# Principal's Report.

(Approved and Adopted by the Committee of Management.)

GENTLEMEN :

It is again our pleasing duty and privilege to lay before you an account of our administration of the affairs of the Institution under our charge.

It is a matter of congratulation that nothing has occurred to mar or interrupt its progress and prosperity during the past year.

The general management of the Institution, in its educational, financial and domestic departments, has received the usual care and attention of the officers and teachers, and it is satisfactory to report that progress and advance have been made in the work of the school-room, that the comfort and welfare of the children have been properly provided for as far as possible, while a due regard has been had to economy consistent with the objects and best interests of the Institution.

Jones, of North End, St. John, one of our brightest pupils who was removed to his home in June, 1888, having developed symptoms of consumption, lingered with occasional hopes of recovery till the end of the past year when fully resigned to the Divine will he sank quietly to rest amidst the tender ministrations of his relatives and friends and with the deep regret of his teachers and schoolfellows.

John Herbet Bryden, of Woodstock and John F. Donovan, of Petersville did not return to school last session, the former on account of weakness and ill health and the latter because his parents needed his services on their farm.

Henry H. Cougle, of Bloomfield, was discharged as his age militated against his making much improvement. Avondale Smith, of Albert Mines, was also discharged.

The following new pupils have been admitted, Adolph Pourk, William Bleakney, Douglas Trenholm, Margaret S. Trenholm, Irene Trenholm and Stafford Martin, protege of E. Hutchison, Esq., Douglstown.

Our accommodation being taxed to the utmost to provide for our present number of pupils, the consideration of other applications for admission is deferred until the opening of the new building.

## Health.

We are thankful to report that there has been no serious illness among the pupils during the year and those requiring the Doctor's services readily yielded to his skill and attention.

### Changes.

Mr. Ernest E. Prince who was one of our first pupils, having been with us since the commencement of the work in 1882, has been taken on as pupil teacher.

He made considerable progress in his studies as a pupil and the zeal with which he has entered on his duties as teacher promises well for his future usefulness.

Mr. W. O'Darnaby, who expressed the wish to work for the Institution as agent and collector will now be employed in that capacity.

### Our High Calling.

Education is the factor by which the intellect is sharpened and expanded, the whole moral nature improved, purified and strengthened, and the capacity for the acquisition and retention of knowledge enlarged and so acted upon that attainments which at one time would have been deemed an impossibility, not only become possible but actual realities.

True Education should have for its aim the developing and refining of the moral nature, strengthening its power and raising its tone, in other words influencing the heart as well as expanding the powers of the mind and adding to its stores.

Those who take up the noble profession of teaching should not esteem it lightly, nor be so ready to throw it up for other pursuits which may happen to be more lucrative.

Why teaching should be thought so little of in these days is hard to explain, unless it be that a certain ridicule has been thoughtlessly cast upon the profession by several of our great writers in describing some wretched school of the past times, where brimstone and treacle were administered in brimming doses every morning before breakfast, or by the publication of caricatures representing the schoolmaster with cane or strap in hand, in the act of punishing some incorrigible boy.

When we consider the life work of such men as Matthew Arnold, the vast influence which teachers may wield by precept and example for the common good, that the seed sown now will bear fruit in the near future, that their pupils will occupy the proud positions vacated by their present possessors, and the world's opinions and advancement promoted and extended by



the principles installed into the pliant hearts and minds of the rising generation: When we consider the influence for good promoting and affecting thought throughout all classes of society, in the cottage, in the palace; vast, potent, measureless, who can underestimate the importance of the profession or be ashamed of the noble work in which he is engaged!

Let the teacher value his "High Calling" as the apple of his eye, as a privilege, as a great trust reposed in him; a hard and laborious work no doubt, which shall call forth all his powers of mind, his energies and patience; let him expect its difficulties and be ready to meet them, not weighing the value of his work by the cash he receives, but looking beneath and beyond and enjoying that quiet satisfaction which a life of usefulness and a knowledge of doing good to those around us generally brings.

