WHAT WILL BECOME OF THE CANADIAN SENATE?

It's Fate Was Discussed in House of Commons Yesterday--Some Members Would Abolish It As Useless While All Favor It's Reform.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—In the house today Mr. Foster moved for a return showing all advances to ministers of the crown and their private secretaries on account of traveling or other expenses in connection with the imperial conference.

Mr. McIntyre, South Perth, moved the following resolution: "That this house deem it expedient to invite the honorable the senate, to cooperate with it by means of conferences or joint committees in giving consideration to the advantages to be gained by changes in the composition of the senate, looking to:—

1. An age limit for retirement and a shortened term of service for future senators.
2. An extension to other authorities, than the present one, of power to select persons for the filling of a portion of future vacancies in the senate.
3. A rearrangement of some of the duties and work of the two houses.
4. And in making recommendations regard to these and other changes calculated to place the senate in a position of increased usefulness and of increased responsibility to the people."

In speaking to it he said that it was decided to discuss two other resolutions on the same subject at the same time. The resolution in the name of Mr. Miller, South Grey, was as follows: "That the Canadian senate as an institution had not proved to be of any decided benefit to Canada and cannot be regarded as a necessity. That the disadvantages connected with and resulting from the maintaining of the senate greatly outweigh the advantages and benefits derived therefrom, and that the senate may with advantage and gain be abolished."

Mr. Lewis of West Huron had the third resolution which reads: "Resolved, That in the opinion of this house it will be advisable at the next general election for the house of commons for Canada to submit the following questions for the votes of the people:—

1. Shall the senate of Canada be abolished?
2. Shall the method of appointment of the senators of Canada be altered?"

Mr. McIntyre said that there were numerous evidences of dissatisfaction with the senate. Some change was necessary. It was the conditions surrounding the members of the senate and not the senators, that he was discussing. The question really was to end or mend the senate. Abolition was not workable. It would place the destinies of Canada with the commons. Abolition would also require a referendum. One remedy was a lesser average age of senators.

The country would gain if the senate was composed of members twenty-five per cent appointed by provincial legislatures, and a number by the opposition in the commons. The present was a good time for a change.

Mr. Lewis spoke briefly. He was not in favor of abolition, but favored a material change.

Mr. Miller spoke in favor of abolition. The senate was comparatively useless, not necessary and not worth its cost to the people. The house of Lords was less objectionable than the senate.

Continuing, Mr. Miller said that the sovereign in England had power to appoint new members in the House of Lords, and besides the senators were able men. Scott, Cartwright, Bowell and Rose. They would not be there if an age limit was made. He had no idea that the senate was any check on hasty legislation or that it afforded protection of the smaller provinces. No more appointments should be made and when the number is reduced to 50 it should be abolished. The fifty could retain the title of "honorable" and \$2,000 a year while they live.

The debate was continued by Mr. Schell

tion leader had never given in a concrete form what should be done. Changes did not always mean reform. The first change should be in the number of senators appointed. The number was now altogether too large. To abolish the senate was too drastic. It was a protection to the smaller provinces. The state of New York had no more senators than Rhode Island.

Instead of the present system each province should be represented by a limited number. Now they were represented by groups. His remedy was that each province should benefit the same. Let us say that would give a senate of fifty-four which would be a pretty strong body. Ontario in that body would have no more than Prince Edward Island. He said six provinces should be more. What he would insist on would be that all provinces would be alike represented on the same footing. Senators ought to be appointed for a limited term. As to the manner of appointment, he wished it was some way else. But having the power they had to do the best they could. No one would desire more elections.

It had been suggested that the house should elect the senators, but he was not quite sure that would maintain provincial representation, but for that he supported it. He thought both parties should be represented. The senate should be reformed, and the question was conducted on all points. He moved the adjournment of the debate.

Mr. Foster agreed with a good deal of what the premier said. So far as he was concerned he had no quarrel with the constitution of the senate. If the senate maintained the character and influence which it formerly possessed there would be no dissatisfaction with it. It was not because of the constitution that the people were opposed to the senate. The manner and quality of the appointments were the cause of dissatisfaction. The debate was instructive and all the more so because not conducted on party lines. Good work was done by men who did not run elections. The senate was wrong because it was the absolute creation of one man. The senate should be reduced to one-half. The older provinces would not be satisfied with less than ten and it would not be possible to give ten to P. E. Island, with its four members. About one term of parliament would be sufficient for a senator, and election by the house would not do. He believed in an elective senate, with different constituencies from the commons with, say, a ten years term. The provinces should be the electoral division. They should trust to the common sense of the people. The debate was adjourned.

