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HOUSES FOR WORKING MEN ON MONTHLY PAYMENTS

Problem of Keeping Up With Industrial Growth of Hamilton - Manufacturing Firms Building

That Hamilton is rapidly becoming the industrial hub of the Dominion is surely shown by the large number of existing factories and the new plants in course of erection in the eastern portion of the city.

The encouragement shown by the past and present city authorities to the manufacturers in giving them water and fire protection, cheap power and excellent shipping facilities, associated with a low taxation for a term of years, brings about the present activity.

Many of the older concerns are building large additions, and this, coupled with the new arrivals, creates a condition in the city which is a source of the envy of less fortunate populations.

Workingmen are pouring into the city, every house is occupied, some of them two and three families are crowded into one.

Builders are rushing up houses, but the demand cannot be kept up with. This is a natural, non-boom-like growth that cannot exist.

The central property is increasing in value constantly, the suburbs are filling up and overflowing beyond their limits into Barton Township.

The scarcity of houses is the only condition that is discouraging to the incoming manufacturer. The workingman must have a home. Work and home are the two things that make life.

Some firms have considered the demands of the workers, and in order to retain their men, have built homes, charging the employee a nominal rent.

Others are making the best of a regrettable condition until relief comes in the form of cheap workingmen's houses.

IS BRITISH COLUMBIA AGAINST CHEAPER RAILWAY TRAVEL?

Mr. F. Maclean, the people's "Bully," is waging a 2-cent railway warfare in the cent belt. Mr. Maclean is gaining for himself and paper and making votes for himself in South York, by incidentally being in the position as the champion of the "people," and there is nothing that gives the redoubtable Billy more pleasure than the charge to pose.

Now it has been shown that the G. T.R. last year carried passengers at an average rate of 1.20 cents per mile and the C. P. R. at 1.42 cents per mile. These averages have been made in face of a "card rate" of 2 cents per mile in the east and 4 and 5 cents in the west, by excursion rates. The excursions have made it possible for innumerable Ontario farmers to visit the Quebec model farm and the Toronto Exhibition. Also they have brought thousands of farm laborers to the prairies in the harvest season and other thousands of tourists thru the west. From these laborers and tourists the west and British Columbia is deriving thousands of desirable settlers.

The 2-cent rate is established, it is more than likely that many of these excursions will be abolished. It is likely that the rate will be continued, and it is more than likely that they would not because they could not afford to do so. At any rate, they would say so, which would mean the same thing to the Ontario farmers. Just what would happen to Billy Maclean when the Ontario farmers found they could no longer visit the model farm at Guelph and the national exposition at Toronto at reduced rates? He would fall and fall easy—at this distance—forecast. But the serious complication would fall upon the west, if harvest excursions were no longer possible, the possibilities of loss to the farmers arm-carry would be enormous, while a splendid channel for receiving new settlers would be cut.

As matters are to-day, people have an opportunity of traveling cheaply at a time when the harvest is most enjoyable and at a time of year when most people can afford the time to travel. So altogether, Statesman Billy's 2-cent scheme will hardly fit into even cent belt requirements.

The above appeared in The Saturday Sunset, Vancouver, B.C., under date of Aug. 17. The Sunset is a newspaper confessedly modelled upon the lines of our own Toronto Saturday Night. The "Front Page" by "Bruce" is usually well written.

We have read the same stuff in the literature so bountifully distributed at Ottawa last session by the railways, but assuming that the writer is entirely sincere it amounts to this, that granting a two-cent fare will abolish all excursion trains and excursion rates. This argument is not new, but it has fallen into disuse in this part of the country, for the reason that now it is a condition, not a theory, by which we are able to judge. In the United States there are fifteen states where the two-cent rate prevails, and in none of them has there been any falling off in the amount or extent of excursions to the public in the way of concessions and communication rates.