#### Errors in Speech.

All who are conversant with the subject acknowledge that the most difficult task you can set a deaf mute child is that of learning to read and write the English Language correctly.

Children possessed of all their faculties and without any special training have unconsciously acquired a certain knowledge of the common grammatical forms and idioms preparatory to entering school.

Their teacher has at the start a ready means of communication with his pupils before a single lesson is brought before them.

The deaf child enters school under entirely different conditions. The simplest forms of the intricacies of language are a great mystery to him. He sees the objects about him, knows the uses of some of them but knows the name of none.

There is no means of communication between him and his teacher until one has been opened up by means of the sign language.

He is thus heavily handicapped for the task that lies before him, and to enable him to obtain a fair knowledge of the grammatical forms of our language he must have constant and patient repetition until they are firmly impressed upon his memory.

Mr. Patterson in the proceedings of the ninth convention of teachers exclaimed, "It will of course be as it has repeatedly

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been contended that the deaf mutes learn from using pantomime to write in an unenglish manner; "nay sir," said Dr. Johnston of a dancing dog, "the creature, it is true dances ill, but the wonder is that it should dance at all;" the same might with truth be said of mutes with regard to their use of English."

There is no doubt that much disappointment is often felt by the earnest teacher in the results which have followed much painstaking labor. He sees his pupils continually making blunders in the inversion of words, using wrong tenses and giving an entirely different meaning to a sentence by substituting one auxiliary verb for another and in the use of idioms only applicable in certain cases and in a certain sense. Like the foreigner who, having an imperfect knowledge of English, shouted on falling into a river, "I will be drowned and no one shall help me," which probably conveyed to the bystanders an entirely different meaning to what he had intended.

The tendency of deaf mutes is to invert the order of the words they employ

The misplacing and omission of adjectives is another common mistake.

As An old fine oak; a young good man; I like summer than the winter, etc.

Too many negatives are often used.

As Nobody cannot go to the city to day.

None of us has not been sick this year.

Numerous mistakes are made in idioms and words that are nearly synonymous, in the use of prepositions, and in the nicer distinctions of language.

As He turned over a new leaf, is sometimes written, He turned over new leaves. A perfect gentleman is expressed as a perfect man. Mary swept on the floor. Summer is warm weather. A birthday of Queen Victoria will be on 24th May, etc

They sometimes express ideas in a quaint way, which is often very amusing.

As Thomas ate porridge which was full of four or five plates.

William made a kite and flew away with it.

Abraham showed his piety by almost killing his son Isaac.

If any person wants to become truly pious he can get converted at any of our city churches free of charge.

The Golden Rule for a Teacher of the deaf is thoroughness in his work. The English Language conforms to few plain and specific rules, and can only be mastered by continual repetition and practice. Let his pupils learn a little, and understand it, and they will make headway. It is better to curb one's impatience, and travel slowly, than to give lengthy vocabularies and inflexions dimly understood, the use of which must inevitably lead to confusion and disappointment.

It is a remarkable fact that while teachers of the deaf find it such a laborious task to convey to the minds of their pupils a good knowledge of language, hearing and speaking people are so utterly careless in the use of their native tongue, and many actually take pleasure in speaking it badly.

We do not refer to the occasional mistakes made by some of our best speakers in the excitement of a stirring speech, every one pardons these; but to the persistent mixing of singulars and plurals, doubling negatives, dropping the particles, confusing metaphors and using adjectives in conjunction having an entirely opposite meaning, which is so common in ordinary conversation with educated people of the present day.

Conventional blunders in speech are so much in use as to have become almost fashionable. Syntax and conjugation are disregarded, and few things, to our discredit be it said, are used so imperfectly as the Queen's English.

