amendment to Clause 13, Sub-Section 2, by adding, "and to accept as sufficient for registration, applicants who may be deficient in not more than two subjects; provided, however, that these subjects be passed to the satisfaction of this Council at any period prior to commencement of college course of lectures. Carried.

Moved by Henry Watters, seconded by Alex. Stewart, that the minutes of this session of the Council be printed and embodied in the printed report of the June (next) session. Carried.

Moved by J. F. Roberts, seconded by E. W. Case, that this Council do now adjourn, to meet again the first Monday in June, or at the call of the President.

MINUTES OF SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING

The Semi-Annual Meeting of the Ontario College of Pharmacy was held at the Board Room of the College at 2 p.m. on Monday, June 6th, 1910, and four following days. The following members were present: Henry Watters, Ottawa; E. W. Case, Picton; J. H. H. Jury, Bowmanville; J. F. Taylor, Toronto; John Hargreaves, Toronto; Alexander Stewart, Guelph; H. Southcott, St. Catharines; R. A. Harrison, Dunnville; J. F. Roberts, Parkhill; E. R. Wigg, Warton, and A. J. Johnston, Sarnia.

President John Hargreaves occupied the chair, and called on the Registrar to read the minutes of the last Semi-Annual Meeting, held in December, 1909, which he proceeded to do, when it was moved by A. J. Johnston, seconded by H. Southcott, that the minutes of the December session having been printed and distributed to the members of this College, be taken as read. Carried.

The resignation of Mr. W. A. Kurn, of Woodstock, as a member of this Council for District 10, was then read.

Moved by A. J. Johnston, seconded by H. Watters, that the resignation of Mr. W. A. Kurn for District No. 10 be received, and that this Council do not accept the resignation, but regrets that his illness prevents his being present at this session.

Communications were read and referred to the various Committees, and the letters from the Secretaries of Cape Colony, Ireland, New Brunswick and Scotland Pharmaceutical Associations were ordered to be placed on file on motion as follows:

Moved by Henry Watters, seconded by E. W. Case, that communications from the Pharmaceutical Association of Cape Colony and others, acknowledging receipt of greetings from this College, be received and placed on file. Carried.

The following communication from the Registrar-Treasurer was then read:

TORONTO, June 6, 1910.

To the President and Council of the O. C. P.:

GENTLEMEN,—I have been much troubled since an article appeared in the Canadian Pharmaceutical Journal from the pen of Mr. John F. Taylor, who was, at the time, a newly elected member of your honorable body, attacked this office by insinuating that the secrecy of the ballot was at stake, and so much so that the Editor of that journal in an editorial took the matter up as a slander on your humble servant, the writer.

I called Mr. Taylor's attention to the matter personally in this office and demanded a retraction, which he promised to make by writing a letter to the journals and assured me that he had no intention of libelling, slandering or insulting me in any way, but on the contrary, held a very high opinion of me and respected me very much, and if the journals would not publish his letter he promised me that he would right the matter by mailing a letter to the druggists of the Dominion to show them that he did not intend to implicate me in any such dirty work as revealing the secrecy of your ballot, etc., which satisfied me; but such has not been done, and this

may be an oversight on the part of Mr. Taylor; neither have the journals contained any such letter, nor have the druggists of the Dominion received it, and owing to this fact I feel that I should submit this matter to you and demand an explanation from Mr. Taylor, and also a retraction to be incorporated in the minutes of this Council meeting, as it is a matter seriously affecting the character of an official who should be free from such accusatory standing against him.

Moved by E. W. Case, that this Council do now adjourn to meet on Tuesday at 2.30 p.m. Carried.

TUESDAY, 7th June, 1910.

The Council met at 2.30 p.m., President John Hargreaves in the chair, all members present except Mr. Karn.

President Hargreaves presented his address:

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

To the Council of the Ontario College of Pharmacy:

GENTLEMEN,—Meeting you once again around our Board is one of the great pleasures of anticipation to which I have looked forward for some weeks. That all with one exception are enjoying such apparent good health is indeed a cause for great thankfulness.

It is a most painful duty which compels me to report that our revered and esteemed member, Mr. W. A. Karn, is prevented through illness from being present in the chair which he has so capably occupied on this Council for many, many years, and I am assured every member of our Council will respond to a fervent prayer to the great Author of Life and Health, that our brother may soon be restored to his wonted health and strength. It is also fitting that we should extend to his wife and daughter our heartfelt sympathies in such a time of trial and sorrow.

