GRAND LODGE I.O.O.F. MEETS

Larger Number of Delegates Than Ever in Attendance at Opening Session.

A WELCOME TENDERED THEM.

Encouraging Reports of the Year's Proceedings and on the Order's Standing Presented.

Fully five hundred delegates were in attendance Wednesday morning at the opening of the convention of the Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows in Victoria, Hall, Grand Master Charles Clifford Lyman, Brookville, presiding.

After routine reports of the secretary and other officers and committees were presented, important among these was the report of the Advisory Committee to the Oddfellows' Relief Association of Kingston, the insurance affiliation of the order for Canada, presented by Col. W. H. Cole, P.G.M., showed a gratifying increase in the membership of the association for the year ending June 30, 1902, an increase of over 8 per cent.

At the opening of the afternoon session a pleasing interlude was given by the vocal quartet of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, which consisted of John P. Kellas, a handsome silk flag, bearing the Canadian coat of arms as an expression of the kindest greetings of the Canadian jurisdiction and a memento of his visit to the Grand Lodge of Ontario.

Rep. J. J. Mason, Bowmanville, presented the report of the Committee on Mileage and Per Diem, which was adopted. It provided for the payment to officers, representatives and members serving on committees of mileage and per diem at the usual rate.

The report of the Rebekah Degree read by Representative J. H. Radford, recommended the granting of charters to three newly organized Rebekah lodges, and urged greater co-operation by the subordinate lodges in promoting the work of the Rebekah Degree.

The need for more diligence in some districts in regard to weak and dormant lodges was recommended by the Committee on the State of the Order, presented by Representative S. J. Miller of Norwich. Gratification was expressed, however, at the large increase in membership during the past year.

The granting of charters to new lodges: Bertie Lodge, Ridgeway, New Ontario, No. 340, Thessalon, Bisset Lodge, No. 51, Mitchell (resubstituted), Russell Lodge, No. 341, Russell, Van-kleek Hill, No. 432, Van-kleek Hill, was approved by Grand Lodge on motion of Representative R. H. Sweet of Exeter. Also the Mergement of Oxford and Samaritan Lodges, Ingersoll. Congratulations were extended to Representative John Dawson, D.D.G.M., of Port Arthur, for instituting a lodge in New Ontario at Thessalon.

Promotion was given Bro. H. A. Mallory of Dryden, to institute a new lodge at Dryden, Ont. No change in clause 98, subordinate constitution, to revise by-laws, was made by the grand body on motion of Rep. W. R. Hall, of Chatham.

The question of adopting the Independent Oddfellow Journal as the official organ of the jurisdiction and being sent free to every member on an increase of the Grand Lodge per capita tax was laid on table for discussion at 11 a. m. Thursday.

The Grand Secretary in his report called attention to the value of the new law, which abolished the payment of benefits for the first week of sickness. The report of the committee approving of this change effected two years ago, was referred back on motion of Representatives J. Dawson of Sault Ste. Marie and R. The Grand Lodge adopted a recommendation of the Grand Secretary to change grand lodge by-law, No. 17, in order that both grand and subordinate lodge elections may take place on the same evening in May.

A warm discussion was participated in by Representatives Blewett, Lisowel, W. H. Cole, P. G. M., Jos. Oliver, P. G. M., O. L. Land, W. H. Hoyle, P. G. M., on the amendment proposed by Representative Cole, of Brock Lodge, Brockville, to allow each subordinate lodge to legislate as it desires as to the payment of widows' benefits. Brock Lodge has, up to the adoption of a uniform constitution for subordinates at the 1900 session, been paying a graded scale of widows' benefits.

The great opposition to the amendment was that it would give subordinate lodges the same powers as formerly to tinker with their by-laws and thus destroy the uniformity of subordinate constitutions, which was essential to stability and progress. After a lengthy debate the amendment was lost.

The concluding business of Wednesday's session was devoted to the consideration of a motion by Representative Jos. Oliver, P. G. M., to change the days of meeting of the annual session from Wednesday and Thursday to Thursday and Friday, in order to allow delegates to attend the sessions of the Grand Encampment, which are now held on Tuesday of the Grand Lodge week.

Among the visitors of the session was Brother Jos. Gibson, of Ingersoll, the Grand Master of the A. O. U. W., accompanied by the Grand Recorder of the same order, Mr. M. D. Carder, who addressed the Grand Lodge and extended the greetings of 43,000 members of the A. O. U. W. Brother F. D. Selfert, a past grand of Columbia College and Bathurst-streets, was introduced as a visitor by Representatives J. T. Hornbloor and J. A. Macdonald.