How often do we hear from the lips of our acquaintances the terms, "awfully handsome, awfully jolly, awfully good of you, horrid nice, just splendid, I guess I will, stuck up, perfectly heavenly, just too lovely for anything," and the thousand and one slang phrases which upset Lindley Murray, and contaminate the well of pure English to which our early education was directed, and being our native tongue it should be our con-

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Carlyle says in one of his works, "Tell me the songs of a people and I will tell you their character." This may be true and such a remark might have been equally applicable to their language.

A rich legacy has been bequeathed to us in the English Language now spoken by one hundred millions of the Caucasian Race in all parts of the world, and such poems as Gray's beautiful Elegy, or Goldsmith's Deserted Village should endear it to us as a priceless gift which it should be our interest and desire to preserve.

#### The Royal Commission.

The Report of the Royal Commission on the blind, deaf and dumb, etc. of the United Kingdom has lately been published and presented to both Houses of Parliament. Among its recommendations are the following:—

I. That the provisions of the Educational Act be extended to the deaf and dumb, and power be obtained to enforce the compulsory attendance of children at a day school or Institution up to the age of sixteen.

II. That the age of entry should as far as possible be seven; that pupils should as a rule be admitted once a year; that the school attendance should be compulsorily enforced for at least eight years, without any existing limit of distance from school, and that power should be given to the local authority to pay the rail or train fare of children when necessary.

III. That there should be one uniform schedule of inquiry of the deaf for the census returns of the whole of the United Kingdom.

These recommendations seem worthy of adoption in our Province. It is often difficult to induce parents to send their children to school, and many of them, regardless of the importance of education, retain them at home until it is too late for admission. In such cases compulsory attendance would be of benefit, as it would save these children from growing up in a state of ignorance and becoming a burden upon society at large.

We trust that the next census returns of the Province will contain full and complete information respecting the class for whom we are working.



### Progress of the Work in other Lands.

A glance at the events taking place in other countries in connection with the deaf shows that a wide-spread feeling of sympathy has been awakened on their behalf, which finds its proper outlet in earnest christian endeavour for their welfare.

#### Pennsylvania.

The large and well appointed Institution in the city of Philadelphia has been crowded out of its old quarters and sixty acres of land have been purchased on the outskirts of the city for \$120,000 on which to erect more commodious premises. It is said the New Institution will cost half a million of dollars and, when furnished with all modern appliances, will probably be the model Institution of the world.

#### California.

Los Angeles has just established a mission for its adult deaf and dumb in which sermons and lectures may be delivered in the sign language, and the general interests of the members looked after. Mr. Thomas Widd, formerly principal of the Mackay Institution at Montreal, has been appointed Missionary.

#### Ireland.

Belfast has opened a new Mission Hall for its adult deaf and dumb at 7 Fisherwick Place. Mr. Francis McGinn, formerly student of the National Deaf Mute College at Washington, is the Missionary, and Miss Tredennick, who for twenty years has devoted her life to the welfare of the deaf, Lady Superintendent. The hall contains reading room, recreation room and lecture Room.

#### Philadelphia.

All Soul's Church was consecrated a short time ago by Bishop Whittaker for the use of the deaf. The Rector, the Rev. Henry Winter Syle was the first deaf man ever ordained as a clergyman for the deaf, and his church is the first in America to have an edifice exclusively for the use of the deaf.

#### Sweeden.

A new law for the education of the deaf in Sweeden was passed last May. The following are some of its features:—

1. Compulsory education from the age of 7 to 9 years.

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2. An Eight years' course of study.
3. Method of instruction, speech, writing and signs according to the capacity of the pupils.
4. Normal School for the training of the teachers of the deaf.
5. Division of the Kingdom into seven great school districts.
6. The expenses of instruction to be borne partly by the state and partly by the school districts.

#### The Argentine Republic.

The publication of a new Magazine has been begun by the teachers of the Rosario Institution, in the interests of the deaf of the Republic and is entitled *La Enseñanza*.

#### Paris.

An International Congress of Deaf Mutes was held in Paris in July last and largely attended by deaf mutes from many of the countries of Europe and America.