The passing away of our beloved and Most Gracious Majesty King Edward VII. is indeed a distressing loss to the nation he so ably, acceptably and wisely governed. It is recognized as almost a calamity to the nobler and better interests of the entire world. All nations seem to mourn with us, thereby betokening the exalted place our King has attained to by his prudent, upright and honorable conduct of the affairs of his kingdom and its relations to other nations and powers. May I suggest the appointment of a capable Committee to draft a suitable resolution of condolence with Her Majesty the Mother Queen Alexandra, in her great sorrow and bereavement, and that the same Committee should convey our congratulations and vows of allegiance to His Majesty King George V. on his succession to the throne of a kingdom such as Great Britain.

The report of our Registrar-Treasurer, which will be presented for your consideration, is most gratifying, showing, as it does, that careful, watchful diligence has been devoted to the conduct and administration of the various financial, educational and legal matters pertaining to the best interests of the College and all its members. I need not refer at greater length to the value of such service, as you will have his report in detail, to which I trust you will accord the earnest deliberation it will merit.

I desire to thank all the members of the Council for their attendance at the special meeting which was convened here on Thursday, February 24th last, for the purpose of considering and approving of an amendment to the Pharmacy Act. As you are aware, an amendment was granted to the Act by the Ontario Legislature which it is expected will prove of great value in promoting greater advancement and progress in the pharmaceutical interests, not only of this Province, but also the whole Dominion of Canada. We are indebted to the Government of this Province for the just recognition of our request, and to the members of our Council, Messrs. Roberts and Johnston, for their devotion, wisdom and guidance which enabled us to secure the sought-for amendment.

The number of registrations of apprentices to date desiring to take the ensuing College course indicates the value of our teaching department and the splendid results of our students in the examinations just concluded, are unmistakable evidences of the value of the high standard of education of the students who are now to attend our courses of lectures, and also of the great efficiency of the faculty and equipment you have provided to impart the instruction required in an up-to-date pharmaceutical school. I am indeed proud to note the following comparison of the results of our recent examination with the best reports of examinations held in Britain. In Ontario, out of a class of 100 students presenting themselves for our examination, 76 were successful, 24 passed in five subjects, and four failed entirely. In England and Wales, out of 28 candidates who went up for the major examination, fourteen failed, and out of 189 candidates for the minor examination, 115 failed. In Edinburgh three major candidates were examined, one failed, and out of 75 minor candidates examined, 38 failed. In Ireland, out of 31 for the major examination, eight were successful and 23 were rejected. In the minor examination four passed and seven were rejected. May I suggest that such a comparative result should be evidence to the British Pharmaceutical Society of the preliminary educational standing of our students, of the thoroughness of our curriculum, and of the fitness of our graduates to receive full legal recognition of their diploma by any Pharmaceutical Society or body in the British domain or in any other part of the world.

I believe it is our duty to the public to have attention directed to the loose and careless manner in which many powerful and noxious poisons and drugs are put upon the market for sale to the public as proprietary or patent medicines. No proprietary article containing the scheduled poisons of any Provincial Pharmacy Act should be manufactured and placed on sale to the public unless such preparation be manufactured under the supervision of a person legally qualified to dispense and sell such poisons in the Province where the article or preparation is manufactured. I would advise that this information be presented to the Minister of Inland Revenue through the Legislative Committee of the C. Ph. A.

In regard to the regulations governing the sales of cocaine and its salts, we have good reason to believe that the provisions are strictly observed by the great majority of the members of our College and also by the wholesalers in our Province. It is my firm opinion that the wholesalers are quite desirous of regulating and restricting the sales of habit-forming drugs, and that they are eager to co-operate with movements intended to carry out the provisions as contained in the Act. I would therefore recommend to the Chairman of the Infringement Committee the advisability of arranging with the Inspector to interview all wholesalers, requesting permission to inspect their record of sales with a view of ascertaining the quantities of these drugs purchased by those suspected of violation of the Act.

A correspondence course for apprentices under the authority of our College was considered and reported by the Committee on Education in December last. In my humble opinion this is an exceedingly important question, deserving of continued serious consideration at your hands.

To correct an erroneous impression created in the minds of some of our members that a Correspondence Course is intended to supplant a College course, I beg to repeat my opinion that a well organized and systematic correspondence course is required to be auxiliary and supplementary to the present College course, to prepare the students or apprentices upon a foundation which the College faculty may hope to finish a class of pharmacists much more thoroughly equipped both in practical and theoretical knowledge than is possible with the College course alone, and to do for the apprentice what is sometimes neglected by his preceptor to-day. Such instruction should increase the practical efficiency of the student during his apprenticeship term, enhance his value to his employer, lighten his work during the College term, and give him the status and advantage of a four years' course of study.