Mr. Crockett was informed by the premier that the contractor for the I. C. R. freight car repair shop at Moncton was E. A. Wallberg, the bulk sum contract for was \$56,630, to date \$54,547 had been paid on account. There have been no extras. The contract for the passenger car repair shop, passenger car paint shop and office building at Moncton were awarded to A. Wallberg under a tender for \$184,945. On account of the paint shop \$147,736 has been paid. No extras have been paid. The contract for I. C. R. planing mill at Moncton was awarded to Rhodes, Curry & Co. for \$23,963, and has not been transferred. To date \$23,007 has been paid on construction account. There have been no extras.

WHO IS RESPONSIBLE?

The Times prints today some extraordinary facts regarding the conduct of the International Railway Co., of New Brunswick in its efforts to secure laborers from England. In December this journal told the story of a man who was one of about two hundred brought to the province with the assurance that they would get at least six months' work, and be able to save about \$6 per week. These men found the conditions entirely different from what they had been led to expect, and very soon after their arrival many of them left the some operations. This man, with several others, was arrested and spent some days in Dalhousie jail. Some of those men earned money in one way or another to pay their way back to England, some worked their way back, and some are still in the country, anxiously looking for work that will enable them to pay their way, and, in the case of some of them, to send a little money back to their families. One can imagine how the letter which the Times publishes on another page today would appeal to a man in the city of Manchester, who had a family and only the bare means of subsistence. He would think of that \$6 per week clear, and of that one hundred acres of land in a model settlement, of which he would become the possessor if his work proved satisfactory. One can also imagine what his feelings would be when he came to New Brunswick and learned the actual conditions and found that neither the \$6 per week nor the model settlement existed outside of the imagination of the agent of a company which sought cheap labor. The International Railway Co. has received enormous subsidies from the province of New Brunswick, and may seek for more. By what right do its agents injure the prospects of New Brunswick as a field for immigrants by making false representations to the working men of England? This is a question which calls for an answer. Premier Robinson proposes to send immigration agents to the old country. They will be met on arrival with the prejudices aroused by the International Railway Co., which has been one of the pets of the government for years past. In view of the disclosures made in this issue of the Times, it would seem to be the duty of somebody to make some explanations.

JAPANESE IMMIGRATION

The Victoria Colonist points out that the new order-in-council which prohibits immigrants from landing unless they come from the country of their birth or citizenship by continuous journey will shut out all Japanese who come via Hawaii, or California or Mexican ports. It will also exclude nearly all Hindus, since there is no direct service from India, most of the Punjabis coming via Hong Kong. The question of emigration is very widely discussed in Japan as shown by quotations from the press. We quote further from the Colonist: "Japanese newspapers say the two main items in the Canadian proposals were reduction of the number of immigrants from Japan and restriction of the qualifications of such immigrants. According to the Japan Herald of Yokohama, the latter item specifies the following qualifications to be possessed by those willing to enter the Dominion of Canada: Emigrants arriving in Canada for the purpose of engaging in agricultural pursuits must be men who have adequate capital and intend to permanently reside there, clerks in business firms having head office in Japan, and men trained for special vocations, such as gardeners, etc. The new regulation will have the effect of rendering useless the agitation of Japanese emigration companies to secure the cancellation of the restriction of passports given to Japanese going to Hawaii whereby they are permitted to proceed to other countries from the islands. In this connection the Japan Herald says:

"The united meeting of the emigration agents, now in session in Tokyo, has passed a resolution recommending the revision of the emigrants protection law, on the basis of freedom of travel guaranteed by the constitution, the amalgamation of all the emigration companies, the cancellation of the words 'Hawaii only' in the passports granted to the Japanese immigrants to Hawaii, and the establishment of a new emigration bureau in the foreign office. A committee appointed at a previous sitting to ascertain the views of the government on the emigration question submitted its report on an interview with Count Hayashi, the minister for foreign affairs, to the effect that while the government was prepared to assist the development of emigration, such development must be sought in the direction of least resistance, and that he (Count Hayashi) thought South America was most favorable for the development of Japanese emigration. It is stated that the meeting will formulate a revised emigration law, with a view to introducing it during the coming session of the diet."

The statement of Bishop Richardson concerning the Scott Act contains one sentence which should be given a possible emphasis. We quote: "I believe it is better for a community to suffer by the enforcement of an unwise law, than that the public sense of the dignity of the law should be lowered by it becoming practically non-effective." His lordship does not believe that the Scott Act is as good as a high-license law would be in Fredericton, but he would have the Scott Act enforced. If the authorities could be prevailed on to enforce the law it is possible that it would be found to be a good law. If not, it would be repealed. Therefore, enforce the law.