The principal objects of the Congress were to advance the cause of the deaf, in the discussion of papers appertaining to their welfare, and to celebrate the centenary of the Abbe Del'Epee. The American Delegation to the meeting consisted of twenty-two Professors, representing the National Deaf Mute College and many of the principal Institutions in all parts of the United States.

#### China.

Mrs. Mills, who was a teacher in the Rochester, N. Y., Institution, for five years, resigned her position there to open up the work in China. Her little school at Tung Chou, near Chefoo was opened in June, 1888 and has now five pupils. In a recent letter acknowledging a contribution to its support, she says: "The growth of the school has been slow like everything else in China; but it seems sure." The average number of the deaf is not less than in other countries; 44 deaf boys between the ages of 8 and 16 living within two days journey, and that she has the pleasure of knowing that her little school is the first of the kind in China.

#### Gallaudet Memorial Statue.

A beautiful bronze statue of Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet, founder of deaf mute Institution in America and presented by the deaf of the United States to the National Deaf Mute College, was unveiled on the 26th June last.

Dr. Gallaudet is shown seated, teaching his first pupil,—a little girl who stands by his side.

The pedestal bears the following inscriptions on its various sides: Friend, Teacher, Benefactor. The deaf people of the United States in grateful remembrance of Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet mark the centennial of his birth with this memorial, 1887. Born at Philadelphia, Dec. 10th, 1787.

Founded at Hartford, the first school for the deaf in America 1817. Died at Hartford, Sept. 10th, 1851.

Upwards of \$12,000 was subscribed by the deaf for this purpose, and a large number from all parts of the country were present to witness the ceremony.

Mr. R. P. McGregor, of Ohio, who spoke on behalf of the deaf, concluded an eloquent speech with the following peroration:—

“My friends, the Gallaudet memorial is finished. Commanding the highest art of the sculptor; his children of silence have placed his statue here in commemoration of his grand work on their behalf. It springs from their hearts; it is worthy of them; it is worthy of the gifted sculptor who created it; it is worthy of him whose life and character it commemorates, and it is also grand; nay it is sublime, in the nationality, the universality of the sentiment which it symbolizes.”

This brief record of events taking place around us shows something of the spirit by which the deaf are sometimes animated and is also evidence of the enterprise, perseverance and self-denial of those who are working for their benefit.

#### Our New Building.

As many of the numerous friends of the Institution who take a deep interest in its progress live far from “the Celestial City” we append a brief description of the New Institution now in course of erection and the grounds on which it is being built.

The estate consisting of 117 acres, is situated at Hawthorne Hill, near Salamanca, about a mile from the Cathedral, and visitors coming up the river from St. John and points east will obtain a good view of the building previous to landing at the wharves of the city.

The site, which was also the site of the first Institution, was

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purchased from Senator Botsford after the destruction of that building by fire in March, 1883, and is acknowledged to be one of the most beautiful and commanding in the lower Provinces.

The ground gradually rises from the gate house near Salamanca, and a carriage drive winds through a fine avenue of tall spruce and fir trees, and after crossing a little brook which was formerly spanned by a light wooden bridge, the first view of the new building is obtained.

The drive passes on in front of the building and joins the main road which skirts the base of the hill.

On reaching the terrace and standing near the site of the old fountain an extensive and magnificent view of the river with the lands beyond dotted with farm houses, meets the eye. To the left in the distance, Mr. Gibson's Cotton Mill and the beautiful church at Marysville are plainly visible, and its white spire glistening in the sunlight affords a pleasing contrast to the dark green of the woods beyond.

The steep slope behind and in front of the building will ensure us good drainage, and the clear spring of water which rises in the woods about a quarter of a mile away from the back of the house, is considered one of the best in the neighborhood, and has never been known to fail.

While the grounds have become a veritable wilderness during the past few years by the overgrowth of evergreens and the decay and destruction of the fences and bridges; the splendid growth of beeches, maples, yellow birch and other ornamental trees can be advantageously retained and will add considerably to the beauty of the place, the possibilities of which, where nature has been so lavish, being apparent even to a casual observer.