I also submit that the question is worthy of reconsideration from the fact that apprentices in Canada and Ontario are now taking instruction by correspondence from Colleges outside our Dominion. Surely the difficulties presenting themselves in opposition to such a course of systematic home study do not compare with the task originally undertaken by a Council of this College to found the College course of instruction, and which now occupies the very high position we are so justly proud of.

If the Committee of Education will consent to reconsider this question I will be pleased to submit to them some few outlines of methods and information in my hands.

Many interesting and important questions will be in the hands of Committees to be reported by the Chairman at this session. The Registrar is in possession of a large list of inquiries from members and students of our College. To all these I bespeak your earnest consideration and in all the questions of importance which will be placed before you and which you will be called upon to adjust, I trust you will accord that wisdom and judgment which has at all times been so earnestly devoted to matters concerning the welfare of the members of our College as affected by the Act under which we are allowed to govern.

A communication from Prof. Paul L. Scott, requesting more microscopes, etc., was received and referred to the Education Committee.

Accounts were presented and referred to the Finance Committee.

Chairman Roberts presented Report No 1 of the By-laws and Legislation Committee, as follows:

REPORT No. 1 OF COMMITTEE ON BY-LAWS AND LEGISLATION.

1. *Re* application of J. W. McCollum, Tillsonburg, who requests to be registered as a member of the College on the strength of holding a Pharmaceutical Certificate from the State Board of South Dakota, your Committee recommend that his request be not granted, as we have no reciprocal relations with that State.

2. *Re* application of A. P. Newell, Arthur, Ont., who makes application to have his registration date from Jan. 1st, 1908, we recommend that his request be granted on producing to the Registrar a statutory declaration of time served.

3. *Re* application of Roy M. Collis, of Haileybury, we recommend that he be granted his diploma.

4. *Re* application of Bert Edgar Nyles, Stratford, who asks to be registered as an Apprentice from Sept. 1, 1909, he having produced the necessary educational qualifications, we recommend that his request be granted.

5. *Re* application of Walter J. Stevens, Toronto, who requests to be registered from Aug. 1, 1905, he having furnished statutory declarations of time served, we recommend that he be registered as an Apprentice with Jno. Stewart, Weston, from above date.

6. *Re* application of Lawrence P. Keane, Trenton, who requests that his apprenticeship be dated from July 10, 1909, he having had the necessary educational qualifications and produced a statutory declaration of time served, we recommend that his request be granted.

7. *Re* application of Augustine Campbell, Chatham, who asks to be registered as an Apprentice from May 12, 1909, your Committee recommend that his request be granted on the production of the necessary educational qualifications.

8. *Re* application of Thomas Nelson, Londonderry, Ireland, who requests that his educational qualifications and apprenticeship in Ireland be recognized, and that he be allowed to take the course and write on the qualifying examinations of this College, he having served four years of regular apprenticeship, as shown by statutory declarations from his preceptors and submitted his matriculation from the Royal University of Dublin, we recommend that his request be granted.

REPORT No. 1 OF EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

To the President and Members of the Ontario College of Pharmacy:

GENTLEMEN,—Your Committee on Education beg to submit their first report, as follows:

1. We recommend that diplomas, medals and John Roberts Scholarship be issued in conformity with the report of the Board of Examiners, to those candidates who have successfully passed their final examinations as held April 28th to May 6th, 1910.

2. We recommend that a suitable certificate be provided for the candidate winning the John Roberts Scholarship, and that the same be supplied to all candidates who are entitled to receive it, and that the cost be charged against the John Roberts Scholarship Fund.

3. *Re* request of W. H. Sanford, of Tottenham, asking for a diploma to replace one lost by fire, we recommend that the request be granted upon his furnishing the required statutory declaration and paying cost of new diploma.

TORONTO, June 9th, 1910.

To the President and Members of the Council, Ontario College of Pharmacy:

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to draw your attention to a matter which is of considerable importance to the Council and the honor of myself as late President of that body. On page 140 of the Canadian Pharmaceutical Journal, October, 1909, over his signature, Mr. John F. Taylor, a member of your Council, made the statement that "Even the secrecy of the ballot, under the provisions of the Pharmacy Act, is no protection to you; his intimate connection (as President) with the inner workings of the O. C. P. office are what ye did not calculate on when ye thought to hide yourselves in the 'cave of adullm' (the ballot box)."

This statement is a serious reflection on the honor and integrity of the two Executive officers of your body—the President and Secretary.