"Bruce" evidently does not read the American exchanges. If he will take a copy of The Ohio State Journal, or almost any other newspaper published in the State of Ohio, he will find a column devoted every day to advertisements by the railway companies of cheap fares and cheap excursion rates. He will find excursions almost constantly advertised from Columbus to Cleveland, Detroit to Toledo, Cincinnati to Wheeling, Atlantic City, Niagara Falls, Toronto and other places and return at the rate of one cent, or less than one cent, a mile.

Ohio has had the maximum two-cent rate since March 1, 1907. The railway companies find that they carry more passengers and that they take in more money, and they are satisfied with the rate, also at the time the law passed the papers were filled with prophecies concerning abatement of excursion rates and other calamities.

Another thing, if "Bruce" will take any Chicago newspaper he will find that the Canadian Pacific Railway and other roads entering Chicago, where they are under a two-cent rate, give a tourist rate going east for the sum-

mer months, corresponding somewhat to the homeseekers' rate going west.

Now we find that a man in Chicago can buy a ticket from the Canadian Pacific to St. John, N.B., and return, for \$25, or he can buy a round trip ticket to Halifax and return, say, for \$32, good for thirty and sixty days.

Well, this man, on his way to St. John, or Halifax, will pass thru Toronto. If he has a brother living in Toronto and desires him to take the trip with him, and the brother undertakes to buy the same kind of ticket in Toronto for either Halifax or St. John, he will pay \$5 more, not proportionately, but \$5 more in fact for a ticket from Toronto to St. John and return than he would from Chicago to St. John and return, and the same is true as to all other points in New England and the maritime provinces.

A year or two ago it was all right to discuss what might happen in the way of cutting off the excursion rates if a two-cent rate was enacted. It was then a matter of theory or surmise; now it is a question of fact. Everyone here knows that establishing a two-cent rate has nothing to do with excursions and other cut rates. Railway companies run excursions to make money, not as a way of giving back money to the people or thru philanthropic motives. They catch a certain trade by excursion rates that they would not get otherwise.

"Bruce" is making an argument for the railway companies which may be effective in British Columbia, but which certainly would excite laughter if presented to readers east of the Rocky Mountains.

One ounce of fact is worth a pound of guesswork like that of "Bruce," and the following editorial from The Montreal Witness is worthy of the attention of our western friends:

In the State of Missouri the two cents a mile railway fare law is admitted to have proved a success so far, despite the gloomy forebodings of the railway men. Since it has gone into operation there has been a great increase of passenger traffic. The cheapening of transportation has had the same effect on travel in general. It is reported that the receipts of railways have increased two thousand dollars a day in Kansas City, while in St. Louis the number of passengers carried is as large as during the exhibition. The companies admit the gain, but say it is offset by increased cost of operation, and may be only temporary. It would be a desire to take advantage of the low fare, a long period, they claim, is required definitely to determine the permanent effects of reduced fares on the volume of transportation. Experience, however, favors the opinion that the business will continue to increase as people become accustomed to the advantages. The number of those who travel for business reasons, or other definite purposes, is largely in excess of the number of those who make a journey merely to take advantage of low fares. However, that may be, it is certain that the electric lines which parallel many of the railways in the richer parts of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois have developed an enormous business that did not exist before they came into being, and it would be very difficult to ascribe some of this development to the cheaper rates.

AN EXPERIMENT IN LIFE INSURANCE.

Statements have been freely made to the effect that if the recommendations of the Dominion commission are made obligatory on insurance companies, it will be impossible for them to conduct a profitable business, and will prejudicially affect the interests of the policyholders. Assertions of this nature are easily made, and their value is largely discounted when the facts disclosed by the investigation are remembered. It is difficult to demand why proposals placing life insurance on a thoroly rate and legitimate basis, preventing overcapitalization, protecting funds admittedly of a fiduciary character from the possibility of improper manipulation and limiting expenses of management to a reasonable amount should adversely influence public sentiment.