The building is 56 feet by 65 feet, of brick with stone coignes and facings, three stories high with mansard roof surmounted by an octagon cupola in the centre. The front entrance will have an ascent of 9 or 10 wide stone steps on the platform of which four circular pillars will be erected to form a portico suitable to the character of the building. The basement will be partitioned off for kitchen, dining room, laundry, dairy and other purposes.

On entering the building, a hall twelve feet wide, faces you,



which extends about two-thirds of its length and is then met with a narrower hall which runs at right angles to it.

On this floor will be the reception room, office and library, parlor, principal's sitting and dining room, teachers and pupils sitting rooms, bath room and schoolroom, the latter, with boys' sitting room taking up the whole width of the building.

The second floor will contain principal's bed rooms, lady teacher's bed room, large and small girls' dormitories, hospital, spare room and bath room.

The third floor will contain gentlemen teachers' bed rooms, large and small boys' dormitories, hospital, lumber room, clothes room, etc.

A wide staircase leading from the main hall will give communication with the different floors.

The building will be heated by open fire places in which coal will be used, and hot air apparatus, the furnaces being located in the basement.

The planning of its arrangements has occupied much thought and when the building is completed, furnished and equipped with educational appliances will be eminently adapted to the purpose which its promoters have had in view.

Mr. Joshua Limerick, to whom its erection has been entrusted hopes to have it ready for occupation about the middle of August.

It will take one thousand dollars to complete the building, and additional funds will also be needed to furnish it and equip it for its work.

It is intended to get some of the land under cultivation as soon as possible that the house may be supplied with fresh vegetables, and a barn for the use of the team and other stock will in the near future be a work of necessity.

The general exterior of the building will be pleasing and attractive, and from its elevated position, sheltered as it is by trees on the north, west and south, will form a striking feature in the landscape, when seen from either the road or river.

#### Acknowledgements.

We beg to tender our sincere thanks to our local legislature for the support which has been extended to this Institution in

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the past and trust that as increased facilities will soon be placed in our hands for the extension of the work, funds will also be forthcoming for the furnishing and proper equipment of the Institution, that we may be enabled to carry out its objects more fully than we have hitherto done, and to take in every applicant who may seek an education with us.

We also desire to acknowledge the aid received from the numerous friends of the Institution who have contributed so liberally from year to year towards its support. It is a pleasure also to record their kind wishes for its success.

The increase in the subscription list last year enabled us to pay off some of the long standing accounts against the Institution.

Our best wishes are due to Dr. Brown, whose prompt and gratuitous services are always available when needed.

We have been extremely fortunate in regard to the health of our household and we thankfully attribute our exemption from sickness and disease to the kind care of an over-ruling Providence.

Mr. George H. Davis merits our thanks for free medicines supplied to the Institution when prescribed; and Dr. Torrens for gratuitous professional services.

We have received numerous illustrated and other papers, magazines for children, from Mr. H. C. Creed and Miss Moffatt, annual reports published by Institutions throughout the United States, Canada and other countries; the Graphic and London News from Mrs. L. Tabor, Fredericton; copies of the Fredericton Farmer, Reporter, Maple Leaf, Kansas Star; and maps from Mr. Joseph Reynar, of Three Rivers, Quebec, all of which have been very welcome. Our thanks are also due to Messrs. W. H. Thorne, W. L. Prince and C. M. Bostwick, of St John, for Christmas Presents and to Messrs. Culbert & Theal, Sussex, for a bundle of fruit bushes and rhubarb roots for the garden. We are also indebted to Mr. Heath, of the N. B. Railway for a free trip to Fredericton Junction last summer. The children had an enjoyable day's fishing in the Oromocto and returned by the evening train much pleased with their excursion and loaded with a heavy basket of Pickerel.