By a report presented yesterday of a Special Committee, which I find was adopted on motion of Mr. Watters, seconded by Mr. Taylor, the Registrar-Treasurer is entirely cleared of responsibility in the matter. This leaves the charge as standing against the President. Under such an imputation I do not care to remain. I therefore demand an investigation by a Committee of your Council, before whom I will appear as to the truth of this charge. I further suggest that Mr. Taylor be not made a member of that Committee, as he was on the Committee investigating against Mr. Graham.

I make this demand as my right and also as the right of the Council over which I presided.

Mr. R. A. Harrison presented Report No. 2 of the Education Committee:

REPORT No. 2, EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

To the President and Members of the O. C. P.:

GENTLEMEN:

1. Your Committee are heartily in sympathy with the views expressed in the communication of Mr. W. M. Kirkland, of Galt, Ont., but do not believe we have power to give practical effect to his suggestions, as the question of dispensing by physicians is beyond the scope of this College, and the problem of Apprentices has been frequently considered and no solution appears to relieve this condition, and moreover, the same condition obtains in nearly every other calling, so that it would seem that the cause must be looked for in some source not confined to the pursuit of Pharmacy. It might be profitably considered whether the adoption of more reasonable hours of service devoted to the conduct of the business of the Pharmacist and more adequate remuneration for the services of Apprentices and Assistants, would not present greater attraction to those seeking a life pursuit, and thus in some measure bring relief.

2. *Re* the application of John F. Hunter, of Orillia, Ont., who asks for a new diploma to replace one destroyed or lost, we recommend that his application be granted, and we further recommend that all arrears of fees be satisfactorily adjusted with the Registrar-Treasurer, having regards to the number of years for which he is liable.

3. We recommend that contracts with the members of the Faculty be renewed on the same terms as at present in force.

4. We recommend that the report of the Dean be adopted and printed in the minutes.

DEAN'S REPORT.

To the Committee on Education:

GENTLEMEN,—The Junior Examinations of the recent past session of the College were in progress while the December meeting of the Council was being held, and hence why the following report could not be submitted to the Council at an earlier date.

These examinations were held on November 29th and 30th and December 7th to 11th, 1909, inclusive.

Eighty candidates were examined, and of this number seventy-one were successful; five received stars and four failed, as is shown by the exhibits submitted herewith.

Candidates who obtained 80 per cent. or more of the total number of marks were granted First Class Honors; those securing 75 to 80 per cent. Second Class Honors, while those who received 50 per cent. or more with a minimum of 40 per cent. in each subject, were given a Pass.

The papers for these examinations are attached hereto, designated "Exhibit A."

The classified list of successful candidates is shown in "Exhibit B."

Supplemental Examinations, for those who failed to pass in December, were held on January 3rd. "Exhibit C" shows the results.

The Senior Term commenced on Tuesday, the 4th January, 1910, and continued without interruption to the end, excepting four days allotted for Easter holidays. The President favored the class during the term with a talk on the "Ethics of the Pharmaceutical Profession," which was ably presented and enthusiastically received.

The programme for the Thirty-first Session of the College was dealt with at the last meeting of the Council.

PRACTICAL PHARMACY.

(Time allowed—two and a half hours).

N.B.—Neatness of work, order of arrangement and cleanliness of desk, locker and outfit, will enter as important factors in your ratings.

I. Make 75 Gms. of Syrup of Hydriodic Acid, according to the following formula:

Potassium Iodide	1.020 Gm.
Potassium Hypophosphite	0.065 Gm.
Tartaric Acid	0.980 Gm.
Refined Sugar	50 Gms.
Diluted Alcohol, and Distilled Water, of each enough to make	75 Gms.

Dissolve the Potassium Salts in 2 c.m.³ of Distilled Water, previously slightly warmed, and the Tartaric Acid in 4 c.m.³ of Diluted Alcohol. Pour the solution of the Potassium Salts into the solution of Tartaric Acid, and agitate the mixture briskly; then place it in an ice-bath for 30 minutes.

Dissolve the sugar in 28.4 c.m.³ of Distilled Water with the aid of heat, and strain through cotton while hot. Filter the solution of Hydriodic Acid into 65 Gms. of the Syrup. Rinse the flask and wash the filter with 2 c.m.³ of Diluted Alcohol; then add enough Syrup to make 75 Gms., and mix thoroughly.

GENTLEMEN,—Your Committee have carefully considered the advisability of redistributing the Electoral Territorial Division of the Province. This we believe is rendered necessary by the large increase of population in the northern districts of the Province, and your Committee recommend that action be taken to give this recommendation effect.

