

CLEMENCEAU ACCORDED VOTE OF CONFIDENCE IN FRENCH CHAMBER Carried By Majority of 91, But Opponents Say

It Spells Doom of Cabinet --- Says He Has Obtained All France Could Desire.

Paris, July 22. — The chamber of deputies gave a vote of confidence in the cabinet of M. Clemenceau this afternoon by a vote of 272 against 181.
M. Clemenceau's opponents were jubilant over the vote in the chamber, saying that it spelled the doom of the cabinet as at present constituted.
Premier Clemenceau. on leaving the chamber, said: "This is a mere skirmish. The real battle is coming."
The premier was cheered as he departed, many officers surrounding him and shouting "Vive Clemenceau" and "Long live the father of victory."