It is worthy of note that in the debate on senate reform or abolition in the house of commons yesterday not one of the speakers, not even the premier himself, expressed satisfaction with the senate as at present constituted. This is a hopeful indication. The various speakers held somewhat divergent views as to the form the reconstruction should take, but this is natural and desirable. Out of the many suggestions a workable and satisfactory scheme can in due time be evolved. There is evidently no strong sentiment either in parliament or the country in favor of the abolition of the senate. But it must be reformed.

Death has claimed an excellent citizen in the person of Mr. Charles F. Tilley. He was not a man who sought public honors, but for a time served the city as the aldermanic board, and paid close attention to his duties. Perhaps the best tribute that can be paid to Mr. Tilley is the statement that he was always popular among the men in his employ. This popularity was due to his generous nature, and his thoughtfulness for the personal welfare of those around him. Charitable without ostentation, he had also the happy faculty of making warm friends among his associates in life.

The Times has spoken many times in praise of juvenile courts, modeled after that of the "Kid's Judge" in Denver. Police Magistrate Ritchie has opened a juvenile court in St. John, under the provisions of the revised statutes, which provide that the public be excluded from the hearing of cases against juvenile offenders. The citizens will welcome the new departure if it may be made more effective than former methods in dealing with conditions in this city which have shocked the thoughtful observer of child life, as too often revealed in the police court.

If, instead of saying that there is not a strong enough public sentiment to ensure the enforcement of a law, those high in authority should unitedly bend their energies to create such a sentiment the result would be more satisfactory. This, of course, assumes that they regard that at which the law is aimed as an evil which ought to be suppressed. When pessimism begins high up, it naturally spreads and becomes more pronounced as it descends the scale.

Certain large corporations are shown to have had a partiality for Japanese labor, and to have encouraged immigration. After all, the Japanese were not wholly to blame for the influx into British Columbia.

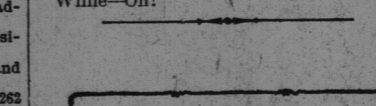

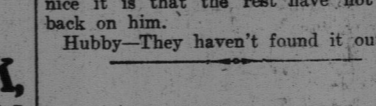

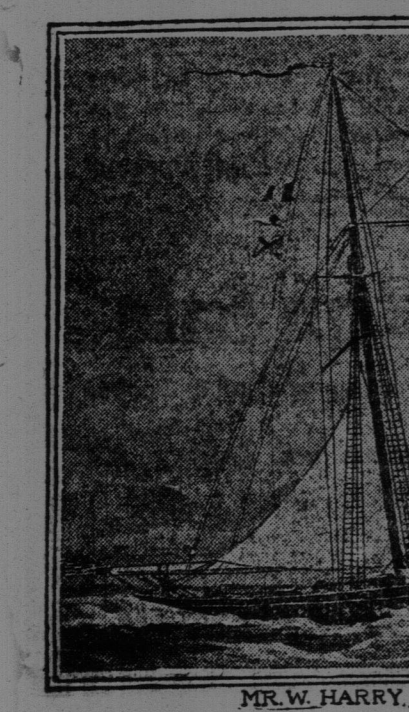

The bank's affairs, he said, improved considerably during the last seven months of 1907, and the directors had every reason to be satisfied.

Mr. Campbell thinks the shareholders will get 100 cents on the dollar. All under the New York, 1,500 shares, and the par value of these shares is \$300,000, and it is said there are a few more shares not under these names, making Morgan's holdings more than \$300,000.

MACKENZIE KING REPORTS ON THE ORIENTAL IMMIGRATION

He Found That Canadian Corporations Brought Many Japanese Into the Dominion as Laborers—Recommends Curbing of Influx by Drastic Regulations.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—The report of Mackenzie King, the royal commissioner appointed in November last to inquire into the question of the influx of Oriental laborers to Canada, was tabled in the house of commons tonight. It is a most illuminative and exhaustive statement of the result of his most searching inquiry into the vexed problem of Japanese immigration, and throws an entirely new light on the generally accepted opinion, as to the responsibility of the Japanese government for the sudden increase in the number of the Japanese landing in British Columbia last summer.

Mr. King says, "and to the prejudice which has been aroused against her people in some quarters, it is not to be forgotten that in the past year the exception permitting the immigration of companies to send laborers to Canada was made conditional upon the production of the foreign office of Japan of the duplicates of bona fide agreements with responsible employers in this country, the bona fides of which required the Japanese government to send their agents to Canada."

OF INTEREST TO DRUGGISTS

Inter-Provincial Registration to be Taken Up by N. B. Pharmaceutical Society.

A matter of considerable interest to St. John druggists and one that has been agitating them for some time, is to be dealt with at a meeting of the New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society on February 4th. It is the question of affiliation with the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association, organized at Toronto, Sept. 3rd, 1907.