Chairman Johnston presented report of the Infringement Committee, as follows:

REPORT No. 1 OF INFRINGEMENT COMMITTEE.

To the President and Members of the Ontario College of Pharmacy:

GENTLEMEN,—Your Committee on Infringement beg leave to report the following:

1. Your Inspector has visited many parts of the Province, and reports that in the main the Pharmacists are endeavoring to conduct their business in strict compliance with the Pharmacy Act, yet there are those who persist in conducting illegal stores, and it has been our endeavor to have the Inspector see these and have them comply with the requirements of the said Act.

2. The Inspector has found violations of the Act by the following:

H. Schofield, Toronto, selling cocaine.

W. W. Swaine, Toronto, selling poison (second offence).

W. A. Twiddy, Toronto, keeping open shop without graduate.

W. W. Porte, Brightou, keeping open shop and selling poison.

T. O. Apps, Paris, keeping open shop and selling poison.

H. Jeffery, Oakville, selling poison.

Jno. Roberts, Toronto, selling poison.

Jno. Brown, Toronto, selling cocaine.

Total fines collected from above.....	\$283 50
Expenses and detective's salary.....	224 81

Balance	\$58 69
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3. In the matter of the communication from Jno. Urquhart, Oakville, calling our attention to the style of advertising in some newspapers, which reflect on the standing and character of Pharmacists, we beg to state that we regret that the managers of newspapers and journals should permit their columns to be used to besmirch the character of any man; but as the offence is one common to the whole Dominion, we respectfully suggest that this matter be referred to the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association, and request our representatives to see that action is taken on the same.

4. In reference to the communication from the Honorable the Provincial Secretary, calling our attention to possible amendments to the Liquor License Act as regards the purchase of liquor by Pharmacists, we recommend that the Legislature of the Province of Ontario be requested to enact legislation empowering the Ontario College of Pharmacy to deal with flagrant violations of the License Act and grant an amendment to the Pharmacy Act permitting the O. C. P. to revoke the license of the O. C. P. for repeated offences of the License Act. We would also express the willingness of this College to undertake the prosecution of all offending druggists, and agree that all fines imposed be paid into the Treasury of the Province, the Province to bear the expense of any such prosecution.

We would further recommend that the Government of Ontario be requested to enact legislation empowering the Ontario College of Pharmacy to deal with flagrant violations of the License Act, and grant amendment to the Pharmacy Act, permitting the O. C. P. to revoke the license of the O. C. P. for repeated offences under the License Act. We would also express the willingness of the College to undertake prosecutions and agree that any fines imposed be paid into the funds of the Province, and that the Province bear the expenses of any such prosecutions.

And we further recommend that this Committee be empowered to take the question up with the Provincial Secretary. We further desire to express our approval in having this matter called to our attention, and to state that this College is in hearty accord with the Legislature in its effort to bring into effect such legislation as will curtail the illegal sale of spiritous liquors.

REPORT OF THE RESEARCH COMMITTEE.

To the President and Members of O. C. P.:

GENTLEMEN,—We, your Research Committee, beg to submit the following report:

We regret that owing to various circumstances there has been some delay in publishing the new edition of the Canadian Formulary, but the printers' proof is now in hand, and the completed job is promised by June 30th.

We commend the new edition to the careful consideration of all Pharmacists in the Dominion, and with their co-operation and support we feel confident that the best interests of every Physician and Physician concerned will be greatly advanced, as the adoption of a common standard for those preparations that are in general use must prove of great benefit not only to the two professions interested, but also to the public in general.

It is not an uncommon thing to find preparations entirely different in appearance and composition marked under the same name; on the other hand, preparations identical in character and appearance are often known by entirely different names, and these names are frequently vague and even misleading, in order to give some particular manufacturer a proprietary trade right to the name and preparation. These things lead to a confusion of ideas not in the interests of either the Physician, the Pharmacist or the public, and often necessitates the keeping in stock of identically the same preparation under two or three different names.

The adoption of the Canadian Formulary will do away with these unsatisfactory conditions, and not only this, but if the druggists of Canada will unite in calling the attention of their medical friends to the advantages of prescribing C. F. preparations, a long step forward will be taken in cementing that bond of sympathy that should exist in every community between these two sister professions.