In another column of this issue will be found an account of a new company established on lines embodying the recommendations of the Dominion commission. The promoters of the Policyholders' Mutual Life Insurance Company believe that it is perfectly possible to conduct a lucrative business under the conditions favored by the commissioners, and the experiment ought to command close interest and attention. The capital of this latest Income on the insurance field is strictly limited, no shares may be issued at a discount, overcapitalization is impossible, and provision is made for the ultimate redemption of the shareholdings when the company will be left on a straight mutual basis. Policyholders share in the management, and the trust character of the funds is fully recognized. For other special features recourse can be had to the article itself, which is well worth perusal by all interested in life insurance. The private act incorporating the company, it is stated, elicited warm commendation when under the consideration of the provincial authorities.

REMEMBER TEACHER.

GODERICH, Aug. 23.—(Special).—At the reunion of the alumni of the Goderich Collegiate Institute here, H. H. Strang, principal of the school from 1871 to 1905, was presented with a check for \$1000 by his old pupils in recognition of his long services. The reunion was held here the past two days. NEW CANADIAN LIFE COMPANY

Meets All Requirements of Dominion Commission and Will Eventually Become Straight Mutual Company—Many Special Features in the Interests of Policyholders.

"At a time when insurance men seem combined to raise objections to practically every act and finding of the insurance commission, it is refreshing to find one company which is prepared to accept their verdict in practically every particular, and which, in fact, has drafted a bill fulfilling these conditions before the work of the commission was completed or the report published. Another peculiar feature is that the insurance company was organized by one of the leading insurance experts of the Dominion of Canada, and is controlled by the private bill committee and the legislature, and passed by unanimous vote and without amendment."

We refer to the Policyholders' Mutual Life Insurance Company, the charter of the last provincial legislature. The act was framed by one of the leading insurance experts of the Dominion of Canada, and is controlled by the private bill committee and the legislature, and passed by unanimous vote and without amendment. A few of its special provisions are as follows: A stock clause prevents the capitalization in any form. One hundred and fifty thousand dollars of stock may be issued, but any amount above this must receive the approval of a general meeting of stock and policyholders of the company, and the ratification of the lieutenant-governor-in-council. The dividend is to be 10 per cent. The profits above this are to be divided annually among the stockholders, and the amount of reserve to be of their policies on each Dec. 31. Two hundred thousand dollars of insurance is to be written before the company commences active operations, and a peculiar circumstance in connection with this is that this amount is practically written and secured by the company so far as commission is concerned, it being secured by those interested among themselves and their friends. The commission thus saved and left in the treasury of the company will pay a large proportion of the first company expenses, and in addition the company starts with an assured premium income from the \$200,000 of insurance. Another peculiar feature is that in the securing of the stock subscriptions no commission is being paid; in fact, the whole organization is being carried while paying no commission, so that the company will start out, not only with its capital not impaired, but with a surplus of practically its first year's expenses in advance in its treasury.

In the future conduct of the company the interests of the stockholders and policyholders are equitably guarded. The stockholder will have one vote for each share of stock, and may vote in person or by proxy. The policyholder has one vote for each \$1000 of insurance, and may vote in person or by letter.

The premium rates are to be the non-participating rates of the standard companies. The policyholders of the company, while paying no commission, will have the advantage of sharing in the profits of this company. The experience of the company shows clearly that large profits accrue even at these rates; it is therefore clear that the policyholders' profits will actually reduce their premiums.

In the drafting of the policy, all technicalities are avoided, and all that is promised in the policy being placed in plain figures, so that anyone can understand the conditions. By agreeing to the commissions to agents, a considerable number of agents have already been secured on a graded scale for the province, and it is thereafter renewal commissions for a limited term. These are so figured that each premium, even in its first year, practically carries its own cost, and its own reserve and paying its own commission, thus avoiding impairment of capital, and by giving the agent a share in the profits, it makes him loyal to the company, overcomes the temptation of switching and rebating, largely reduces the cost, and in every way makes the agent interested in the future success of the company.

The company desires no greater latitude in the way of investment than is specified under the Insurance Act, and no more speculative investments in any case be impossible from the fact of the annual distribution of profits to the policyholders.