The Christmas holidays were most enjoyable. All the pupils preferred spending their holidays at the Institution instead of going home, and preparations were made to give them a good time. The schoolroom was decorated with festoons of evergreens and flowers, and a large Christmas Tree occupied the centre. Toys of all kinds and gifts, useful and ornamental adorned its branches until the evening when they were distributed among them.

Two magic lantern entertainments were given during the week and various Christmas games indulged in with great zest.

On New Year's Day, Mr. and Mrs. G. T. Whelpley paid the Institution a flying visit, their sleigh loaded with parcels of confectionery, oranges, apples, grapes, etc. A cordial welcome was extended to them. Sir John Allen not being able to visit us on that day sent his gifts by Mr. Whelpley. It is almost needless to add that our young people considerably appreciated these kind attentions.

A number of charades were performed by the teachers assisted by some of the older pupils, in the evening and altogether a most enjoyable Christmas and New Year's Day were spent by all in the Institution.

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Before bringing this brief report of the events of the past year to a close, we would commend the Institution and its interests to God, who has watched over it hitherto, and while thankfully noting the advance which has been made since the opening of the first Institution in 1882, when with few friends and more enemies it struggled for an existence, we would look forward with hope and confidence, invoking His blessing upon a bright and prosperous future, assured that if we are engaged in a good work, with a single eye to His service, that it will not be withheld.

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## Physician's Report.

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FREDERICTON, N. B.,  
March 17th, 1890.

*To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Institution for the Deaf  
and Dumb at Fredericton, N. B.*

GENTLEMEN :

In accordance with established custom, I have the honor to submit this my annual report as Physician to the Institution.

It affords me pleasure to say that there has been but little sickness in the past year. Most of the cases that I have been called on to treat have been colds, and of a mild character, yielding readily to treatment.

Influenza of a very severe type, which has been prevalent in city and county during the winter; many cases proving fatal, has marvellously avoided the school, and even LaGrippe we have looked for in vain.

The exemption from serious sickness is no doubt due chiefly to the care and attention the pupils receive from the Superintendent and Mrs. Woodbridge. Through their efficient management the inmates not only receive every attention, but the sanitary condition of their surroundings is carefully looked after.

I would suggest, when the new building is completed, that the government be asked to confer with your honorable body before supplying the Hospital with the furniture, etc., etc., required.

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## Terms of Admission.

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The Fredericton Institution for the education of the deaf and dumb, is situated at Hawthorne Hill, about a mile below the city.

I. Applicants for admission must be deaf mutes of sound intellect, good moral character and free from any infectious disease.

II. The annual charge is \$80 a year, payable semi-annually, in advance, for which sum is provided, boarding, lodging, washing, tuition, medical and dental attendance.

III. Pupils will be received from between the ages of seven and eighteen.

IV. Exceptions to the above will be taken into consideration by the Managing Committee.

V. The session commences on the first of September, and terminates on the first of July. The proper time for admission is at the commencement of the session. No pupil to be removed from school during the term, without consent of the Committee.

VI. All the pupils are expected to go home for the mid-summer holidays, on the first of July, and to return punctually on the first of September. The Christmas holidays are spent at the Institution.

VII. Parents and guardians are required to furnish their children with a good and sufficient supply of clothing, and to renew the same when needed. Every article must be marked with the child's name in full to ensure against loss. Parents should deposit a small sum of money with the Principal for the purchase of necessary articles when required. An account of which will be kept and rendered at the end of the session.



VIII. No sleeping accommodation is provided at the Institution for relatives and friends visiting the pupils.

IX. When applying for admission, the following questions should be answered in writing :

1. What is the full name of the child?
2. When and where was the child born!
3. Was he born deaf? If not, at what age did he lose his hearing, and by what disease or accident?
4. Has he had the Measles, Scarlet Fever or Whooping Cough? Has he been vaccinated?
5. Are there any cases of deafness in the same family, or among their relatives?
6. How many brothers and sisters has he?
7. What are the names, occupation, and post office address of the parents?
8. Was there any relationship between the parents before marriage?