In order to hasten the introduction of the Canadian Formulary to the Medical Profession, your Committee would make the following recommendations:

1. That all members of the Ontario College of Pharmacy be supplied with one copy of the Formulary free of charge on application to the Registrar, and that Pharmacists outside of the Province of Ontario, or those members of the College who desire extra copies for distribution to their medical friends be supplied with the regular edition at the following

prices: Single copies, 50c; 1 doz., \$4; 25 or over at 25c each, and with the more substantial edition in stiff covers, at the rate of 75c for single copies, or 50c in lots of 10 or over.

We would also recommend that each District Representative ask the members of his district to appoint a Special Research Committee to co-operate with your Committee in suggesting new preparations, etc., in connection with the research work of the College.

Your Committee would further recommend that a set of, say, 15 or 20 of the leading preparations of the Canadian Formulary, be supplied upon request to each District Representative for use at his district meeting.

We would also recommend that a suitable circular letter be prepared covering the important features and advantages of the Canadian Formulary work, and that each representative be supplied with a sufficient number of these to enable him to send out one with each notice when calling the district meeting.

We would further recommend that a carefully prepared circular be sent to each Physician in Ontario, calling attention to the C. F. and setting forth some of the advantages it offers to the Medical Profession and suggesting that they ask their local Druggist for particulars.

To the President and Members of the Council of the O. C. P.:

GENTLEMEN.—Your Committee on Finance and Executive beg to report as follows:

1. They recommend payment to the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association of their per capita tax for 50c for the year 1909.
2. That the salary of the Registrar-Treasurer be increased \$200 per year, in view of the increased cost of rent and other living expenses and in recognition of the efficient manner in which he discharges all the various duties of his office.

(NOTE.—Messrs. Case and Wigle asked to be placed on record as opposing increase in salary of Registrar).

Moved by Henry Watters, seconded by R. A. Harrison, that recognizing the need for greater powers in the registration of Apprentices in regard to educational qualification, it is deemed necessary and expedient to ask the Legislature for power to modify the terms of educational qualification to the extent of permitting compliance with the requirements to cover any

period previous to entering on the College course of instruction in any case in which not more than two subjects are lacking to complete full matriculation, and that application be made to the Legislature for amendment to the Pharmacy Act at the earliest opportunity.

Moved by R. A. Harrison, that this Council do now adjourn, to meet on Friday, 10th inst., at 9.30 a.m. Carried.

FRIDAY, June 10th, 1910.

The Council met at 9.30 a.m., all members present except Messrs. Adams and Karn, President Hargreaves in the chair.

Mr. Harrison, Chairman of the Divisional Committee, gave the following notice of motion:

I hereby give notice that I will at the next meeting of this Council move to amend By-law No. 10 by changing the boundaries of some or all of the Electoral Territorial Divisions of the Province, as may be considered necessary to give a more equitable division of the Province.

Chairman Roberts presented Report No. 3 of the By-laws and Legislation Committee, as follows:

REPORT No. 3 OF COMMITTEE ON BY-LAWS AND LEGISLATION.

1. *Re* application of A. H. Walton, Toronto, requesting to be registered as an Apprentice from Aug. 1, 1906, he having produced satisfactory educational qualifications, we recommend that his request be granted on the production of a statutory declaration of time served.

2. *Re* application of Percy J. Morton Sterling, who asks to be registered as an Apprentice, in compliance with his educational qualifications, we recommend that his request be granted on production of a statutory declaration of time served from his preceptor.

3. *Re* application of W. J. Cooper, Toronto, who requests to have his apprenticeship in Ireland allowed, and to register as an Apprentice in Ontario, to serve balance of time required by this College in Ontario, your Committee beg to recommend that his request be granted on production of a statutory declaration of time served in Ireland, he holding the educational diploma of the Royal University of Ireland.

4. Your Committee recommend that the amendments to the Pharmacy Act secured in the 1910 session of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, be printed and attached to each printed copy of said Pharmacy Act.

5. In the matter of the communication from the Attorney-General, in which he calls our attention to reported irregularities in the registration of one S. C. Cooper, Lion's Head, as an Apprentice, we beg to call attention to our report on this case in Report No. 4, Clause 4, of this Committee at the December session, 1909, in which we reported that after the most searching investigation that Mr. Cooper had statutory declarations that he had duly served his full apprenticeship, but that in view of the fact that his time from Jan. 18, 1906, to April 25 of the same year was questioned, we required that he furnish the Registrar with further satisfactory statutory declarations covering this period. These were accordingly filed, and we have them, three in number, now before us: from Rev. Jabez Gandier, clergyman; H. J. Adams, druggist; Charles Bedwell, lumbermen, all of Lion's Head. These gentlemen severally declare that his apprenticeship covering the above period was regularly served. We have a further statutory declaration from Mr. Adams that he served the balance of his apprenticeship. Having thus given the case every consideration possible, and in view of the fact that no evidence contrary to the above statutory

declarations were before us, we therefore recommend that a copy of this minute of this Committee and the one above referred to in the December session, be forwarded to the Department of the Attorney General.