These are all admirable features, and have not only elicited strong and genuine approval, but are admitted to constitute a new and reliable departure in Canadian insurance.

It is also proposed, following the example of the United Kingdom Temperance and General Insurance Co. of Great Britain, one of the largest and most successful of insurance companies, to keep separate accounts as regards funds for the abstaining and non-abstaining policyholders. The report of this company, now in its sixth year, and, therefore, in its experience beyond the possibility of peradventure, shows that the abstainer has an advantage of about 20 per cent. over the non-abstaining policyholder, and as both classes will pay the same rate, the directors hold that it is but just that abstainers and abstaining members should each share in the profits of their own class.

One interesting feature of the bill is its provision by which the company will, by evolution, become a purely mutual company, as the bill provides that as the surplus warrants the stock may be retired, commencing, however, not earlier than five years from the date of organization.

Regarding the prospects of the company, a leading insurance expert of Ontario says: "The company is bound to be a huge success as soon as the public understands its system." The provisional directors are: Messrs. J. Main, A. C. Pratt, B. E. McKen- zie, M. D. A. W. Briggs, Charles Bonick, C. A. Wilson and A. M. Feather- son.

The head office of the company is located at 404 Temple Building. The insuring public will certainly be greatly interested in the success of this company.

Political Intelligence

If there are any dead of decay in the ranks, it is the duty of the party to apply its pruning-hook, and he doubts less that they have the utmost courage in their past and they are not likely to be disappointed in his action at the present juncture."

Ames, M.P., who discusses "Conscience in Politics" with a representative of the Ontario Liberal party, "Only," he says, "when Canada shall have a sensitive conscience and oppose, in succession, every government that betrays its trust will we have a clean and honest administration which we have a right to demand and which we will accept."

The member for St. Antoine (Montreal), observes that this Independent vote, which is the hope of the Dominion, is being secured largely by men who have attained to manhood since the last election, or of new comers. In general probably 10 per cent. of the voters are new voters, and these men of open mind will determine the result. Mr. Ames advises the new voters to be sure to vote for the Liberal party, and they should also hear the authorized defender of the government in power.

MR. BECK'S DUTY.

The Hamilton Herald: It is reported that Hamilton Beck has an ambition to run as the Conservative candidate in London in opposition to Mr. Gibbons, who is believed to have been selected as the government candidate and as Mr. Hymans's successor in the cabinet. If the report is true, Mr. Beck's best friends will counsel him to fling away that ambition. His proper place at present is in the Whitney cabinet as the man chiefly responsible for that government's policy.

How Mr. Beck could, with honor, quit provincial politics at this stage of the development of his career project, it is difficult to see. He more than any other man is responsible for the project. He is personally identified with it, and he is personally responsible for the power question and is able to expound it. The government's power scheme has now reached the most critical stage of its development. The people of Ontario have been encouraged to fill and that opinion is now being abandoned or emasculated, and the disappointment and resentment of the public will be so great as to imperil the position of the government. Honor and duty alike call upon the man who has had most to do with creating public opinion in favor of the scheme and urging public hope in it, to remain in charge of it until his promises have been fulfilled, or are in a way of being fulfilled. He should quit now his reputation would suffer. His enemies and the enemies of the power project would be guilty of any action of the nature of "welching."

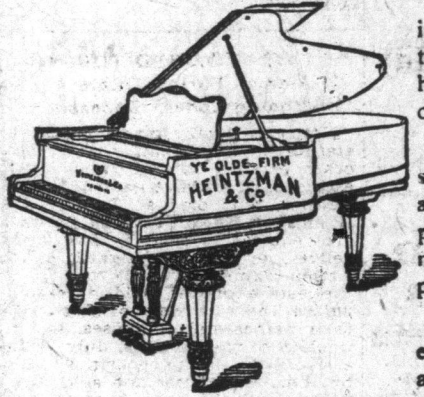

Asked as to the state of politics across the water, he replied, in his vehement manner, that:

"In spite of all the talk, largely founded on ignorance or bred in malice, the imperial government of today is united and retains the confidence of the country so overwhelmingly expressed in January, 1906. Not a single member of the Liberal party, or of that moderate section of the Liberal party that sits with and works with the Liberal party, has withdrawn his allegiance from the prime minister."