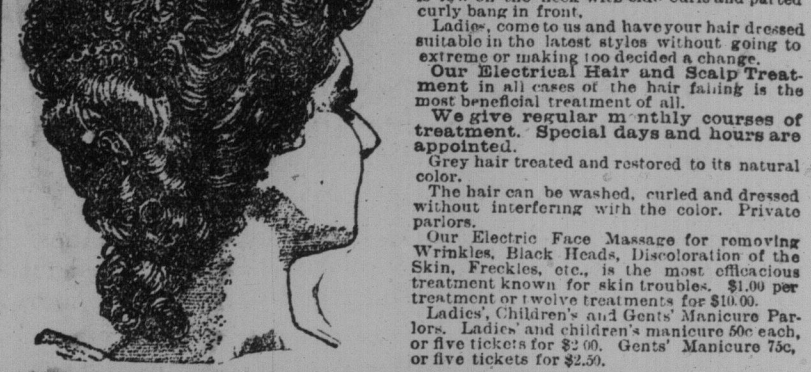

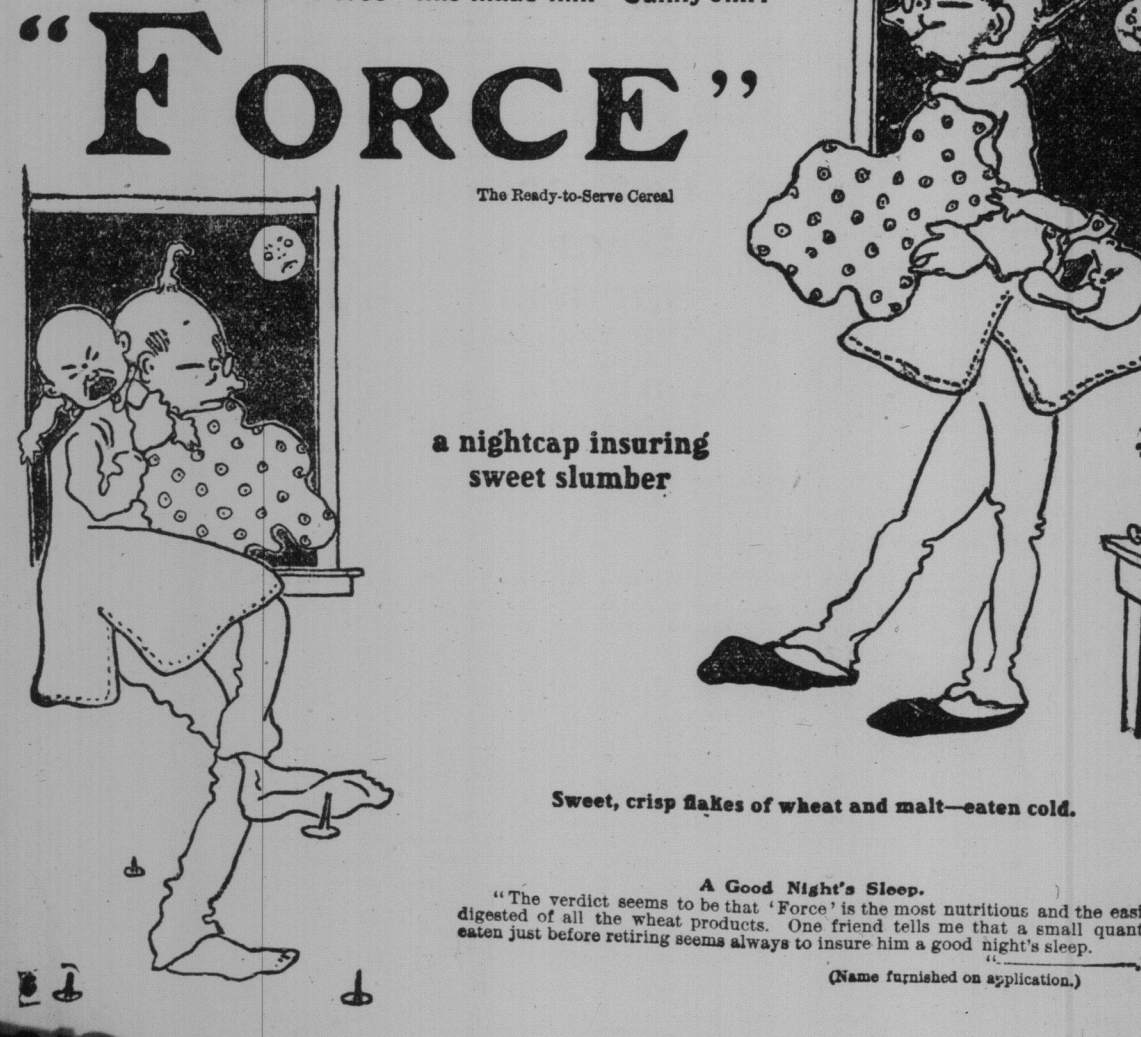

tations to the Dominion government had been dealt with. In their report, as submitted by W. K. McNaught, the chairman, they reviewed the steps taken on behalf of the association to effect better tariff changes with the Canadian investors.

Then our representatives appeared before them when they received an excellent hearing and received the impression that the government were strongly in sympathy with protecting Canadian industries.

It was after the meeting of our most important deputation with the government that their assurance along this line led our representatives to question very seriously as to whether steps should be taken by the association to educate the people of Canada regarding the importance of our manufacturing industries.

It is in the opinion of your committee, therefore, that the pressing problem is to do all that lies in our power to educate the public regarding tariff requirements and the advantages of using Canadian products.

The delegates were treated to an excursion around the harbor by the local branch, when the afternoon session was devoted to the presentation of an enjoyable and profitable all.

Not only have we had in Canada what has been called a "tariff fever" which is synonymous with an expansion of our commerce, but also we have attained to higher standards of growing industry of Canada herself.