6. Your Committee further recommends that the Solicitor prepare a suitable statutory declaration to cover the period of apprenticeship served.

7. Your Committee also desire to call the attention of Pharmacists to their negligence in failing to register Apprentices at commencement of their service. Attention to this matter on the part of preceptors would greatly assist the Registrar-Treasurer and save the apprenticeship much unnecessary inconvenience.

Chairman Stewart presented a special report of the Education Committee on the President's Address, as follows:

SPECIAL REPORT EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE ON PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

To the President and Members of the Ontario College of Pharmacy:

GENTLEMEN,—Your Committee asked to consider the address of the President beg to report as follows:

1. We note the appropriateness of the kindly and sympathetic reference made with regard to the protracted illness of our esteemed colleague at the Board, Mr. W. A. Karn, and beg to record our earnest approval of the action already taken by this Council with regard to his resignation. We deem such action as a mark of respect due one who has so faithfully and so long been a servant of the Pharmacists of this Province.

2. We heartily endorse the suggestion of the President with regard to appointing a Committee to draft a suitable resolution with reference to the death of his late Majesty King Edward VII., and a further resolution conveying our congratulations and expressive of our loyalty and allegiance to his successor, our new sovereign King George the Fifth.

3. We regard the tribute paid to the Registrar-Treasurer in referring to his report as greatly due him, and that appreciation of his services expressed in a more tangible form might well be considered by the Council.

4. The recognition of the untiring efforts of Messrs. Roberts and Johnston, and those representatives of the Council who have been so active in promoting and safeguarding the interests of the College in regard to matters of legislation, we note with satisfaction and pleasure.

5. It is interesting to note the statistical comparison embodied in the address with reference to the results of recent examinations held in various Colleges in the British Isles, and those of our College examinations, whether they may or may not be regarded as sufficient data upon which to base conclusions. We trust the day may soon come when the status of our graduates may be such as to command recognition and thus prove a strong factor in bringing about complete reciprocity in diplomas throughout the Empire and the ambition and desire expressed by the President become a wish fulfilled.

6. With reference to the sale of cocaine, we would respectfully draw the attention of the President to the closing part of Sub-section V. of Sec. 26 of the Pharmacy Act, which clearly provides that the books of wholesalers shall always be open to inspection by the proper authorities. We consider this to include the Inspector of this College.

7. In connection with the cocaine amendment, it is worthy of special note that wholesalers without the Province are not subject to the provisions of our Act, allowing them to sell cocaine into the Province of Ontario without restriction, thus discriminating against the wholesaler within the Province and making the Act ineffective. For this reason the legislation should, to properly meet the conditions, be federal in scope.

8. We consider the suggestion that the Minister of Inland Revenue, through the Legislation Committee of the C. P. A., should be approached *re* the compounding of patent and proprietary medicines containing poisons for sale to the public, to be a timely one. In our opinion the requiring by federal legislation that such medicines as contain any of the poisons mentioned in the schedule of the Patent and Proprietary Medicine Act of Canada, must be compounded by Chemists qualified under the laws of the respective Provinces in which such patent medicines are put up, would afford ample protection to the consuming public and to the members of the various Colleges of Pharmacy throughout the Dominion.

The matter of conducting a correspondence course for Apprentices in connection with this College has previously received consideration at the hands of this Committee. We have further considered the question and at this time do not deem the undertaking expedient.

We recommend that the Address of the President be incorporated in and printed in the minutes.

Chairman Stewart presented Report No. 3 of the Education Committee, as follows:

REPORT No. 3, EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

To the President and Members of the Ontario College of Pharmacy:

GENTLEMEN,—Your Committee beg leave to submit:

1. We recommend that the application of John F. Kobylanski, Toronto, Ont., who asks to be registered as an Apprentice, be granted.

2. *Re* requisition of Dr. Paul L. Scott for additional microscopes for his department, your Committee, while in sympathy with any useful additions to the College equipment, deems it expedient to be in possession of fuller particulars as to the requirements in this regard, and would request Dr. Scott to present same for consideration at December session of Council.

3. As the year 1911 records the twenty-fifth anniversary of the inauguration of teaching by the O. C. P., your Committee would recommend that suitable memorial should be considered by your Council and that a Committee be named to give effect to this suggestion and plans laid before Council for proper recognition of the event.