"It is quite true that the Liberal government is in close grips with the hereditary and episcopal wing chamber, the house of lords. This upper house represents the three great vested interests of land, of liquor and of the state church."

"The Liberal party was elected in face of the most vehement opposition of these three forces. In that fight it won, and it will continue to fight against these privileged and monopolistic interests until in religious tolerance, with which is intermingled the education question, in freedom of access to the land, and in control of the liquor traffic, the old mother country becomes as free and as democratic as the greatest of her daughter nations, the big Dominion of Canada."

Mr. Hamar Greenwood left for Vancouver yesterday afternoon, but returns in September, when he expects to spend about a week in Toronto. He was accompanied by W. A. Bonnell, brother of Watty Bonnell.

ONE THOUSAND MIX.

Over One Hundred Hurt in Fight Over Plate of Ice Cream.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—(Special.)—A pretty quarrel over a plate of ice cream last evening precipitated a riot at Witzel's Grove, College Point, L.I., in which nearly eight thousand men were involved, and in which one hundred and fifty were hurt.

Of these fourteen were seriously injured. Mr. Witzel received a fractured skull and may die. It took reserves from six stations to cope with the remarkable outbreak.

It was a turbulent windup to a day of merry-making by the Jefferson Tammany Club of the Bronx, which, headed by Leader Louis F. Haffen, had embarked on two steamboats and three barges at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth-street in the morning.

About eight thousand six hundred strong finished gorging into the grove. They had friendly games of baseball, and the dice rolled merrily in obscure corners for a while.

The Piano Attraction of the Exhibition. Everyone, doubtless, remembers the gold-finished grand piano of the old-time firm of Heintzman & Co., that was the centre of attraction in the piano section of last year's Canadian National Exhibition. TOBIN IS ON TRIAL NOW CHARGES ARE NOT STRONG

Alleged Tampering With Ballots Not Proven Why Bain Was Nominated.

With all due solemnity befitting the occasion President Tobin, Vice-President Lovely and Secretary-Treasurer Bain, the three principal officers of the International Boot and Shoe Workers' Union, were charged before the assembled delegates at the convention at the Labor Temple yesterday "with tampering with the ballot, falsifying local union returns, issuing false statements with regard to voting of alleged suspended members and with doing other unlawful acts, with the intention of depriving Messrs. Hickey and Murray, candidates for office at the last election of the organization, of any chance of securing election."

The evidence given was of the weakest possible description, the strongest feature being that of an alleged conversation, said to have taken place between Max Grume and Messier, two former employees at the general offices, who were discharged and afterwards employed by Hickey, and overheard by another employee, Martin, to the effect that they knew what votes had been cast for Tobin, as they had broken the seals and examined the ballots, and they sealed them up again, this story lacked corroboration. A careful scrutiny of the ballots followed, but no traces of the alleged tampering could be discovered.

President Tobin was put on the stand and the prosecuting counsel endeavored to prove that Tobin had been accused by ulterior motives in selecting candidates for positions in the general offices, and that undue influence had been brought to bear to secure the election of Secretary Bain. This was quietly and emphatically refuted by Tobin, who said the reason Bain was nominated for the position of secretary-treasurer was his expert knowledge of accountancy, and the exceptional abilities he had displayed as business agent and financial secretary of the local unions of Chicago.

DOESN'T STOP EXCURSIONS.

Two Cent a Mile Rate in Ohio Regarded as a Blessing.

James M. Clark, a prominent real estate man of Columbus, Ohio, is spending his holidays in Toronto.

"How is the two-cent fare in Ohio?" asked a World reporter.

"First rate. It suits the people and the railway companies report increased earnings."

