TARIFF AND RULES OBSTACLES.

The live stock breeders of the Dominion have deliberately refused to make an exhibit at the St. Louis Purchase Exposition. They will reconsider their decision providing radical changes are made in the prize list of the fair, written assurance given that the judges shall be acceptable to the Canadian government and that the tariff restrictions against the importation of Canadian live stock be permanently removed. Those informed on the subject admit that they do not anticipate that these concessions will be granted. A committee goes to St. Louis today to confer with the Exhibition management. In view of the prominence of Canadian live stock exhibits at the Chicago and Buffalo fairs and the necessity for a similar exhibit of this industry, if the live stock display of the St. Louis show is to be of a representative type, this action is serious. The Dominion breeders insist that they have been unfairly treated in a variety of ways by the American government and the rules of the fair, and by resolution assert that it is better to use the money necessary for such an exhibit at home than to attempt to build up trade relations with the United States under such discouraging conditions.