Chairman Southcott presented Report No. 3 of the Executive and Finance Committee, as follows:

REPORT No. 3, EXECUTIVE AND FINANCE COMMITTEE.

To the President and Members of the Council of the O. C. P.:

GENTLEMEN.—Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. Having examined the McGill Street property, we find it badly in need of repairs, and we feel that an investment of \$700 or \$800 in repairs and improvements would greatly increase our revenue. We therefore recommend that an architect be employed to look over the property and draw up specifications for said improvements; tenders be asked for said work, to be done under the supervision of the following Committee: the President, Registrar-Treasurer, Chairman of Finance, and Mr. Taylor.

2. Your Committee also recommend that the College building be painted, the same to be completed before the opening of the College.

3. Your Committee would further recommend a new floor in the cloak room, the renovating of the Registrar-Treasurer's office, and the fitting up of the upper front room in the College building for a library and reading room.

4. Your Committee recommend that the above work be carried out under the supervision of the following Committee: the President, Registrar-Treasurer, Chairman Finance and Chairman of Educational Committee.

5. Your Committee would also recommend that \$5,000 be invested in approved securities, said investment to be left in the hands of the President, Registrar-Treasurer and Chairman of Finance.

6. Your Committee would recommend, *re* resolution of E. R. Wigle, referred to this Committee, that consideration of same be deferred until the December meeting.

7. Your Committee recommend that the President notify the Bank of Commerce to accept the signature of the Registrar-Treasurer for returned cheques.

Moved by Alex. Stewart, seconded by A. J. Johnston, that the President, Vice-President, and the Registrar be a Committee to draft and forward the resolutions *re* death of King Edward VII, and the ascension to the throne of his successor, King George V., in accordance with the suggestion made in the Address of the President.

Moved by R. A. Harrison, seconded by J. F. Taylor, that we believe all future payments to the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association should be by annual grants as thought best, and that we notify that body to this effect. Lost.

Mr. Stewart called for the Yeas and Nays.

Yeas—Messrs. Stewart, Harrison, Taylor and Wigle.

Nays—Watters, Johnston, Jury, Southcott, Case, Roberts and President Hargreaves.

Moved by Henry Watters, seconded by Albert Johnston, that the grant to the C. P. A. be continued for another year, viz., not more than 50 cents per capita of membership of this College, taking June 15th register as basis. Carried.

Moved by Ed. W. Case, seconded by J. F. Roberts, that the President and Mr. Henry Watters be and they are hereby appointed as delegates of this College to the meeting of the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association, to be held at Halifax, with expenses paid other than their mileage.

Moved by Ed. W. Case, seconded by J. F. Roberts, that the sum of ten dollars (\$10) be voted Mr. Geo. E. Gibbard to cover postage, telegrams, etc., during his term of office as President of this College. Carried.

Moved by A. J. Johnston, seconded by Henry Watters, that this Council desire to place on record its appreciation of the clear and correct reports appearing in the city papers of the proceedings of this Council during the present session, and further desire to thank Mr. Douglas Eppes, of the Canadian Druggist; Miss Yarnold, Pharmacy Journal, and other reporters, for their excellent judgment and tact. Carried.

Moved by Henry Watters, seconded by Ed. W. Case, that this Council recognizes the need for more perfect preparation of Apprentices for the duties of their calling, and approves any practicable plan to meet this need. In furtherance of this conviction it is resolved that a Committee be appointed, consisting of Messrs. Wigle, Adams, Case and the mover, to report at the earliest opportunity to this Council. Carried.

Moved by Alex. Stewart, seconded by H. Southcott, *re* application of Wm. Rolls, of High River, for a new certificate, we recommend that his request be granted upon his furnishing requisite statutory declaration and fees covering the facts of the case. Carried.

Moved by E. R. Wigle, seconded by J. F. Taylor, that the minutes of this meeting, and also the special meeting in February, be printed in pamphlet form and sent to each registered Druggist in the Province. Carried.

Moved by Alex. Stewart, seconded by J. F. Taylor, that in order to give effect to the suggestion made in Report No. 3 the Education Committee, with reference to the 25th anniversary of the inauguration of teaching by this College, the following Committee be appointed, and that they present a report at next meeting of the Council: President, Vice President, Henry Watters, Dean, Registrar of College, and the mover. Carried.

Moved by J. F. Roberts, seconded by J. H. H. Jury, that this Council do now adjourn, to meet on the first Monday in December, 1910, at 2.30 p.m., or at the call of the President. Carried.