"And you still have excursions?" "Yes," said Mr. Clark, "I am traveling on an excursion ticket via the Ohio Central and Nickel Plate from Columbus to Niagara Falls and return. The ticket cost \$6, that is at the rate of less than one cent a mile. We have more excursions than before the two-cent-a-mile law was passed."

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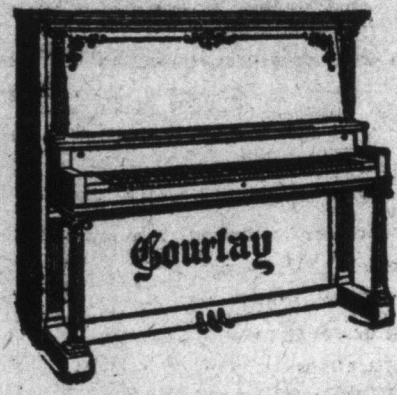

WALL STREET ANXIOUS LEST DIVIDENDS SUFFER

Action of Southern Railway Directors Gives Rise to Feelings of Apprehension.

World Office
Friday Evening, Aug. 23.

The dealings in Sao Paulo provided a feature in the afternoon, comparatively dull-day in the local stock market. The buying demand, with which the morning session opened, was far from being met by profit-taking after the display of pyrotechnics which the shares have afforded during the past week, found a scarcity in offerings, and an advance was scored from the opening price of 112 to 115 1/2 on sales of 254 shares. In the afternoon, however, there was a reaction, on somewhat lighter dealings following, realizing, the close being around that of yesterday. The company's official July statement, issued this afternoon, is not of the brightest, showing gross earnings for the month of \$160,712, as against \$164,666 for July, 1906, a decrease of \$3,954, and an advance of maintenance and operating charges, shows an increase of \$774, making a falling off in net earnings of \$8956. The gross earnings for Jan. 1 to July 31 are \$1,188,184, an increase of \$36,591, and the net earnings of \$773,707 show a gain for the same period of \$14,342.

General Electric showed strength in the morning, with a rise of two points in the afternoon. In all, only one share of the stock changed hands, there being little placed on the market. Mackays, following the lead of New York, were fractionally stronger. The day's trading emphasized the local dearth in stock offerings.

In New York, there was a tendency to sag after the bullish demonstration of Thursday. The market, however, developed during the afternoon, and closing quotations were mostly at low figures. The action of the Southern Railway directors on the preferred was a reason for special weakness in that stock, and, as pressing the possibility of similar retrenchment measures by other railroads, was not relieved by Wall-street. Another unfavorable influence was the insistence of reports of damage to wheat crops.

The July statement of the Rio de Janeiro Tramway, Light & Power Co., Limited, shows total gross earnings of \$548,430, with maintenance and operating charges of \$359,149, making net earnings \$189,281. The aggregate gross earnings, Jan. 1 to July 31, are \$3,472,884, and net \$1,115,650.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—The directors of the Southern Railway Company today cut the semi-annual dividend on preferred stock from 2 1/2 per cent. to 1 1/2 per cent. The railway reports for the year ending in 1906 a surplus over dividends of \$790,321, a decrease of \$1,488,745 from the previous year.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—The first considerable transfer of currency to the west for the movement of crops and other interior business of the country was made by the sub-treasury today. Five hundred thousand dollars was transferred to Chicago, and another half million to San Francisco.

Texas is suing the harvester trust for violating anti-trust laws, and claims damages amounting to \$1,100,000.

The New York Cotton and Produce Exchanges will close the Saturday preceding Labor Day.

St. Louis & San Francisco has declared the regular quarterly dividend of 1 per cent. on the first preferred, payable Oct. 1.

United States Attorney - General Bonaparte has conferred with other officers in the Alton immunity from prosecution and the feasibility of making a case against Harriman.

The July net earnings of the Porto Rico Railway Company show an increase of \$473 for the same month last year. The net increase for seven months is \$28,691.

Dun's Trade Review reports the number of failures in Canada for the week as 139, compared with 135 for the same week of 1906. The number in Ontario is 74.
