



chooner Breaks Her Moorings at Port Credit-Brave But Fruitless Attempts to Secure Her.

Captain Hall, the Deputy Harbor Master at the Queen's Wharf, received a telephone message from Port Credit during the windstorm yesterday afternoon asking him keep on the lookout for a schooner wh was being tossed about in the lake, also for a fishing boat containing men, about whom much anxiety was felt as to their safety. The schooner was sighted by Captain Hall rolling heavily, and with no sall set, about three miles out in the lake. We have now \$123.000,000 of specie in the New York banks, and \$169,000.000 of gold in the Trensury, which, with the current imports of \$15.000,000. after deducting the \$100,000.000 of reserve cold unkes a total available supply of \$207.000.000. To this may be added, on a very moderate estimate, \$50,000,000, represented by foreign creditor balances still due to us, which, in the face of war possibilities, gives us a total available gold resource amounting to over \$250,000,000—to say nothing of the other stocks of the metal in this country amounting to over \$450,000,000."


